## **Mowing Regimes**

High Peak Borough Council have agreed 'A New Approach to Mowing regimes across the High Peak' as part of their Parks Strategy - Enhancing Biodiversity in our parks - High Peak Borough Council - and Manor Park is included. This is a really positive step and one those involved in Friends of Manor Park wanted some time ago. We had hoped that High Peak Borough Council would include three grass verges in Old Glossop as part of this pilot, however at the moment this is limited to parks. We are continuing to work with the council so we are in a position to move this forward as soon as we can, and will update you on progress.

## Bioblitz Recording Event, 10am – 2pm, Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> June at Ashwood Park Buxton

The council is working with High Peak Biodiversity Network and will be holding Bioblitz recording events throughout the High Peak. These events will show residents how to establish and record baseline species in an area. This can then help with identifying how biodiversity is affected by any changes that are made, recording how species diversity changes over periods of time.

The Bioblitz event at Ashwood Park, Buxton, on Saturday 7th June will now take place from 10am -2pm, starting from the Wetherspoons/Fairfield Road end. The aim of the visit is to take a leisurely but thorough look at all that nature has to offer in this edge of town park, recording flowers, birds, insects etc. There will be four specialist forays led by Steve Price (lichens), Helen Waterman (mosses and bryophytes), Jon Mortin (insects) and Sheila Stubbs (plants). You're welcome to bring along sweep nets, magnifying lenses and sample pots if you have them, but they're not essential. Parking available at Wye Street or Sylvan Road:
