



To paraphrase that passage:

Dear friends,

In Matthew's gospel, a teacher of the law asked Jesus: 'which is the greatest commandment in the Law?' – this in an attempt to trap him! The answer given was: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind.' But then Jesus added that there is a second most important commandment: 'Love your neighbour as you love yourself.'

As we approach our Easter celebrations for 2025, I would like to focus on that second commandment, especially as I look out on the world around us and see the terrible things being done to people who are also our neighbours but in other countries!

In the first letter of John, chapter 4, John states: 'If we say we love God, but hate others, we are liars. For we cannot love God, whom we have not seen, if we do not love others, whom we have seen.

As I look at what has been happening to the people of Gaza, the scenes of utter devastation inflicted by weapons of mass destruction on civilians – where is any love for neighbours being shown?

As I watch the ongoing conflict being conducted by Russia against Ukraine with deliberate targeting of hospitals, blocks of apartments, the energy infrastructure, coupled with the vast loss of life on both sides – where again is any love for neighbours being shown?

Gaza and Ukraine are but two conflict areas among many more that are happening daily in our world. Others do not get the same level of publicity but are of equal importance for those involved.

I would ask everyone to look carefully at the passage in 1 Corinthians 13 which is often used at weddings but is far more reaching in its scope than just that use! I may have every gift, ability, knowledge, wealth, even total faith, but without **love** it has **NO** value!

Love's qualities are patience, kindness, truth, hope, peace, joy, humility, goodness, faithfulness and self-control.

These are very much the fruit of the Holy Spirit at work in lives changed by an encounter with the risen Jesus Christ!

In addition, love brings compassion, empathy and understanding into our relationships with our neighbours.

Whilst individually we cannot influence the global events we are witnessing, we can make a real difference in our own local situations by taking to heart this message about the importance of love.

Our neighbours are not just the people who live 'next door,' nor just those who live in the same street or town that we know!

The stranger we see and offer a smile to is our neighbour, the person walking their dog, the lonely person sitting on a bench in the town amid a sea of other strangers – each is our neighbour.

We can choose to interact with those around us, to offer a simple greeting such as 'good morning / afternoon', a smile, or offering a helping hand if needed.

Loving our neighbour can start small and grow into a real friendship, if we let it.

For our neighbours in far distant places, then please hold them in your prayers, especially for those in real danger, those being oppressed and those who know famine, drought, poverty...

There, but for the grace of God, could our own lives have been placed!

An Unfortunate Name

What good people Victorians were at 'rubbing in' your station in life. They never let you forget where you came from.

Charles Dickens wrote in his various novels, about the labels society placed on people in his generation. There was a complete horror of the workhouse, and my own parents born in the late 1800's often expressed this.

The name given to St Thomas' Nursing home, in Darlington Road, Basingstoke, was the Home for the 'Friendless and Fallen.'

The foundation stone was laid in 1879, and the first women housed there were called Penitents. The Home had 48 young women, aged between 15 and 30 years, trapped in prostitution and poverty. They worked hard for their keep, and the home had strict rules and regulations. In 1884 a chapel was added, and in 1885, 60 women. lived there. The 'Sisters of Charity' an Anglican Order ran the home. We can only guess about the day to day living.

In 1989 the building was marked for demolition, but was saved after protests, and is now a very different place.

Today, there are friendless people, but the term 'fallen' has ceased to exist. We have a kinder society, and 'Loved and Blessed' is a title we prefer, and should certainly aspire to.

In 1632 George Herbert wrote, 'Love bade me welcome' (see page 8 for a copy of this poem). I have a copy on my bedroom wall. Our society today isn't perfect, but we are trying to understand what compassion for our fellow man looks like.

Being Attentive to God

Our thanks to Rev Lesley Martin and Angela Hiscock for the March Retreat at Silchester, the first this year, the theme 'Being Attentive to God'. We explored how we should tune into God and listen to Him without being distracted by our everyday busy active lives surrounding us.



We were invited during our Meditation time to take a smooth stone pebble, polished in the running waters of a steam. Holding the stone in our hands, *my stone, my rock, my Lord*, assisted us in focussing on God, listening to Him, and stilling our wandering minds.

We were given the opportunity in our quiet meditation time to read and take notes from a number of books and articles exploring prayer and how to come to God in the Stillness of Meditation. I was led to an article by Emma Lowth of the Renovare Community. She gives good advice in "Listening to God and Stilling Our Wandering Mind" from Psalm 139.

