PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council have been looking at maintenance of their assets in the parish in recent months. A quote has been accepted to look at all bus shelters and repair and paint them. We are also looking to re-paint the lampposts. The planning application for work on the Rettendon Oak is now with Chelmsford City Council - a crown reduction of 5m is proposed to protect the tree for the future. We are still trying to source replacement mechanisms for the gates on Sonters Down.

Following the grant to the Cricket Club a few months ago, the Council has granted the Village Hall Management Committee £2,500 to replace the hall windows.

The Council is in the process of agreeing their budget and precept for 2019/20. This will be discussed and hopefully finalised at the November meeting.

At the last meeting, the Council agreed a response to the article published in September about the Bell Fields. This response is now on the website on the Council Information page.

Country Diary

November and December is the time to see a swirling and swooping of a fantastic dance in the sky known as a surmuration. The starlings are swarming and gathering members of their species to perform aerial acrobatics in the gathering gloom of late autumn. Why do they do this you may ask? They gather to keep warm and to fend off predators. I used to see small gatherings of starlings when travelling home from work on the Dengie.

This is also the time of year to look out for migrating birds. One such bird, the red wing, is the smallest of our thrushes. Another bird more often seen than the red wing is the fieldfare, which is about the size of a mistle thrush and has a grey —blue head and rump. We also welcome geese, teal, widgeon, and knot. We have a lot of water in this part of Essex – reservoirs, lakes, rivers and estuaries this part of Essex – reservoirs, lakes, rivers and estuaries that become home to these species.

Early winter is a good time to see seals. I believe you can catch a boat from Burnham or Southend to go and watch them.

A Resident's Viewpoint

I'm writing in response to Mr Harts comments in the previous newsletter about 'repeatedly asking at the parish council for urgent road and pavement repairs to Meadow Road and Sonters Down". Firstly, Mr Hart is a parish councillor and he is as able or qualified as any of his colleagues to fill in an application for funding for such a scheme through the Local Highways Panel he mentions, through the Essex County Council website. Unfortunately such funding would be unlikely as the LHP won't fund 'road maintenance' schemes but only those related to safety or non-motor user improvements like cycle paths. On that note I'd like to point out that parish councillor Denise Fleming has led the way in applying for several LHP 'allowed' schemes, one being the conversion of Chalk and Hoe Lanes into Quiet Lanes. This involved a lot of effort in setting out the need, getting traffic surveys done, taking pictures and filling out a lengthy application. It didn't qualify as a Quiet Lane but in the end Essex County Council have resurfaced both Chalk Street and Hoe Lane and they funded signs put up to warn motorists about horse riders. She has also successfully applied for a traffic survey of the Battlesbridge bridge which will be carried out by April next year, another issue that Mr Hart has raised. Mrs Fleming has also successfully achieved funding for the parish for the speed signs on Main Road and the new signs on Hawk Hill roundabout (due before April). Three other requested speed surveys in the parish have unfortunately been turned down but add the effort that is being made to make us safer as we use our roads to drive, cycle, ride or walk on, by the parish council of which Mr Hart is of course a member

Collected Comments on the Parish Council Chairman's report an Apology

With regard to this item published in the September newsletter, the Parish Council Chairman has informed me that he objected to retrospective planning application 17-00708-ADV solely on the basis of multiple errors in the form, not from any desire to stop football being played on the Bell fields. I would like to set the matter straight and apologise for this error. As I stated at the end of the article, I edited the item based on comments received from many villagers, and it described the situation as I understood it. Apart from some technical details, such as the use of the word 'bequeathed' which should have been 'awarded', the remainder of the piece was not untrue. I apologise to anyone offended by the reference to 'turkey/Christmas', it was merely a light-hearted reference to the well-known phrase.

The item was definitely not my personal opinion, as I stated, we no longer live in the village (although we have strong links through the Horticultural Society, Church, newsletter etc.), so any views we may have are irrelevant. We try to remain neutral, and were only reporting what many villagers tell us, not just 'a vociferous few'. We have been accused of being 'outside troublemakers', which we find most offensive.

As to the idea that a response to an item should be obtained prior to publication, this would effectively prevent publication of anything remotely controversial. Surely as long as an item is not defamatory and/or knowingly misleading, and carries suitable disclaimers, it spices up the newsletter. Anyone is free to provide contributions expressing alternative viewpoints, in fact, they would be welcome.
