Dear Friends,

As I write this message to you, next to me is a letter from the Alzheimer's Society's reminding me that June is the month for their **Forget Me Not Appeal**. We are being asked to make a donation and receive a forget me not badge to wear. I am sure that many of us have seen what the devastating effects of dementia can do to people we know and love and one of the worst symptoms is the loss of memory and recognition.

Remembrance may bring us joy or it may be painful, but in looking back at the twists and turns of our own life journey, the past enables us to make sense of our own identity and how we have become the people we are now. But how much of what we remember is accurate? If we were to go back in time, would things be exactly as we think of them now? Often, we can't remember the exact words that were spoken at the time or what really happened. We change ourselves over the years and our perception of events changes and we now see things in a different light.

During this month of June, the Church will be celebrating Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit. During his discourse to his disciples at the Last Supper, Jesus spoke the following words:

'But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you'. (John 14; 26)

For the Gospel to spread after Jesus had ascended to heaven, it was important that his followers were all singing to the same hymn sheet, so to speak (excuse the pun). It was vital that they could each give a true and honest account of what they had witnessed in Jesus' ministry and what he had taught them, especially regarding the meaning of his death and resurrection.

By reminding the disciples of Jesus' teachings and the details of the events of his life, the Holy Spirit enabled the books of the New Testament to be written and available for us today.

As the apostle John wrote in his gospel:

....'these (signs) are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing in him you will have life by the power of his name'. (John 20:31)

So, the Holy Spirit acts as a divine teacher, helping believers understand the deeper meaning of Jesus' words and guiding them into all truth. He helps illuminate Scripture, making it clearer and more applicable to our daily lives.

Furthermore, the Holy Spirit also serves as a reminder of Jesus' teachings. In times of confusion, temptation, or struggle, the Holy Spirit reminds us of the words of Christ, encouraging believers to stay on the right path and live in obedience to God's will. This role of reminding ensures that the message of Jesus is never forgotten, but remains a guiding force in the life of every Christian.







ST ANDREW'S TRINITY METHODIST CHURCH MINUTES OF THE CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING

Held on Tuesday 20 MAY 2025 AT 7.30pm

Present: 21. Apologies: 12

Welcome and Devotions:

Revd Claire welcomed everyone to the first evening Church Council meeting. She announced that Joan Thomas, had sadly passed away in Oakridge House, where she had resided for some years. We prayed for Joan in our opening devotions.

- **1. The Minutes** of the Meeting held on 10 February 2025 were accepted as a true record. Revd Claire thanked Michael P for chairing this meeting while she was away on sabbatical.
- 2. Matters Arising: There were none.

3. Property

There had been no major changes since Bob's last report.

Finance

The Treasurer had circulated her financial report and the accounts for the 8 months to 30 April 2025. Margaret H. explained how the circuit worked out their assessments for each church. The Treasurer confirmed that the monies for the roof repairs contained within our expenditure would eventually be reimbursed. **Reports from Other Groups:**

<u>Worship Group</u>: Attention was drawn to the Harvest Lunch on 27 September, followed by our Harvest Service on Sunday 28 September

<u>Pastoral Group</u>: No changes since the last meeting.

<u>Tech Group</u>: Church Council voted to keep the current tech group going. David W. continued to talk about the benefits of a bigger screen which would allow more possibilities for mission. The meeting discussed I-Players and streaming, CCLI and the different types, and cost of licenses. It was agreed to pursue further investigation and potential benefits for worship. The Tech Team were thanked for all their hard work.

Mission: Revd Claire spoke about the importance of mission and the small number of people who meet as a group. She urged other members of the congregation to join in, for part, or all of it. We are now about to begin gathering information from our church community and surrounding areas of South Ham and Buckskin. Revd Claire talked about Our Church's Future Story and mentioned that in the coming weeks and months we will listen and share with the wider community as well. Angela W spoke about stories from our community and the process of coming together. There is a lot going on already, but many people are unaware of this. Stories from our church, our community and individual stories. These different groups should be encouraged to talk together and share their experiences. Revd Claire said that it is not about starting lots of new things as there is already a lot going on, it is more about being more intentional, and to make room for the Holy Spirit.

