



Dear friends,

It is always a privilege to spend time with the families who come to share with us at Jesus and me (JAM) and in the first session this year, we all spent time looking at what each one of us is good at and what talents we possess. It wasn't surprising that despite all of us being part of God's big family we were very different with very varied gifts and talents. To understand a bit more, we looked at the parable of the talents that Jesus told.

This parable is the story where a rich man with three servants gives each of them some money (talents) and asks them to use it while he is away. When the master returns, two of the servants have made a profit by investing or buying and selling but one servant has just buried his talent and has nothing extra to show his master.

The children all agreed that the message of the story lay in the trust the master had placed in his servants. He expected them to use the talents he had given them to achieve something good; something which they and their master could be proud of. They weren't surprised that he was angry with the servant who had done nothing with the money entrusted to him.

The master rewarded the active, diligent servants by placing more trust in them and giving them more responsibility but the other servant lost all that he had been given. We could all see that God has given each of us gifts and talents but that he expects us to make good, profitable decisions about the ways that we use them.

The story led us to an understanding that just like the servants in the story, "whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much." Luke 16 v 10.

It would be unreasonable if we gave young children large salaries and made them

responsible for their own food, shelter or too much else. However we all come to a time when we need to understand that everything has a cost and a value and that there are choices to be made. That's why we gradually give children pocket money and responsibility for some of their own decisions. It's the same with us and God, He expects us to look after the gifts we've been given and to understand the trust that is placed in our hands. The parable tells us that if we are faithful with the little things we have, God will trust us with more.


Some of the decisions and questions which currently face us as individuals and as a nation may seem too big or too complicated for us but we have a God in whom we can confidently place our trust, whom we can ask for wisdom and who has promised always to be by our side. That's a cause for hope in the future and trust in the eventual coming of God's Kingdom and the fruition of His plan.

Farewell to Edward (Ted) Dowson, 2 July 1950 – 12 January 2025

Edward Dowson was well known to people at Trinity where he was part of a team working the sound system that enhanced worship at Sarum Hill. At the time of the death of his wife, Julie, he was recovering from Meningitis, and he continued to experience ill-health for the rest of his life. After becoming seriously ill in the autumn of 2024, his health declined rapidly and he died on 12 January, shortly after entering a nursing home.

His funeral took place on 31 January. The committal, attended only by his family, took place at the graveside in Ellisfield where he had lived with Julie for many years. This was followed by a celebration of his life at the Farleigh Estate Social Club.

Edward had lived in the Basingstoke area for many years, both within the town and later in the village of Ellisfield, which he loved. He had many interests, several of which reflected his love of nature. He was an active participant in the life of the rural community, assisting with the organisation of local events. His love of film saw him leading a film society in Ellisfield and he also enjoyed jazz.

He was a member of the U3A and one of the activities he undertook was Croquet, moving on from U3A Croquet to becoming a keen and valued member of Basingstoke Croquet Club.

Some years after Julie's death, he met and married Barbara Richardson, a widow and member of Kempshott Methodist Church. They shared many interests and enjoyed several holidays abroad. When travel became difficult they moved back into Basingstoke to a bungalow in Buckland Avenue. Barbara did not enjoy robust health and sadly died in February 2022.

Edward has two daughters, Sarah, who lives at Sherfield-on-Loddon, and Louise who lives and works in education in Brunei. Edward braved the travel to visit Louise and her children a couple of years ago. Both Sarah and Louise spoke lovingly about their father and gave a real sense of his personality. A long-term friend also spoke of camping holidays abroad in a car which seemed not up to the job. He bore witness to Edward's impetuosity.

Edward's children, step-daughter, grandchildren, brother, nephews and many friends from all his interest groups enjoyed remembering a man of kindness, imagination and integrity. Charities selected for donations in his memory were the Hawk Conservancy Trust, Andover and the Hampshire Wildlife Trust.

May he rest in peace.



<u>BUT</u> it will be up to our Church congregation & those running various groups & activities to keep both me and our e-news editor (Hazel) informed of what is going on.


The website is in its infancy, and a huge learning curve for me in its development, so I welcome any suggestions for changes and/or additions you would like to see on the website, *Peter H*

ABRIDGED MINUTES of ST ANDREW'S TRINITY CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING Monday 10 February 2025 at 2 pm

Twenty-six people attended Apologies received from four members

- **1. The Minutes** of the meetings held on 21 October 2024 and 18 November 2024 were agreed as a true record.
- **2. Matters Arising:** Under 9. Publicity, Peter Harris wanted to clarify that he and Hazel were not producing a register of activities, but a Flyer.
- 3. Property: A property report had been circulated prior to the meeting.

