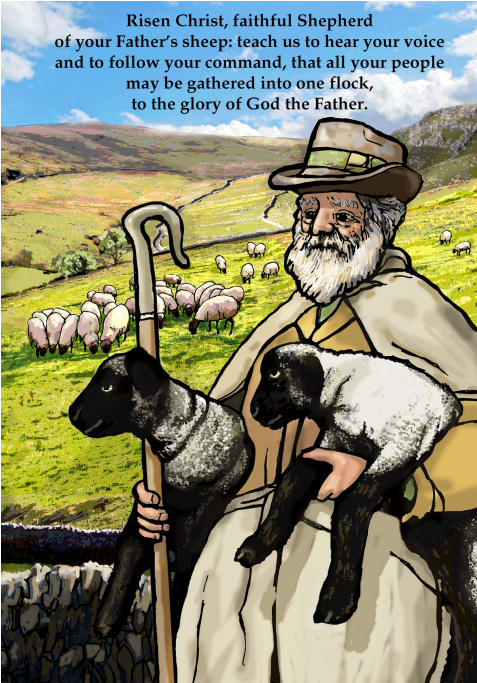

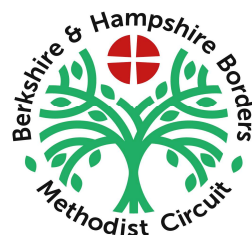

Dear Friends,

It is good to be back from sabbatical and catching up with news and events that have happened whilst I have been away. If I haven't seen you or spoken to you since returning, then I hope to rectify that soon but take this opportunity in the meantime to wish you a very happy Easter!

One of the questions that I have been thinking about in recent weeks for myself and others is 'What attracts us to Jesus?' It is a question that takes us to the heart of our faith. If you have been a Christian for a long time then you might reflect on what first attracted you to faith and made you curious about Jesus, and how that might have changed or evolved over time. If you haven't been a Christian for long then you might feel that that first attraction and curiosity is still strong. If you are on the fringes of faith or have no faith at all then you might feel that this question doesn't have an answer.

For me, one of the things that pulls me towards Jesus, that makes me curious and interested in him, is that he often does and says surprising and unexpected things, and because of this he offers comfort and joy, but also challenge and confrontation in equal measure. I'm drawn to who Jesus is because he offers a different way to think, act and be; often working in a different way to the way that the world works.

I guess one of the most surprising things that Jesus does is at the heart of the Easter story. Despite Jesus saying during his ministry that he would suffer, die and rise again, many were surprised that he was true to his word. Many of those who witnessed the truth of the resurrection and met with the risen Jesus and spent time with him still struggled to truly understand that he had risen from the dead and that they were to share this good news of abundant life that only came through him.

AV Things in the Church Building



You may remember that we changed our sound mixer on 12th April. If you were in the service on Sunday 13th you may remember a certain amount of squealing sounds and microphone testing before the service. Apart from that you probably noticed nothing other than Llyn using something different on Sunday mornings.

However our new mixer and its associated devices allows for several new things to happen because of its greater flexibility.

1. It can be used more simply. Whilst we are grateful for Llyn's work week by week, it means if she is away or unable to be with us, it will be much easier for someone else to step in.
2. Because the new mixer is essentially a computer we can make use of specialist software to prepare slides for worship.
3. We have the potential, should the church want, to use more microphones or add in musical instruments or to zoom services etc.
4. We now have a way to mirror (copy) the screen onto hand-held tablets so that those facing away from the screen can easily see what is on the screen, and those in the congregation who for whatever reason cannot see the screen, can follow on handheld tablets.

My hope is that some of these can be implemented over the summer.

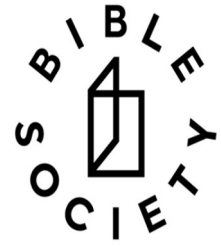

Open the Book is an exciting storytelling project which started 25 years ago. Bible stories are shared with young school children in a way that is fun, interactive and memorable.

Jean Elizabeth Jeram, 28/7/1932 – 24/2/2025

Family and friends joined together to celebrate the life of Jean Elizabeth Jeram on the 24th March at St Andrew's Trinity church. The hall was full, with family travelling from as far as Australia, and old dear friends from Yorkshire, all together to remember a wonderful lady, a wife, mum, granny, great granny and friend.



Jean was born in London in 1932, where she grew up with her family in very modest surroundings. Her great loves were reading and going to the cinema. She would visit the local library at the end of the road twice a week, reading three books after each trip. The cinema, or picture house, was a treat with her elder sister, they would stay and watch the same film through several times, musicals being her favourites.