- 1) The thoughts that pop into our minds in the silence of meditation may be a surprise to us, but they are not a surprise to God. **Verses 1, 2**. You have searched me Lord and you know me. You know me when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar.
- 2) Remember that the thoughts that enter your mind are there because your brain is working hard to process everything that has happened to you. God made us this way for our good. When the internal noise feels like a torment read **verses 13,14**. For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Your works are wonderful, I know that full well.
- The thoughts in our minds are not going to go away. It is how God made us. So there is no point resisting them or trying to distract ourselves from them we have to go through them. But we cannot do this on our own. Ask God to lead you through your thoughts, and reveal the truth about them. **Verses 23,24**, Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me and lead me in the way everlasting. Amen.

Now that Spring is with us, Silchester Methodist Church is the ideal location for retreat and meditation. It has a relaxing tranquil garden with comfortable benches and a summer house, with views overlooking the adjacent woods. It is located alongside the local common, a natural open area with heathland, gorse bushes, trees and small ponds. A place to be part of nature observing and listening to the wildlife and birdlife as you walk and meditate.

I did just that and walked amongst a small herd of free ranging young cows grazing amongst the bushes and trees, content with their natural environment that meets all their needs. You may note from the photo that there is no colour prejudice with wildlife as they all feed and socialise together just as God intended!

The next Retreat at Silchester this year is **Wednesday 30**th **April**, **'From Easter to Pentecost'**. Travel with the disciples as they meet the risen Jesus. Why not come along?

AV Things in the Church Building



At the February Church Council I updated everybody about the Audio Visual work. Much of the work is visible and does not need describing here. I talked about 4 items that we believe need to be completed as part of the initial and agreed work. These were

- Tidy cabling for powered speakers
- Configure new audio mixer and remove previous audio mixer
- Training and familiarisation
- Provide a summary to Circuit to claim financial support

Because of the need to thread cabling through cupboards and loft spaces, the first item will probably take longer than a day, and we have not yet managed to identify a time to do this. However I am aware that it does look unfinished, and it will be done as soon as we can.

We plan to set up the new mixer on Saturday 12th April; please bear with us on Sunday 13th!

I have spoken to some of you to act as reviewers for my report to the Circuit. If I have not spoken to you, but you have business skills, particularly relating to business planning, and you are willing to help, please do talk to me.

Church Council also discussed the need to replace our current projection laptop, and agreed that this was necessary, and as a result we are now using a Windows 11 machine with a little more power for projection, and I believe the number of occasions where the projection has "failed" have been reduced.

I also shared my wish list with Church Council. You may have thoughts on this; if you do, please do talk to me about them.

- 1. Provide screen mirroring for those leading worship (as the monitors are too high) and screen mirroring for those who cannot see the screen regularly (this may be resolved with the new mixer configuration).
- 2. Review the operation of the hearing loop as there has been some suggestion of problems.
- 3. Review the microphones that are used as not everybody can always be heard, for various reasons (this is underway).
- 4. Consider a curtain to block the Cross window when required with low winter sun.
- 5. Consider visual worship enhancements to the sanctuary area to have a 24/7 presentation of our Christian purpose.
- Consider the broadcast options into the Mug and Biscuit and Small Hall for occasions when the main hall is full.


There was also a feeling that the existing computer was slow, and hopefully things will seem better with the new one.



Was it a Miracle ??

The Island of Malta was a great help to us during the war, they had RAF and submarines there who were a constant menace to the Germans trying to supply their forces in North Africa. They were bombed most days, they were only some 60 miles from Sicily.



On this day at a place called Mosta there was a large church with a high dome. It was the second largest in the world when it was built.

There was a well-attended service taking place when they were bombed and a bomb crashed through the dome and landed at the end of the central aisle, skidded right down the aisle to stop at the altar and did not explode. If you go there now the bomb is on display (minus explosive) and you can see where the dome has been repaired.

I think it was a Miracle with so many people involved.

I have another interest in Malta. On the Island is the only Roman Catholic Boys Brigade Company in the world. Joyce and I have visited them twice and been made very welcome. On our first visit we expected to see a small company with little equipment – not so, it is better equipped than most companies. They have a large two-storey building just for them and outside there is a full-sized basketball court with highwire and floodlights. They also have the use, on request, of a full-sized theatre. I was always amused to listen to the sports report on the Saturday television to hear how many baskets the Boys Brigade had scored that day.


Although the Island did receive the George-Cross I have always felt they did not receive enough recognition.

As people they are very laid back – this may explain – the passenger in a taxi watched as the driver was on the left and then on the right and said to the driver "In Malta are you supposed to drive on the left or right?". The driver replied "**WE** do not do that, we drive in the shade".

