On Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> April following the 11-15am service, we shall be holding our church annual meeting, starting at about 12-30pm.

#### **Rettendon & Battlesbridge Urgent Matters**

Dear residents, you may have read the Parish Council's update on its achievements during its 4 year term of office. Unfortunately I do not believe it has been the bed of roses it might seem, in fact I believe there have been a number of failures:-

- 1) Cancelled the purchase of over 1 acre of land with access to Meadow Road, Rettendon; the previous council set aside £20k for the freehold purchase, to use the land for affordable housing and extend the Sonters Down playing fields. This, and money set aside for the proposed pavilion on the Bell Fields, are reasons why the PC has far too much money in reserve.
- 2) The PC lost control of the Village Memorial Hall to the Hall Management Committee, in acrimonious circumstances. However, the hall deeds have been transferred to the Charity Commission and it is my opinion that the Management Committee are doing a good job.
- 3) Against my advice, the PC took legal action against a landowner to make permanent his kind concession of access from the hall car park to the cricket pitch. The PC lost, and did not have the courtesy to apologise to the landowner.
- 4) Took out enforcement action against playing football and signs erected by the football club at the Bell Fields – notice 17/00140/ENFB, which has mysteriously disappeared from the City Council website, but I have a copy. Despite objections from the PC chairman, I successfully obtained retrospective planning permission– see Planning Ref 17/00708/ADV which is on the City Council planning website.
- 5) The PC have now lost the parish newsletter, which was compiled by the previous PC chairman for many years, and on his retirement by Barbara Wright. This was caused by disagreements over the control of content. When Mrs Wright made a statement to the PC on her decision to make the newsletter into a not-for-profit organisation, the PC chairman was most discourteous, making a show of ignoring her.
- 6) The PC has already spent £15,295 and set aside many more thousands in pursuing legal action against myself and others who believe we are managing trustees of the Bell Fields. I would like to point out that the PC originally went to Birkett Long solicitors for advice on this matter. I have a copy of their advice, which is somewhat detailed, but a key point was that according to the Trustees Act 1925, the existing trustees had the power to appoint new trustees. This should have been the end of the matter, but Tees Law were then consulted, in a manner which some think may have been improper. Subsequently Tees Law have come up with alternative advice which in fact involves winding up the charities and the PC taking control and ownership of the Bell Fields (whose deeds are now held by the Charity Commission). The objectives of the PC for taking this action are unclear, which is why I am fighting the legal action. I promise my intention is to preserve the Bell Fields for the use and recreation of all residents. There has been no complaint whatsoever of the way us 'purported trustees' are running the Bell Fields. We have agreed to take the dispute to mediation, but have now been served with high court writs.
- 7) As reported, the village gateways have been replaced at a cost of  $\pounds 18,000$  (nearer to 19k actually). I had offered to do the work myself, with assistance from others suitably qualified for highways works, for the cost of materials only, less than  $\pounds 2,000$  for some plastic fencing.

As for the much trumpeted openness of PC meetings, it should be noted that residents are only allowed to make 5 minute statements at the start of meetings, and then only if relevant to an agenda item. Some issues are discussed in 'working groups', whose workings are not even disclosed to <u>all</u> councillors, let alone the public. Meetings are indeed well attended as many residents feel the need to keep a close watch on what is going on.

The PC elections are on 2nd May, I do hope things will not continue as the last 4 years. Yours Sincerely Roy Hart

### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council has been considering the issue of the Bell Fields in meetings since Christmas. They have agreed to bear the costs of mediation, which was recommended as the preferred route by the Charity Commission. Suggested mediators have been passed to the other party and the Council is now waiting for their response.

In the meantime, an application to the High Court for permission to bring an action was made. Due to time constraints imposed by the Court, this application has been made in tandem with the preferred mediation route. The High Court have agreed a hearing to consider the matter which should take place shortly.

Councillors continue to look at other matters in the parish such as street lighting and provision of dog bins.

If you have any queries or comments in between meetings, please let me know. Many issues can be dealt with outside meetings alternatively I can bring information to meetings if required.

# From the Parish Priest for Rettendon, Hullbridge and Rawreth

We are part way through Lent. Mothering Sunday is 31<sup>st</sup> March and so we will be having a family service to celebrate God's gift of Mothers! The Family Service is an act of worship for all ages, involving singing, stories, activities and prayers.

Through Lent we are preparing for the great Easter Celebrations and from 14<sup>th</sup> April will remember day by day the story of Jesus' last week. We start with Palm Sunday on 14th April. We will remember the crowds cheering for Jesus as he came into Jerusalem. They were waving palm branches, which is why we call it Palm Sunday. Our service will be at the usual Sunday Service time of 10:00am at Rawreth and we will listen to the story – it takes quite a while to read but it's worth hearing!

On Thursday evening we will remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples. This year our services will be at St Thomas Hullbridge and St Nicholas Rawreth, both at 7:30pm. At St Thomas' we will be more formal, we will have a special service of the Holy Communion or Mass, while the service at St Nicholas takes the form of a light meal remembering that Jesus' last meeting with his friends was a shared meal. You are really welcome to come along and join in. It's free but we would like to know if you are coming so we can get the catering right. (Please phone 01268 766565, leave a message if you don't get a reply and we'll book you in).

And Friday is the day we remember Jesus' death, so we have a time of story, Easter hymns and reflection between 2 and 3pm at All Saints; the bible tells us that Jesus died at 3pm.

And then on Easter Sunday morning we will celebrate the resurrection. Celebrations start at 5:30am (yes that is half past five in the morning) and a group of us will be at Ashingdon to share their early morning service, remembering the disciples who went to Jesus tomb at daybreak.

Then at the more civilised time of 11:15 am we will have an Easter Day service at All Saints.

It would be great if you could come to any of these so that you can share in the story, we'd love to see you.

### **Battlesbridge Free Church**

The World Day of Prayer took place at All Saints on Friday, March 1st. Sadly not many people could attend to share in this

service on that day. Some at Battlesbridge arranged to follow this World Day service at our morning service last Sunday. The service had been compiled by a group of Christian women from Slovenia. Their theme was taken from St. Luke's Gospel, the story of the Great Feast, prepared by the King. Many of the notable people were invited but when the date of the banquet arrived they, one by one, made their excuses as to why they could not attend. The King was insulted and angry. He had their places filled with those of more lowly status and those usually marginalised or looked down on by smart society. In the script of the service, five representative Slovenian ladies gave a background of their upbringing under the Communist regime where, as Christians, they were treated as second-class citizens and were disadvantaged in both education and in finding work. Grandparents had kept the faith alive. The day's prayers stressed the need to value those on the outer edge of society, just as God, the King in the story, welcomed those whom society shunned. It is sad that many today devalue the God of our forefathers, the God who so loves mankind, that provides a way in which we can look forward to a new, continuous life after our mortal body dies. It's all in the New Testament of the Bible, with eye witness accounts from those who lived and worked with God's Christ.

With mayhem going on in many parts of the world and our own nation tearing itself apart over Brexit, it would seem sensible to unite in at least one day of earnest prayer. Next year it will be the turn of St. Nicholas, Rawreth, to host the event, which Christian women from Zimbabwe will compile.