<u>Outreach, Children's/Young People and Families Groups</u>: Yvonne H. introduced her new full-time assistant, Louise C. who is currently engaged in visiting and supporting local nursery schools. Yvonne gave a talk on the transformative effect that 3G had on young people. The Circuit intends taking another group this year. The cost last year was

£170 per person, and through lots of fundraising we were able to pay for the children from Oakridge and St Andrew's Trinity churches. Yvonne asked the meeting to agree to sending young people from Oakridge and St. Andrew's Trinity to 3Generate this year, without a cost to their families. There was a unanimous vote in favour of the proposal. Revd Claire suggested holding a retiring collection after Sunday worship with envelopes clearly marked for Circuit Youth. The sale proceeds, from items in Trinity's old building will all be donated to Circuit Youth. Other fund raising will take place throughout the year as well as 'individual' donations.

It is planned to open the Mug and Biscuit during August on each Thursday serving usual refreshments with the addition of activities in the church for children accompanied by their parents. The meeting agreed that Yvonne should explore the idea of a Christmas Tree festival at church.

Oakridge Friday Youth Hub welcomed 89 young people who come and go throughout the evening. Yvonne reported that they gave out 15 Bibles, and at the Basingstoke Youth Table in London Street URC, 150 Bibles had been distributed to young people.

4. Safeguarding/GDPR

No change since the last meeting. Margaret H. pointed out that safeguarding was everyone's responsibility.

5. Circuit News

The Circuit Steward reported that we now have a Deacon late into Stationing, who is new to this District.

Revd John Banks (Tadley, Silchester and Mortimer) is coming to the end of his probationary period. His Ordinance Testament Service is being held in Weeke Methodist Church, Winchester, on 8 June at 4.00pm.

6. Proposed Redevelopment of South Ham and Buckskin area

In the absence of Bob L, Revd Claire spoke of the great significance that St Andrew's Trinity Church is placed at the centre of this development. Although this is at the very early stages, people in this immediate area are affected, as well as people who come into our building. It is an uncertain time of upheaval for some. What mission possibilities are there for our church placed at the centre, significant to this and the next generation. How do we respond or offer support. What is our role as a Christian community being the stable building at the centre. Think about it now, listen to the local community, look on-line.

7. Any Other Business

<u>Boys Brigade</u>: The church council was asked to donate £500 to cover the cost of taking the Boys' Brigade to camp on 20 May and a further six weekends away during the year. There was a unanimous vote in favour of the proposal.

<u>The Anna Chaplaincy</u>: Revd Claire gave some background to this organisation and reported that she and Karen Frost had trained 8/10 people who now have trained as Anna Chaplaincy and are ready to be commissioned. There will be a Commissioning Service for 20 people on 20 July (possibly at Tadley in the afternoon) and the Founder of the Chaplaincy, Debby Thrower will be taking the service.

<u>Trinity Building Sale of Contents</u>: Please note that this sale will take place on Saturday 28 June, ex Trinity Church, Sarum Hill, Basingstoke 10.00am – 3.00pm and refreshments will be available. All proceeds to the Circuit Youth fund.

<u>Table Tennis</u>: Yvonne H. said that she would like to offer table tennis during the month of August on every Thursday evening. After discussion, the meeting agreed to this trial run in August.

<u>Church E-News Magazine</u>: Revd Claire spoke about the huge undertaking it was to produce a monthly e-news publication. The proposal is that from September 2025 the E-news will become a quarterly publication.

<u>60th Anniversary Boys' Brigade</u>: Linda H wanted to say everyone enjoyed the Saturday activities and the lunch on Sunday. She had received a lovey 'thank you' card from the Boys' Brigade which she showed to the meeting.

