DOG OWNERS RESPONSIBILITIES

I write as a concerned resident and as a dog owner having recently encountered a very distressing situation whilst walking with my dog.

My concerns are about owners allowing their dogs to run off lead in the area between Rettendon Village and Rectory Lane. In particular, I have frequently encountered two Staffordshire Bull Terriers running loose. My own dog has been intimidated by both these dogs.

A brown and white dog was recently involved in a sustained attack on another dog, it having run out of control across a large field. I was shocked to hear the ferocity of the attack, which lasted several minutes, and the sobs of the victim's female owner. I do not know the outcome, but I cannot imagine that serious injury was not sustained. This incident happened on the 20th March 2018.

We are fortunate to have open land to walk on, whether we are dog owners or just out for a pleasant walk in the country. It is not acceptable to feel intimidated by dogs running loose and barking at you or your own dog.

A reminder of the law regarding dogs is clearly required. There are two Acts of Parliament that deal with dogs:

- 1. The Dangerous Dogs Act 1991
- 2. The Dangerous Dogs Act 2014

The 1991 Act was introduced following a number of attacks on children. It identified four breeds of dog that were of particular concern. Staffordshire Bull Terriers are not one of those breeds listed in the Act.

The amended 2014 Act came into effect on the 13th May 2014. The law applies to all dog owners regardless of size or breed. Of particular relevance to the matter above, Section 3 of the Act creates a criminal offence for the person in charge of the dog to allow it to be 'dangerously out of control' in a public place.

A dog does not have to bite to be deemed dangerous in the eyes of the law. A dog is considered to be 'dangerously out of control' if it:

- Injures someone;
- Makes someone worried that it might injure them.

A court could also decide that a dog is 'dangerously out of control' if the following apply:

- It attacks someone's animal;
- The owner of an animal thinks they could be injured if they tried to stop a dog attacking their animal.

If a dog is attacked by another dog, the matter should be reported to the police.

I am sure that nobody would want to ban dogs from public places but, speaking personally, I want to feel safe when walking with or without my dog.

The remedies are simple:

- Keep your dog on a lead. Extending leads give dogs plenty of scope for enjoying their walks and, of course, they are capable of being under full control at all times.
- If you have any doubt about your dog's behaviour make sure that it wears a muzzle when in a public place.
- Take your dog to appropriate training classes.

To summarize, be a responsible dog owner. Observe these simple rules and everybody can feel safe and enjoy our beautiful surrounding countryside.

Battlesbridge Free Church

Our little church was called a Free Church because Christianity no longer had to conform the straight jacket of just one rigidly imposed form of worship from that time of 1852. A group of local business men and farmers were joint tenants of a piece of land in Battlesbridge and in 1843 a chapel was built to be used for public worship of Almighty God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, as usually conducted by Protestant Congregational or Independent Dissenters, holding both Infant and Adult Baptism under the supervision of the Church, meeting in the Chapel. There was provision for Deacons to be appointed to manage the conduct of church affairs with the proviso that all important decisions must be approved by the whole membership at a church meeting to be held once a month.

So there was democracy and freedom, where individual thoughts and opinions could be shared and where worships reflected the freedom Jesus gave for each individual to come to direct contact with him in Spirit.

Our country's culture and laws were built on Christian ethics. Our schools used to reflect this in teaching the faith handed down through the centuries. How sad that we seem to have allowed secularism, humanism, transgenderism and heavyhanded Political Correctness to blind the freedoms of thought and speech which were fought so hard for, not only through the centuries but for which many thousands died within the World Wars. But God is still God. He wont go away. He can't be disbelieved out of existence and in spite of our largely turning our backs on him, He still loves every one of us.
