Your Committee

The Committee of ten shown on you membership card has recently gained three new members. This means the work can be reorganised with some of the tasks being taken on by these keen new volunteers. Our new Treasurer is Peter Walker, Anthony is continuing to co-ordinate our liaison work monitoring local issues. Howard Moss will be taking over as Membership Secretary. John will continue organising our 'distribution' helpers. Jane Shipp will be our Talks Secretary. Sally is still our contact for external publications. We welcome Peter, Howard and Jane and thank them for volunteering as co-opted members of your committee.

Members

Generally when we are asked to address a specific issue all we can do is advise individuals on the best way for them to register their complaint. However, we arranged, with the aid of our councillors Adrian Chandler and David Goodwin, for GBC to clear the traffic islands in Curling Vale. This was particularly important because members in Thorn Bank considered the growth obstructed the view for drivers. Some suggested that the residents had opted to tend to these plots and others that they had been told not to. GBC confirmed that both islands were taken over by the 'community association' as a project completed by their Planning and Landscape Architect Depa rtment about 10 years ago. However, GBC have now agreed to maintain these islands from now on and that they would be cleared when the verges in the area are cut.

Future Developments

The Green Belt, Save the Hogsback, the University and Blackwell Farm

As a reminder, a fundamental review of the Guildford Borough draft Local Plan was called for just prior to the elections (which are a distant memory now). The planning can now resume. Blackwell Farm is the largest new settlement area (265 hectares of green belt) being proposed in the Plan and has been earmarked for 2,250 homes but the University, which owns the site, is pushing for more than 3,000.

The 'Save the Hogsback' group have updated their website. They are saying ...

"it is time to start serious fundraising. A barrister will be needed (with in-depth knowledge of the planning system) to represent local residents at the (draft) Local Plan Inspector's Inquiry. The cost will be in the region of £5-6k so we are now asking for donations. These can be made via the recently updated 'Save Hogs Back' website at http://savehogsback.co.uk/?page_id=263 - just click on the "Donate" button. The University has spent thousands on consultants for their proposed development, but the 'Save the Hogsback' group are relying on the generosity of supporters in order to save this important green belt landscape."

Garden Club Report

In the last edition of the Village Voice I recalled the success of our Spring Show, and now it is time to think of the Summer Show which was held on June 17th. The Johns Hall was full of colour and fragrance from roses, sweet peas, pinks and flowering pot plants. The class with most entries was for a vase of mixed garden flowers. A popular subject for flower-arrangers had a fairy story as its theme. One that caught the eye was "Goldilocks and the Three Bears", and another "Three Little Pigs". Petite arrangements depicting the seashore showed great ingenuity in the use of natural materials. While judging was in progress, we had an illustrated talk by the Lead Ranger of the Devil's Punch Bowl, maintained by the National Trust. He dealt mainly with re-shaping the land reclaimed from the old road after the building of the tunnel. It had to be filled in and contoured. In places the slopes were strengthened with hessian and sown with heathers and suitable grasses to return it to the habitat where Dartford warblers, woodlarks and stonechats would feel at home. Also in June, a coach-load of members spent a day at Borde Hill Gardens in Sussex. At the Village Picnic on the Rec our stall was mainly planned for young families, with activities for children, and we hope, a chance for parents to learn about the Garden Club.

After the Club meeting on July 15 where Mr Paul Gallivan's subject was Woolbeding Gardens, Sussex, we have an August break. We compensate by meeting twice in September! Our main event of the year is our 69th Annual Show, on 5th September, open to the public at 3pm. The classes for cookery, crafts and photography as well as the usual fruit, flowers, vegetables and floral art will have already been judged. Mr Clive Stone of Oak Leaf Enterprises will present the prizes at 4pm. Visitors can sit and enjoy light refreshments, and, perhaps think of joining the Garden Club themselves.

We meet on most third Wednesday evenings of the month at 7-30. (phone 577035) The second September gathering will be on 16th. Mr John Hall takes the subject 'The many uses of heathers'. That takes our thoughts back to the Punch Bowl, with its Heather-tinted slopes.
