Hidden Covid-19 cases in our community - Getting Tested if you have NO SYMPTOMS.

Chelmsford
City Council

New Covid-19 testing centres are opening in Chelmsford for **people who feel well and have no coronavirus symptoms.** These centres are trying to find hidden cases in the Chelmsford area to help stop the spread of the virus in our city. These tests are aimed at *symptomless people in the Chelmsford area who can't work from home and their families*.

Quick Testing. - By appointment only to be booked: online, call 0333 772 6144, lines open 8am to 8pm every day, or email: booking.confirmation@nhs.net. Results in around 30 minutes. Where: Central Baptist Church, Victoria Road South, Chelmsford, CM1 1LN. Details of how to access the site and nearby parking will be available on booking. Take-Home Testing. Test kits available to be collected and then done at home. Swabs are sent to a lab and you'll be contacted by the NHS Test and Trace team with your result. Where: The Cramphorn Studio entrance of Chelmsford City Theatres, Fairfield Road, Chelmsford, CM1 1JG. This site will be open between 11am and 3pm, Monday to Friday and parking is available close by at the Fairfield Road car park.



Then we received hundreds of pages of paper work from solicitors, some threatening letters, and during all this I lost my husband, he was my best friend and soulmate, which made it all the harder being on your own. Ray did a lot of work on the field, so I say to all the true villagers: we honestly thought we were doing the right thing, we are sorry it has cost a lot of money, the chair, Roy Hart, is the most honest man you could ever meet and without him we could never had done it. He is a true gentleman. He has been there for me after loosing Ray. Ray's words to me was "keep fighting to keep the football going". And although we aren't trustees now, we mustn't loose our football pitch.

Let's hope we can enjoy it for many years to come.

Country Diary - Winter Observations

We have been encouraged by the Government to go outside and take a walk in the park, use the footpaths and woodlands and observe the nature around us at first hand. Outside my house my friend Helen and I (suitably distanced) have listened to a robin singing his heart out. On his daily visit this robin chooses the same branch on the same tree to sing his happy tune. Also a horde of sparrows visit my bird table daily to fight to feed on the bird feeders. The other day I counted 34 sparrows keenly and noisily feeding. You would be amazed how they quarrel and fight, they remind me of a school playground.

Starlings are regular visitors who with their vicious beaks come to the bird table to disturb the sparrows. The geese also come along flying over in their distinctive 'V' formation honking as they pass over to no doubt feed on the marram grass in the estuary. But winter is not just about the birds but the snowdrops are making an appearance — such heralds the spring. I know the aconites will shortly be bursting with their little yellow stars. The pity is I do not have any growing anywhere in my garden, but it is my 2021 'to do' list.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Since the last newsletter, the Council have held three meetings.

In November the Chairman gave an update on the costs hearing in the Bell Fields dispute. He said the costs hearing had taken place and he had been surprised and disappointed that no costs order had been made, so that each party had to pay their own costs. The defendants had been required to deliver to Tees by Friday 27th November 2020 some 90 documents not previously handed over. He said that the trustees would then have two months to decide if they felt more documents were missing. The Parish Council had a limited amount of time to decide on any further action and he suggested an extra ordinary meeting should be held.

On the 3rd December an extraordinary meeting was held. The land ownership of the Bell Fields was discussed. The current title deed covering the entire area mentions the Rettendon Bell Fields Trust which has no legal standing. The Council discussed the issue at some length and the Chairman said that that over the next few months motions would be brought to Council to work towards a stable, long-term resolution of this issue.

The Council also debated the three options outlined by Tees following the costs order. The options were to seek to appeal the judgment itself, seek to appeal costs or to take no further actions in this respect. All Councillors agreed that no further action should be taken.

The Council agreed their precept demand for 2021/22. Recognising the difficult year for many, it was agreed to hold the demand at last year's amount resulting in the Band D charge for a dwelling in the parish rising by a nominal amount of £0.01.

On 15th December the Council agreed to support the introduction of a clearway along Main Road, where parking on grass verges had caused severe damage and resulted in danger to both vehicles and pedestrians. Cllr Wright gave a full report on the Council's defibrillators which can be read in the minutes for that meeting.
