

Dear friends,

How good is your hearing? Maybe you can hear well? Maybe you wear hearing aids which means that you can hear well? Or maybe, as you've become more mature in years you feel that your hearing is not so good, even with some extra help. In later life, my dad struggled with his hearing and needed to wear hearing aids. He didn't find it easy to wear them and, at times, he found that noise and chatter could become quite distorted. So much so, that at family get-togethers when the four boy grandchildren were in attendance, my dad would ceremonially take out both hearing aids and lay them on the table because the noise in the house would be a bit too much for him! On a more serious note, I know that a common problem for those with hearing difficulties is the amount of background noise that might be going on when trying to focus on an individual conversation or voice.

If any of this resonates with you then you might be drawn to the Methodist Church's Christmas campaign which this year is called 'Hush the Noise'. The following explanation says: 'Christmas is loud, isn't it? So much expectation. So many voices. Telling us how to celebrate, what to wear, what to eat and drink, what to watch and what to buy. Instead, this Christmas we're inviting everyone to hush the noise. To listen for the love song that Angels bring, this and every year. They sang it the first time more than 2,000 years ago, on the midnight clear. They're just waiting for us to join in.'

So, that is the challenge for us as December begins. To find space and time and moments of quiet refreshment that means we can hear what God might be saying to us as we prepare for the birth of Jesus. There are plenty of opportunities in the life of our church to find that space and time amidst all the louder celebrations, and you are warmly invited to come along and join in. A lot of the Advent and Christmas activities are advertised in more detail in this magazine - do take a look. All are welcome.

I want to take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy Christmas and peaceful new year. As 2025 begins I am on sabbatical and so will be unavailable for three months until the start of April. My good wishes to you all for this time and I look forward to catching up with folk again just before Easter.

<u>Christmas</u>

My Mum loved Christmas, and she was expert at it. She loved the colours, the music, the carols, the food, the laughter, the stockings. and family.

She was as far removed from Charles Dickens' character Scrooge, as it is possible to be.

She came from the slums of Portsmouth, worked 'in service' married a Londoner, and stayed in the city, for the rest of her life. At Christmas time, it was we three, Dad, Mum, and me. Mum went into Christmas, with great enthusiasm. She decorated the flat where we lived, with paper chains and balloons. It was just after WW2, money was scarce. I had returned from evacuation, and having been bombed out, my parents had a new council flat. Nothing posh. But we were safe and happy.

Mum made Christmas cake on the elderly stove we had in the kitchen. She never measured the ingredients, she just knew. She made Christmas pudding too, inside there was always the chance of a coin, sixpence, or a thruppenny bit, placed secretly after the cooking. After the food was finished, there would be games. My parents owned a bagatelle board. This was not the modern type with a spring, it had a wooden stick to push the metal balls around, and hopefully get the score you wanted. I still have the board, and it is a tradition in my family, to play every Christmas. We even have a Bagatelle Cup, and a wooden spoon award. Mum was blessed with a wonderful sense of humour, and optimism, and Christmas was the time she showed her love. My Dad smiling, quietly supporting her. Christmas has changed, but it is still about love, God's love for each one of us. As I look for presents, I know the simplest gifts are the best. My eldest son lives in Spain with his wife. This year I am giving him his Dad's Bible. I have placed the marker ribbons, in places of blessing for him. Places of assurance of God's love and protection.

Thank God for those we have loved, for those we love now, for those we will love in the future, and those who will find his love through us. God bless you.

Journeys of Imagination THE BIRTH

The cold wind hit me like a sledgehammer as I stepped outside the door and looked around. After the warmth of the cattle shed, and the sweat and blood of the birth, after the pungent smell of idling cattle and damp straw, I needed some fresh air – and now I'd got it with a vengeance.

The chill wind that I'd barely noticed inside the creaking barn cut through me, and I pulled my coat tighter round me. The midwife, none too pleased at being called out at that time of night, had come and gone, and the innkeeper had long since returned to look after his other guests.

It was a clear night; as cold nights often are. No trace of clouds to be seen anywhere – just a carpet of stars arching across the sky. And one, I could see, far brighter than the others. Back at home, I had often looked up to the night sky, to trace the shapes and patterns in the formation of the stars, but I had never seen this one before, outshining everything else, shouting to the sleeping world to pay attention, to gaze on it and see God's greatness there.

And then I saw them coming. Men from the hills. Noisy and excited. I paid no attention at first. Just revellers, I thought, making their way home after an evening in the town. But no. As they came closer, I could see – and smell – that they were shepherds. And they were talking, shouting, to each other and to anyone who would listen. And I clearly heard the word "baby" drifting across on that chill wind.

Something special was happening...... I was still puzzled, unable to make it all out. But I did remember Mary's words all those months ago, when she tried to explain what was happening. And I suddenly had one of those strange feelings that you get now and again: you know what I mean? A feeling that God was very present in His world ... and that I too was standing in His presence.

