Rettendon has charities operating in our midst in various forms. But what is a charity? An organisation formed for a specific purpose capable of being charitable for the public benefit. Those who serve on the governing body of a charity are called charity trustees. The business of the trustees must be independent of any other organisation. If the income exceeds £5,000 per annum the charity must be registered with the Charities Commission.

Trustees essentially should be trusted. Rooted in the local community and open and transparent in their dealings. They should be highly accountable for their actions and have high standards of public conduct in the way they work.

Recently our Richard Cannon Charity had vacancies for two trustees. These were organised by the Parish Council. As this procedure took several months to effect we should take care to lay down a clear procedure for this process.

Following the court case involving the Bell Fields there will be decisions to make about the trustees there as their four year term of office ends on July 23rd 2021. The trustees do not have to be Councillors so anyone of sound character could be eligible. Happy with the present crew, then they could be re-elected.

Country Diary

I have to apologise this month for taking much of what I write from The Times newspaper. The fact is that $\overset{{}_{\scriptstylelace}}{\sim}$ there are less birds in many gardens due to their modern layout. It applies more to urban areas than us here in Rettendon but here there are exceptions. The point is so many more people are pulling out their hedges and in some places small trees to create more hard standing for cars.

If you have a mixed hedge you have a good place for birds to feed and nest. This brings me on to feeding. Ron spends half of his summer in the garden attempting to prevent birds and insects from devouring his fruit and vegetables whereas I like to feed the birds! I favour using the cylindrical shaped feeders, the smooth type, with portholes in them. I also use the more open type for fat balls and peanuts, however I do not ground feed birds because the food scraps left attract rats which can quickly become a menace.

I have not pulled out hedges in the last 40 years but in recent years I have observed less diversity in the species of birds. No chaffinches, greenfinches, bullfinches or siskins, however we have more wood pigeons and collared doves which we could well do without. The birds obviously can do with feeding at this time of the year - the sparrows make good use of the $\frac{1}{2}$ service. The antics of our garden birds gives me great pleasure watching them.

How are you ... ?

Many of us are struggling, we seem to be dangling between the hope that it will all be over soon and the despair that it might go on for ever. I don't even need to say what this is about ... we all know.

Alongside the pandemic is an epidemic of mental health issues; many of us are just plain fed up or maybe angry, others of us struggle with more severe depression, but we are all affected.

There is a lot of advice out there about things we can do to build our resilience and it needs careful checking. There are however some themes that I find keep cropping up and they seem to fit in well with my Christian faith. They are summed up in three words: Now, Others and Thanks.

Now: The past is gone and who knows what the future holds but all we can do anything about is the present, now. So slow down, maybe look up mindfulness or meditation (there are lots of different approaches: some may suit one person, others another). As a Christian, the past is left behind. Things I got wrong are forgiven and I try to forgive the hurts I've received, to leave them behind. The future is in God's hands. What I am responsible for is what I do right now.

Others: One of the things I have realised about being down is that I become more and more obsessed with me. So, I need to break any cycle of self-pity and look out at other people. Jesus told us to 'Love our neighbour as ourselves' – note he did *not* say '... *instead* of ourselves'. (There is something about sharing love that increases our capacity to love so that we can include ourselves in a healthy way. After all, as Christians we celebrate that we all are loved by God.) The great thing is that I can do something for others *right now*; I can pray for them. I find the most helpful prayer is praying that focuses on peoples' possibilities rather than their problems. So praying for someone to be healthy rather than praying about their illness – it can amount to the same thing, it's just more positive.

Thanks: This may well be the most potent tool against depression but it can also be the hardest. That's why I leave it till last and build up to it. But it always seems easier when I have stopped fretting about the past and worrying about the future, and also when I have broken that cycle of self-pity. As I look around me now, I become aware of many things and people to be thankful for, and so again I can pray and praise God for the gifts of his creation.

These are the things that I find helpful and others have too. If you are struggling, I hope that they may be of help to you as well. Please get in touch if you like to know more or make a comment.

This can only go so far however, and there are some mental health issues that need medical help just as physical illness sometimes does. When we can't break the cycle of mental health issues for ourselves it is important to ask for help and your GP may well be the best place to start.

PARISH COUNCIL

At the January Council meeting, Councillors considered two new policies for adoption. The first relates to the financial reserves by the Council. A public body can hold general reserves (to cover ongoing expected costs in an emergency) and specific reserves which are dedicated to named expenditure. The reserves should reflect what is agreed in the Budget so that the Council is clear where money is coming from for each budget line – whether the precept for the current year or money already held in the bank.

The Council also adopted Remote Meetings Policy to clarify the behaviour expected at online meetings and to make sure both councillors and residents are aware of the protocols involved.

Both these new policies can be found on the website.

Councillor Dale Evans brought to the Council the suggestion that Rettendon should consider undertaking a Neighbourhood Plan. It is a while since the Parish Plan was completed and these have now been superseded by Neighbourhood Plans. Once adopted, a NP becomes a document that the planning authority (Chelmsford) have to take into account when considering planning applications within the parish, so it gives a parish some measure of control about how their locality might develop. Cllr Dale Evans is going to investigate further and report back in due course.

Investigation into a new Council website is ongoing. A Council has to comply with new requirements regarding accessibility. The current website is provided on a free platform but it has limitations and a new website produced by a designer who can advise on all current legislation and requirements will be of benefit to the parish.

The weir on the North Bank, which we lowered, works very well as a safety valve against flooding, its spread 40ft wide!

Sitting in my office last week I could see an otter foraging in the snow. By the time I found my camera it had disappeared.

I have just parted with a sailing boat. I feel very sad. I have owned it for 34 years. It has been part of my life. We shared many adventures together, over possibly 70,000 sea miles: Battlesbridge to the West Indies and America, 6 Atlantic crossings, 3 times to the Arctic Circle, Azores 3 times, with many race wins, and part of a trip to the North Pole, 1st place in Plymouth to Reykjavik, 3rd in OSTAR, Round Britain races, etc. We have never let each other down, but we have had some severe storms. I actually shed a tear when it left, it was the same feeling when leaving a happy house you have lived in for over 30 years, but will still have wonderful memories and dreams to reflect on of a half a life time. But it has gone to a trio of great sailors and more adventures for them.

I remember the good years of Rettendon Council when I took almost all the Council on a trip down the river to see the seal colony and supper back at the yacht club. There were 12 on board. All with life jackets and a glass of wine. At Parish Council meetings we always had tea and biscuits or a home-made cake and at the Christmas meeting port and hot mince pies. Ron Fallows ran a wonderful council, I wish we could turn the clock back.

Roll on the Spring and Summer and calmer parish waters.
