RULES

- 1 Exhibits to be staged between 08.15 and 9.45 am.
- 2 The Hall to be cleared of all Exhibitors promptly at 9.45 am.
- 3 The Show opens to the Public at 2.00 pm.
- 4 The Entry Fee is 20p per exhibit except for the children's section which is free.
- 5 Entry Forms and Fees to reach the Show Secretary not later than Sunday 1st September 2019.
Late entries are not permitted.
- 6 Prizes to be collected from the Show Secretary's table from 2.30 pm onwards. Money not claimed by 4.30 pm will be deemed to be a donation to the Society's funds.
- 7 Exhibits NOT to be removed before 4.00 pm.
- 8 Vases will be provided for all exhibits except Classes 31, 34, 35 and 41 - 49. No other vases will be allowed. Pot sizes specified are the approximate inside diameter.
- 9 Classes 42 - 49 exhibits must have been the property of the Exhibitor for three months.
- 10 Domestic and craft exhibits must have been made by the exhibitor.
- 11 All items in Craft Classes 67 to 74 must not have been entered before in Prestwood Gardening Society Shows. Please only enter completed works.
- 12 Entries are restricted to Members only with the exception of Domestic, Floral Art, Craft and Children's Classes.
- 13 All Exhibits shall be at the risk of the Exhibitor and the Society shall not be liable for loss, injury or damage from any cause whatsoever.
- 14 Trophies will be presented at the Show at 4.00 pm and are to be held for one year. They are to be returned to the Show Secretary or a Committee Member by Saturday 1st August 2020.
- 15 Points will be awarded as follows: -
Classes 21 and 41 ... 8; 6; 4
Remaining Classes ... 4; 3; 2 (Not Classes 23 & 24)
Only the Exhibitors highest award in each Class will count towards their score.
- 16 Trophies will be awarded to Members only.
- 17 In the event of a tie for a points trophy, the Member with the most 'Firsts' to be the Winner.

Some Tips for Exhibitors in the Floral Sections

Read the Show Schedule carefully before deciding your entries. The Judge will read the description of each class before judging it. If your entry does not meet the description it will be declared NAS - not according to schedule – and will not be included in the judging.

Judging Flowers and Ornamental Plants

In assessing the merits of most exhibits of flowers and some exhibits of pot plants consideration will be given to condition and uniformity.

Staging flowers and ornamental plants is particularly important. Although no points are awarded for arrangement, attractive presentations catch the eye of the judge. In the case of cut flowers in metal vases (supplied by the PGS) experienced exhibitors use newspaper or 'Oasis' in the vase to stabilise the individual stems.

The RHS Horticultural Show Handbook classifies Dahlias into 13 Groups (**Groups 1-10 are illustrated on the next page**).

Class 36 calls for 3 blooms from the Decorative Group.

Class 37 calls for 3 blooms from the Cactus Group

Class 38 calls for 3 blooms from the remaining 11 Groups.

Class 41 calls for a collection of mixed flowers in one bowl, with a maximum diameter of 8 inches. A bowl is a vessel where the mouth width measurement is at least equal to, but usually greater than its height. A vase has a greater height than the width measurement of its mouth.

Classes 42 – 49 give the exhibitor a wide range of possibilities, but ensure that your flower pot is clean and within the maximum pot size limits.

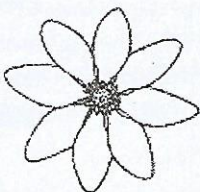

DAHLIAS

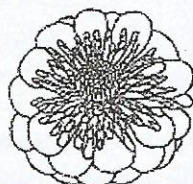
The variety of border hybrids offers a dazzling display of colour and form to every gardener, and no special skills are required to cultivate or propagate them. In colour the flowers range from deep reds, crimsons, purples, hues of mauve, and vibrant pinks to whites, apricots, oranges, bronzes, and brilliant scarlets, in size from the tiny pompons of 52mm (2in) to huge exhibition blooms greater than 254mm (10in) across.

Dahlias are excellent for providing cut flowers and will bloom vigorously throughout summer until the first frosts – provided with the right conditions a single plant may produce up to 100 blooms. Their various flower types (shown below) form the basis of the recognized groups.

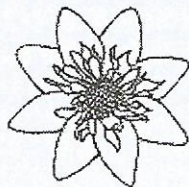
Single – each flower usually has 8–10 broad petals surrounding an open, central disc.



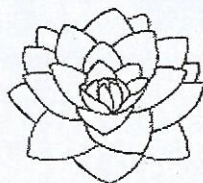
Anemone – fully double flowers each have one or more rings of flattened ray petals surrounding a dense group of shorter, tubular petals, usually longer than disc petals found in single dahlias.



