Collected Comments on the Parish Council Chairman's report, published in the July/August 2018 edition of the Rettendon and Battlesbridge newsletter.

The Parish Meeting was called at the request of a number of residents, exasperated by the apparent lack of action by the PC in doing anything whatsoever. With regard to the proposed construction of a community building on the Upper Bell field, the previous PC had drawn up detailed plans, held an exhibition, and conducted a Parish-wide survey, with a majority in favour of such a building. As this was being disregarded by the present PC, the poll was requested in order to try to progress the matter. Unfortunately, the question put to residents basically asked if the PC should spend lots of money, with the predictable turkey/Christmas response. Pointing out the cost of the poll cast those who called for it in a bad light. The sum involved is chickenfeed compared to that spent on solicitors (over £7,000 to date and £30,000 earmarked for further legal fees), which is not mentioned.

Which brings us to the thorny topic of the Bell Fields. A bit of background is needed here. The Bell Fields comprise 2 fields ('upper' and 'lower') opposite the Bell Public House, which were begueathed to 'The churchwardens and overseers of the poor in the parish of Rettendon' for the use of the people of Rettendon. The lower field was originally used as allotments and the upper field for a sports ground. At some time in the past, the churchwardens were replaced with the Parish Council who subsequently set up two registered charities for the two fields, with trustees taking on the role of administering the fields in accordance with the terms of the bequest. Information can be publicly viewed on the Charity Commission website (https://www.gov.uk/ government/organisations/charity-commission), charity numbers 271479 and 271480. The trustees were drawn from the parish council, but the two roles of parish councillor and trustee should have been kept separate. From this point there should have been no parish council involvement, as the Bell Fields became independent, properly registered charities. The change in Parish Councillors should have had no bearing on the trustees of the Bell Fields. Unfortunately, the people involved were not scrupulous in making clear what hat they were wearing (trustee or parish councillor) in their dealings regarding the Bell Fields. This has led the present PC to claim they still have some role in the running of the Bell Fields. However, instead of accepting the situation, the PC resorted to taking legal advice on the matter, which predictably said more legal work was required. The PC tried to impose new trustees and issued solicitors letters which intimidated the existing trustees. Trying to blame the legal expenditure on an unreasonable attitude shown by one councillor ignores the attitude shown by some of the other councillors which has caused this particular mess. There has also been interference by persons unknown who have caused damage to the existing building on the site, flooding of the field, attempts to change locks, and recently damage to the water supply to the lower Bell Field, all hardening attitudes.

The PC chairman's comment "I've heard various rumours about the PC wanting to build houses on the Bell Fields, wanting to stop football being played, and so on" is particularly interesting, as it implies this is all nonsense, but there is no actual denial given. It is undeniable that there have been attempts to try to stop South Woodham Ferrers Football Club (SWFFC) playing on the ground. Initially this took the form of a dispute over the signs erected by SWFFC, but escalated into solicitors letters being issued, and attempts to prohibit parking on the north side of the path which was the original line of South Hanningfield Road, as the PC claim ownership of that piece of ground, even though it should have been given to the Bell Fields in exchange for land taken when the original A130 was dualled at the junctions with the Hanningfield roads.

Edited by Paul Wright, Treasurer of Rettendon Horticultural Society, from comments received from <u>many</u> society members, and other villagers. I would prefer not to be involved, as I am no longer a village resident, but this is the situation as I understand it from many comments. The bad blood all stems from the ongoing feud between two village factions, no doubt both sides have their points, my wife is happy to include input from anyone in the newsletter, but rarely gets opposing views. The travesty here is the waste of public money on solicitors.

Battlesbridge Matters

Re: Traffic problems on the river bridge. I did apply some time ago to put traffic lights on the bridge for a 6 month period, to no avail. But my solution of a very bold white line across the North side of the bridge with a very large direction arrow pointing from the South to the line: then there is no argument who has right of way. A can of white road marking paint and a large brush – job done.

The annual barbeque was a great success for the "Friends of the Bell Fields". Members of the Rettendon Cricket Team turned up in their 'whites' to give instruction and demonstration of batting. The singers turned up, but unfortunately the heavens opened up, hamburgers floated off the table, but many brought umbrellas and all started to sing "I'm singing in the rain", and "It's pouring". A very memorable barbeque. And next morning another barbeque on the river bank 70 dressed up as pirates, etc. rowed from the Yacht Club along the river. Slept Saturday afternoon! Are there any residents who would like to row with us?

Regarding the Bell Fields area: the small section of the field north of the original line of the South Hanningfield Road termed by C.C. as the consolation land, was given in lieu of the land taken from the charity fields for the widening of the old A130 (now the A1245) in 1969. This consolation land is governed by the enclosure award of 1861. This transfer was endorsed by the County Solicitor. In other words the P.C. held the deeds and the Managing Trustees are there to maintain and "run the field" with no influences from the P.C.

I have suggested to the P.C. they send a request to ask the Charity Commission whether the registered Managing Trustees, as recorded with the Charity Commission, are legal or not. We have direct contact with the Charity Commission and I will faithfully pass their request on as the Commission are the high authority.

I really hope they accept my offer and this will save any more money being spent (the P.C. have set aside £30,000 of council funds!). A judge will probably ask the question too.

I have also asked, as Hayes Park Residents are now paying Council Tax, where is their contribution going? This represents a very large number, say 400(?), residents but the precept remains unchanged?

I know that geese feed on salt marsh grasses exposed in the mud when the Thames is at low tide, but is it a refuelling stop or more seriously a meal for the day?

Helen saw a heron fly over this week. I have not see a heron for some time. I expect it was scouring garden ponds for food. The hot dry weather has scorched and killed the grasses in the lane so the clouds of brown butterflies have disappeared, however the small blue butterfly is in the garden at present.

A lady who is interested in bats tells me that there are not so many butterflies and moths about which means the bats are finding it hard to find food. With little grass we are lucky in this area as our farmers do not have large herds of cattle to feed but it is a big problem in many parts of the country.

The only wild flower about at the moment is the fleabane, which seems to have survived the drought.

STOP PRESS the geese are mainly Brent geese going out to feed before they return home to roost.