I glanced up at the skies once more, so bright, so crystal cold, and again pulled my coat around me before going back in to my wife, and to that tiny fragile piece of humanity who it seemed, could even bring stars to his cradle.

We currently have a Communion Service and Carol Services planned as listed below:



Can it ever be resolved? If so, how? These are the basic questions addressed in this revised and expanded sixth edition of Colin Chapman's highly acclaimed book.

Having lived and worked in the Middle East at various times since 1968, Chapman explains the roots of the problem and outlines the arguments of the main parties involved. He also explores the theme of land in the Old and New Testaments. discussing legitimate and illegitimate ways of using the Bible in relation to

Caring for the donkeys of Gaza


A charity based in the UK is sending emergency vets to care for donkeys in Gaza.

Safe Haven for Donkeys was set up about 20 years ago to treat working donkeys across Israel and the Palestinian Territories.

But the charity says that its mobile first aid team is even more necessary now, because with fuel scarce and so many vehicles damaged, donkeys have become a main mode of transport in Gaza, carrying water and medicine, and even sick people to hospital.

However, the animals are often suffering. They face starvation, dehydration and open wounds. Since April, the team has treated approximately 800 donkeys and horses. *PP*







Audio Visual Update – December 2024



Over the course of November, you will have seen some very obvious changes to the main hall. At the time of writing, we have moved the wooden cross and we plan that by the end of November the screen will have been moved. We hope that in December the loud speakers will be taken off their temporary stands and fixed up on the side walls. I want to say thank you to many who have helped in words and actions in all sorts of different ways with this, and thank you to everybody who has put up with change and disruption. Our work is not finished, but we have made progress.

The next phase of the work will involve changing the sound mixer and also trialling some ways to allow those leading worship to see what is on the screen without having to look up at the monitors. We are also investigating how we can provide tablets for people whose eyesight is poor to enable them to see what happens on the screen. We continue to think about other ways to support the life and mission of this place with the technology that we can offer.

You will be aware that we are keen to make use of the screen space when a service is not happening to provide a space that would allow us to share God's love or something about the Christian story for anybody who comes into the hall. This might be through images, craftwork, even sculptures, etc that would be hung on the wall or stood on the ground. We are therefore keen to identify potential designers, artists and artisans who could enable this to happen. If this is you, please do contact me. There are some who have already said that they are interested in helping with this – thank you – and it would be good to have input from others.

I am investigating whether we can identify somebody from outside our community who could help us with this. If you have ideas of somebody with suitable skills, please do mention it to them, or ask me to speak to them. Please do speak with me if you have comments or suggestions about anything here.

Teaching the Lord's Prayer across the North of England

The Archbishop of York Stephen Cottrell plans to teach the Lord's Prayer across the North of England throughout 2025, a priority of his vision for *Faith in the North*. Archbishop Stephen is to visit dioceses in the Northern Province of the C of E where he will be sharing the relevance of the Lord's Prayer to our world today, encouraging people to pray and live by this, as part of their missionary discipleship. Archbishop Stephen is encouraging prayer, storytelling and church planting inspired by the Northern Saints such as Hild, Cuthbert, Bede and Paulinus. The aim is to foster deeper connections with the Christian faith across the north and renew the Church's missionary purpose to share God's love with all.

Archbishop Stephen said "In less than 70 words, Jesus gives us a prayer to learn by heart and a prayer that gets inside our hearts, shaping the way we live. The Lord's Prayer surely is the best place to start. It is said in just about every church service, from the coronation of the King to the christening of a child. It's a challenging prayer and when we say this prayer together, we become part of God's movement of change, of bringing God's heaven to earth. It teaches us how to pray. But it also teaches us how to live". *Faith in the North* is a movement of prayer and strategic resourcing which aims to help recapture the missional energy and commitment to prayer of the Anglo Saxon saints leading towards 2027, with the celebration of the 1400th anniversary of the establishment of the Church of Saint Peter in York and baptism of King Edwin by Paulinus in 627. *(from PP)*

Iconic Bethlehem Carol Sheet celebrates 70 years in Print (PP)

It was back in 1954 when the charity, BibleLands Mission Aid Society, first tentatively decided to print a colourful compilation of popular Christmas carols, alongside images of some of the people BibleLands served. From the start, the scheme was an immense success. The carol sheets were so popular that even that first year, 100,000 copies were insufficient to meet the demand of schools, churches, British army bases at home and abroad and Royal Navy ships across the world. The donations appeal towards the BibleLands projects in the carol sheet also raised hundreds of pounds.

When 500,000 copies were quickly sold in 1955, BibleLands knew it had a winner on its hands. So it was that, in 1956, with 1.5 million carol sheets sales as the target, an accompanying catalogue of Christmas cards and gifts and prayers for God's favour was also launched. The plan was overwhelmingly successful – much needed funds were raised for the work of BibleLands.

