

Highcrest celebrates being top of school sixth form league table

Staff and students at The Highcrest Academy are celebrating being number one in the sixth form league tables for schools in Buckinghamshire for progress made between GCSEs and A-Levels.

New figures produced by the Department for Education put the academy in High Wycombe at the top of the county league for school sixth forms, in tables which compare performances across the country.

Highcrest's sixth form progress rating of 0.47 – also known as a value-added score - outstripped that of all the other upper and grammar schools locally in 2017. Progress was measured between the end of Key Stage 4 (GCSEs) and the end of students' A-Level studies.

The academy was also given a 'well above average' rating for A-Level results performance which puts it in the top 5% of all sixth forms and colleges nationally.

Delighted Assistant Headteacher Paul Shaw, who ran the sixth form until this year, said: "We could not be happier with the results we have achieved over the past few years and this latest set of figures just shows what a talented bunch of staff and students we have at Highcrest. Last year, we had the second highest progress rate in Key Stage 5 for the whole of Bucks, so to go one better is fantastic and shows a real level of consistency."

Mr Shaw said 89% of all A-Level grades last year were C or above which is 12% above national average.

"Results have improved year on year for the past four years which is fantastic." he added.

"These figures could not come at a better time for us because we will be moving into our new sixth form block in September 2018 and will be able to take applications for more students."

From Westminster to Wycombe - Steve Baker MP

Along with other MPs in Buckinghamshire I regularly attend meetings with the providers of local NHS services, including the chief executive of the Hospital Trusts and GPs. At our January meeting we discussed pressures on the hospital over the winter period. The hospital's contingency plans have shown it was prepared to cope with the additional numbers of people presenting at A&E over the last few weeks, although the hospital administrators recognised people did have to wait longer than they would have liked at times. Whilst I was at Stoke Mandeville Hospital, I asked to

look around a new facility which has been built to improve the way ambulances handover patients to the emergency team. The new facility had only been open for a few days when I visited, but I was told it had already made a difference and allowed patients to be treated more promptly and effectively.

I know the doctors who commission NHS services are always looking for patients and the public to help shape health services. In the past healthcare services have often focused on activities but more emphasis is now being put on outcomes. The new Outcomes Framework has been written by a small team of patients and public volunteers with relevant experience, and these outcomes will be used to help design services in the future. The NHS is also looking at ways to improve the way the NHS deals with medicines and with discharge from hospital. A further study involves the local Clinical Commissioning Group which is working with the charity Macmillan Cancer Support to look at cancer services on a project entitled 'Living with and beyond cancer'. A survey has been set-up to find out which elements of cancer services are working well and to discover if new support should be provided. They would like to hear from those currently undergoing or have undergone treatment or who have cared for someone with cancer. If you would like to comment on any of these surveys, please go to the Let's Talk Health Bucks website at www.letstalkhealthbucks.nhs.uk/

Another issue I know is of concern to local people is housing. I am pleased that the Government is trying to tackle our national housing crisis; the housing budget has been doubled and new initiatives have been introduced including the Government's most recent proposal to allow some limited building upwards on existing developments provided it is in keeping with other buildings in the area. Although these are national schemes I am also interested in how we build a range of homes that meet local housing need here in Wycombe and I have written to the Leader of Wycombe District Council about this. I have also recently met the senior teams from our local social housing associations and looked around some new build properties and sites for development. In particular, Red Kite has some innovative plans for new business models and developing more homes in the Wycombe area, and I am hopeful these will help local people to remain living in the town where they grew up. Cabinet Recommends £5 Band D **Council Tax Increase**

Wycombe District Council's share of the council tax paid by residents is expected to increase by £5 for an average Band D property for 2018-19. The cabinet agreed the

increase at their meeting on Monday 5th February to recommend the change to the full council.

For a Band D property this means the payment goes up from £131.99 to £136.99, an increase of 3.8%. The estimated other increases are:

Bucks & MK Fire & Rescue	£ 62.70	2.99% increase
Parish (average)	£, 47.68	7.1% increase

Butterfly House appeals for residents to volunteer

Have you not guite lived up to that New Year's resolution you made way back in January? Are you feeling guilty about failing to carry out the good deeds you promised you would do in 2018? If so, South Bucks Community Hospice has an easy answer to help both you as well as people with life-limiting conditions.



The hospice is reaching out to residents of the Totteridge and Terriers area asking them to volunteer - either at Butterfly House in Kingwood Park, High Wycombe or at its shops in Bourne End and Hazlemere. The campaign to recruit new volunteers is being spearheaded by Mimi Harker OBE, former Mayor of Amersham and immediate past Chairman of Chiltern DC.

Mimi, who is a patron of the hospice, said:" If you have never volunteered before or are looking for another role, and would like to see what it is all about. what a great place to start. "Not only are you surrounded by an amazing team of staff to support you, but there are so many roles you could volunteer for - from running reception, to helping in one of the shops, tending the garden, working in the kitchen, driving patients back and forth or getting involved in one-off events."

