All Saints' Church, Rettendon eight hundred years of history in our village

Our lovely Church in Rettendon is valued by our local community as part of the history and life of our village.

One of its most significant features is the wonderful early eighteenth century marble memorial to Edmund Humphrey and his family. They were great benefactors of the church and the village in their time. The memorial is described as one of the most important monuments from that period in England and it is very

rare to have a monument of this quality in a small village church.

The monument is now in need of restoration and cleaning.

A conservation programme is planned which will remove centuries of dirt and then waxing to prevent further damage from dirt and from the bats which roost in our church.

The cost of this work, which will be undertaken by an expert firm of conservationists, is £33,500. This will restore this beautiful and valuable memorial and ensure that it continues to bring pleasure to future generations.

Can you help us restore our Memorial?

We will be applying to specialist conservation Trusts for grants towards this work, but we also need to raise a proportion of this sum ourselves from the church

and community. Any donation you are able to make will help towards this important conservation project in our village.

Parish Council jottings -Extracts from the Rettendon Review 1968

Are you good at remembering dates? I don't mean your birthday or your mothers. In school I always remembered 1066 and all that, and more recently 1939 and coronation day are easily recalled. One date we don't remember is one which had such an influence on this country, 1894 is the Local Government Act which amongst other things enabled the creation of PC's.

The (PC) differs in many ways from the larger units of local government and one very important difference is that councillors should know the electors as people, be seen in the community and to spend the precept wisely all for the benefit of the communities they serve. It is said it is for this reason that political parties have not managed to dominate parish councils, as they seem to the rest of government. Another important difference between parish and larger councils is the services they provide and the amount of money they raise. Every penny a council spends must be authorised by some act of parliament. They can provide swimming pools, bus shelters, tennis courts, and football pitches. They can also provide and maintain parish halls, public seats, public clocks and if needed allotments and burial grounds, plant trees and make grants for the upkeep of churchyards and war memorials. Not a greatly exciting list but one of the most important functions of PC's is to be a watchdog for the parish on the activity of the larger authorities and to see that the opinions of the PC are made known.

We currently hear a lot about democracy but what better form of democracy could we have than to live in a group large enough to be effective but small enough to be personal and more importantly the certainty of being able to attend a meeting where you can tell your councillor what you think of him or her. All parishioners have the right to attend Parish Council meetings and many years ago the PC adopted the practice of adjourning the council meeting for ten minutes or so to enable any parishioner to speak on any matter if they so wish.

It is said that parish councils are the last stronghold of true democracy, do we here in Rettendon match up to that description?

The public are included in the monthly Parish council meetings and can have their say on any matters which are on the agenda

If you have any item you wish to be included at a Parish Council meeting please get in touch with one of your local Parish Councillors. It may be the item can be answered before the meeting, or some research is needed before the item can be added to the agenda. If you do not receive a reply within a week please get in touch with either the Parish Councillor you raised it with, or the Clerk. Some items may not be Parish Council matters, and you will be told if they are not so they can be taken elsewhere.

Parish Councillors were elected by you to represent you. Please feel i free to ask about what concerns you in the Parish.
