I write this at the end of the first week that we had the whole school back in 2021. It was a much anticipated event – one that

staff, parents and children had looked forward to for a good few weeks. Our Friday Whole-School assembly (albeit on the screen in each class) was a great moment. **23rd March 2021** - One year on from the original lockdown and a minute's silence for those who have died and those who are still suffering. Bells marked the end, but perhaps also a new beginning.

#### **Rettendon Memorial Hall**

The Hall Management would like to explain the reason for the removal of the flowering ornamental cherry from the flower bed at the hall. The main stem was being overpowered by the suckers which had appeared over time and not been taken out. These suckers, which appeared to be part of the tree, were wild cherry root stock having only insignificant flowers, and leaving only one small piece with pink flowers. The plot was also overrun with substantial wild cherry roots, reducing the ground for anything else.

Once removed it was realised the sign proclaiming "Rettendon Village Hall" could now be seen from the roadway. Therefore it has been decided not to grow another tree in the plot to allow it to continue to be seen.

It was agreed to make the garden into a community herb patch to give everyone the chance to use culinary flavourings. The plants chosen will all be edible in some way. All have scents and most will flower if left to do so. Some may have to be cut back after flowering. We will ensure the plot is cared for, but hopefully it will be the community who will use it and help us care for it. There is already mint, sage, rosemary, lavender and camomile, and flowers will be added which can be eaten. A poster is to be added to explain the herbs and their uses.

We are hoping to have some bug boxes around to help the wildlife and are looking into ways of being more environmentally friendly around the hall. There are already some water butts collecting water from the roof.



## ALL SAINTS'S CHURCH, RETTENDON

There is something about this time of year that puts a real smile on people's faces. The days are getting longer, we've even started British Summer Time, flowers are starting to show and it's getting warmer (well on most days it is!).

Even more this year, hope is in the air. Hope of an end to lockdown and the possibilities of getting out and about and really meeting people socially, we can even think about tentative plans for holidays. As part of all this All Saints church is planning to move from just streaming services on line, to restarting our services with a congregation present.

On **Sunday 18**<sup>th</sup> **April** we will re-start our regular service with a congregation at 11:15am. On both Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday as well as our Livestreamed Holy Communion at 10:00 there will be an outdoor service at 9:00am. This will be at St Nicholas Rawreth on Palm Sunday and at Rettendon on Easter Sunday. This service will last for about 30 minutes.

At Easter we celebrate the victory of love even over death as we remember Jesus dying out of love for us and being raised from the dead on Easter Day. ## **Country Diary**

Spring is definitely emerging. Most gardens are bursting with daffodils and the hedgerows have the blackthorn, sloe and the wild cherry blossom. I have been told that this area is the best place to see the cherry plum blossom.

Yesterday a sparrowhawk visited my wild bird feeder table. I wondered "why", at first, there were no sparrows to be seen in the area, then I saw the reason. A sparrowhawk arrived and was stalking up and down the hedge and every now and then it would dive into the hedge. After a while an incautious sparrow arrived – the hawk spied it as well, it dived but the sparrow fled. The sparrow must have escaped as it was soon back again.

The feeder, the location of this hawk melodrama, is on the east side of our bungalow which tends to be the feeding location for the smaller birds.

Earlier in the week I saw two male blackbirds fighting on the west side of the bungalow, Their rise and fall was quite balletic. About ten days ago I went to Hyde Hall and heard some buzzards and then saw a small flock of them. They were quite high in the sky. It is only in recent years that buzzards have come to Essex

A neighbour recently told me he had seen a barn owl at dusk in the field near his home and also a deer in Creephedge Lane.

It is a pity that we are not in sheep country here as I love seeing the lambs but there are some flocks nearer the coast.

## **PARISH COUNCIL**

Following on from last month's report, at the February meeting the Council agreed to accept a quotation for providing a new website. The current one is hosted free on the e-Voice platform but new regulations which came into force last year mean that every Council website has to comply with accessibility guidelines. This means it has to be accessible to a wider range of people with disabilities, including blindness and low vision, deafness and hearing loss, and learning disabilities. The current website does not meet these standards but with the technical expertise of our new provider the new website will comply.

The wording of the Village Survey was agreed and the costs for printing and delivery approved. By now they have been delivered and the survey has closed. Councillors will consider the responses and these will inform future action taken by the Council.

The Council's insurance renews on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2021. As the policy is under a long term agreement the policy renews automatically but we have been reviewing the Council's assets over the past few weeks (bus stops, defibrillators etc) and this information will be used to update the information our insurers hold. A further meeting was held on 11<sup>th</sup> March 2021 to discuss the response to questions arising from the survey, and documents relating to the Bell Fields dispute.

## A RESIDENTS RESPONSE TO MRS PREBBLE'S ARTICLE IN FEBRUARY'S NEWSLETTER ENTITLED:- "As I see it......"

In February's issue, Mrs Prebble placed an article apologising to "all the true villagers" for costing the Parish "a lot of money". She also confirmed that without Roy Hart they "never could have done it"! Mr Hart is himself a Parish Councillor.

Mrs Prebble was one of the former Trustees of the Bell Fields Charities recently removed by Court Order.

We do of course live in a Parish that includes not only Rettendon Village, but also Rettendon Common, Battlesbridge and Hayes Country Park.

I do hope that Mrs Prebble can be persuaded that all Parishioners are entitled to be classed as "true villagers", rather than just a select few. After all we all pay our Council Tax just the same and are entitled to have a say in the running of our community.

Of course it was unfortunate that legal action was required, but the Bell Field's litigation was the last resort available to the Parish Council. It followed several wasted years involving numerous attempts to persuade the purported Trustees that their appointment was unlawful. Something that they, and Mr Hart, steadfastly refused to accept. In the event, it took a Senior High Court Judge to confirm that their claimed status as Trustees was unlawful.

The Upper Bell Field football pitch is currently a loss making venture. It is leased by South Woodham Ferrers United Football Club (the majority of whose members are not of this Parish). The rent paid does not cover the amount of remedial work required to restore the field and so this will need to be subsidised by the Trustees or the Parish.

The football pitch itself has been declared unsafe by the Essex Football Association and it cannot be used for matches until the remedial works are carried out to large areas of the playing surface.

The lawful Trustees discovered this fundamental problem when they regained control of the Bell Field Charities in September 2020, but they have quickly identified suitable contractors, prepared an appropriate specification and hope to commission the works allowing for the reuse of the pitch in September 2021, when the new football season gets under way.

I trust our Parish Council, and the Trustees appointed by it. They will remain answerable to all Parishioners in the same way as they had been previously for well over 100 years.

We are awaiting sight of the F.A. Report before commenting further on the state of the football pitch. With reference to the remainder of Mr Knight's text we feel that the High Court Judge said it all.