People with only limited time on their hands need not worry. "If you only have a couple of hours to spare, that's fine," said Mimi. "Those hours will be incredibly valuable if, for instance, they are spent greeting people as they come through the door at what can be an incredibly stressful time. "No special skills are needed – just enthusiasm, commitment and perhaps a love of chatting and spending time with others, although there are plenty of behind-the-scenes roles too. We welcome applications from a wide range of people."

Mimi is the hospice's volunteering ambassador and to show her commitment, she volunteered in both the Bourne End and Hazlemere shops at the end of January. She added: "There is such a wide variety of work to do there, and it's so fulfilling to know you are making a difference to others. My heart literally lifts when I work with an organisation such as Butterfly House, especially when I can see the impact my work is having and how many people are benefiting from my tiny contribution. "If you have any time at all, just give us a go. If the first role you try isn't what you expect it to be, you can try out so many different others."

The Burial at Taplow





Until the discovery of the Sutton Hoo ship-burial, the princely burial at Taplow was the most important burial of the Saxon period known in England. Spring at St Francis' Church

Thank you and goodbye

By the time you read this I shall have left St Francis Church after 23 years ministry in Terriers and Totteridge. As some of my readers may know, I had imagined that at some time in the spring or summer of 2018 I would be moving into retirement. God, however, had other ideas. In the summer I was head-hunted by the Diocese in Europe to become the first resident chaplain in the

Italian port city of Genoa for more than twenty years. My last Sunday at St Francis was 25th February, and my last service there was the mid-week Prayer Book Communion on 28th February. I shall be licensed by the Archdeacon of Italy to serve the Church of the Holy Ghost, Genoa, on St Patrick's Day, Saturday, 17th March.

So from now on other names will be appearing on the notice-board outside the church building, at least until my successor is appointed. Until s/he is licensed the day-to-day running of the Church will be in the hands of the Churchwardens, who can be contacted via church.org.uk. Enquiries about christenings, weddings and funerals, about the times of services, or about booking either the church hall or the church building should be directed to the church office, which can be contacted on (01494) 462911 or via the parish website (www.terrierschurch.org.uk). Thanks to colleagues in other local churches and local retired clergy, the pattern of services at 10.00 a.m. on Sundays and Wednesdays will continue. Unfortunately it is not possible to say at this stage whether or not the early (8.00 a.m.) Communion services on Sunday will continue. Please keep an eye on the website for up-to-date information.

I have enjoyed my time here in High Wycombe, and would like to take this opportunity of thanking all who have contributed to the running of the local church during the past quarter-century, all who have supported events at St Francis during that time, from our Christmas Market to our children's concerts (at present, sadly, in abeyance), and those, of all faiths and of none, who have taught me more about what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. Thanks, too, to the regulars at St Francis for their patience at my occasional absences on diocesan business.

There have been moments of high drama: the "bomb plot" in 2006 and all that followed it, the discovery of what turned out to be a murder weapon in the Vicarage hedge while searching with the children for a lost ball. There have been moments of deep sadness: the sudden death (far too young) of Fr Michael Williams and the more recent departures of Carol Crofton, Val Jones and Paul Beniston, three faithful servants of God who died too early. In recent years there has been the joy of seeing the church building restored and its internal lay-out transformed – work which is still in progress – the challenge of finding my way around the new developments, at Kingshill Grange, Milton Place, and Kingswood Park, and the excitement of the first steps towards a partnership with a parish in Sweden. There have been fruitful encounters, with Catholic brothers and sisters at St Wulstan's and with Totteridge Baptist Church, with the Muslim Education Centre in Totteridge Drive and, more recently, with the mosque at Bowerdean Crossroads.



We ended 2017 with our annual Christmas events in December and our pub night on the last Friday of the month. As in the past we held two dinners for the festive season, one at lunch time and an evening dinner dance at Hazlemere Golf Club. Both events were well attended and enjoyed by all. A few members even went to both so you can see good food is always a driver!

At the end of January we hold our AGM evening. This is very much an informal event held at the monthly pub night. We reviewed events over the past year to see which worked well and perhaps one or two that didn't for whatever reason. It was also a time to look forward to the New Year and get some ideas for our events over the spring and summer months. The ideas I am pleased to say flowed and it looks like we will have a full and varied programme over the next few months. Ideas included Horse Riding, Bowling, River Trips, Craft Fairs, a Farm Visit, Theatre and at home take-aways. Now how is that for variety which along with our regular events there is sure to be something for everyone.

Some events run monthly such as the Friday Lunch Club for which in February we went to the recently opened Spindle and Thread in High Wycombe. We are also regular visitors to Dusty's Blues Club in Holmer Green usually attending a live music event once a month. We also go to the theatre, cinema, comedy evenings, and various other events and trips out throughout the year. As the milder days of spring approach once again we will be doing more in the great outdoors with walks, trips and days out.

All our events are open to new members with the Pub Night a great place to meet up. You would be very welcome to come along and join on the last Friday of the month at The Crown, Amersham Road, Hazlemere from 7:30pm. There is food available if you wish to skip the cooking at home and many members take that opportunity!
