## **Toot Hill Village Green – Dangerous Object**

On 4th April this year, the Parish Grounds Maintenance Contractor was cutting Toot Hill Village Green, when he unfortunately ran over a piece of wood into which nails had been placed. This caused over £250 of damage to his grass cutting equipment, which the Parish Council had to pay for. It is believed this item had been placed there deliberately in an attempt to cause damage and 'teach a lesson' to any joy riders that may decide they want to use the village green to drive over. We understand the frustration that these joy riders cause, however the Parish Council was extremely concerned and disappointed to see that somebody had taken such action. Whilst indeed the placing of such an implement on the green may have caused damage to vehicles driving recklessly over it, it could also have seriously hurt and injured a child, a dog, or simply anybody walking across on the green. On this occasion, the outcome was one of inconvenience to our grounds maintenance contractor, and a cost to the Council (indirectly to our residents), but it could have been much worse resulting in seriously injury. We have reported this incident to the Police. The Parish Council is currently looking at ways we can enhance security on the green without prohibiting access to the green for our residents or changing the nature of the green itself. In the meantime, we ask residents to refrain from taking such action, and be patient whilst we look at available options.



## **Toot Hill Village Green – Heritage Finger Post**

Earlier in the year, and thanks to Cllr Anthony Purkiss (Theydon Bois Parish Council) and Epping Forest District Council's Highway Rangers, some much needed maintenance of our heritage finger post on Toot Hill Green took place. The 'fingers' had to be sent off for renovation, but we hope you agree it looks great, providing not only clear direction to road users, but historic pride and sense of place for our community. There is certainly one local resident who was extremely pleased with the results, given he was the individual to last paint it back in 2014, who took the time to contact the Parish Council asking thanks were passed on to the Rangers for the exceptional attention to detail that was undertaken as part of the renovation project. Great job!



# **D-Day 80th Anniversary Commemoration**

6<sup>th</sup> June 2024 marked the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day, and to recognise this occasion Stanford Rivers Parish Council joined communities across the country by lighting the Beacon on Toot Hill Village Green promptly at 9.15pm. We were delighted that so many of you took the time to join us in marking this important historical event. In commemorating the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day, we pay homage to the resilience and fortitude of the British veterans who played a crucial role in this pivotal moment of the Second World War. The invasion claimed the lives of thousands of allied soldiers. These brave men—many just teenagers—left their families and their futures behind to liberate Western Europe from the grip of the Nazis. We must remember the sacrifices they made.



### Solar Farm, Berwick Lane

Many of you would have recently received through your door a leaflet providing details about the amended proposals for a Solar Farm in Berwick Lane, Stanford Rivers. This idea was first mooted early 2023, with a public consultation being held by the site promoter in May 2023. The latest leaflet states that having listened to feedback from local residents during the public consultation process, the site promoters have improved the proposal for Nickerlands Solar Farm by reducing the overall size and amending the design. There has been some confusion locally regarding what these changes are, and so we broadly summarise them below.





There is a reduced site area, with the south-eastern corner (near Berwick Lane) pulled back from the bordering local properties by around 200m. The overall site has been reduced by approximately 19.5 acres, with the site construction access moved away from Berwick Lane into Tawney Lane. There are enhanced improvements to biodiversity with new tree and hedgerow planting. The Parish Council was pleased to see that changes had been made to move the proposed development away from these properties, however has contacted the site promoters to suggest a further reduction in the proposed development site as well as moving the construction compound westward away from the properties. We await further information on these proposals, however the new Labour Government has pledged to work with the private sector to triple solar power by 2030, aiming for 50 gigawatts of generation capacity by that date. # First Aid Training – Are You Interested?

The Parish Council is considering running a First Aid and Defibrillator Use training session for local residents. This would be free of charge and provide you with a basic understanding of first aid, along with training on how to use a defibrillator. The Parish currently has two defibrillators for community use, and each one can be used without any training, however having basic medical knowledge within our communities can only help.

