


Our garden project is completed and we are really happy with the result. The

#### **Country Diary**

It is a grand sight, a huge skein of geese flying overhead, honking as they go. These large 'V' formations skimming the roof tops - some 20 geese or more in total. They leave their quarters to visit the river estuaries to feed on the marram grass growing in the mud of the river. A local farmer's wife tells me they have had over 300 geese feeding or resting in one of their fields here in Rettendon.

Last week (first week in October) we had five skeins pass overhead within ten minutes of each other flying north, perhaps to the reservoir.

The autumn colours displayed on the trees have been magnificent this year. As you enter Rettendon Common just before the 'Bell' Pub there are two trees either side of the road. Both the same species - one the leaves are scarlet, the other the leaves are burgundy. The field maple and the sycamore are particularly good with a mixed autumnal colour range.

It is a bit early for the fieldfare, a visitor from Scandinavia. However if and when they come they will hoover up the Hawthorn berries - sometimes known as haws or bread and cheese, an autumn delicacy.


#### **Local News**

### ALL SAINTS'S CHURCH, RETTENDON Thanksgiving and Generosity

Last month I mentioned that we were in a season of remembering and we still have the Act of



In the last month however we have also celebrated Harvest, a different sort of remembering. We have remembered all the good things that the earth has to offer and the blessings that we receive. This remembering has led us to action (as all good remembering does) and there have been two important actions that come with Harvest celebrations: Thanksgiving and caring.

In giving thanks we acknowledge that the good things we receive are not all our own work but, in some degree or another, are gifts. As Christians we believe that God is the ultimate giver. But even if we don't believe in God, we recognise that while we may work at planting a seed and nurturing the seedling, that is only part of the story, we are dependent on the wonderful biology of seed and soil that in its mindboggling intricacy weaves the life of a new plant. The reality is that no matter how hard we work, none of us can ever hope to deserve all the blessings that we receive, our hard work alone can never supply all we need, much less all we receive.

The reality we face is that the rewards of work are anything but proportionate to the work we put in or even the value of the work to others. Most of those who receive state benefits are in work. Care workers and medical staff are paid a fraction of what many of us earn and celebrities earn many times what most of us could dream of earning. However most of us, if forced to choose, would have care workers and medics rather than celebrities!

And so thanksgiving, acknowledging how much we have been blessed, leads to caring. Caring for those for whom hard work is no guarantee of being able to keep up with bills. It has been wonderful to see all the Harvest Gifts that have been given and passed on to HARP Southend (a charity supporting homeless people) and the Wickford Foodbank.

So many thanks to all who have made donations – including the generous donations from the children at Rettendon Primary School and Little Darwin's Nursery. My prayer is that this generosity of spirit will grow and spread as we as a nation and in our communities face the financial challenges that we are warned still lie ahead.

The Richard Cannon Charity is an example of such generosity from our history, and from which Rettendon people can benefit. The charity receives requests for help of all sorts, and this includes help with heating and heating bills in the current crisis. The charity is restricted in the help it can offer to one-off payments; it cannot commit to regular support. #### A Night to Remember - The Great Storm

No one who was awake in the early hours of Friday October 17th 1987 will ever forget the experience. It was the night that changed the face of the landscape in this area, and the sights that greeted residents as they got out of their beds the next morning were almost beyond belief.

Some people called it a hurricane, others a great storm but whatever it was christened the devastation it left behind it was a tempest of incredible fury.

The great storm meant five terrifying hours of chaos and destruction which started around 11pm which were all the more frightening because of the darkness. When dawn finally arrived shocked residents awoke to an alien landscape. Cars were crushed by fallen trees and masonry was a commonplace sight. Missing tiles were hardly mentioned when the next door neighbours had lost an entire roof.

Fences and walls, caravans and mobile homes, traffic lights and lamp posts, entire shop fronts, telephone and power lines were all seemingly demolished with ease. I saw a large van with high sides get caught by a strong blast which firstly rocked the van with the following seemingly, stronger blast depositing the van and some contents on its side on Cranes Farm Road, Basildon.

Above all else it was the thousands of mature trees we lost that evoked the greatest and most enduring sense of sadness. Garden trees, street trees and even Norsey Wood nature reserve, Billericay had swathes of trees flattened. In fact thirty five years later the scars of the hurricane (yes I called it a hurricane) can still be seen.


