

Bereaved residents can pay tribute to lost loved ones in the run-up to Christmas by dropping into South Bucks Hospice and leaving a message of remembrance on a special tree. The hospice runs an annual 'Light Up A Life' event in which prayers are said and messages are left on the Christmas tree.

For the first time this year, the charity has decided to extend the opportunity for people to take part by placing the tree in its fover up until Christmas Eve. People will be able to walk in between 9am to 4:30pm on weekdays and pay tribute to lost friends and relatives with some quiet reflection time by the tree.

Jackie Ward, Chief Executive Officer at South Bucks Hospice, explained: "We organised a traditional Light Up A Life service this year at Holy Trinity Church in Hazlemere for November 27. This was different for us because we normally hold the event at the hospice. "However, we realised that not everybody would be able to attend the church service and we wanted to find a way to allow the whole community to take part if they wanted to. Local bereaved people trying to come to terms with their loss could benefit from a service being run for the first time in January. The charity's new telephone Bereavement Listening Service begins in January 2022 following a successful appeal earlier this year for volunteer listeners. "We would like to hear from bereaved people who need support and could benefit from the free telephone service. To qualify to use it,

you need to have either lived or have a GP in South Bucks and lost a loved one to cancer or another prolonged, life-limiting illness."

Juliette Coffey, Head of Individual and Family Support at South Bucks Hospice. explained how the new service will work: "You will be allocated your own trained personal bereavement listener who will support you and listen to whatever it is you feel you would most like to share. You may experience a range of emotions,

everything from shock, denial, anger, despair and sometimes guilt. We will explore these emotions together with you and help and support you during this time. The service can be provided on a weekly basis for up to three months."

Community Impact Bucks supporting charities, communities, volunteering

New support for voluntary & community organisations in Buckinghamshire



A new service offering support, guidance and training to charities, voluntary and community groups and social enterprises (not-for-profit groups) is now available. Delivered by local charity Community Impact Bucks and funded by Buckinghamshire Council, the VCSE (Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise) Support Service provides free help with all aspects of running a charity or voluntary group including starting up, leadership, fund-

ing, and volunteer recruitment and management, with priority given to those with income of less than £100,000. Tailored support ensures each organisation can get the help that they need. Getting support is easy: to get help for your organisation or, if you know of an organisation that would benefit from our support, fill in the short request form on the web site and a member of the Support team will be in touch.

Would you know the signs of abuse?

November's Safeguarding Adults Week (15th – 21st



November) was a good reminder for individuals and organisations to think about if they are able to recognise signs of abuse and neglect, and know how to record and report their safeguarding concerns. This year the week focused on how everyone can help to create a safer culture by taking steps to minimise harm occurring in the first instance. If you volunteer or work with a local charity or community group, it is worth checking what safeguarding

policies are in place. If you aren't sure they are up-to-date or cover all safeguarding requirements, visit the web site to find the latest safeguarding guidance for voluntary organisations and how to access tailored safeguarding advice and training. You can also watch a series of short videos for volunteers to help you carry out your role safely.

Checking your organisation's internal processes

Community Impact Bucks launched a Healthcheck Tool to help charity or voluntary



group leaders assess the internal processes of their organisation, and see if the correct policies and procedures are in place. Providing a list of questions that should be asked periodically, the Tool looks at six core areas of running and developing a voluntary organisation including Governance, Strategy and Business Planning, and Leadership. On completing each section, the tool provides a list of all the actions that need to be taken, as well as advice on where to look for more information. To create your own free report, click on

I know the cost of living is the most pressing issue today in Wycombe and many of my constituents would have watched the recent Budget hoping measures aimed at easing it would be announced. I was pleased to see certain measures I have campaigned for to tackle the cost of living were announced in the Budget. I had called for the Government to take action to support those on Universal Credit, and was pleased the Universal Credit taper rate will be cut from 63 to 55 pence. It is vital the Government works to ensure

that lower income families have more money in their pockets. This would not be possible without the economic stability successive Conservative Governments have brought.

There were several other measures announced that will support those struggling with the cost of living: freezing fuel duty, ending the public sector pay freeze and raising the minimum wage will provide individuals and families with greater financial comfort as our economy recovers from the impact of Covid-19, lockdowns, and restrictions. Similarly, I very much welcome the reforms to alcohol duty that will result in cheaper pints than otherwise for all of us who enjoy a visit to the pub.

The Budget will increase total departmental spending over this Parliament by £150 billion. Capital spending on health will increase by £4.26 billion to help clear the test, scans and surgery backlogs; £500 million will be spent supporting children and families with a focus on mental health and new local Family Hubs; spending on skills will increase by 25% including funding for free courses and new traineeships. The Budget shows that if we're to fund public services, we cannot ever return to Covid-19 restrictions as our ability to increase funding on public services would be severely hampered.

Turning to more local matters I recently attended a meeting at St Lawrence Church, West Wycombe (the one with the golden ball). The parochial church council is facing large costs to keep the church open and is looking for people to come forward to form a working party on how best to preserve the church for the future. The church is a local icon, so I know this is an issue for people living in the town, and I have offered to do what I can to support the church remaining open.

We are now in the season of Remembrance. I attended the launch of this year's Poppy Appeal and spoke about the good work the Royal British Legion has done over the 100 years since it was formed. I will also be attending Remembrance Sunday at All Saints church in the High Wycombe in mid-November and another event in Fawley during the afternoon when there will be a commemoration of a RAF plane from 161 Squadron that came down near the village in 1943.

As there will not be another edition of Terriers and Totteridge News before next year, I would like to take this opportunity to send Seasons Greetings to you all. FIFTY DEFIBRILLATORS NOW INSTALLED IN THE HIGH WYCOMBE AREA



New Eden Centre installation

Following joint activity with South Central Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust, South Central Ambulance Charity, Thames Valley Police, the Hazlemere Fete and many local schemes, there are now over fifty defibrillators installed in the High Wycombe area. One of the newest installations is at the Eden Bus Station, in an area with a high footfall of people every

week. Robin Mugridge from South Central Ambulance Charity, Rus Hawkins from Thames Valley Police and Ray Cox from the Hazlemere Fere met to launch the defibrillator. The need for defibrillators has been widely publicised following the incident with Danish footballer Christian Eriksen whose life was saved with a device.

A defibrillator is a device which can be used in conjunction with CPR to deliver an electric shock to a person in cardiac arrest, where the heart stops pumping blood around the body, in an attempt to restart their heart. They are designed to be used by anyone without the need for training.

Every year in the UK there are some 60,000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests (OHCA), with resuscitation being attempted in around half of these, but just one in 10 people survive to hospital discharge. However, the chances of survival are two to three times higher with immediate bystander CPR and the early use of a defibrillator.

The new defibrillator is registered with a scheme provided and promoted by South Central Ambulance Service, the Service covering the Counties of Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire, Berkshire and Hampshire. An app, Save A Life, is available to show the locations of your nearest defibrillator within this region.

If you find someone unresponsive and not breathing, or not breathing normally, immediately dial 999 and begin CPR – the emergency call handler will help guide you through this. They will also tell you if a defibrillator is available nearby so that another person can fetch it. There are many online guides on how to perform CPR and use a defibrillator.


