

Dear Friends,

Autumn is a special time, one for harvest, thanksgiving and preparation for a new year ahead.

For Angela and I, it has been a time when the apples on our tree have been falling every day coupled with a search to collect as many as are viable for our own use and to share with friends and neighbours.

The consequences of not picking up all the fallen fruit is that those missed apples can and will try to produce new trees! We found a new tree a couple of years ago, near a boundary wall, that we let grow to see if it would produce fruit. Last year we saw some small apples which didn't mature, but this year the tree produced more fruit and we discovered it was a plum tree, not apple!

Thinking of fruit led me to think about our own personal harvest, that of 'words' which can also deliver different types of fruit depending on our choice of words and how we use and deliver them in our conversations with others.

Words such as those conveying love, hate, empathy, understanding, kindness, respect, welcome, rejection, and sympathy all produce a harvest in ourselves and in others.

Stop the boats! Go Home! Protect our children! All speak volumes about our lack of love for all our neighbours.

If this is left unchallenged, then we only need to look to America and the treatment of 'illegal' migrants who are being put into detention camps, deprived of all civil liberties, no right of appeal and / or deported to be imprisoned in another country with a poor human rights record!

Look also at how Israel is treating the peoples of Gaza in their quest to 'defeat' Hamas, using constant missile and drone attacks on a civilian population, using starvation as a weapon by preventing access to the many hundreds of aid trucks

waiting at the border crossing points!

Words are powerful, they hurt when used in anger or hatred or spite. They provoke reactions from people who don't fully understand the consequences of those words, both for themselves and for those to whom they are directed.

The term 'Fake News!' has become a rallying cry by those wanting to convince the world and their own people of the lies they want to perpetuate.

The consequences can be seen openly around the world; in the USA; and with the conflict between Russia & Ukraine – call your neighbour a Nazi and your actions are 'justified' (in your own mind).

Karibuni Children


Trinity Circle - 9th September 7.30pm at St Andrew's Trinity



Just Peace, Becoming Peacemakers August Silchester Retreat

Are you prepared to be a Peacemaker? Well Our Lord is guiding us so that we can be. ".... seek peace and pursue it" Psalm 34:14. Also refer to the Beatitudes, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God."

We live in a World today that is torn by war and conflict more so now than at any time since the Second World War. It is also the Anniversary of the nuclear bombing of Hiroshima killing more than 140,00 people, and many thousands more due to radiation fall out in the following generations. Today we are on the brink of further nuclear war, and must do all we can under the guidance and authority of the Holy Spirit to prevent this ever happening again.

Our August Retreat at Silchester Methodist Church led by Rev Angela Webb and Rev John Banks explored 'Just Peace, Becoming Peacemakers', giving us the opportunity to further develop our abilities as Peacemakers in todays fractured World.

We were given the opportunity in our quiet meditation time to read and take notes from a number of books and articles exploring peace and peacemakers both past and present, and giving us guidance in our lives today. I now see peacemaking as a pyramid structure at a number of different levels where we have conflicts and disagreements that all need resolving. We have: 1) Family and close friends, 2) Our local community which might well include our church, 3) Our Nation where we have disagreements in our Government, or between our various counties, ethnic groups or religious faiths, and the lastly 4) Our Nation in the International community in the World as a whole. Resolution of conflict at each level all contribute to achieving Peace in the World today.

However before we can become effective Peacemakers we need to look closely at ourselves, and our inner attitudes. We must all see that our inner attitudes are often harsh, attacking and judgemental. Our ego seems to find its energy by having something to oppose, fix or change. When our mind can judge something to be inferior we feel superior. We need to, and must, recognise our constant tendency towards negating reality, resisting and opposing it in our minds. In short to be effective the Peacemaker must be completely unbiassed. This can only be achieved by obedience to "Love one another, as I have loved you", John 13:34. In practical terms this means resisting these tendencies to judge others by reaching out to the Holy Spirit within us to give us the strength to do so. "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is – his good, pleasing and perfect will", Romans 12:2.

We also had the opportunity to walk in the adjacent Silchester Common on this beautiful Summer day and walk amongst the trees, heathland and small ponds with none of the distractions of daily life, and to listen to the birdsong around us as we walked and meditated. I took the opportunity to take this walk to seek some Peace. It was there I met this little butterfly nestled in a gorse bush (see picture) relaxed and at peace with himself in "his World". I'm sure he sensed my presence and was at ease with it, as I was with his.

