




Dear Friends,

One of the things that I have been thinking about recently is the idea of 'welcome'. So, I wonder if you can think of a time when you have been made to feel welcome? Maybe this was when you moved into a new home and one of your neighbours knocked on the door to introduce themselves? Or when you started a new job or joined an organisation or project? I hope that we have all experienced a welcome somewhere and from someone in our lives.

A few weeks ago I entered a building for a meeting that had lots of signs that were welcoming, in fact there was a poster that had the word welcome written in lots of different languages. Maybe you have seen a poster or display like this? There used to be one in the entrance area to my children's primary school. It strikes me that putting the poster or display on the wall is the easy bit. Sometimes when we meet the person or people in the building, we are not made to feel welcome at all! Offering a welcome to other people must start with an open heart and a generous spirit, and a willingness to accept the 'other' for who they are. This is not always easy to do (occasionally this can be for good reason and we need to safeguard ourselves) but sometimes we can be hesitant or suspicious of offering a welcome to someone else, especially if they are very different from ourselves.


There is a lovely verse in the New Testament part of the Bible, in Hebrews, that can be summarised as this: show hospitality or welcome to strangers because by doing this some have entertained angels without knowing it. As I reflect on this, I am reminded that the times when I have been privileged to offer a welcome to others, to share hospitality with folk who are very different from myself, I have been blessed far more in

return through what has been shared. Sometimes when we are pushed out of our comfort zone to meet people where they are, we find a common humanity and a shared desire to respect and be respected and in that we learn about others and about ourselves. We gain fresh insight and understanding.

I wonder what opportunities there will be in the coming weeks over the summer period for me to offer a welcome and share hospitality with others? What opportunities might there be in our church community?


The group to be commissioned involves

Trinity Bibles Going to Zambia!

Pew bibles and Junior Church bibles as well as other bible story books from Trinity will soon be on their way to the 'Family Future Community school' in Kabwe, Zambia, visited by the Trinity Girls' Brigade in 2010 and 2012.

Future Pillars Zambia (FPZ), the UK charity that supports the school, will send them in the next container shipment. The bibles and books will be used as classroom resources to support the RE syllabus and will mean that each child in the class can have a bible to refer to instead of one bible per class of 40 children!

The school has grown from strength to strength and now has 1,000 pupils from preschool to upper secondary school level. The children primarily come from 3 shanty towns in the local area and are fed and educated with no fees charged for any items. The feeding programme is essential as in many cases it is the only meal the children get and so the school kitchen stays open throughout the school holidays.

The school now receives Government funding for about 70% of the teachers' salaries but, just like in the UK, the rise in food prices means FPZ needs to continue fundraising. You can feed 5 children every day for just £25 a month.

The Vocational Skills Centre, which was just opening when we visited in 2012, is now an approved Government training scheme offering courses to both pupils graduating from the school and fee-paying students. This income means that 400 young people per year can get free training on an accredited course and leave with the skills needed to provide for their families in the future.

He makes me lie down He restores my soul

Our thanks to Revd Lesley Martin and Angela Hiscock for the June Retreat at Silchester

Methodist Church, the theme being "He makes me lie down He restores my soul", Psalm 23:1-6. The relaxing and natural location of the Retreat gave us the opportunity to appreciate the comfort and support our Lord, the good Shepherd, provides for us in this challenging World today, without being distracted by our everyday busy active lives.



The Book of Psalms comprises many early Hebrew writings from Old Testament times and is now used in both Hebrew and Christian worship. Psalm 23 can be seen as a profession of joyful trust in the Lord as the good Shepherd - King. It is no less meaningful to us today as we Christian Believers have the personal indwelling Holy Spirit.

We were given the opportunity in our quiet meditation time to read and take notes from a number of books and articles exploring prayer and meditation, and how to come to God in the stillness of meditation. I was led to an article, Creative Writing, by April Yamasaki, pastor, author and editor. What she had done was write a paraphrase of Psalm 23 using the letter **G**. Let me share this with you. Compare this with the Bible version of your choice.