<u>Flower Stands</u>: We have a small team of 4 people that make up the Flower Group. Church Council asked if they would provide two stands of artificial flowers either side of the screen.

Sunday School

A high percentage of Church goers today, were children in Sunday schools. In 1780 when the Sunday school movement began, many children could not read or write. An Anglican layman, Robert Raikes, who was a publisher, living in Gloucester, decided to take a group of boys (no girls at this stage) teach them to read and introduce them to Christianity.



Their text-book was the King James Bible. Not the easiest book to study, but by learning from the Scriptures, they absorbed the Faith, as well as the words. They learnt the tenets

of their faith, with the Catechism and in time the girls were included too. There is a statue of Robert Raikes in London, which marks the life of this worthy man.

Many of us will recall our Sunday school days. Some of us had a star card, which was stamped every Sunday, noting our attendance. Usually at the end of the year, there would be Prize giving, when we would receive, a suitable book. I remember receiving 'Mary Jones and her Bible.'

We learnt the Bible stories, we often received an illuminated text card, and we sang choruses, which remain in our memories today. The choruses had actions, such as 'Running over, my cup is full, and running over,' and 'Zaccheus was a very little man and a very little man was he.' In Sunday school we learnt how to be Christians.

We also went on a Sunday School outing, usually to the seaside, which finished with a tea party. We were so fortunate, and for children who did not have ready transport, this was amazing!

Moving on to 1885 an Anglican clergyman wrote a hymn, for the children in his village to sing in procession. His name was Sabine Baring Gould, and the village was Horbury in Yorkshire.

Much of the industry in the area closed at Whitsun, (Pentecost). Local churches held Whit Walks. The children processed around their villages, and local bands played suitable music, each village trying to be better than the next. The little girls dressed in white dresses, and the boys looking very smart. The hymn Sabine wrote was 'Onward Christian Soldiers.'

This hymn has featured in several films, and like other hymns has been altered over the years. The military aspect is misunderstood, and in some hymn books, it is now 'Onward Christian Pilgrims.'

One wonders where St Paul's message in Ephesians Chapter 6 vv 10-17 comes to the mind, when he urges the early church to 'Put on the armour of God'. The devil has not changed his tactics, indeed he has only sharpened them up. So, the nicety of our present generation, gives him free rein.

The young Curate of St Peter's Church, Horbury left a hymn which should stir the church into action. Unfortunately we have to ask has the church become too complacent and comfortable? It is a challenge for us all.

One denomination of the Christian Church says, 'Give me a child until he is 7 years old, and I will give you the man.' That is how important Sunday School was and could be again. Let us pray for all who work to teach children the Faith today.

Defending Our Freedom

Lepe Beach, now part of Lepe Country Park in the New Forest, has long been my favourite beach resort. It has magnificent views across to the Isle of White, and there is always plenty of activity on the water with yachts and motorboats.

When I was young my parents would take us there to walk the shingle beach and to swim. We would take the number 59 bus from Hythe and enjoy our time there. I shall never forget our parents taking us all to see the June 1953 Spithead Naval Review celebrating the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. There was a vast fleet of some 200 Royal Navy Warships including Commonwealth ships. The bus service ran late that evening enabling us all to enjoy the event and travel home safely.

As we approach VE (Victory in Europe) Day I visited Lepe Beach again recently and enjoyed the walk along the beach. This time not just for the coastal walks and fresh air but to see its historic D-Day remains. It is one of the few surviving locations which played a crucial role serving as an embarkation point for thousands of troops and vehicles bound for the Normandy beaches on 6th June 1944. The site also witnessed the construction of parts of the Mulberry Harbours, prefabricated piers designed to facilitate the loading of troops and supplies. We can still see today the remains of brick and concrete structures and the remains of a pierhead.

Significantly, there is also a memorial there dedicated to the men of one of our Regiments who left from Lepe Beach for the D-Day landings but never returned. The dedication reads:-

'Take these men for your example.

Like them remember that prosperity can only be for the free, that freedom is the sure possession of those alone who have the courage to defend it'.