Jean wasn't evacuated in the war, instead staying home to be with her father, and during this time she flourished as a good scholar – leaving school with excellent results. This took her to working as a typist and then personal secretary to the Adjutant General of the Suez Canal company using her skills in English and French shorthand. Jean's children remember what a great 'speller' she was, with them often asking her 'how do you spell this / or that' in the days before the internet.

Jean met William in 1950, both attending St Stephen's church in Wandsworth. They continued courting while he did his national service in Egypt, and they got engaged then married in 1955. William always says proudly – Jean gave up a very successful career to be with him and raise a family.

They had four children, moving to Basingstoke in 1966, when they joined the Methodist church here in Western way. Here she worshiped for nearly 60 years.

Jean continued her love of music, singing with the New Loddon Singer's with many of her friends from church.

As a mum, granny and great granny, Jean was the heart of her family, and alongside William, she created a home filled with love and warmth that held a special place in each of our lives.

She had a way of making everyone feel special. Her hugs were the best, her smile could light up a room, and she always knew exactly what to say when you needed it most. Together with William, she created a family full of love, a safe place to visit, and their greatest supporter.

As a Granny she brought genuine warmth and kindness into the lives of her grandchildren. Her hugs were a thing of legend, and her smile was infectious. Always knowing exactly what to say and how to listen; she was quietly there, offering love and understanding, without judgment.

In the last years of her life, Jean's health deteriorated, with her spending her last 7 months in a local nursing home. During this time she was visited almost every day by her family, where they would sit, watch tv, chat and remember wonderful times gone by.

Jean will be forever missed by so many; for her strength, words of wisdom, kindness, and love. Her family will always feel her loss, but take strength in the fact she was not afraid to die. Basingstoke Chaplaincy Prayer Letter – April 2025



Christ is risen! This is a message that gives us hope & joy. It drives us forward as Chaplains to bring good news to others wherever they may be in their lives. Whether this is un-mentioned in some conversations, or celebrated news in others, we listen to people and speak into their different situations to the extent that anyone wants to share with us.

We have been able to support several people in difficult circumstances recently. Sometimes other people, colleagues or family, are not aware of problems a person faces but a conversation with the Chaplain as she calls in to a shop or as he sits in the staff room will give a moment to share and get a fresh perspective. At a different level Hampshire Constabulary is conducting a survey into police suicides; perhaps no one wants to look weak in a tough job – and then something snaps.

Be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another. A message for each of us and an attitude to share.

During the Muslim month of Ramadan there were open invitations to join in the breaking of the fast (iftar) which were accepted by some Chaplains. On Maundy Thursday we are organising a presentation of the Easter message to Muslim friends.

This Easter, with your support and prayers, we will be distributing Easter cards and some chocolate eggs as we seek to show that Easter has meaning for everyone. It carries a message of goodness. We can express it in our conversations, help bring peace and make Basingstoke a better place.

Thank you for your support and especially your prayers. We wish you a happy Easter, praying that you will feel the gratitude and joy brought by the sacrifice and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Prayer requests – Please: Give thanks for the invitations to be in places of work to support people there, and for the helpful conversations we have had.

I Remember VE Day, 1945

An 80th Anniversary has some significance, particularly because it is possibly the last time we celebrate it, in a meaningful way.



I have asked a few friends for their memories of a day when peace was restored, and for many this meant going home, while for everyone it was a time of joy.

The weather forecast was given publicly for the first time since the start of the War. It would be a warm, Thundery day, with bright intervals. Temperature mid 70's Fahrenheit, (20 centigrade).

Whatever the weather, the public were out on the streets, with flags, bunting, dancing, singing, all against a background of ringing of Church Bells.

Miriam remembered VE Day well. She was born in 1933 and lived in Sherborne St John. On VE Day a big street party took place in the village. Miriam aged 12 years, was dressed as a Spanish troubadour. She had a toy monkey on her shoulder, and a tickly moustache. She loved the party, and her eyes still twinkle, when she recalls it. Miriam's family took in evacuees during the war, they joined in the celebrations.

Mervyn was a teenager in London. His family lived in rural South Wales. He was visiting London for the first time. His Aunt had brought him to the city. He loved all the dancing in the streets, so much so, that he was caught up with the dancers. His Aunt was panic-stricken, where was he? When she found him, he was unconcerned, just standing eating an apple.