Since then, many millions of carol sheets have been sold, until this year the charity, now renamed Embrace the Middle East, has produced a new-look **Edition with 27 popular carols**, including three new additions for this year: *O Holy Night, See Him Lying on a Bed of Straw (Calypso Carol)* and *The Angel Gabriel from Heaven Came.* For more information or to purchase your copy, visit: https://shop.embraceme.org/collections/bethlehem-carols

The President of Azerbaijan at the recent COP29 Conference on Climate Awareness, stated that oil and gas in his country are a "gift from God". In the light of the steady advance of global temperature due to the now proven uncontrolled use of fossil fuels this is certainly a controversial statement.

We should be aware of the Great Commandment "*Love your neighbour as yourself*", Mark12:31, and ensure that others around us who are in need are able to share in our good fortune.

In the wider sense both individually and globally we should be very much aware of our responsibilities in this World as given to us by God. This is clearly defined in Genesis 1:26, where God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground".

Our present situation with global warming and its consequences escalating out of control is one of many examples clearly telling us that we, mankind, from the earliest of times, have not been diligent in ruling our world. We have not been wise in using God's Gifts in "ruling over all the earth" but have exploited them by our personal desires for power, greed and self-gratification. The exploitation of fossil fuels in recent times is clear evidence of this!

The greatest gift that God has given us individually from the beginning of time is "the Gift of Life in this World".

Each one of us now should actively and urgently take responsibility for managing our World, protecting it from further destruction, and work towards restoring it as was God's Gift of Creation given for us. If we do not achieve this, God's most precious "Gift of Life in this World" will be taken from us!

So the churches were strengthened in the faith and increased in numbers daily.

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, 'Come over to Macedonia and help us.' When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them. Acts 16: 5; 9-10 (NRSVA)


Anything to help us face that steaming turkey stew.

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Basingstoke Town Chaplaincy Prayer Letter, November 2024

We hide from death with the increasingly grotesque displays at Hallowe'en and then Remembrance reminds us of the deadly horrors of war. These events give us opportunities to speak about death, sacrifice and grief more openly. Recently we have wept with those who are weeping, mourned the loss of a loved one, worried with someone with a grim diagnosis. People try not to show their hurts but a listening ear is of value and comfort. But Chaplains need to be genuine and meaningful in their response. We share the love of God who can meet an immediate need and give the opportunity of salvation. Shop staff have particularly challenging roles these days as companies cut costs by reducing numbers. Some have been known to Chaplains for years but we struggle to see people regularly due to their busyness and our shortage of Chaplains.

In the Law Courts the opportunities are different as people face issues of offending, being offended against or witnessing unpleasantness and we can talk about circumstances and the power of forgiveness. Conversations with court staff and Probation Officers have also been valuable, especially with the pressures on the Courts and the early release scheme which results in a number of prisoners all being released on the same day. Some exprisoners will become homeless and churches are working together to provide a Night Light Winter Shelter.

Recently we hosted an engaging interfaith discussion about the town and our community cohesion. There are many opportunities to engage and work together as churches and as different faiths for the benefit of the community. There is a strong tradition of parades in the Hindu community and we will join several churches holding open events for Christmas. These send out our message of good news and bring the community together.

Church of England & Methodist Church recommit as Covenant Turns 21

Anglicans and Methodists in England have underlined their commitment to forging closer ties as together they recently marked the 21st anniversary of an historic covenant between the two churches. The Anglican-Methodist Covenant was signed by leaders of the Church of England and the Methodist Church in Great Britain in front of Queen Elizabeth II on 1 November 2003, with services of celebration at both Methodist Central Hall and its immediate neighbour Westminster Abbey. The Covenant recognises how much the two churches – which separated in the 1790s, after the death of John Wesley – have in common and commits them to removing further obstacles towards unity.

It has opened the way to new partnerships on the ground between local Church of England and Methodist congregations, ranging from joint worship and sharing church buildings to shared community projects and staff such as youth and family workers. The Archbishops of Canterbury and York, Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell, said: "The Covenant was both a reflection of the great degree of friendship and agreement in faith and life which the Church of England and the Methodist Church of Great Britain share, and a commitment that we should work ever more closely together in the years to come." The Revd Helen Cameron, President of the Methodist Conference, and Carolyn Godfrey, Vice-President, said: "It is good to reaffirm the covenant that was signed 21 years ago, and to celebrate the work and worship that happens between the Church of England and the Methodist Church locally and nationally. We look forward in hope to journeying together in the future." *(taken from Parish Pump)*


Canon Paul Hardingham gives thanks to the God who comes among us (PP)... Christmas Geese

The story is told of a farmer who didn't believe in Jesus. One snowy Christmas Eve, his wife was taking their children to a service at their local church. He refused to come saying: 'Why would God lower Himself to come to Earth as a man? That's ridiculous!' So, they left him at home. 