- 1) The Lord is my Guardian, he gives and I am grateful.
- 2) He grants me gentle rest in green grasslands; He energises me by great geysers of grace,
- 3) He gives me good growth

 He guides me in generous paths of goodness for his name's sake.
- 4) Even though I grumble and groan at the gloom of death, I grasp your hand for you are with me.

 You guard and ground and grow me.
- 5) You gather me in for the grand gala, while others might glance and glare; I glow in gleaming garments and golden garland; my goblet overflows.
- 6) Surely goodness and grace shall be God's gifts that keep on giving and giving, And I will glorify in God in the galaxy of gladness forever.

Maybe this experimentation will inspire you to some wordplay of your own as a way of meditating on the depth and meaning of this Psalm. Choose your own letter to play with and have fun!

We also had the opportunity to walk in the adjacent Silchester common on this beautiful Summer day and walk amongst the trees, heathland and small ponds with none of the distractions of daily life, and to listen to the birdsong around us as we walked and meditated. Many species of beautiful butterflies were evident in the surrounding bushes. I took the opportunity to take this walk.

For those of us that would like to see the Psalm 23 visual image of our Lord, the Shepherd, in a more practical way you can do just that at our local National Trust, The Vyne, where you can "lie down in green pastures, ….. besides quiet waters" in the gardens by the lake …… and also enjoy the natural wildlife living there. See photo!

I came away from the Retreat with a re-affirmation that Jesus our Lord and Shepherd is with us today, no less so than when the Psalm was written. We need, each one of us, to take time to be personally with Him, trusting Him and receiving His Love and Support, in restoring our Souls, equipping us to serve His Will.

The next Retreat at Silchester this year is Wednesday 6th August, **Just Peace**, Becoming Peacemakers. "……seek peace, and pursue it." Psalm 34:14. Why not come along?

Listen, Care, Love

Three words, which if we take them seriously, can change life for us, and for those around us. We all know when someone is really listening. Maybe it is something we have said many times before, or something we have never dared to utter. We all need someone to listen. Listening, really listening is something learnt. For a moment, to put aside my own thoughts, and concentrate on the person in front of me, or on the telephone, or in a letter, to read 'between the lines.'

When I volunteered to be a Visitor at Basingstoke hospital, that was my brief. Unfortunately, Covid brought this to an end, when the Chaplain said, I could no longer fulfill the role, as volunteer Visitors were stopped.

As a Visitor going from bed to bed on the three wards on F floor, for elderly care, the wards I was designated to visit, my generation. I had so much in common with these folk, but everyone's story is different, and it is wrong to clump them all together. Often there were no words, just the need to have someone alongside. Sometimes words come out in a torrent with words all jumbled up, words not expecting a reply, full of need, full of questions, full of anguish. In all cases my trustworthiness is essential, that it is confidential, and will not be repeated.

Going from patient to patient, listening, caring, loving. Following the Chaplain's list of names, and sometimes having a word when I felt a need. An elderly gentleman wanted me to sing 'The mountains of Mourne,' yes, I could do that. A song from Ireland, his homeland. What a privilege! To smile, to listen, to pray. To care, and to show Christian love.

We all know when people are not really listening when they are detached, when they are 'sparing' us a moment. We all long for peace in a noisy, restless world, we all need prayer, and patience, we all need compassion.

A salvationist song writer wrote 'Unless I am moved with compassion, how dwellest Thy Spirit in me? In word and in deed, burning love is my need, I know I can find this in Thee.'

My Experience of having a Stroke

On10 March this year having just arrived home about 1 o'clock with Hazel having been at the Singing Group at St Andrew's Trinity I realised something had happened to me. Something had happened to my eyes and although I could still see my vision was affected and my head felt strange. I immediately said to Hazel something had happened and I needed to be taken to A & E.

As it transpired this was a big mistake. We got to Basingstoke A & E about 1.45 pm and to cut a long story short, Basingstoke rang Winchester about me (after 5 hours of various scans, eye tests, waiting around, etc). They were told to blue light me to Winchester A & E immediately. This was very quickly arranged and we were on our way to Winchester. Needless to say this was an experience in itself as the crew realised the ambulance was having engine problems and was unable to go faster than 30 mph so the crew arranged to meet another ambulance which was sent from Andover and we were transferred, to complete my transfer to Winchester.

