Ward Councillor's Report

Thank you for the opportunity, to contribute to this newsletter. I wanted to update everyone on a few developments locally, especially those affected by the current C19 restrictions. For those businesses occupying properties with rateable values which are legally required to close as a result of the national lockdown, the application process for discretionary grants is now live at www.chelmsford.gov.uk/businessgrants

In an ever-changing situation, you can also keep up to date with all the restrictions and help available via the same website under the "Coronavirus" link.

Work is ongoing to open the Curry Hill footbridge, the bridge has remained closed since it was built in 2001. It will provide a link between the parishes of Rettendon and Runwell.

ECC are currently running a consultation regarding the new school to be built on the St Luke's Park development. You can view and register comments until 13th December 2020 at https://consultations.essex.gov.uk/school-organisation/stlukesnewschool/ - warning, there is an obvious typing error. The parish boundary hasn't changed!

I recently attended a briefing by developers for the SWF Masterplan, which is Strategic Growth Site 10 on the new Local Plan. In my opinion, there is much work still to be done on the transport network locally. Even without the Bradwell B proposals or this new housing plan, traffic is near capacity on the A132 in our area, especially on the Turnpike. Residents at Hayes Country Park already struggle to exit onto the Burnham Road, I will continue to emphasise this point at future meetings until we see improvements.

The issue of fly tipping and illegal waste recycling is still a problem in our area. Coordinated action by both CCC and ECC along with the Environment Agency has seen several operations closed down locally, and there is ongoing legal action.

I will try and keep residents updated with matters related to the City Council, via this newsletter. Please stay safe, and look out for those in need of help especially during the lockdowns.

Rettendon Parish Matters to me - Thoughts and Memories

I have always tried my best for the Parish including, as I see it,
trying to preserve the Bell fields for the residents. Here is not the
place to write further, so instead I shall remember the wildlife I
have encountered around Battlesbridge and further afield.

When my dear father, Frank, died in 1961, I was fifteen and just left school. We were destitute, apart from an old Riley car and a few air rifles and two shot guns, one was a 410. I used to shoot
rabbits and hares for mum to cook. When dad was still alive, almost every Sunday we would go fishing or shooting or just long walks, which usually involved stopping off at some small country
pub. I was left outside with a bag of Smith's crisps, a lemonade and a catapult.

40 years later I was fly fishing with a friend on Hanningfield

reservoir in one of their boats. It was sunny, and almost flat
calm. There was a very large bird, effortlessly gliding across the
surface of the water, about 3ft above it. On inquiring to the bailiff

I was informed it was an osprey. There is a rather good café on
the bank, so if you are having a cream tea, spring or autumn
time, you may see one as they migrate back and forth to warmer
climates, mainly Africa.

One January morning, some years back, I was mooring a boat up at the side of Jim Gallie's gangway. The sky was china blue with not a single cloud. High up was a large brown bird with wide wings and end feathers like fingers. Just spiralling southwards. Yes, it was a Golden Eagle.

I have sailed quite a bit around the Shetland Isles, on returning back from Iceland once, I had thought I had seen a sea eagle, with its white tail. In the evening, in Lerwick, on relating this to an old friend who lives there, he frowned. I asked why. He told me the local MP had shot two sea eagles as there had been two cases of crofters babies/toddlers being attacked by them outside their remote homes from their play pen or crib! One I believe
 was fatal

We had a red stag deer in the back field, which in fact I did not see, but there were a few fine witnesses from the sea wall along from Smith Plastics. They were first alerted by the horses near by, which were becoming agitated. How it got there I will never know, but it vanished in the dark!

Spitty's Reach Marsh behind Hayes Park and the river .There was a pair of short eared owls, quite large birds, who of a summer's evening would hunt the marsh in silence, just crossing back and forth! One evening I was duck shooting in a canoe up Hope Creek, Benfleet, when I was attacked three times by a large owl. Its third run from behind grabbed my woollen hat, never to be seen again.

As for solace, I have just restored a wonderful old rowing boat to take Jonathon, my grandson, bass fishing in the Spring. Well, that's the dream: the end of lockdown, and hopefully COVID 19, and a warm lazy day on the river Crouch, and in my case at peace with the world and especially Rettendon Parish Council.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The last Council meeting was held on 27th October. Ian Grundy, Essex County Councillor, sent a report detailing the activities of the County Council in relation to the Covid situation, provision for children over half-term and action the Council is taking to tackle climate change.

The Clerk reported on changes to legislation affecting Parish Councils over the past few months, which included removal of the requirement to hold an Annual Meeting of the Council, the Annual Parish Meeting and to display the agenda physically in a conspicuous place in the parish. Until further notice, the legal requirement regarding display of the agenda is satisfied by publication on the Parish Council's website.

The Council's Working Groups reported although little progress was reported since the previous meeting.

Cllr Phillips reported on the recent annual meeting of the EALC, where constitution changes had been rejected.

It was agreed that the Council would review Standing Orders to take account of the changes over the past few months, including protocols for holding remote meetings.

A further application on the Bradwell B Power Station was considered but the Council felt they had nothing to add to their previous response, which had been considered at length with a full response provided.

Discussion on the proposed budget for 2021/22 took place, with some minor amendments agreed. The budget and precept for next year will be considered at the November meeting with the Clerk to provide information for Councillors. The final decision must be made by the end of December so that the precept request can go to Chelmsford City Council within their deadline.

Cllrs Phillips and Dale Evans reported on highways issues and the difficulty of getting these resolved.

If any resident has any query about any Council matters please do not hesitate to contact me.

At the next meeting (24th November) the Council will hopefully decide on the budget and precept for next year, and full information will be published on the Council website. Council policies will be reviewed and a new one (Remote Meetings) will be considered and will be published on the website once adopted.
