It's time to plan for a new growing and showing year. Time to reflect on last year's successes and failures and decide what works for us. Everybody's gardens are different and what grows for one person does not necessarily grow well for somebody else. Be brave and try some new vegetables and flowers that you have not grown before.

If you have a propagator or spare windowsill space now is the time to sow tomato and chilli seeds. In the past I have sown seeds in multipurpose compost and have been disappointed with the germination. On our visit to

- Kings Seeds in the Summer we spoke about poor germination
- and were advised to start seeds in a proper seed compost as multipurpose compost is too strong for seedlings. I will
- certainly be putting that advice into effect this year.

- Lawrence, author of a book entitled Miss Wilmott's Ghosts.

Battlesbridge Free Church

We were lulled in November and December with fairly mild winter weather. So, the present extreme cold has come as a shock. We used to be



able to predict the date of various seasons and their usual type of weather to be expected. With global warming we can no longer expect predictability in weather patterns.

The weather is not the only pattern in our lives that has taken on a very different aspect, with old certainties less predictable. During the war years, the majority would have assumed that we were a Christian country. It was normal, at the time, for most of our children to attend Sunday School and, in our day-schools, the morning Assembly was most likely to resemble a simple act of worship.