Roof: BL drew attention to the paragraph concerning roof repairs following storm damage. The cost of the November repairs was £12,000 and is guaranteed for 15 years. The second repair in December cost £4,800 and is guaranteed for 10 years.

Gardener: We have employed a new gardener, Mr A. Bonner.

Signage: Estimates had been received to supply three outside signs showing our new Church name, at a cost of £1,002, which included the removal and disposal of the old signs. The proposal was carried by a majority vote and one abstention.

Lettings: We have lost one letting which was the South Ham Action Group which has disbanded. At a recent Stewards meeting it was agreed that Church Council be asked to agree to an increase in letting fees. The proposal is that from September 2025 the hourly rate for regular bookings will increase by £1 and for occasional bookings £2 per hour. It is further proposed that the Guides, Brownies and Rainbows will remain at their existing rate. In reply to a question, the Treasurer confirmed that the revenue from lettings more than covers the cost of heating and lighting.

<u>Health & Safety Policy Notice</u>: This had been circulated, and MP asked the meeting if they would approve the notice for the coming year. To be reviewed annually. A risk assessment policy should also be attached.

4. Finance: Sarah W had produced a financial report and a balance sheet for St Andrew's Trinity for the 5 months ending 31st January 2025, plus an additional report which included a 5 month comparison to the previous year. In reply to a question SW explained why the circuit assessment is a year behind, and the reason why there is an assessment for St Andrews, and one for Trinity.

MH confirmed that there will still be some money for St Andrew's Trinity Church, which will come from ex-Trinity accounts

Reports from Other Groups: Reports circulated before the meeting were from the Worship Group, Pastoral Group, Tech Group, Outreach Group, BB & U5's Group, Outreach Group, Children's/Young People and Families Group and Mission. The only questions arising from these reports were on AV and Mission.

<u>AV</u>: DW had produced a very comprehensive report which was circulated prior to this meeting. He gave a summary of the work already carried out in the hall and mentioned the four outstanding items left to complete the AV scheme. He also talked about other additional improvements that people might like. DW proposed to Church Council that we purchase a new laptop with Microsoft 365 and suggested that perhaps a small group of people could investigate what sort of laptop and software would be best for our church and then put forward a proposal to Church Council.

ABRIDGED MINUTES, ST ANDREW'S TRINITY CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING (cont'd)

<u>Projectors</u>: MF asked if the quality of projection could be improved, mentioning the distracting sunlight from the circular window. There was some discussion about turning lights off, and having single lighting for organ/piano, and the pulpit. MH thought a new laptop would improve the quality of projection on the screen. PH suggested we look at procuring a better-quality screen. It was agreed that this should wait until Revd Claire is back from sabbatical. In the meantime, DW said the AV group would think about the points raise and explore further possibilities.

Mission: BJ had circulated the notes she had taken at the Zoom meeting. DW spoke about his own thoughts and there was a general discussion on what mission meant to us as individuals. Before the next Church Council Meeting DW asked everybody (a) to pray and make a note of what we do that might be described as mission. "Nothing" is an acceptable answer, but we should be creative about what this means — not just evangelism, but living out our Christian calling of love for the world not just "church" sponsored things, but personal ones too. (b) What, if anything else, we think that God might be calling us as individuals to do on 'mission', including areas not to continue.

- (c) the same question as (b) but as a group of people, or the whole church community.
- (d) What are the reasons why we don't do items (b and c).

It was pointed out that no one has asked the church people what they do, or want and that we should encourage the congregation to join in. eg: ask people to pray for us.

LH said she was surprised to learn that there was a lack of understanding that the Mug and Biscuit was for everyone, not just church people. We will have to think about how best to promote the M & B.

5. Safeguarding/GDPR

Safegarding: MH reported that there had been some advanced training courses. She pointed out that safeguarding is the responsibility of everyone. Five people were mentioned that needed to renew their DBS certificate,

GDPR: Pauline volunteered to look at the Trinity website/emails and inform Michael if there was any sensitive information that comes under the GDPR rules.

6. Circuit

Sarah R. reported on Circuit news. Heather Symons had been appointed as Pastoral Assistant and Louise Craig appointed as Lay Outreach (all subject to references). We were not able to attract a Deacon in the north of the circuit for the elderly. There are outstanding vacancies in Andover and Reading.

7. Any Other Business

Extra tables and chairs will continue to be put out on Sunday. LF will put a message on the screen to remind people.