Once at Winchester I was processed very quickly with a scan of my head which identified that part of the optical processing area had been affected but importantly it was still within the additional timeframe to administer drugs to possibly reverse the damage caused by my stroke, as I had by now missed the $4\frac{1}{2}$ hour time-frame. They administered the appropriate drugs around 8.40 pm and I was transferred to the Stroke ward where I stayed for 2/3 days. The care at Winchester was excellent and from having lost 50% of my vision (the vision of the left half of both eyes) I regained the lower half of the left half of my vision and in time I may regain the rest. We have to wait and see.

What has this experience taught us? If you have or suspect a stroke, do not self-present yourself at Basingstoke – Ring 999 immediately and get an ambulance as they will take you to Winchester. The current 'FAST' message on tv, ('face, arms, speech and time') does not highlight the fact that eyes can be affected by a stroke, as in my case where it was only eyes!

The Winchester Stroke team are very concerned about my case as well as some others which involved either self-presenting at an A & E and / or people who only had eyes affected. They are talking about changing the 'FAST' campaign to something like 'BEFAST' with the 'B' standing for 'Balance' and the 'E' standing for 'Eyes'. In addition they are looking at improving the identification of patients who self-present at A & E who may have Stroke Symptoms.

Joan Mary Thomas (Remembered) 15 July 1927 to 9 May 2025

Obituary (by Kiya, Granddaughter and (taken from the Order of Service)

It is with great sadness that Joan's long life came to a peaceful end on 9 May 2025, surrounded with love. Born on the 15 July 1927. Joan was determined to make it to 100 – of which at 97 years old, she incredibly, very nearly did!



Joan lived a fantastic life, full with adventures, love and worship. It is an impossibility to note absolutely everything this amazing woman did in her life but I'd like to share some of the key moments with you.

In her early years working at the Co-op and Telephone Exchange in the Basingstoke and Fleet community. Along with husband Cyril and best friend Brenda, Joan spent her earlier years putting on yearly carnivals and attending concerts before settling down at her beloved home with her family in Portacre Rise. She later went on to run a Nursery from her home, shaping the minds of young people with her caring nature, poems and crafts for many, many years.

Artistic by nature, Joan surrounded herself with crafts and painting, using her paint brush to shape the minds or many disabled adults in her visits to Roman House and Audleys Close and was a passionate activist for disabled rights and autonomy thanks to her son Julian. Joan took great pride in her artwork, selling her beautiful pressed flower arrangements and landscape paintings at craft fairs and fetes throughout the years. Her artwork has brought many people happiness.

Joan as an active member of the church community and found joy attending regular services and her Flower Club Meetings at Trinity Methodist Church. She often wrote poetry about her love for Christ and enjoyed noting and sharing her favourite hymns and verses with others.

Through this all, Joan was an extremely dedicated mum to Julian and Lynette, fun and nurturing Nana to Kiya and beloved wife to Cyril. Her strength, warmth and compassion knew no bounds. It has been a privilege to share 25 years of my life as your granddaughter and you have shaped me into the woman I am today.

Joan, you will be greatly missed by all that knew you.

Joan remembered by Angie Smith – I first got to know Joan through the Trinity Flower Club in the early 1990's. It was very friendly and informal, though we all had to make an arrangement with a title each month; for example: a boot or trainer, with flowers in a container inside the shoe! Joan was talented at pressed flowers and would make pressed flower arrangements of wedding bouquets at Trinity. She became a very close friend and rang me daily in late 2004 / 2005 when I was recovering from a serious illness.

Joan's family, Cyril, Lynette and Julian were very important to her! I can remember taking our oldest granddaughter, Jessica, to play with Kiya at Joan's home and in their garden when both Jessica and Kiya were toddlers.

Joan lived in the bungalow at Popley with Julian for some years before needing to move into Oakridge House, where I was able to visit her along with our minister, Claire, and

other friends from church. It was there just a few months ago that I was able to join in with her with a singing group at the home.