I clearly saw then that it was quite possible for we two of totally different species and lifestyles to live in peace and harmony with one another, respecting each other in our common World. We left each other in Peace.

I asked myself then why can't we humans today from different ethnic groups, cultures, and indeed Nations do likewise and live in Peace, and not be continually in conflict?

I came away from the Retreat with a stronger understanding of what Peacemaking is about, and that we should strengthen our relationship with the Holy Spirit in renewing our minds so that we are better able to serve God's Will as Peacemakers.

Did you Spot many Butterflies this past Summer? (PP)

The wildlife charity Butterfly Conservation is deeply worried about our butterflies. Or rather, lack of them. It seems that more than 80 per cent of our species have declined sharply in number since 1970s. Each summer sees the Big Butterfly Count, when the public is encouraged to send in the number of butterflies they have seen over a short period of time. Last year saw the lowest number of butterflies spotted in the count's 14-year history. Even familiar species like the small white, common blue & small tortoiseshell had their worst summer ever. A record number of people saw no butterflies at all. Butterflies have been hit by climate change, use of pesticides & damage to their habitats. The drought this summer has been bad news for their caterpillar offspring, which need growing plants to feed on. So, this autumn, why not plan a happier year for butterflies in 2026? As you prepare your garden for winter, go to https://www.rhs.org.uk/wildlife/butterflies-in-yourgarden for some ideas of how to make your garden butterfly-friendly.

The answer is found in God and this is an irrelevant question and answer to many, because they have never felt the need to understand things of a spiritual nature. Not everything is discovered on a computer screen.

Falling in love, cannot be explained, but we know it happens. When it does, it takes over and becomes an all-encompassing feeling. The newly converted Christian displays the same reactions. Caught up by the acceptance of God's spirit and forgiveness, coupled with the amazing gift of love from God. Faith cannot be explained and just accepting that love, transforms lives.

A hymn writer wrote these words. 'The mind cannot show what the heart longs to know.' Head knowledge is fine, but heart knowledge is so much more.

September is the time of year when we get back to our routines after the summer break. As whole-life disciples (lit: learners) we are all called to learn from Jesus and live like Him. God wants us to make a difference in our workplaces and schools, and with family and friends.

As Paul writes:

'And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him.' (Colossians 3:17).

'WHATEVER you do': God is at work in every aspect of our lives. He can use whatever we do to make a difference to those around. Do we believe this? Our lives shouldn't be like an orange, segmented into the sacred and secular, but more like an apple, in which all of our lives are available to Him.

'Whatever YOU do': God wants to use us to share God's love as we serve others around us, wherever we spend time. We can trust Him for the resources we need hour by hour, day by day, year by year. What do we need from Him?

'Whatever you DO': We work for God alone, in responding to God's love for us. How does this perspective make a difference when what we do is hard, unrewarding, or even unappreciated by others?

A man standing on a train platform was asked one day: 'Who are you?' He replied, 'I am a Christian thinly disguised as an accountant.' If we were asked the same question ourselves, how would we respond? As disciples of Jesus Christ, our identity is rooted in God and His call upon our lives.

For each of us, September means learning from Jesus about how we might live for Him in the different places we find ourselves.

ST ANDREW'S TRINITY METHODIST CHURCH

ABRIDGED MINUTES OF THE CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 19 AUGUST 2025 at 7.30pm

The Minutes of the meeting held on the 20 May 2025 had some 1. amendments made before being signed as a true record of that meetina.

'The Minutes of the Church Council Meeting held on 19 August 2025' are displayed on the Notice Board at the back of the Church.

- **Matters Arising:** No matters arising. 2.
- 3. Church Council Secretary: Revd Claire was pleased to announce that Donna L-O. had agreed to replace Barbara J. as Church Council Secretary. Proposed by P Wood and seconded by D Bath. Agreed unanimously. Revd Claire thanked Barbara for her contribution as CC secretary since the two churches had come together as St Andrew's Trinity Methodist Church.
- Proposed Redevelopment of South Ham and Buckskin: 4.

Bob L. gave some background information on the recently formed Action Group. Sovereign Housing and Basingstoke & Deane Council. After discussion, the meeting concluded that there was likely to be a lengthy consultative period and it would be years before anything actually happens, but we should be mindful of the disquiet and uncertainty that speculation has created in the local community.

