The registered managing trustees of the bell field, with the help of many residents, will complete the north boundary with brand new fencing, which has been delivered and paid for with the charity funds.

Despite comments in the Parish Council Chairman's report, I can assure residents myself and the other five managing trustees will do our utmost to maintain and protect the wonderful asset of the Bell fields against all overtures. The Charity Commission of England are the governing authority. I had hoped this issue could be resolved without resorting to legal wranglings, but as the RPC Chairman states they have instructed a solicitor to act on the RPC's behalf. We, as trustees, have a requirement to act for the Bell Field charities.

It is true that the Bell Field trustees were appointed by the previous Parish Council, but we did not cease to be trustees with the election of the new Parish Council.

Dart Bus Services.

One of the directors has informed me they are very pleased with the public support to the service. Month on month the passenger numbers are increasing. I have had only one complaint, that a No 3 bus in Rettendon departed a few minutes early, which resulted in an hour wait! Dart have apologised to me. The bus service linking Southend, Basildon and Broomfield is still in the discussion stage. Great Baddow service now runs past Sandon School.

More importantly Dart are sending over new application forms for <u>Concession Fares</u> for school children and 6th form college pupils for travel to and from school on their bus route. Please contact me for further information.

Rettendon & Battlesbridge Newsletter October 2004

60 years on - The Summer of 1944

As we all know June 6th of this year marked the 60th anniversary of the D Day landings. What was life like in Rettendon as seen by a young boy in the summer of 1944.

In June, I had two months left at school under the Headship of Mr Griffen at Rettendon before going to Wickford senior school. Not knowing what it was all leading up to at the time, there was a lot of troop movements passing through the village, a convoy would take anything up to an hour passing through Rettendon heading for the ports.

The big thing when the convoys stopped for a rest, was all the boys in the village would gather round and ask the soldiers for buttons, badges or any part of equipment. To get a hat would be a real prize. The Army was billeted in Rettendon at what is now Rettendon New Hall, with the lodge serving as the Guard house at the gate. The Mess and Transport section were located in the (now derelict) barns adjacent to Rettendon Old Hall.

So this gave the young boys plenty to occupy themselves with. One pastime would be to sit on the School wall and watch the Army lorries fill up with petrol from the pump taken over by them on the forecourt of what was Oakdene Stores, owned at the time by Mrs Manders. It didn't take long to round up the boys in the village for a game of soldiers. We would dress up in our bits of uniform which we had collected and swapped with each other. Some of us would mount guard at the School gate, others would be on guard at the gateway to number one meadow, now the entrance to Meadow Road.

There would be a runner between the guards to report on those attacking; it all ended up very friendly. Another game I would play was with my friend at the time, (and for a long time afterwards) the late Tony Andrews, who had a collection of Dinky Toys. We spent hours playing soldiers again. In the village hall would be the film shows for the soldiers. The people in the village would get an invitation, which gave us something to look forward to.

During the war my mother was a collector for the Red Cross. Every Saturday morning I would set out with my brother and go around all the houses with my collecting box.

Both my parents (like a lot more people in the village) helped with War work by doing small assembly work. The work had to be collected from Bevan Bros. factory in South Hanningfield Road. In turn, my brother and elder sister would walk to the factory to deliver and collect more work.

1944 was the year the 1st Rettendon Scout Group had a photograph taken (many of you will have seen it), and was taken by the steps that now lead up to no 17 Crouch View.

There was no electricity in Rettendon so on Sundays I would pump the Church organ and for this I was paid $\pounds 1$ per quarter. For weddings and funerals I was paid an extra 2/6d or twelve and a half pence in today's currency.

As you can see in the summer of '44, there was plenty of things to occupy a young boy. No Television and never bored. **Raymond Spearman (***CHAS)*

I would like to reiterate: this newsletter is compiled from various entries and is not the work of any one person. The views expressed in this newsletter are those of the contributors and not necessarily those of the compiler, or of the Parish Council. This has been the case all along, though some seem to be unaware of it.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Council held their Annual Meeting at the end of May. This is when the Council elects a new Chairman and appoints members to its committees. It's also good practice to look at the Council's policies and make sure they are up-to-date with Council requirements and any new legislation.

The Council is also looking at providing some new streetlights on Hawk Hill and by Hayes Park. We have asked three firms to conduct a site visit and provide a design, which will then come back to a meeting for consideration. Work on the Rettendon Oak will be taking place to check its health, and once this is carried out we can look at any further work needed.