<u>Christians Against Poverty</u>: YH gave information to the meeting on this national charity which works with churches enabling people to manage their budgets. She proposed that CAP would like to run 4 sessions at South Ham and she asked if our church would cover the cost of the meals and rental of our building. AV would be required. LH volunteered to provide refreshments.

<u>Michael asked for a nomination to be our church link to the Foodbank</u>. PW offered to be a telephone contact and JL volunteered to be the e-mail link.

Memorial Book: PA mentioned that the memorial book had been updated and is now back in the display cabinet.

A suggestion was made to have some artificial floral displays in front of the back walls in Church.



A Lent Reflection



Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating doughnuts, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, 'At the bakers I told God, that if He wanted me to buy doughnuts, He should provide a parking space in front. On the eighth time around, there it was!'

Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer. At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, 'You are My Son, whom I love; with You I am well pleased.' (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations challenge Jesus in key three areas of His identity: His divine sonship, political power and Messianic role (Luke 4: 1-13). It is as though Jesus was looking into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He should be.

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, 'who am I? It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves? Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives. Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers. (**PP**)

Zac in Basingstoke in 2025


Do you sing? Play an instrument? Want a challenging but rewarding day on **7 June 2025?** It is not long to go now!





Last month a week was set aside by churches, to consider church unity. This was termed, 'The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.' In years past, this was celebrated positively, in Basingstoke. It finished each week, with a united, Service, in one of the town's churches.



It seems to have ceased. And I for one miss it. I am an Ecumenist, and I believe that each denomination of the Christian Church, has a part to play in worship and adherence to the Faith. Their respective churches are all the 'House of God' and although their style of worship varies, all are valid.

Why a Glass of Milk may help Save your Life

Drinking a glass of milk a day could cut the risk of you getting bowel cancer by almost a fifth. So say researchers at the University of Oxford. They have found strong evidence that calcium protects against the deadly disease.

According to the data, it takes only an extra 300mg of calcium a day (found in a large 240ml of milk, or a couple of pots of yoghurt) to result in a 17 per cent lessening of the risk of bowel cancer. Currently, one in 20 women and one in 17 men in the UK will be diagnosed with bowel cancer during their lifetime. It affects around 44,000 people each year in the UK. (**PP**)





Peterborough Cathedral could 'face financial ruin by Easter'



Peterborough Cathedral, one of the great Norman Cathedrals of Europe, is facing financial collapse. The 1400-year-old Cathedral is facing a perfect storm of rising National Insurance costs, rising fuel bills, cost-of-living crisis and decline in giving to the Cathedral. The dean, the Very Revd Christopher Dalliston, needs to raise £300,000 by the end of March. Otherwise, Peterborough Cathedral risks becoming the country's first 'part-time' Cathedral, and not able to open every day of the week. It costs about £2 million a year to run the Cathedral. It relies on commercial activities, public donations, and events and exhibitions. A 'C of E' grant makes up only 15 per cent of the Cathedral's income. (*PP*)

'Thank you for your help in turning my life around'. That was the essence of a card sent to a Chaplain recently as a result of discussion during a distressful time in court. That someone should bother to write shows the great level of appreciation of our presence in the town centre and places of work. We hear some good things as well as tales of difficulties connected to health, relationships and security. Responses to life events vary, and sometimes we can only share a word of encouragement and tell a person we are praying for them, which we do individually and collectively. We can also suggest where further help might be available. Recently we heard of one person who has started going to church where he can be encouraged to grow in Christ.

A Chaplain attends a discussion group for people who are lonely or living with loss, which is held in the Discovery Centre on Mondays and alternate Fridays. Friendships are being built and the gospel shared appropriately. Charles Spurgeon spoke of thankfulness for the wave that throws us on to the rock of Jesus; when a traumatic event occurs a Christian can help guide to Christ rather than a rock of despair or destruction.

Security in The Malls / Festival Place seems to have become more effective in combating shoplifting. Persistent offenders can be banned. Vandalism at the Top of Town has been in the news and shop workers are concerned at the intimidation and damage done. We are seeking to support shopkeepers in different ways; even our presence is a deterrent to abuse.

We are hoping to agree a temporary lease for our office as Festival Place is being sold. It is being left for the new owners, once it is sold, to decide what to do about our presence and the office accommodation. Please pray that this will be settled favourably for us.

We would love to talk more about the Chaplaincy, to churches and groups: how and why we do what we do and the benefits that come about. We are also wanting to recruit some more Chaplains so that we can help more people and spread the good news. Contact us to arrange a Visit.

I also want to thank you for praying for the work we do as a Chaplaincy and for the support you give us.