One lasting memory of Joan is her fondness for cake, biscuits and chocolate which I am sure she preferred to regular meals at times.

Joan and Julian were also members of our Housegroup (Steve & Angie's). One of Joan's favourite pieces of music was John Rutter's 'All things Bright & Beautiful' which she had on a CD.

Joan will be missed and remembered with great fondness by all who knew her.

A Day to Remember – Bishop's VE Day challenge (PP)

The Bishop to the Armed Forces issued a challenge at the recent national online service for VE Day. Bishop Hugh Nelson said that the act of remembering was far from "a matter of nostalgia," but instead a living reminder of our duty to one another. Bishop Hugh's message came during a service recorded in St James's Church, Piccadilly, in central London, which was itself bombed but continued worshipping throughout the war, and which hosted special services of prayer and thanksgiving on 8 May 1945.

The church, built in 1684, was partially destroyed by a direct hit on the rectory on 14th October 1940, killing the verger, Charles Murray, and his wife, Edith. The Rector, Archdeacon Thomas Lambert, survived only because he had gone to visit relatives just outside London on the day the bomb hit.



¹¹ So then, remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called 'the uncircumcision' by those who are called 'the circumcision' - a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands - ¹² remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of

Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. ¹³ But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. ¹⁴ For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us.

¹⁷ So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! ¹⁸ All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; ¹⁹ that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. ²⁰ So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹ For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

Church of the Living Stream – Update

As you all know, Church of the Living Stream is a totally on-line successor to Kempshott Methodist Church.

Probably the most important element in the life of any Christian church is the celebration of Holy Communion: the remembrance of Jesus' last meal with his disciples.

Since we went online we have held a monthly communion service at Grace and Colin's house for those in the vicinity. We now have approval to extend this "on-line" to anyone who would like to join us.

Our minister, Claire, has written an introduction to what we are proposing to do.

Church of the Living Stream – Update (cont'd)

The first on-line Communion service will be held on 29 June at 10.30 am as part of the normal Sunday service. Anyone is welcome to join in on Zoom using the normal access codes (meeting ID 625 007 3339 passcode uYrc2X). You will need to have a small piece of bread and a small non-alcoholic fruit drink (or water) to hand. There will be an on-screen liturgy for us to join in with.

This is very experimental: we are working with researchers at Roehampton University who have been engaged by the Methodist Church to look into the practice of on-line communion and they would be keen to hear your views on the subject. Methodist prayer handbook 2024 / 2025



Grace Caps

I've had the honour of helping mend a friend's armour these last few weeks. This was not a metaphorical armour mending involving deep chats over coffee. It involved a good few hours of sewing and many pricked fingers. But the process made me contemplate my own spiritual armour.

It all started with an arming cap, a thick quilted cap worn under the helmet. It's the foundation of all the headwear of a knight. This arming cap has unseen steel plates in the shoulders and neck well the chainmail wired and sewn to the outside. A thick chinstrap holds it secure into the head. The arming cap is soft and most knots from the sewing are intentionally formed on the outside to avoid chaffing the skin of the face and head. The cap's purpose is to protect the hard metal of the helmet from the head and to keep the helmet





And it's here that God started to speak to me. In Ephesians 6, the bible speaks to me about the helmet of salvation. It's that sturdy protection God provides and is the foundation of my prayer life. But underneath my helmet and built into its structure and design, He also gave me another gift. It's called Grace. A helmet worn without the arming cap is heavy and uncomfortable. Yes, it still provides protection, but it's hard protection.

Rather than conviction of my sin, I used to feel guilt and condemnation over salvation. Knowing the pain Jesus endured on the cross for me was almost too much to bear. I was grateful for it but at the cost of religiously trying to do

everything right to prove to God just how sorry I was. It was like wearing that helmet without the cap. It was heavy, hard and unwieldy.

But over the years God went deeper and revealed to my heart just how beautiful his gift of grace is. Jesus took the weight of my sin not because he had to, but because he wanted to. The guilt and shame was replaced by joy. And that's what accepting Grace does. It reveals to your heart the depths of God's love for you that he went all the way to the cross despite my sin. Because he just loves me that much.

