# Remembering 100 years since the 1918 Armistice.

#### All Saints' Church, Rettendon **Garden of Remembrance**

To commemorate 100 years after the end of World War I and those who did not come back, the church is opening a Garden of Remembrance on 1st November. Servicemen who did not come back from other conflicts since then will also be remembered.

All Saints' Churchyard has 3 graves commemorated by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission:

Private Thomas Wolfe Braithwaite, died April 11, 1916 Lance corporal H.S. Whiteman, died June 18, 1918 Private William Charles Yeo, died March 1, 1946

### **Rettendon Memorial Village Hall Remembrance Coffee Morning** Saturday, 10th November, from 10:30am till 12 noon.

The Village Hall is commemorating the 100 years since the end of WWI, and other conflicts by having a morning of remembering with tea/coffee, cakes and general chit chat. If you have memories please bring them along. It is not just for village residents, all are welcome. The event is free.

There will be a chance to donate to the Royal British Legion for the annual Poppy Appeal.

The hall was built as a memorial to those who took part in the World Wars.

#### **Country Diary**

Here in the southeast we have enjoyed some splendid autumn weather. The west and the north have not had it so good. I have previously mentioned the autumn berries and leaf colouring but not the acorns. Apparently we have a plentiful supply of these seeds which the squirrels and other such mammals will store away to make sure they have full tummies this winter. Perhaps we could gather them up and plant a new Rettendon forest!!

This time of the year is the time to see spider's webs. They are fantastic! The dewy mornings with the sun shining on them is like seeing strands of silvery silk. When I was teaching I used to get children to put a piece of black card behind the web and then spray a fine glue on them then the outline and architectural structure was there for all to see.

The orb web is most commonly found but have you spotted the purse or hammock web. The house spider's is not nearly as spectacular, just a mess of fronds in the corner of (some) of our rooms.

Fungi can be seen and gathered. I am not talking about mould on top of jam or cheese but those found in fields or edges of woodland. Curiously, most people believe that all fungi are poisonous, not true but beware of any that are red, yellow – green 💺 or spotted. There are about 10,000 species of fungi to be found in Great Britain. As a child, I used to gather mushrooms and sell them – but they get maggoty very quickly.

#### An Invitation to.....

a Memorial Service to remember those whom we love but have died, being held at All Saints Rettendon on Sunday 18th November at 3.00pm

This is a time of year when traditionally we remember. On the 1st November, All Saints Day, we remember those who have died and then on the 11th we remember those who died and suffered as a result of war. We might also add 5th November when we remember those who tried to blow up Parliament!

So about this time of year we will hold a service at All Saints Church to remember those whom we love but have died. You are warmly invited, whether the person or people you remember died recently or a long time ago, maybe even in the war.

We will have the opportunity for each person to be remembered by name in the service and to light a candle for them, placing it on the altar. We will give thanks for the joys we shared and celebrate the love which continues and memories that sometimes still cause sadness.

The service will be less than an hour and include prayers, hymns, a reading from the bible and a brief reflection.

Remembering 100 years since Armistice Day There will be a special memorial at All Saints Church to remember 100 years since the ending of the First World War. A cross will be cut into the grass near the entrance of the churchyard, to the left of the path, to make an area where personal memorials (possibly the small wooden crosses with poppies) for relatives or friends who were lost during the First War or other conflicts.

There will also be a special Act of Remembrance at All Saints Church on the 11th November.

Bell fields - The registered trustees are refurbishing the small changing hut/shed/pavilion, or whatever you would like to call it. However it is water tight and forms a wonderful basis for a grant, from Sport England, etc and the difference by Public Subscription, if need be. The condition of the pitch is very good. The more it is played upon and rolled the better it gets. We have favourable comments from visiting players!

We are hopefully having a group of special need young people to have a fun game of football with care and instruction. The Bell field is enjoyed by many dog walkers and the red bin is in regular use - Thank You. There is also a large litter bin for rubbish and water bottles. The North fence has not been erected yet as the ground is still rather hard.

Remembrance Sunday 11th November will be 100 years since the end of the 1st World War. The 11th hour of the 11th day 1918. A major landmark in the history of England - the freeing of world tyranny. The church, I feel, will be very well attended in 3 weeks time. Remembrance silhouettes have been bought by the Parish Council and one by Public subscription.

I have repeatedly asked at the Parish Council for urgent road and pavement repairs to Meadow Road and South View Road. Highways have managed to get some extra funding, 3 million I believe, for 50 schemes to be put forward. I have photographs of the two roads and hopefully we will be lucky.

Our River Crouch Conservation Trust is 10 years old and still going strong with 2 major clean ups twice a year. Rettendon has quite long river boundaries: the Crouch and the South - Rettendon Brook South East discharging in to Fenn Creek on the boundary with South Woodham Ferrers. Average attendances are around 30 volunteers. We did have 83 at one clean up - all unpaid, voluntary for which I thank them. We may have some good news for the next newsletter.

#### Be a responsible dog owner

A recent report in the Essex Chronicle mentions a dog loving Essex resident who was fined £220 and ordered to pay a £30 victim surcharge and £250 court costs for failing to remove dog faeces from a public space (Hylands Park, Chelmsford.)

What is a public space? A footpath, a road including verges, park, play area, churchyard, cemetery, in fact any area of land to which the public has access. Here in Rettendon and Battlesbridge are you one of those dog owners who do not bother to pick up your dogs calling card? Please do so and help to reduce the likelihood of a young child being exposed to dog faeces and possibly contacting Toxocara, which can lead to blindness.

Save yourself a possible £400 fine and pick up after your pooch, use the dog bins or take the used dog bag home with you.