The Council is looking into the possibility of arranging a litter-pick and clean-up of the parish in the coming months. Support from the City Council is available for such an initiative. If anyone would be interested in being involved in this, or if you have any suggestions for particular areas, please let me know, or alternatively contact CIIr Glenys Jones on 07739 530611.

Rettendon Parish Council - Chairman's Report 8 May 2018

I'm pleased to provide the annual Chairman's report on what we've achieved so far and our goals for the next year for the benefit of the community of Rettendon and Battlesbridge.

1 Road safety

We continue to support Community Speedwatch which is a proven scheme for reducing excess speed and improving road safety. Curiously enough there's an article about CSW on the BBC website today. Of the 35,000 CSW letters sent out by TfL to motorists in London in the past two years, TfL says only 2% of recipients have re-offended. A study it conducted in north London suggested that volunteers working for a year were able to bring down the average speed by 11mph, to 31mph - below the 40mph limit.

We are fortunate to have a very dedicated Speedwatch co-ordinator, Sally-Ann Judd, working with Councillor Glenys Jones to coordinate with a team of volunteers.

Unfortunately the Rettendon Community Speed Watch have not been out recently due to a broken speed gun. This has now been replaced with a more up to date gun and the team are currently testing it. Once testing is complete and all of the team are competent in using it, they will be out and about again. With the VAS signs now working in Main Road Rettendon the majority of drivers do take notice of the speed limit, but there is still a small minority who do not.

If you are concerned about speeding in our village and want to do something about it, please do consider joining the Speedwatch team.

Our experience continues to be that, even if fully funded by RPC and supported by local residents, improvements in highway safety require the approval of Essex Highways, Chelmsford City Council and / or Essex Police, and getting approval takes much longer than we would like or expect.

• Essex Highways eventually agreed to replace the 2 broken vehicle activated speed signs (VAS) on the old A130 and to maintain them at no cost to the Parish.

• Following a survey, the Local Highways Panel (LHP) have agreed to improved signage for the playschools and primary school on Main Road and confirmed this is in their budget for this FY.

• LHP have agreed to provide additional horse and rider signage along Warren Road, Chalk Street and Hoe Lane, and they have confirmed this is in their budget for this FY.

• We were contacted by residents of Mayphil Park with concerns that emergency vehicles had difficulty locating them due to poor signage. New signs are now in place.

• The Parish Council agreed to fund 2 additional VAS signs on South Hanningfield Road and Old Woodham Road and the sites were surveyed by LHP. They decided that neither site was considered appropriate. We have challenged their analysis of the survey data, but received no substantive response.

• A speed survey on Hawk Hill resulted in a similar outcome. However, we are in discussion with Essex Legal Services, to install extra lighting on Hawk Hill, and pressing for improved signage on Hawk Hill roundabout to make the low bridge more obvious to drivers of high-side vehicles.

• We continue to press for a reduction in the speed limit on Chalk Street and Warren Road (currently 60mph) to something more appropriate for a country lane used by walkers, horse-riders and cyclists as well as motor traffic.

• We are also pressing for a reduction in the 50mph limit past the houses on Hoe Lane, or at least a footpath for residents to improve their safety following the substantial increase in traffic along Hoe Lane.

• In Battlesbridge, we continue to keep in touch with the residents, working on options to ease speeding and traffic through the village.

• Along the A132 (Burnham Road) we are working to deliver improvements for the residents of Hayes Country Park so they can enter and exit the site more safely. We are in discussion with Essex Legal Services, to install extra lighting on the Burnham Road, at the entrance to the Park.

2 Parish Meeting and Parish Poll

At the written request of 6 members of the parish, a parish meeting took place on 12 December 2017. Questions to the PC arising from the meeting were recorded and the PC prepared a Q&A document that was subsequently approved by the full PC and is available on our website. At that meeting, a parish poll was proposed and 17 of those present voted in favour of it. The question to be put to the parish was "Should there be a multi-purpose community building on the Upper Bell Field and paid for out of Parish Council Reserves?" The poll took

place on 11 Jan 2018. 125 votes were cast in favour of the motion, 203 against. We're not aware of any individual or group working to progress this as a project, for example finding out who would use it and for what purpose, and thinking through the economics of on-going operation as well as the initial design and construction costs. Taking the outcome of the parish poll and the apparent absence of any work to build a case for a multi purpose community building, the budget that had been set aside for building a pavilion on the Upper Bell Field has been reallocated by RPC to be available for a broader range of projects on the Bell Fields. Such projects would be requested by the Trustees and of course would have to be aligned with the purpose of the charity, ie "exercise and recreation for members of the parish."