- Property, Lettings, Health & Safety: Revd Claire thanked Bob L. for his report which 5. had been circulated to all CC members prior to the meeting. Bob mentioned that one of the hirers had reduced their letting from 5 sessions to 4, resulting in a slight loss of lettings income. He also emphasised the importance of all church members being vigilant over the security of our building eg: checking that windows are secured and lights and small items like fans are switched off, when the building is vacated.
- Proposed Craft Group: This new outreach craft initiative proposed by Yvonne H. was 6. discussed as well as our existing Trinity Circle Group. Church Council members agreed to the proposal of creating a Craft Group but a decision has to be made regarding how often and when this group would meet and to avoid clashing with Trinity Circle meetings, particularly as some of their members may have an interest in attending the proposed craft group.
- Finance: The Treasurer had circulated her report and the balance sheet to 31st July 7. 2025. Sarah W. confirmed that our finances were in good shape. Revd Claire mentioned a previous beguest which had been ring-fenced in our accounts for a suitable project. Margaret H. confirmed that Trinity accounts have finally been closed with the Charities Commission.

Reports from Other Groups: 8.

The Worship Group: had met the previous day and reported that a Baptism was booked in the church diary for September. Plans are in place for the Harvest weekend 27/28th September, with a lunch on the Saturday and on Sunday, harvest donations will be accepted. Full details will be published in the E News.

Angela W. wanted to raise the lack of provision for the significant number of young children which now sit at the back of the church during Sunday worship. She asked if we could provide a small selection of simple self- directed activities of a Christian theme for these children. There was unanimous support for this provision, and Revd Claire asked anyone interested in assisting with this, to talk to Angela W.

Children's/Young People and Families: Louise C. gave some feedback on the cont'd Published by St Andrew's Trinity Methodist Church

8. Reports from Other Groups (cont'd):

Children's/Young People & Families (continued): Children's Activities Day. This operates on 4 Thursdays in August for children of all ages and their parents, from 10 am – 4 pm. It has had a steady start and Louise encouraged members of the Church to go along to the Mug & Biscuit to have a look at what is going on and perhaps join in the fun in the church area.

3 Generate: Yvonne H. had been busy fundraising and so far over 40 children have signed up. During September there will be more fundraising to enable more children to participate in this Christian event. Yvonne H. has asked everyone to hold 3 Generate and the children in their prayers.

Tech Group: David W. had produced a report which was circulated to CC members. We already have a CCLI licence, which opens up more opportunities for mission. Llyn F. mentioned that we would need an ambient light resisting screen for showing films.

- 9. Mission: Revd Claire suggested that at the General Church Meeting on 26 October, we make mission as part of our worship, by talking about our mission and beginning a listening exercise. During our service we can add what we are already doing to our MAP (mission action plan). Another aspect was our communication and publicity within, and outside of Church. Communication was fundamental to what we do. Peter H. spoke about his survey on communication within our Church. He explored in detail who communicated, what they communicated, how they communicated, and where they communicated. The outcome was a proposal to church council that he formed a small group to consider how we can improve our communication. They will subsequently report back to church council members with some recommendations. A general discussion took place, and it was decided that Peter H. and David W. would form a small group to take this forward. Anyone else interested in being part of the group should contact either Peter H. or David W.
- 10. Safeguarding: Everyone is responsible for safeguarding. Margarat H. talked about the importance of signing up for training sessions as soon as they become available. Retraining is mandatory after 4 years and people should know when they need to sign up to a course. There is Basic training, and Advanced training for those who have already completed the basic training course. Anyone who has to be DBS checked for the job they do then safeguarding training is mandatory. For those who work in the Mug & Biscuit training would be useful but it is not mandatory. Individuals can put themselves forward for basic training.

GDPR: Revd Claire gave an overview of GDPR legal requirements and compliance. We urgently need a person to fill this role in our church, and asked those present to think about this. All the necessary paperwork is available once we find a volunteer.

- **11. Circuit:** Sarah R. asked those present to keep in their prayers all those people involved in Stationing; the churches, the circuit staff, and families. It is a difficult time for everyone as they seek God's will.
- 12. Any Other Business: Memorial Bench Iris Rogers
 Revd Claire is now going to contact the local Councillor to try and move this forward.

Putting out Chairs for Sunday Worship – Diane B. drew attention to the difficulties the Stewards have putting out chairs Sunday morning. She asked for volunteers to come to church a bit earlier to help with this.