Basingstoke Chaplaincy Prayer Letter – March 2025

We live in uncertain times with the world order being shaken; international security and economic threats are to the fore. There are local changes and tensions too. What hope do Christians have in troubled times? While we may fear the future there are Christians suffering now in many parts of the world. The coming of spring-like weather helps lift us but Christians have a greater message. The promise given to the Israelites is repeated in the letter to the Hebrews: 'For God has said: I will never leave you, and I will never forsake you'.

This is the message of hope Chaplains offer people. Through us God initiates engagement and hope for people in all the stresses and strains of life – in the Courts, at work or going about their daily business. Talking to a stranger in a Chaplain uniform helps some people, others build up a friendship and can trust a Chaplain with their secrets. Either way, God makes Himself known, person by person, step by step.

Thank you for supporting us in offering God's love and support to people we meet and showing people in Basingstoke something of God's ways for good community relations. Although we cannot divulge confidential conversations we can share generally and welcome invitations to meet congregations and church-based groups.

Ukrainians in Desperate Need of Help

As Ukraine recently marked the third anniversary of the Russian invasion, charities have warned of the desperate need for humanitarian aid for the country. An estimated one in three people in Ukraine have been displaced by the war. Roughly 3.6 million have been internally displaced, while 6.5 million have fled the country. 90 per cent of these refugees are women and children. The children remaining are also traumatised, with schools destroyed, homes bombed, and an ongoing lack of food. As World Vision warns: "The emotional burden faced by Ukrainian children cannot be overlooked." One Ukrainian mother says simply: "We see death. We see destruction every day. There's too much pain and sorrow." Russia launched its largest-ever drone strike on Ukraine on the eve of the anniversary. (*PP*)

Canon Paul Hardingham Considers the Effect of Easter... (PP) The Real Easter

In CS Lewis's *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*, the lion Aslan is put to death by the White Witch. The stone table on which He is killed cracks in two, but Aslan meets with Lucy and Susan alive again. He explains the Witch's failure: 'her knowledge goes back only to the dawn of time. But if she could have looked a little further back, she would have known that when a willing victim who had committed no treachery was killed in a traitor's stead, the Table would crack, and Death itself would start working backwards.' This is a great picture of what Jesus' cross and His resurrection has achieved. As Paul writes, 'I want to know Christ, to know the power of His resurrection' (Philippians 3:10). To understand the real Easter, we should experience the same power that raised Jesus from the dead!

New Hope: Like the girls in the story, Easter highlights the sadness and confusion that loss brings. Yet the resurrection of Jesus brings new hope, as it demonstrates the victory secured by the cross over sin, Satan and death. We can face life's difficulties knowing that Jesus walks beside us.

New Love: Our relationships are often characterised by a lack of forgiveness, hurt and betrayal. Yet Jesus' resurrection opens the possibility of new love, as His power enables us to accept others and forgive them.

New Life: When we are trying to make sense of life, like the girls in the story, Jesus offers us a living relationship with Himself. It's a friendship with God through Jesus that can begin today and continue for eternity.

When Lucy met Aslan again, she cried: 'Oh, you're real, you're real!' We too can find the real Easter through a life changing encounter with the living Christ.



Night Light Winter Shelter - A Heartfelt Thank You!

As we wrap up another season of the Basingstoke Night Light Winter Shelter, we want to take a moment to reflect on all that's been achieved and express our deepest gratitude to everyone who made it possible.



Over the past 90 nights (1st December 2024 to 28th February 2025), an incredible **144 volunteers** have come together to provide warmth, care, and support to those in need. Collectively, they have covered **6,382 hours**, with the average volunteer giving 44 hours of their time. A special mention goes to the ten volunteers who each gave over 100 hours, and 18 volunteers who covered half of all shifts between them—your commitment has been truly inspiring!

The impact of this work has been remarkable. We received **57 referrals, with 36 guests staying at the shelter at least one night**. More importantly, **19 guests have now moved into accommodation**, and an additional 8 people housed before they even needed to stay with us. On average, **guests stayed 21 nights before securing accommodation**, and in total, the shelter provided 783 bed nights of warmth & safety. A huge thank you goes out to the churches of Basingstoke, not only for providing venues but also for encouraging their communities to step up & get involved. Your generosity in offering space & encouraging volunteers has made such a difference, *The Night Light Winter Shelter Team* (item abbreviated)

They were on the road, going up to Jerusalem, and Jesus was walking ahead of them; they were amazed, and those who followed were afraid. In our own lives, may a closer walk with God bring calm in place of distress, hope in place of despair, and a new sense of purpose that will restrain our wanderings from the path and bring us back into the light that enables us to go forward in trust, whatever the future might hold.

So bless us all in our journeys along the way and bring us safely into the realm of light and love, where we shall be forever with the Lord. Amen.