Collerette – single flowers each have broad, outer petals, usually 8–10, and an inner 'collar' of smaller petals surrounding an open, central disc.



Water-lily – fully double flowers have large, generally sparse ray petals, which are flat or with slightly incurved or recurved margins, giving the flower a flat appearance.



Decorative – fully double flowers have broad, flat petals that incurve slightly at their margins and usually reflex to the stem.



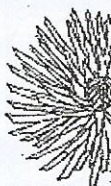
Ball – flattened to spherical, fully double flowers have densely packed, almost tubular petals.



Pompon – flattened to spherical, fully double flowers are no more than 52mm (2in) across – a miniature form of ball flowers.



Cactus – fully double flowers have narrow, pointed petals that can be straight or curl inwards and have recurved edges for more than two-thirds of their length.



Semi-cactus – fully double flowers are similar to cactus flowers but have broader-based petals, the edges of which are generally recurved towards their tips.



Miscellaneous – flowers are in a wide range of unclassified types, including orchid-like (shown right), single and double forms.

- 50 Quiche Lorraine using homemade short crust pastry:
max. size 8"
- 51 Apple Pie with homemade short crust pastry, max. size 8"
- 52 Six Brown Batch Rolls, own recipe
- 53 One White Loaf, own recipe, bread makers not allowed
- 54 Apricot & Walnut Loaf
350g/12oz strong white flour half a 7g sachet dried yeast
250ml/8½floz tepid water(¾) and milk(¼) 25g/1oz butter
1 level tablespoon granulated sugar 1 level teaspoon salt
35g/1¼oz chopped walnuts 55g/2oz dried chopped apricots
Put the flour and salt into a large bowl and rub in the butter.
Stir in the yeast, sugar, dried fruit and nuts then mix the liquid
into the dry ingredients. Knead for 10mins, then leave to rise,
covered in lightly oiled cling film, in a warm place, until doubled
in size (45mins – 1hr). Knock out the air from the dough and
put into a greased and floured 2lb loaf tin. Leave to rise as
before until doubled in size. Bake in a preheated oven for
around 30mins at 200°C/400°F/Gas 6. When ready the loaf
should have a hollow sound when tapped on the bottom.
- 55 Four Chocolate and Hazelnut Scones:
400g/1lb self-raising flour 100g/4oz butter
80g/3½oz caster sugar 180ml/6½ fl oz milk
60g/2½oz chocolate chips 40g/1oz chopped hazelnuts
Sift flour and sugar into a bowl and rub in the butter until it
resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the chocolate and
hazelnuts, then add the milk a little at a time, stirring with a
round bladed knife until you have a soft dough. Turn out on a
floured surface and roll out to about 3 cm thick. Stamp out
using a 7cm round cutter. Place on a baking tray and brush
tops lightly with milk. Bake for 20 – 25 minutes at
190°C/370°F/Gas 5. (makes about 8-10)

- 56** Swiss Roll, filled with Lemon Curd. 3 egg recipe
- 57** Oaty Cherry Cookies – Plate of Six
250g/9oz softened butter 50g/2oz caster sugar
100g/3½oz light muscovado sugar 225g/8oz porridge oats
150g/5½oz self-raising flour 50g/2oz raisins
200g/7oz glace cherries – ¾ of which roughly chopped
Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas4. Cream the sugar with the butter until white and fluffy. Stir in the flour and oats and mix well before adding all the cherries and raisins. Divide mixture in 18 equal portions and make into balls. Put onto lined baking sheets, well spaced, and flatten slightly with fingertips. Bake for 15 - 20 minutes, until pale golden at the edges, but still soft in the centre. Leave to cool.
- 58** Cut and Come again Carrot Cake
225g/8oz self-raising wholemeal flour 1tbs milk
225g/8oz soft margarine 3 medium eggs
225g/8oz soft brown sugar 100g/4oz sultanas
100g/4oz carrots peeled and grated 1 tsp mixed spice
Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas 4. Grease and line a 20 cm round cake tin. Sift the flour and spice into a bowl, then add all the other ingredients and mix to a dropping consistency. Pour into the tin, making the top smooth and level. Bake in the centre of the pre-heated oven for about 1 hour or until firm to the touch in the centre. Leave to cool in the tin. To finish sprinkle the top of the cake with caster sugar before serving.

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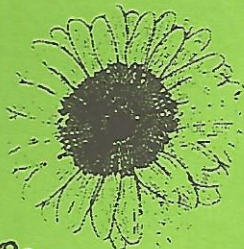