Parish Polls must be administered by the principal council in which the parish is situated, so for us that is CCC, and the parish bears the administration costs. Publicly available figures indicate that the typical cost of a parish poll is between £2,000 and £5,000. The actual charge from CCC turned out to be £1,509.80.

3 R&B newsletter

The newsletter is in its 37th year of publication. According to Ron Fallows "the newsletter is a medium for the general exchange of information about past, present and future events, activities and happenings in the parish." RF also stated that "contributions are welcome however the right is reserved to accept, amend or reject contributions either in part or whole. The Collator's decision is final." As most of us will remember, the Collator was Ron Fallows himself, and Ron decided to step down from this role at the same time as ceasing to be a member of RPC.

This PC is most grateful to Barbara Wright who volunteered to step in as replacement Collator, and of course to the volunteers who distribute the newsletter. It continues to be a valuable source of information about events and activities in the parish, and the PC is pleased to continue to support it. We became concerned that the newsletter was being used to express personal opinions on controversial topics, and that the PC in paying for printing of the newsletter could be accused of using public funds inappropriately and potentially illegally (for example by the newsletter including an article containing language that might be considered offensive). Accordingly we proposed that each edition of the newsletter be circulated to all parish councillors, and our clerk, in advance of publication, so that any of us could express concerns about the content before publication. Bearing in mind that the newsletter had been until recently collated solely by the Chairman of the parish councillors seemed a reasonable and rather more democratic approach.

However, the PC was immediately accused of censorship and suppressing contributors' rights to free speech, so we have further proposed that each draft is reviewed by our clerk, and this arrangement seems to be working to the satisfaction of most people so far.

4 Bell Fields

Before this PC was elected in 2015, it was the practice of RPC to manage the Bell Fields as though they were their own assets. The agendas and minutes of PC meetings show this very clearly. For example, leases were signed by the previous Chairman, using RPC headed paper. Following the May 2015 election, one of the re-elected councillors has taken it upon themselves to assert that they and several other previously elected councillors are the "Managing Trustees" and that the Parish Council are the "Custodian Trustees." They refuse to recognise trustees appointed subsequently by RPC (even though parish records show their own appointment by RPC). RPC does not have the authority to waive its legal obligations, which in this case are to appoint trustees. We are advised that we have a duty to resolve this situation and have instructed a local solicitor to act on our behalf. The councillor in question refuses to engage in discussion and hence is forcing RPC to use parish funds. We have contacted the Charity Commission several times, but they are consistent in their response which is that this is a trustee dispute and they will not intervene (except in certain exceptional situations that we are not in, at least not yet).

Finally on this topic, I've heard various rumours about the PC wanting to build houses on the Bell Fields, wanting to stop football being played, and so on. Our agenda is straightforward and open: our role is to appoint trustees to the two charities that were established to manage the Bell Fields. That's it.

If either set of trustees approaches RPC for a grant, and RPC agrees that the purpose of the grant is aligned with the purpose of the charity, RPC will consider the application as it would any other application.

Even if every trustee decided that they wanted to build houses on the Bell Fields, they would need approval from the Charity Commission.

5 Flood Protection Works

Several areas of Rettendon have a history of flooding. We have declared our support for those residents at risk of flooding and continue to use our resources with those of other local authorities at City and County level to mitigate the risk.

6 Rettendon Parish Council administration

Our new clerk, Katherine Kane, has helped us update the format of our meeting agendas and minutes and has completed several projects including:

- Sorting through an accumulation of parish records
- · Setting up a new website
- Transitioning our book-keeping from hand-written to spreadsheet

• Updating our existing policies and, with help from some councillors, drafting many new policies for RPC approval where there were gaps (business continuity, information security, bullying and harassment, and so on)

7 Other items

Following the abrupt announcement of local bus services being terminated, a number of people took action to find alternative transport providers. May I thanks all of them again, especially on behalf of those reliant on public transport. Residents at Hayes Country Park told us they had no local Royal Mail post box. I'm pleased to report that Royal Mail have agreed to install a post box.

Finally, we are entirely open to consider suggestions from anyone in the parish for new projects: your ideas are very welcome.
