I never would have thought, after almost 2 years, that Covid was going to still be playing such a major part in our school life- but here we are.

At Rettendon we enjoyed a lovely, if not slightly amended, end to the Autumn term at Christmas. We were grateful for the wonderful support of our school and local community who attended our Christmas Fair, which raised almost £1300 (including the Christmas Raffle) which was amazing. This is a massive help to the Friends of Rettendon School group who have found the past 2 years a very tricky fundraising time. That said they have been a massive support, providing laptops that could be used during periods of remote learning, as well as many other wonderful things.

### Country Diary

I have been searching for inspiration. I did not have any idea what to write about, however I finally decided to write about little things that have occurred around me.



Firstly, the sparrowhawk has been prowling on the hedge near to the back door which is the area where the bird feeders are and clearly visible from my kitchen window. It does not move when I switch a light on or off or when I am at the sink

it will remain there, just watching.

It is quite a striking bird — it must be a male for it has an almost pale blush pink breast, a slate blue tail, and nut brown wings and back. It loves to eat small birds like sparrows so he has plenty of choice as we have plenty of sparrows in our garden. Sparrowhawks suffered badly in the 1960's from a wide use of poisonous agricultural chemicals and became extinct in eastern England. Now that most of the worst chemicals have been banned the sparrowhawk has made a strong come-back.

This week a greater spotted woodpecker and a greenfinch have visited the bird feeder. This was very exciting because the greenfinch is now on the red list of birds which are under threat of extinction. Yes, it is only February, and the pretty delicate snowdrop is flowering bravely and so are some early daffodils which are growing in sheltered locations even as the wind howls and bushes and trees sway and rock.

### Thoughts from Battlesbridge.