13. Date and time of next meeting: Monday 3 November 2025 at 2.00pm

Praying with the Prayers of the Bible – Learning to Pray by Example Luke 11:1: 'Lord, teach us to pray.'

Luke tells us that the disciples asked Jesus to teach them how to pray after He had just prayed. This is very important. In His preaching Jesus had spoken about prayer; (eg Matt. 6:5-8) He had also included prayer in His teaching; eg Luke 18:1. But it was neither His preaching or teaching on prayer that inspired this request from His disciples; it was His example in prayer. Jesus had sent His disciples out to preach, yet their request was not, 'Lord, teach us to preach.' They had witnessed the mighty miracles that He performed and saw the astonishment of the crowds (Luke 9:43), but they did not ask Him, 'Lord, teach us to perform miracles.' No, they asked instead, 'Lord, teach us to pray.'

The disciples were beginning to learn that there was a direct link between the prayer life of Jesus and His Spirit-anointed ministry. We need go no further than what we find here in Luke's Gospel to see the consistent prayer life of Jesus. As news of His mighty ministry spread far and wide, 'great multitudes gathered to hear and be healed' (Lk. 5:15). This was 'high noon' in the ministry of our Lord and as the crowds gathered to hear Him, 'He withdrew to the wilderness and prayed' (v.16).

The next chapter tells us that Jesus made a habit of having whole nights of prayer. 'In those days He went out into the hills to pray and He continued all night' (6:12). A little later the evangelist records that immediately following the feeding of the five thousand, the disciples were with Jesus – and He was praying (9:18). When Luke recounts the Transfiguration of Jesus, he says the Lord took Peter, John and James up the mountain 'to pray' (9:28).

Luke wants his readers to know about the prayer life of Jesus. At every step of His ministry we see Jesus praying. He prayed early in the morning before the day began; He prayed late in the evening after hours of demanding ministry; He prayed in secret; He prayed with His disciples and He often prayed all night. He prayed in homes; He prayed by the roadside; He prayed on mountains; He prayed in boats; He prayed in the wilderness; He prayed in the synagogue; He prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane; He prayed on the Cross.

No wonder that Jesus' example in praying prompted His disciples to ask, 'Lord, teach us to pray.' As we read and study the life and ministry of our Lord, we will be likewise moved to ask Him, 'Lord, teach *us* to pray.'

Chaplaincy Prayer Letter – July & August 2025

Dear Supporters

Thank you for your ongoing support and prayers – they are very much needed and appreciated. Here are some of the things God has done recently in His mission as we have engaged with people.

- A pupil recognised a Chaplain who also performs in 'Open the Book' and asked about similar activities connected to church.
- A Chaplain met a parent who mentioned her children spoke of 'Open the Book' at School. It led to a conversation about her children going to Sunday School and her returning to church.
- A shop worker's cancer treatment went wrong and she was in hospital. The Chaplains
 prayed and sent a signed card so when, several months later, she returned to work she
 thanked the Chaplain profusely for caring about her and praying. She has started going
 to a church with a friend.
- A Chaplain met a church member doing voluntary work and was able to encourage him.
- A WhatsApp support group included a shop worker who was able to see how Christians support one another and pray for people.
- A family being made homeless was prayed for over many weeks. They found an ideal house within reach of the special school the child attended and recognised the support they had been given.
- A security guard treated someone with great consideration and remarked to a Chaplain that they had seen how Chaplains handle situations compassionately and so were copying the approach.
- A Chaplain met lapsed members of the church and was able to encourage them to return.
- A shop worker spoke to a Chaplain for the first time to say how much the mere presence of Chaplains was appreciated because it showed everyone that people cared.
- We gave a presentation to the Mayor, Basingstoke MP and others in a multi-faith community service groups meeting, and we had a publicity stand in The Malls in June.

There are many opportunities within the community to engage with people and we would welcome more help with this. Chaplains attend the law courts four mornings a week, another is a valuable member of the Police Chaplaincy team and one attends the bus station weekly. Others visit shops, The Safe or meet people in the streets. We are available for Foodbank volunteers at their warehouse, and we lead discussion groups in the Discovery Centre. We are also present at many civic events.

From an admin perspective, we are still waiting for a meeting about a new lease on the office in Festival Place.