Margaret was an evacuee in Rickmansworth, Hertfordshire. Her mother was working as housekeeper in the vicarage. She asked if Margaret could join her there, and the Vicar agreed. On VE Day, Margaret was asked by her mother, to go for Koray tablets at the local chemist's shop. These were for pain relief. The pharmacist joked, 'Perhaps you should be asking for Hooray tablets, now the war is over.'

Richard was not evacuated. He lived in Bromley, Kent, not far from Biggin Hill aerodrome. He used to cycle from his home to watch the 'dog fights' in the sky. The seriousness of the situation was brought home however, when a German plane crashed in his neighborhood. The reaction of the neighbors was to rush out to help the pilot. No longer the enemy, just a fellow human being, needing help. War makes strange bed fellows.

Many children were evacuated during WW2. There was no vetting of placements, and so for some the experience affected their lives, for good or ill. Town folk and country folk have different ways and customs, and just understanding the accents of speech could be a challenge.

Maureen was in her first place of evacuation for two weeks. Her mother deemed it dirty, so removed her daughter to Lancashire, where Maureen was happy with kindly people.

John remembers the street party in New Addington, near Croydon. He was away from London, when the local school was bombed. Fortunately, the children were in a shelter.

Heather visited the Isle of Sheppey on the Kent coast, which was heavily fortified

during the war, so although a boom was along the coastline, the sea that formed a barrier against invasion could be seen.

Peggy lived in Brixton South London. Her father was serving in the North Atlantic convoys. What a debt is owed to these brave men. Not evacuated, just searching all the time for safe lodging, she and her mother experienced the Blitz in Liverpool and London.

So, we the children of 1945, give thanks for deliverance. We went home; the experience made us the people we are today. Independent? Possibly Strong minded? Possibly. Thoughtful? Hopefully Kind? Always.

Life is for living, and we give thanks to God for his love and protection which brings us to the present day. 80 years – It has flown by!

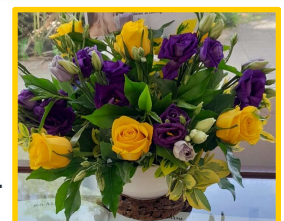

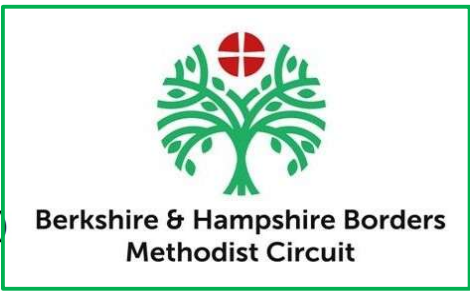

- 150 years ago, on 1 May 1875, Alexandra Palace in London was officially opened. It became the home of BBC television in 1935.

John was about to open the service but they could not see the horse behind them who clearly wanted to be the centre of attention. To the left of the photo is George Thornton another Trinity deaf church member, engrossed in his hymn book and probably not bothered by the horse as he was a full-time worker at the farm.

This photo is one of my cherished memories, not because I took the photo but because I was in the right place at the right time with my camera ready to snap. I thought the whole scene was endearing. They say that film stars are reluctant to act with animals or children for they steal the show and this was certainly the case on this particular day.

This service occurred every year during the summer. When the weather was fine we all sat outside and munched our tea together, sitting on bales of straw, all of us thoroughly enjoying ourselves in fellowship together. If it was wet we continued within the shelter of the farm. Oh happy days.

Canon Paul Hardingham Considers the Difference a Person can Make Barnabas – A Very Likeable Disciple

This month we remember St Barnabas, whose real name was Joseph, a wealthy Levite from Cyprus. However, he was better known by his nickname which means 'Son of Encouragement' (Acts 4:36). Throughout Acts we see him encouraging others in different ways. Barnabas was an example of *generous giving* (Acts 4:36-7), when he sold property and offered the money to the church for those in need. In the midst of a caring and sharing community, he was singled out as a symbol of generosity. Are we known as somebody who is generous to those in need around us?

Barnabas later *encouraged a new Christian* in the person of Paul (Acts 9:27). After Paul's conversion and knowing his reputation, Barnabas came alongside him and brought him into the fellowship of the church. Are we ready to help those who are new in the faith to find a place in our church?

Finally, Barnabas was sent to the church in Antioch where he '*saw the evidence of the grace of God*' (Acts 11:23). It was a church which brought Jewish and Gentile believers together for the first time. Like Barnabas, do we rejoice when we see God doing new things in people's lives? Are we also willing to embrace these things and facilitate change?