A Statement following the Death of Pope Francis

The Archbishop of York has issued a statement following the news of the death of Pope Francis recently. Here are excerpts from that statement:

"Let us walk together, work together, pray together.' These are the words Pope Francis said to me when we met in 2023. They sum up his vision for the church, both the Roman Catholic Church but also ecumenically. "Francis's whole life and ministry was centred on Jesus who comes among us, not to be served, but to serve. We saw that in Francis's service of the poor, his love of neighbour especially the displaced, migrant, the asylum seeker, his deep compassion for the well-being of the earth and his desire to build the church in new ways. Francis showed us how to follow Jesus and encouraged us to go and do likewise.

"His encyclicals and teachings were supported by his deeds and actions. His whole life was instantly recognisable as those of one who followed Jesus. "Pope Francis was acutely aware of the divisions between our churches and I remember the powerful work he did with the then Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, and the Moderator of the Church of Scotland in promoting peacebuilding in South Sudan. "I remember, in the brief times I spent with him, how this holy man of God was also witty, lively, good to be with and the warmth of his personality and interest in others shone out from him. May he rest in peace and rise in glory. **PP**

Are bananas really good for you?

Cons: Can raise potassium levels too much (avoid them if you have kidney disease), can lead to wind and bloating, cause blood sugar spikes, weight gain, and disrupt sleep.

'Mini' is Named Best-ever British Car *(PP)*

What is your favourite
British car? Think of the
Land Rover, Aston
Martin, McLaren, Bentley
and Rolls Royce. Then
think of the Mini.

That is what a group of judges for the Auto Express did recently, and they chose the Mini. Their verdict? "Put simply, we reckon no other British-built vehicle better represents the relevant, innovative and pioneering UK automotive industry quite like the world's original small car."

Phil McNamara, editor at large, Auto Express, adds: "there was only ever going to be one winner of our Top 50 Brit cars rundown. The Mini was crowned undisputed champion."

It was in the late 1950s that the British Motor Corporation (BMC) asked car designer Alec Issigonis to come up with a sub-three-metre compact car that could accommodate a family of four. The result was the Mini, soon beloved of the public, celebrities and even (in a modified version) racing drivers.

The modern version of a Mini Cooper is nearly 90cm longer than the original, and prices starts at about £25,000.

Oakridge Friday Hub

As many of you are aware on a **Friday at Oakridge Methodist Church**, we hold a **'Warm, Food and Youth Hub'**.

The 'Warm and Food Hub' have been going for quite some time and are now well established supporting the local community and meeting them in God's Love. We are on average supporting 50 families in the area. There are many conversations that happen and new people are always so surprised at how open we are, God's love is showed not just by the volunteers but by the community to each other, barriers have definitely been broken down,

Now let's talk about the 'Youth Hub' this is our newest Hub but has still been running for 2 years a bit informally and when people ask me, I would say about 30 to 40 young people,

That was till a few months ago when we did a full count over several weeks, this can be tricky as youth don't come in one at a time, but on average we see 89 young people each Friday, **Yes that is right 89**, now some come in and do not talk to us, some just tell us about their day / week. And a few stop to have longer chats or hang out with their friends. But the question and the discussion have been amazing, challenging but amazing. The youth of today want to know what this Christian faith is all about.

We have just been given the little red New Testament Bible that used to be given out in schools, sadly most schools are now refusing to give them out. BUT, at Oakridge on the first Friday we had them, we gave out 15 Bibles and at the youth table in town (outside URC church) we have given out over 150 Bibles to the youth of Basingstoke, since being given them.

So we ask for continual Pray for the young people of Basingstoke and all the church youth projects that they may know God's Love.

'From Easter to Pentecost' (Retreat)

Our Retreat Day at Silchester Methodist Church commenced with prayers. I can think of no better place to be than in the Church's garden. It was a glorious sunny morning in the company of birdsong from the garden and surrounding trees.