Harvest theme....by Lester Amann (PP) Abiding in Jesus

This is the time of year for many churches to hold their Harvest Festival services. No doubt, there will be displays of food, some bought, with others grown in gardens and allotments. While gardeners can have pleasure growing fruit and vegetables it can be hard work tending to them and dealing with pests. Jesus knew about the care given to vines. In John 15:1-8 Jesus compared Himself to a vine and referred to God as the gardener. These verses are both challenging and reassuring. In this parable, God is responsible for pruning the vine. He sees what parts are useful and what parts are useless. The unproductive parts are cut away, so that growth is encouraged. Jesus is telling us that God will prune our lives, not to harm us, but to encourage our spiritual growth. God's pruning cuts away wrong attitudes and wasteful behaviour, all of which serve no useful purpose in our lives. This pruning is required so that we become more fruitful. And the fruit God wants is love, joy, patience etc, (see Galatians 5:22-23). These holy qualities are intended to influence the world to change it from the bad to all that is good.

To encourage its growth, a vine has to be regularly cut back. The effect looks drastic, but essential. When God cuts away the dead wood in our lives He does it because He knows how our lives can grow. The pruning knives are in the hands of our Father God who only desires the best for us. This pruning process can be painful, but Jesus says that it is vital if the Holy Spirit is to flow through us to produce the fruit that God wants. Also in this parable, Jesus said He was the vine, and we are the branches. We have no existence apart from Jesus. We can do nothing for God on our own and must be joined to Jesus. In the same way a vine utilises the life-giving sap to flow into the branches, so we need the Holy Spirit to flow His life into us. It is only by remaining in Jesus can He give us the inner resources for an effective fruit-producing life.

Jesus said 'Abide in Me' (John 15:4 King James Version). Abiding speaks of sustenance, being upheld and supported, enduring and withstanding. So, if we are to reap a harvest of holiness, may we be prepared for God's pruning, and continue to abide in Jesus, our Lord and Saviour.

Heavenly Father, September is the month of new starts for so many. New starts can be exciting, but they can also be daunting. We don't always know what to expect and sometimes we feel as if we are on our own in a strange new place, or situation.

Premier Christian Radio – the First Christian Broadcaster to Britain (PP)

Christian broadcasting was not always allowed in this country. As late as the mid-1980s, Christians were petitioning Parliament and the broadcast regulator to allow Christian broadcasting to begin in the UK. Finally, it happened, and in 1990 the law was changed. Five years later, in summer of 1995, Premier Christian Radio was launched. The Christian community rallied around the station, with thousands committing to provide regular monthly support, and make it the success it is today.

Highlights of the past 30 years include:

1999 – launch of Premier Online, streaming Premier to the world

2006 - launch of Premier.tv, providing Christian Internet TV on demand

2009 – broadcasting nationwide begins on DAB Digital radio

2010 - Premier Gospel begins

2016 - Premier Praise begins

Nowadays, with more than 1,100,000 listeners every week, Premier is the largest Christian Media organisation in the UK, reaching people via its print, digital and radio platforms. Premier Christian Radio is available online and nationally on DAB and on smart speakers. The Premier Christian App is available to both iPhone and Android users, via their respective app stores.

Transfiguration by Canon Paul Hardingham (PP)

'There Must Be More to Life Than This'. These words from Freddie Mercury of Queen will resonate with many of us, when we are looking to get more out of life, even as Christians. At a deeper level, we want to see and hear more clearly what God is doing in our circumstances. The Transfiguration of Jesus, which we remembered in August, helps us to consider this issue (Luke 9:28-36).

Jesus was transfigured alongside Moses and Elijah, 'As He was praying, the appearance of His face changed, and His clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning.' (29). To understand our circumstances, firstly we need to see Jesus as God wants us to see Him. The disciples' eyes were opened to see Jesus' divinity. The presence of Moses and Elijah confirmed Him as God's promised Messiah. By helping us to grasp who Jesus really is, this event powerfully calls us to entrust our lives into Jesus' hands to experience His presence and power.

Secondly, if we are to make sense of our circumstances, we need to hear what God says about His Son. A cloud covered them and 'a voice came from the cloud, saying, 'This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to Him." (35). God affirmed His love and call on Jesus as His beloved and chosen Son. Do we hear God speaking these same words to us? When we know that we too are loved and accepted by God, this transforms our understanding of our lives.

Whatever our circumstances, they can be transformed by what we see and hear. Open your eyes to see a transfigured world. Open your ears to hear a transfiguring voice. Open your heart to become a transfigured life.

















