The Chairpersons Message

As we come up to our much delayed AGM on Tuesday 14th September it falls to me to make our usual call for new blood on the committee. We have had a couple of new members join over the two years of my Chairmanship, and very welcome and helpful they are. However in order to be fully effective I feel we still need more volunteers covering a wider diversity of ages and interests if we are to properly represent the residents of Onslow Village and respond appropriately to their needs. Onslow Village remains a community with many useful and fun activities taking place. People are swopping things, organising events, canvassing opinion, offering covid support and many other activities on the wide range of social media that now exist. OVRA was started over a 60 years ago and still has a place within the community It offers a talks programme that still remains popular. It has organised the annual Christmas Tree and the Advent windows that gave a lot of pleasure to many.. It has organised popular street parties to mark special events in the life of the village. More importantly it helped to coordinate the efforts to support the vulnerable during the worst periods of the Covid crisis. However there have been huge changes in the social fabric of Onslow village in recent years. People are better connected through social media, and tend to organise group events directly with other like minded individuals through social media. As such the role of OVRA in providing a social hub for Onslow Village has declined. These changes are very apparent when viewing our membership numbers which have been declining. Moreover the average age of our membership appears to be increasing. More recently this may be due to the hiatus of the Covid pandemic, but it also may signal a more fundamental change. So the question is, is it time to recognise that OVRA, in its present form, is no longer in step with the modern world.

If so we need to recognise this and decide how we might change to best support the requirements of Onslow Village going forward.. To do this we must ask some serious questions regarding the purpose of OVRA: *Is there* still interest in organised social activities such as Quiz nights, musical evenings, film nights and disco/dance evenings? Or are these best left to interested parties to organise for themselves through social media. *Is there* still interest in our talks? We have run these for many years now and they appear popular, however possibly serving members of our community who may not be able easily to access social media. Is there an interest in widening this out? Should we continue to run some or all of these via zoom? *Do we* need to be more active in the political arena? Onslow Village faces many pressures over the next few years. A3 widening, more housing, an expanding university, and increasing traffic burdens are just a few of the things in our future which may impact us, so does a residents association have a useful role here, or is this best left to groups interested in specific issues, and our local Councillors? *How do* we better involve all sectors of our community? We are very actively supported by seniors, but is there a role for OVRA with younger residents and families?

We would be grateful for your opinions on this, whether or not you are currently a member. You can write to me with your thoughts (ray_gwgc@hotmail.co.uk) or come to our AGM at the Village Hall of the 14th September at 6:30 pm (Covid restrictions permitting)

What's in a Name?

There's Watt's Gallery and Watt's Chapel of course? But nearer to home consider your own address. Does this have some largely forgotten significance? Some of our local street names seem obvious like Orchard Road, Farm Walk and the Farnham Road. Even these can have more specific relevance like Farm Walk that led to Wilderness Farm, and hence as most of you know we have Wilderness Road. The Dominican Friary inspired Friars Gate.

It is hard to visualise that in the 12th century this area was thickly forested, teeming with wildlife, particularly deer, and witnessed the sights and sounds of the Royal Hunt. It was probably an extension of the forests of Windsor. Is this the origin of Windsor Close. These hunting grounds were known as Guildford Park and our Cathedral now stands on top of Stag Hill. Ludlow, Genyn, and Bray Roads are named after King's Keepers of the Park. Henry Plantagenet's court was based in Guildford Castle. Hunting lodges are said to have been sited above the present rail station and in Walnut Tree Close. When the Castle needed repair, the court was moved to a Manor at Blackwell Farm, where the foundations can still be seen. Hence, we have Manor Way and Old Palace Road. Eleanor of the Acquitaine was Henry's lady so we have Queen Eleanors Road in the village and QE School. Litchfield Way is named after Mr Frederick Litchfield who was due to be the first Chairman of the Onslow Village Management Committee which moves us from the the 1100's into the 1920's.

There maybe more to your address than you are aware of!



Refurbishing Jubilee Gardens

Surrey County Council Survey on Traffic Flow in and out of The Drive

As you will have noticed the Village Voice has come with a questionnaire document with a Freepost return address. This has been prepared by Cllr Angela Goodwin in consultation with SCC engineers giving what they feel are possible options for traffic flow in The Drive. This has been initiated by a recent petition on this issue. Cllr Goodwin approached OVRA to see if we would distribute a link to an online survey. We agreed to do this but being aware that some of our residents are not comfortable online we asked that a paper version be prepared. Cllr Goodwin agreed with this. However SCC had no budget for this and Cllr Goodwin had to look for other solutions. The local Liberal Democrats have agreed to fund the printing. This means that the paper will have a liberal Democrat logo attached to it but we are assured that the content is identical to the SCC online version with the exception of the process for returning the hard copy. OVRA has agreed to distribute this under the following conditions.

- 1. That this is a survey by SCC to determine the best solution for The Drive closing date 30th July 2021.
- 2. That an online version of the survey is available at the following link -

https://www.surreysays.co.uk/deputy-ceo/makingthedrivesafer/

- 3. That the options have been chosen by SCC in consultation with their engineers
- 4. That the survey is the same as that prepared on behalf of SCC except were strictly necessary to facilitate return of the hard copy surveys

That the survey is currently informal but formal proposals for change will be subject to formal consultation. OVRA has agreed to distribute the survey to ensure as far as we are able that the whole of Onslow Village sees this survey and therefore has the opportunity to comment. OVRA takes no view on the benefits of any option and does not endorse any of the options given. We merely want to make sure that Onslow Village is properly consulted. We trust that you will agree that any changes to The Drive will affect Onslow Village as a whole and that the opportunity for all residents to comment was important.

Our Village AED box is positioned alongside the Main Doors to the Village Hall with its external sensor light and level / ramp access to the car park and road. We would like our local residents and Hall users to be familiar with the Automated External Defibrillator (AED). Safe use is aided by reassuring and easy to follow programmed audible instructions. Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is part of this procedure and a valuable potentially life-saving skill.
