Peter and I embraced the idea for the "Living

Memorial" around 2008, the same time Britain was
repatriating our fallen Service Personnel through Wooton Bassett.

For the second time in British history the public were kept informed with the progress of the war in Iraq and Afghanistan and, more importantly, names and pictures were routinely shown on the television and newspapers of the young forces personnel killed in action. The first Gulf war being the first to be televised live.

Unless we're mistaken, the Falklands conflict was the first war to repatriate our fallen troops back to Britain. Prior to that they were buried in the Country they fell.

Thus so, in 2008 my Husband and I were inspired by events in Wootton Bassett and the decorum and respect that was shown to our fallen troops along the route by Veterans and Residents.

With a lot of research through the MOD website we managed to get the names of Soldiers killed primarily in Iraq and Afghanistan. Then we found a source to supply our plaques. The next decision was where to place the plaques. We wanted to find a lovely area on our farm where people could come and pay their respects and sit and think. Initially, we picked our smaller field (8 acres) close to the house. But, as the numbers grew in deaths, we became aware that we needed a bigger area.

Coupled with further research we started to encompass the other wars and conflicts where British troops had lost their lives. That being so we chose a larger field (20 acres) further away from the road and more encased in the countryside.

Thus the Living Memorial came into being. We have included every war up to the second world war. To mark WWII we have built a small chapel. In recognition of WWI we have a paved area with a sculpted metal poppy wreath.

We hope you can understand the format we are trying to create. We feel being surrounded by nature will come some way to help heal those who have lost a loved one and help them come to terms with their grief.

Anyone in Service to this Country who is prepared to sacrifice their life so that others may live theirs in relative safety deserve our respect and thanks.
