#### **River Crouch Conservation Trust**

9th August 2022 View from the bridge Our wonderful River Crouch has been in great danger over the last few weeks, which resulted in 1,200 beautiful fish dying, including roach, perch, dace, chub, and bull heads which are on the rare list of threatened species, they are very small fish and weigh less than loz.

Our river Crouch is one of the greatest populated in Essex for fish life. We also have otters, kingfishers, water voles etc. This is a **plea to all members of the public**, when you are walking along the riverbank, if you see dead fish in the Crouch, discoloured water, or a strong offensive smell, please ring us or send us an email.

On Friday 29th July we were called out to the Wickford Memorial Park bridge by the large main gates. Many fish were gasping for air and laying on their sides. I cleared any blockages of old branches and debris to allow the distressed fish able to make their way with the current to deeper, cooler waters. I took water samples, etc., until it was getting very dark, and went back to my office in Battlesbridge and alerted Anglian Water (who came out very quickly) and The Environment Agency. Their officers spent all weekend trying to trace the source of the pollution in the Nevendon Brook area and bagging up all the dead fish, with the help of Trust members.

The next Friday evening on the 5th August I followed up another complaint of sewage, etc. near Crays Hill at about 8pm. I discovered sewage being discharged into a large drainage trench alongside London Road approaching Crays Hill. We found the discharge straight away coming off the A129. Sewage and foul water was running into the ditch which was running to Church Road and into the River Crouch. The stench was extremely strong.

I then drove to the river, with Charles Keeling Esq who had alerted me to the problem. The stench was still extremely strong 1/4 of a mile away, I took water samples from the River Crouch bridge. I spoke to a resident who informed me that the vile stench by the river had been there for almost 2 months!

The 3rd incident: I was sent an email from a kind lady. Her mother's garden and others near Basildon were flooded by discoloured water, which was tested by Essex & Suffolk Water and was found to contain a high level of chlorine and was a real environmental problem. Chlorine is very dangerous; it was used in World War 1 as a choking agent. The foul water was coming from an old asbestos pipe on farmland, which had burst, unfortunately the garden ditches also run into the River

If pollution in the River Crouch gets any worse, especially in the hot weather and low water level, not only will the fish and wildlife suffer, it will also contaminate the shellfish beds of which there are many, and get into the food chain. I think everyone will agree this is a very serious situation.

On these three occasions, I must also thank Anglian Water, the Environmental Agency and especially Peter Steward and Paul Thwaites, Trust Members, for their prompt help and professional assistance. Yours very sincerely Roy H Hart

The Bull Head, also known as the Millers Thumb are listed Internationally as being on the red list of endangered species and are



very rare. They are very small only weighing less than I oz. They favour gravel and small stones to build a nest especially under bridges (Wickford Park) They hunt at night and they live up to 5 years and must be protected at all costs. We missed many dead fish, and have to consider the estimated total of dead fish was possibly double what we managed to recover. The number of Bullheads was considered to be hundreds.

#### Life Emergency and Defibrillator Use

- Phone 999 and ask for the ambulance Service, put the phone on speaker
- If you are on your own with no mobile signal and no landline, you must go and get help. (Emergency calls are routed through any mobile phone provider).
- If the patient is unconscious and not breathing start CPR **IMMEDIATELY**
- The Ambulance Service will remain on the line and issues instructions on CPR
- If there is a defib give location of box, Ambulance Service will give the code and instructions.

#### Why have a code on a defibrillator box at all?

- The Ambulance Service must be contacted so they can prioritise an ambulance, and send other help if quicker.
- They know if the defibrillator (defib) is available and working, or will suggest an alternative:
  - ◆ Defib may have been removed by the ambulance service as it was used, so needs checking.
  - Maintenance being done on it (new pads/batteries)
  - Defibs are checked and reported as OK, on "The Circuit" website, by a registered monitor

If there were no code on the defibrillator box:

- Has someone contacted the Ambulance Service? They need to know of the emergency
- The defib may not be in the box or working
- Has it been taken out to use, not used, but not put back (so who has it? Where is it?)
- Has it been used, is not complete and cannot be used
- Is the defib ready for use, has it been checked lately?
- Has the defib been stolen?

The defibrillator is only for emergencies. The initial response should be phone for an Ambulance, and start CPR IMMEDIATELY on someone who is unconscious and not breathing. If done within the first 4 minutes they have a much greater chance of surviving.

1 in 10 people in Britain survive an out of hospital cardiac arrest. due to low bystander CPR rates. In countries where CPR is taught in schools, as many as 1 in 4 survive. (British Heart Foundation)