Grace is the arming cap of spiritual warfare.

If my salvation is worn without owning and accepting the depths of his grace and love for me, prayer becomes a religious duty. Rigid and unwieldy. Awkward and hard. My knight friend won't wear the helmet without the cap, or the cap without the helmet. Helmet without arming cap is uncomfortable and unwieldy. Arming cap without helmet leaves the head open to harm.

Accepting and truly owning the gift of grace is foundational to a prayer warrior.

Grace isn't pretty. It's covered in oil marks, sweat, tears and stitching holes where God comes in and repairs us again and again. But a helmet without it is not effective or wearable in battle.

James 5:16 says, "The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results." Sounds like Grace is needed. You ready to armour up?

Mary Magdalene

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene, who is remembered this month in the church's calendar (22nd July). What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past:

When Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed, and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Make Jesus the centre of our world:

Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest people for His purposes:

Mary is a great example of Paul's words: 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.'

(1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously. We shouldn't be quick to dismiss the things that don't agree with our expectations, as Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary, and if we allow Him, He can do it through us!

Why you should Drink Tea – There is a popular greeting card which says: 'All things are possible with a cup of tea'. And for many of us, that is almost always true. Tea comes from the Camellia sinensis plant, which is often blended with other plants for different flavours, such as Earl Grey or Chai. Tea is the UK's favourite hot beverage, which besides from cheering us up, has cancer-fighting properties and can improve our heart and gut health. So here's what's good about tea:

Tea is rich in polyphenols, which have antioxidant effects on the body, and can reduce inflammation. Milk does not hurt their absorption, so add milk if you like! Tea has flavanols, which helps your blood to flow and lowers your blood pressure. One study at Harvard found that drinking three to four cups a day means you are less likely to have a heart attack. Tea is prebiotic, which means it promotes healthier kinds of bacteria in your gut, which helps with your digestion, your respiratory system, and your immune system. Tea lowers blood sugar, and even the risk of Type 2 diabetes, due to the polyphenols. Tea may reduce your risk of cancer. Again, the polyphenols are your friends here, as they may be slowing the development of certain types of cancer. Tea helps you concentrate. Coffee may speed you up, but it can also give you the jitters. Tea contains around 40-50 mg of caffeine, which is only half the amount found in coffee. But tea also has an amino acid called 'L-theanine', which helps produce a feeling of 'calm concentration', by lowering stress and improving mental focus.

Tea improves sleep—due to the polyphenols, L-theanine, theaflavins, thearubigins, and gamma-aminobutyric acid (GABA), which help lower stress and create calm. Finally, black tea or green tea? Without complicated science, they are equally healthy to drink. Black tea has more caffeine, which may help if you need more energy! (PP)

Before You Open Your Bible – Nine Heart Postures for Approaching God's Word, by Matt Smethurst, 10Publishing, £3.99

We know the Bible is important, but some struggle with it. We're not biblical experts - but may be familiar with Genesis & more. The Bible may intimidate & confuse us & reading it doesn't always thrill us. Yet the Bible is where God reveals His loving character & incredible plan of redemption. In a practical & engaging manner, Matt Smethurst - managing editor of Gospel Coalition - presents nine heart postures that will prepare you to unpack all that's awaiting you in God's Word.

With Sea Sunday in mind, and also people's pending holidays on water this summer, this seemed a good hymn to offer for July... we have all the original verses of the hymn.

The Story behind the Hymn: Eternal Father Strong to Save (PP)

Eternal Father, strong to save,
Whose arm hath bound the restless wave,
Who bidd'st the mighty ocean deep
Its own appointed limits keep;
Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee,
For those in peril on the sea!

O Christ! Whose voice the waters heard And hushed their raging at Thy word, Who walked'st on the foaming deep, And calm amidst its rage didst sleep; Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee, For those in peril on the sea!

Most Holy Spirit! Who didst brood Upon the chaos dark and rude, And bid its angry tumult cease, And give, for wild confusion, peace; Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee, For those in peril on the sea!

