Plea from Many Residents

Rettendon seems to have more than its fair share of dogs however not all dog owners pick up their calling cards which can be a hazard to walkers, push chair pushers and those who need to use walking sticks. Uncollected dog poo deposits are a serious health hazard that in certain circumstances can lead to children becoming blind.

Our plea to dog owners is get some dog poo bags and use them and, by the way, please don't just throw the used poo bags into people's gardens or hang them up on any nearby hedge. The Parish Council have organised dog bins along the main walking paths which were paid for, including emptying, by your council tax. Please use them or take it home and put it in your own dustbin, again collection paid by your council tax. If any dog bins are missing let the Parish Council know.

Failing to pick up your pets calling cards is an offence against the law with a £75 fine for the first offence and £100 for any subsequent offence.

And further to that plea.....

Several residents of East Hanningfield Road have expressed

their dismay in horses leaving their calling cards on the pavement - as per the photograph. This creates far more of a mess than dogs and is dangerous for pedestrians as sometimes it is so bad they have to step into the road to avoid it. Please can riders take care.

You may be unaware of this but it is illegal to do so anyway, as quoted from The Highway Code Rule 54: You MUST NOT take a horse onto a footpath or

pavement, and you should not take a horse onto a cycle track. Use a bridleway where possible. Laws HA 1835 sect 72 & R (S) A sect 129(5) (Taken from https://www.gov.uk/guidance/ the-highway-code/rules-about-animals-47-to-58)

From our special correspondent......

A recent occurrence in the parish may be of interest to others should they find themselves in a similar situation. A true-life story, which recently happened to a valued resident of the parish.
