The Onslow Arboretum

and...

Last June our talk was presented by the M.D. Of "**SAFEGUARD COACHES**" which was celebrating its first 90 years. This Guildford based family owned business then celebrated its success at the coach and bus industry's premier awards event after being named Small Bus Operator of the Year. This coveted accolade was presented at the routeONE Awards held in November in Birmingham. It is an award that recognises excellence and confirms that Safeguard Coaches is among the best in the country. After collecting the trophy from celebrities Tim Vine and Steph McGovern, Andrew Halliday, Managing Director said: "Being recognised as the best small bus operator nationally in this hard fought competition is a huge accolade and well deserved recognition for all our drivers, supervisors, engineers and managers in this our 90th year of operation. We are very proud of our success." Now and then we receive enquiries concerning the Arboretum. Without exception they are positive. We put up a sign last year giving information about the Mike Hawthorn memorial tree and I'm pleased to report that the sign and the tree have survived. So, we are now going to put up more signs concerning the history and creation of the Arboretum on the (empty) reverse side of the notice board.

Briefly, the history is that this one time farm field may have been in the centre of a larger Onslow Village if the 1920s plans had been fully implemented or it may have been covered in houses when Onslow Village Ltd. was wound up in 1984. However, following a campaign GBC adopted the field as an Arboretum.

The theme of this botanical garden is '80 Trees from Around the World' but a count some time ago recorded more than 250 trees. The storms in early 2014 felled a number of the larger trees which we hope will allow new trees to be planted and this would provide a greater 'age mix' of the trees in the collection.



The Weald and Downland Museum

At our 11th November talk John Walsh, a long standing volunteer at the Museum, arrived in period clothes which are not, he emphasised, a costume but appropriate dress of the time. He explained the work of the museum and how it has extended its collection of tools and artefacts to add to its many historic buildings. The Museum is justly proud of its Downland Gridshell, a very large modern 2 level building, an incredible and lightweight structure made of oak laths that was completed in 2002. This is one of a very small number of gridshell structures in Britain. Its design and method of construction are unique. A very high degree of carpentry skill went into its fabrication, emulating, but not imitating, the traditional framed buildings at the Museum. John's enjoyable and jovial presentation was also fascinating - it's not everyday you see four-bladed shears!

The 24 Hour Trench

On the 13th January Andy Robertshaw, who is a military historian with a national reputation for bringing the past to life, explained what WW I trench life was really like and why it differs from the current and generally accepted view. As an example, old soldiers remember it in colour while our images are in Black and White. Andy told us of the experience he gained from building a replica of a specific part of a WWI trench and then observing a squad of serving soldiers with WW I period kit and supplies living in it for 24 hours and operating under the trench orders of the original occupants. The practical insights gained from this experiment are now used on WW I archeological digs. Andy's illustrated talk was a perfect balance of interest and elucidation.

AN INVITATION TO INVESTIGATE

The GBC 'new' LOCAL PLAN is being re-evaluated and pending the General

Election on 7th May it is unlikely that there will be a further major announcement until then. It seems that attention is currently focused on the 'CIL' - the Community Infrastructure Levy which introduces charges on developments to fund infrastructure improvements to mitigate the worst affects on the area of new developments. However, one of the salient themes of a number of the largest proposed developments is the use (or misuse depending on your view) of greenbelt and the impact upon sites of outstanding natural beauty. So to prepare for the time when we are again asked for our comments we can familiarize ourselves with what is currently in the proposed development sites. Maps are fascinating to pore over and walking we are told is good for us ; so if you want to improve your knowledge of our local area get busy.

ONSLOW VILLAGE and the whole surrounding area lies in the south-west corner of the former mediaeval Royal Park of Guildford, founded by Henry II (1154-89) and which remained in Royal ownership until 1624. The park was significant in its size and importance conveyed through royal ownership, with the presence of the Royal Manor House on the site of the present Manor Farm, pinpointing this site as the centre of a wider historical and cultural landscape.

The Sites and Monuments Record SMR 1657 refers to a Mediaeval moated site of Guildford Park Manor, Manor Farm (recently renamed by the University as Manor Park so we will forget it was a farm). This is a Scheduled Ancient Monument - Number 12763. It is the site of 12th to 17th century Royal Mansion and Hunting Lodge. No visible traces of the Royal Hunting Lodge and Manor House exist, but the moat survives as a water-filled feature on the north and east and as a dry ditch on the south and west sides. The site contained the remains of a building dating from the 13th to 16th century. It was designated as a Scheduled Ancient Monument in 1990 and therefore both the monument and its setting are subject to protection.

The boundary of the Royal Park followed the south westernmost boundary of the site. Traditionally enclosed by a ditch and a bank topped by a pale fence, this is still a fairly significant landscape feature formed by a row of vegetation and as a boundary of a demonstrably pre-1600 estate, it is protected under the Hedgerow Regulations 1997. It should further be noted that the pale fence boundary of the park can be seen on historical mapping to enclose Manor Copse. The boundary of the park leads further northwards and is still represented as a coherent feature within the present day landscape as the boundary between Strawberry Grove and the Surrey Research Park, following the line of footpath Number 446 north to form the boundary between Park Barn and the countryside to the west.