O Trinity of love and power!
Our brethren shield in danger's hour;
From rock and tempest, fire and foe,
Protect them wheresoe'er they go;
Thus evermore shall rise to Thee
Glad hymns of praise from land and sea.

The author of these words, William Whiting, was an Anglican clergyman in Winchester, which is hardly a seaside town. Yet Whiting had not only grown up by the sea, but had nearly died in it. As a young man he had been on a ship that got caught in a violent storm, afterwards he felt certain it was God who had saved the ship from sinking that night. Some years later, as headmaster of the Winchester College Choristers' School, Whiting was approached by a student in distress. The student was due to sail to the USA and was simply terrified at the thought of 3,000 miles of ocean. To try and reassure the student, Whiting decided to share his experience. And so, he wrote this poem, basing the description of the power and fury of the sea on Psalm 107.

It is not known if it helped the nervous student or not, but within a year the poem had become a hymn, and soon sailed into the influential first edition of *Hymns Ancient and Modern* of 1861. Another Anglican clergyman, John B Dykes, wrote the music for it. He was already a successful composer, with 300 hymns to his name. Dykes named this tune 'Melita', after an old name for Malta, where St Paul was once shipwrecked.

Whiting released two more versions of the lyrics, in

1869 and in 1874. During the rest of the 19th century, the hymn became a favourite with the Royal Navy and the United States Navy. Other Services adapted it, including the Royal Marines, the Royal Air Force, the British Army, and the United States Coast Guard. Above all, it became known as the Royal Navy Hymn. More recently, *Eternal Father* made a 'guest appearance' in the Hollywood blockbuster *'Titanic'*, and is also often chosen by ship's chaplains for use in civilian services at sea.

Praying with the Prayers of the Bible: the Prayer of National Confession

Daniel 9:5, 'We have sinned and done wrong ... turning aside from Your commandments and ordinances.'

In this chapter the prophet Daniel, an exile in Babylon, prays one of the Bible's truly great prayers of national repentance. Knowing that Judah and Jerusalem had fallen to the enemy and that 70 years of exile lay ahead (v.2), Daniel set himself to seek God on behalf of his own people. With fasting and sackcloth and ashes (v.3) he turned to God in fervent prayer. Our nation, wherever we live, is in need of intercessors like Daniel. His praying has much to teach us.

For Daniel, prayer was a daily habit. Earlier, in chapter six, we read the well-known story of how he was thrown into the lions' den. This happened because nothing could stop him having his daily devotions! When King Darius decreed that no one in the land should pray to any god except him for 30 days, Daniel ignored the order. As he had always done, he opened his window facing Jerusalem and prayed three times every day. For this disobedience he was sent to the lions' den. So here in chapter 9 the great prayer of national intercession is prayed by a man whose prayer life is sustained by daily devotion.

We also see that Daniel knew the character of his God. He is great and awesome, keeping covenant and steadfast love (v.4). To him belongs righteousness, mercy and forgiveness (vv.7, 9); He confirms His word (v.12) and He is the Lord who brought His people out of Egyptian slavery (v.15). Across the years, even in exile, Daniel's consistent prayer life has revealed to him Who God is. With this confession of His glory and majesty and power is the glad acknowledgement of a personal God. Note 'the Lord my God' (v.4); five times 'the Lord our God' (vv. 9, 10, 13, 14, 15,); 'my God' (v.19).

Daniel's knowledge of the one, true God is matched by his love of God's people, his own nation. He identifies himself with his people, facing national judgement because they have forsaken the Lord. 'We have sinned and done wrong' (v.5). 'We have not listened to Thy servants the prophets' (v. 6). 'To us, O Lord, belongs confusion of face' (v.8). 'We do not present our supplications before Thee on the ground of our righteousness, but on the ground of Thy great mercy' (v.18). Daniel makes himself confessor and spokesman and intercessor for his whole nation.

It is not surprising that this great prayer of intercession, grounding its confidence in God, received a speedy answer. Even while Daniel prayed, the angel Gabriel was sent to him with a message from God (vv.20-23). What an encouragement for all of us to become intercessors for the nation!