Praying the Prayer of Forgiveness:

Numbers 12:13, 'O God, heal her, I pray'

These six words are Moses' prayer for his sister Miriam. They tell us a lot about Moses and a lot about prayer. For some time Miriam and her brother Aaron had been simmering with anger against Moses. They protested that he had married a Cushite woman (v.1), but the real cause of their animosity was jealousy. 'Has the Lord spoken only through Moses?' (v.2). Don't we have a ministry as well? Hasn't God also spoken through us? Why does everyone look to Moses? Why are we overlooked? Jealousy is a powerful and deadly emotion. God had given ministries and honour to Miriam (Exod. 15:20,21) and Aaron had become the chief priest (Num. 3:1-3), but neither of them were satisfied with that. It looks as if Miriam fomented and took the lead in criticising Moses. Suddenly the Lord intervened (v.4). He called Moses, Aaron and Miriam together and defended His servant Moses. Moses is faithful in all my house! (v.7)

Whereas the Lord had often spoken to other prophets in dreams and visions, He speaks to Moses 'mouth to mouth' (v 8). How dare Aaron and Miriam question Moses whom the Lord called 'my servant' (v 8). Having so strongly defended Moses and rebuked his critics, the Lord departed and then the divine judgement fell. Suddenly Miriam, the leader of the conspiracy, was struck down with the dreaded leprosy. Aaron immediately cried out to Moses, confessing his own and his sister's sin and foolishness (vv 11,12). Then Moses demonstrated why the Lord honoured him so highly. He expressed no anger, no vindictiveness, no spirit of 'settling scores' against his brother and sister. In spite of their antagonism and jealousy, Moses loved them both and 'cried to the Lord' on behalf of Miriam.

He prayed one of the shortest prayers found in the Bible. 'O God, heal her, I pray' (v 13). He was grieved and full of compassion to see his sister so terribly afflicted. The prayer was prompted by the love that forgives, the love that overlooks what others have done to us, the love that wants God's best for them. And only God's grace can make us like that. The prayer is so short, so simple, so direct, so personal. 'O God, heal her, I pray.'

And God heard and answered. As a warning to others who might challenge Moses' authority, Miriam was quarantined for seven days, then fully healed and restored (vv 14,15). How does this incident help us in our prayer life? First, true prayer is born in compassion. The lips express the deep feelings of the heart. Second, God will not hear our prayers if our hearts are not right with him and with one another. While we cherish resentments and grudges, our praying is powerless. Third, while there are many times when prayer needs to be persistent, there are also times when it is a simple, deep cry from the heart. *(PP)*

Is it Time you Remembered 'Eureka!'?

As Lent 2025 gets underway, do you suspect that your Christian commitment is not all it could be? If so, you are not alone. As one American church leader sadly put it: "In America the church is 3,000 miles wide – and one inch deep." But Jesus is still calling us to be His disciples, NOT His well-wishers – from a safe distance! So how does one start as a disciple, exactly? It can be helpful to remember the story of John and Andrew in the first chapter of St John.

Firstly, John and Andrew were simply getting on with daily life when their teacher, John the Baptist, introduced them to Jesus. They hadn't been out looking for Him – but when they met Him, they were deeply affected. Andrew excitedly reported: "We have found the Messiah" (John 1:41). His statement is true, but the more you read of the story, the more you'll realize that it was Jesus *who found them*. He is after YOU, too! If you encounter God, it is no accident that your paths have crossed.

The English poet Francis Thompson was a derelict living under a bridge until a Christian benefactor took him into his home. One of the poems Francis Thompson later wrote was 'The Hound of Heaven', which described God as the one who sought him down through his wayward, "labyrinthine ways." He was, like us, running from God, who all the time was leading him to an encounter with Himself.

Secondly, there is the *eureka!* factor in Andrew and John's story. This expression, from the Greek *eurisko*, is said to have been exclaimed around the year 200 BC by the Greek mathematician Archimedes when he discovered a way to determine the purity of gold. Andrew used this same expression in vs 41, when he told his brother he had found Jesus Christ. "I've found Him! Eureka!" This Lent, you can be sure that Jesus is certainly looking for you, and if your response has ever been: 'I've found Him! Eureka!" – then you, like Andrew, have become a disciple, a Christian.

Maybe you began to follow Jesus a long time ago, but your obedience has been "on hold." You haven't been faithful in worship, in reading the Bible. You haven't even been a part of a local church. Well, Lent 2025 is an ideal time to re-discover the joy of *eureka!* again. *(PP)*