Encouragement is one of the spiritual gifts in the New Testament (Romans 12:8). It can be greatly undervalued, but it is crucial in growing the church. Like Barnabas, will we nurture gifting; strengthen the doubters and those tempted to give up; show generosity to God's people and beyond the church; alongside strengthening people to move beyond their own comfort zones to help those in need?

Let's be prepared to ask the following questions: '*Are there people alongside us who will encourage us?*' and '*How can we be encouragers to others?*' **PP**

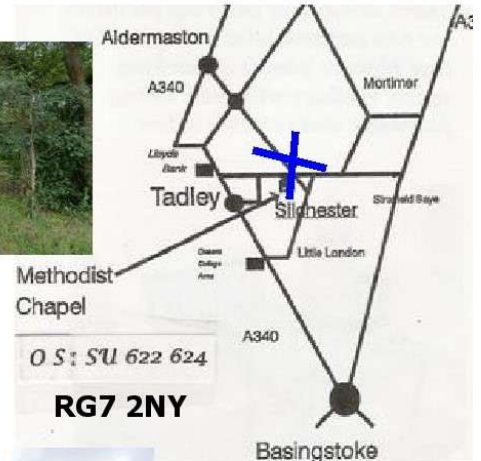

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

It seems that insects who live in the countryside are very susceptible to bright lights, which can badly disrupt their overall health and general behaviour.

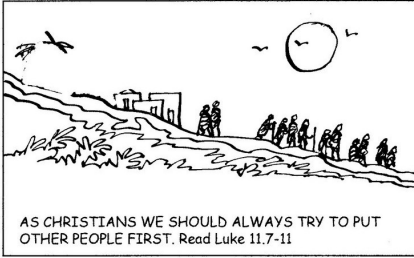
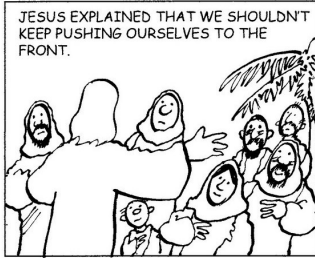
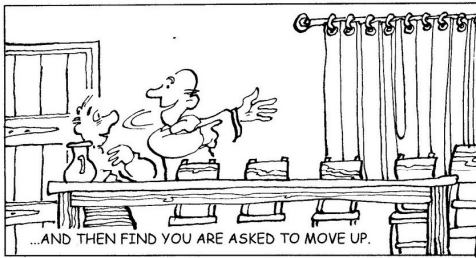
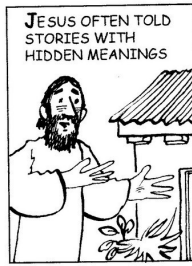
As one scientist explained: "We don't know exactly how fatal it is, but one estimate is that 33 per cent of all the insects attracted to light die before morning. And even if they don't die, they're spending all their time at the light instead of doing the things they're supposed to be doing."

Light pollution is now seen as adding to what some scientists have called "insect Armageddon", with a 75 per cent decline in insect populations in 30 years. As one scientist said: "Small individual actions such as drawing curtains can make a big impact to our smallest creatures."

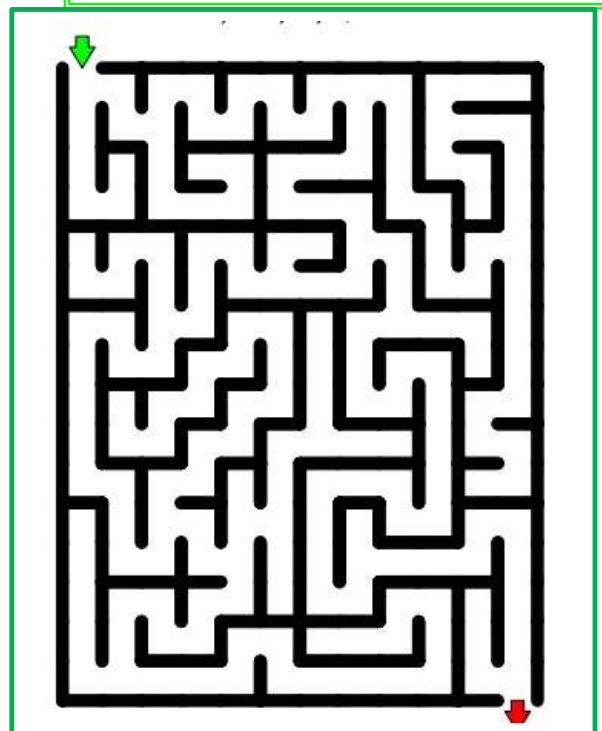