The course is expected to be around 3-4 hours long, and would be held locally at the Toot Hill Village Hall. If you are a resident of either Toot Hill or Stanford Rivers, and feel that this is something you would be interested doing, please contact the Parish stanfordriverspc@gmail.com. A decision as to whether or not to run the course will be made later this year, and anybody who has expressed an interest will be contacted directly. # Stanford Rivers Neighbourhood Watch







We have thankfully experienced a very quiet period in terms of crime in our parish, although there seem to be regular reports of issues in our neighbouring parishes. This was until earlier in July when there were two recorded incidents in our area, the theft of a silver Toyota Hulix in Toot Hill and the theft of tools, welding equipment and a vehicle from a business in London Road, Stanford Rivers. It is a well known fact that thieves have a tendency to revisit the area for a second attempt, so please remain vigilant. Although as a general rule we live in a safe, rural setting, we can never afford to let our guard down, and if each of us keep our eyes open for any suspicious behaviour, collectively we can help protect the area in which we live.

### **PFCC Crime Plan Survey**

Over the summer, the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner (PFCC) for Essex, Roger Hirst, is seeking public feedback about his Police and Crime Plan for 2024 to 2028. He is running partner workshops, public engagements, group activities and a public survey to gather thoughts about whether the priorities are right, if there is something that has been missed and what should be included. ### **Crane in Stanford Rivers**

Many of our residents have contacted us this year to express their concern regarding the crane that appeared over the skyline of Stanford Rivers. Located within the ground of a local business, the crane had become a prominent feature in a rural setting, which many residents were unhappy with. A planning application for the crane was submitted to the District Council earlier this year, with a decision made in June by the Local Planning Authority refusing permission for the crane. The refusal report states that the crane by reason of its excessive height and bulk results in a visually obtrusive and incongruous form of development harmful to the character and appearance of the street scene, the wider locality and wider setting of the non-designated heritage asset (Former Ongar Union Workhouse). In addition, the crane was recorded as constituting inappropriate development which is, by definition, harmful to the Green Belt, and that the development would also cause additional harm to the openness of the Green Belt and for purposes of including land within it with no very special circumstances being demonstrated to clearly outweigh the identified harms. So why is the crane still there? The planning system allows for a period of appeal, however we understand that EFDC has submitted a formal enforcement notice to the applicant requiring them to remove the crane.



### Toot Hill Village Hall – Solar Panels

We are excited to announce that the Parish Council has successfully received £20,000 grant funding via the National Lottery Community Fund towards the installation of solar panels onto the roof of the Toot Hill Village Hall. Our village hall is a well used community facility, and the installation of solar panels will not only help provide cleaner, sustainable energy for the hall, but will help to keep the hall hire rates low, which will benefit everybody This funding will be added to the in the community. £15,000 grant funding received via the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, and the £15,000 held in earmarked reserves for the project (which will also include the removal of the asbestos roof and replacement with something more modern). Epping Forest District Council declared a climate emergency in September 2019 and made a commitment to do everything within its power to become a carbon neutral District by 2030. As a rural parish, and a small parish council, we have limited options to make our own impact on reducing our carbon footprint, but this will go some way to ensuring we make our own mark on this target.

#### Village Sign, Stanford Rivers

Cllr John Adams has been working hard to find ways to slow the traffic down going through Stanford Rivers along the A113. This isn't limited to actions around traffic signs or speeding, but thinking about ways to make the area have more of a village feel, thereby acting as a subconscious visual cue to drivers that they need to slow down. One of the suggestions currently being considered is a new Village Sign which was discussed at length at our last meeting. We were extremely grateful for the input from our previous Clerk, Mrs Kay Hayden, who provided information about the meaning and history of the current village sign which was erected to mark the Millenium on the site of the Stanford Rivers united Reformed Church, built in 1820 and destroyed by fire in 1927. I would advise that we absolutely do not intend on replacing this very important sign which represents a part of the Parish's history, but are looking if there are ways we can 'add' to the area to create a sense of place. Some of the other suggestions include flower planting and the regular maintenance of the verges.

of making changes to how planning applications are considered. This is following the District Council coming a whisker away from 'being designated' and losing some of their decision-making powers for planning, which would result in applicants for larger developments being able to apply directly to the Secretary of State for permission, completely bypassing the District. We are currently unsure what these changes will mean in reality, however what we do know is the proposals are likely to mean that the Parish Council and local residents will need to be 'smarter' if they wish to object to a planning application, ensuring there are clear valid planning matters listed as reasons to object.


