1.0 Brief History of the Service

Surrey Heath Museum dates back to the 1930s, when it was known as Camberley Museum and based on the collection of Mr. George Poulter, who was the first Curator. It was housed in the Frimley and Camberley Urban District Council Offices on London Road. In the 1960s the museum moved to Newstead, a Victorian house on Knoll Road in Camberley. In the 1970s it was closed and Newstead demolished. At that time a team of staff were employed to catalogue the whole collection. In 1987, the museum reopened in an annex of Surrey Heath Borough Council offices with a permanent display, exhibition area and on-site storage facilities. In Autumn 2017, a council decision saw the closure of this site with view of creating a 'pop up' museum and on line presence. At this time, the museum agreed to create a community partnership with Surrey Heath Museum Action Group who already occupied a unit in The Square, Camberley. The Museum closed down at Surrey Heath House in Feb 2018 and reopened at 33 Obelisk Way, Camberley in June 2018.

2.0 Mission Statement

The service adopted a new logo and became Surrey Heath Museum & Heritage Services.

The aim;

“Surrey Heath Heritage Services exist to preserve, manage and document the heritage of this Borough. We will promote our unique heritage via public exhibitions, events, outreach and research access”.

3.0 The Collections

The collections reflect the social and industrial history of the Borough's past and fit into the following categories – costume, furniture, accessories, craft, art, photographs, industrial, archaeology, geology, education, military and natural history. There is also a large amount of reference material. There are over 30,000 objects in the collection. Nationally important art collections include Percy Harland Fisher (1865 to 1944), George Edward Lodge (1860 to 1954) and George Kenner (1888 to 1971). The museum has connections with San Francisco University (photographs by Edward Mendell, international wildlife and tribespeople, who lived in Windlesham) and the Imperial War Museum (water colours by George Kenner, WWI German prisoner of war based in Frith Hill).

COVID PANDEMIC WORK

The museum closed from March to July 2020 and again in October 2020. Museum volunteers were not able to work, however we hosted two ladies, Jane Harden and Wendy Ashwood from Windle Valley Day Care Centre who were relocated to the museum. They worked through the un-accessioned costume collection, entering over 1250 items into the collection. The museum store at Bagshot was also relocated to a storage container in the works area of London Road Recreation Ground. This saved the service c. £3,000 in internal charges.

The main museum stores are still the basement of Surrey Heath House and now, the storage container at London Road Recreation Ground. The stores were cleaned and reorganised by museum staff to create a costume section plus the picture store was reorganised.

SURREY HEALTH MUSEUM

The Museum received £6500 from SHBC and £100 from Community Fund for Surrey to organise a Generational Rocks project focussed on the Old Dean; themes of isolation and opportunities for the young. The project was designed around young and old people talking together on the shared experience of growing up on the estate. The conversations were to turn into a mini music festival with performances. Regrettably after a number of stops/starts the project was abandoned as access to care homes and schools was impossible. Two Project Officer's were involved, David Bedward and Julia Curnock. David took the lead and worked closely with schools and visited local community leaders. The funding was reallocated for Free French workshops in 2021/2022.

8.0 Outreach and Websites

The Covid Pandemic made running the service near impossible, however, important adaptations were made. The Education Officer, Kathy Joice, focussed her time on creating a digital service, where workshops were recorded and schools booked a loan box with the recording on a memory stick. This has created an important online provision.

School loan boxes and reminiscence boxes were still delivered to schools/care homes, however, the service was much reduced. The Museum team focussed on an online presence, continuing to develop the museum website with a focus on making areas of the collection available online. Kathy also focussed on Facebook posts and our on-line presence generally.