Our theme was "From Easter to Pentecost", travelling with the disciples as they meet the risen Christ. This period in Christianity gave us the firm foundation of our Christian beliefs and was very challenging to Jesus' disciples who were questioning "What was the purpose of his ministry that it should end with his tragic death without victory?" In our own personal lives with its many difficulties and challenges, many of us are asking the same question today.

The Retreat, led by Rev Lesley Martin and Rev Angela Webb, gave us the opportunity to meet the risen Christ in our own personal way whether it be through readings, books and pictures reflecting the drama of that time, or in our own quiet meditation. Different areas of the retreat premises focused on a number of places where the disciples met with the risen Christ, these included the Garden, the Road to Emmaus, the Lakeside and the Mountain.

We also had the opportunity to walk in the adjacent Silchester Common on this beautiful Spring day and walk amongst the trees, heathland and small ponds with none of the distractions of daily life, and to listen to the birdsong around us as we walk and meditate. The gorse bushes were radiant in their beautiful yellow blossoms. I took this opportunity to take this walk! See picture.

I found myself perusing David Kitchen's book "Easter Inside Out", the story as if you were there. Kitchen re-imagines the Easter message through a variety of characters from Mary Magdalene to Caiaphas.

It gives you a chance to see the story in your head, feel it in your heart as if you were there. If you want to understand who might have been where and doing what as the Easter story unfolds, this book gives you answers. It also lets you sense what it could have been like to be one of those involved. I like to think that at many periods in history the characters and thinking of the people were very similar to ourselves in our world today. Technology and communication have changed of course but would a political leader or a manual worker assess their situations any differently across time? I think not!

The story concludes with Mary Magdalene, sometime after Pentecost, sitting beside the Sea of Galilee reflecting on how her life had changed since meeting Jesus. Seeing the effect of the wind blowing across the water confirmed to her the living reality of Christ in her life and in her world. We should ask ourselves, "How does Christ reveal himself to me in my life today?"

I have a copy of "Easter Inside Out" on order!

I came away from the Retreat with a re-affirmation that Jesus the Risen Christ is with us today, no less so than for the disciples those many years ago revealed at Pentecost. We need, each one of us, to continue to walk with Him, placing our daily problems at His feet, receiving His Love and Support, and receiving His personal Guidance, day by day in serving His Will.

The next Retreat at Silchester this year is Saturday 21st June, "He makes me lie down He restores my soul." Why not come along?

Understanding the Trinity

Trinity Sunday has its place in our liturgical calendar (15 June), yet we do not often hear sermons on the Trinity. The term 'Trinity' isn't found in the Bible, and the Early Church took nearly 400 years to come up with a clear understanding of it.

However, there are hints of trinitarian language in the New Testament, eg Jesus instructs His disciples to baptise 'in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit' (Matt 28:19). Our understanding of the Trinity arises from God's activity in our world, as reflected in the creedal questions:

'Do you believe and trust in God the Father, source of all being and life, the One for whom we exist?

Do you believe and trust in God the Son, who took our human nature, died for us and rose again?

Do you believe and trust in God the Holy Spirit, who gives life to the people of God and makes Christ known in the world?

So why should the Trinity be important for us? If 'God is love' (1 John 4:8) it means that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are in a community of love together. Their relationship has been expressed as a divine dance, as they interact with one another, expressing love for each another and complementing the work each one has to do. As people made in God's image, we are called to live this community of love in our lives and churches. The Trinity also provides the basis for our mission, 'As the Father has sent Me, so send I you.' Just as God the Father sent Jesus into the world, so Jesus sends us into the world to do the Father's work, equipped and accompanied by the Holy Spirit. In sharing God's love, we share the life of the Trinity.

Augustine spoke about the Spirit being the love between God the Father and the Son. 'At the heart of reality lies the love between the Father and the Son. The Spirit unites us with Christ so that we begin to experience the same depth of love that exists between the Father and the Son.' (*Graham Tomlin*). (*PP*)
