News from Bucks County Council

It has been a very busy year so far in the Councils transport department, coping with the worst winter for 31 years. First we had snow and ice which went on for far longer than normal causing national shortages of gritting salt. In Bucks we never ran out but had to restrict the gritting routes to main roads and bus routes only. This caused a greater dependency on grit bins which quickly ran out of grit, not helped by some members of the public removing it from site for their own use. The big job following the thaw has been to repair our severely damaged roads and residents will be aware of all the work that has been going on in our division with more to follow.

To celebrate summer there will be a new wooden seat on Church Common behind St Francis where one can sit and enjoy the views. The previous two seats that were there had gone beyond repair and I have been able to fund the new one from the Councils community fund. The two new seats on Amersham Hill seem to have seen plenty of use this past year.

My thanks to all residents who have kindly reported non functioning street lights especially Geoff Pegg of Neighbourhood Watch fame. Please continue to do this if you can but we shall also be doing more regular scouting by transport officers in future.

Windsor Drive residents battle against path

Residents of the flats at Windsor Drive woke one morning to find a notice attached to the back gate and a also a lamppost on the estate. The notice advised of an "Application for a modification order" The order if granted would "recognise" a public path across the privately owned grounds and car parking areas linking Sheraton Drive through to Windsor Drive. The application was submitted by a resident in Sheraton Drive with some support from those living in Amersham Hill Drive.

Many of the residents of Windsor Drive have written to the County Council and their local councillor on the issue which would threaten the privacy and security of the estate. The estate has suffered from people coming in from the Sheraton Drive entrance and recently a gate was installed to restrict this. The grounds have suffered from fowling by irresponsible dog owners, damage to hedges and litter. Students from the nearby Royal Grammar School passing through have also cause an issue.

The County Councils process for dealing with an "Application for a modification order" is a long one. It may lead to a public enquiry at which the applicant will have to prove evidence of usage over 20 years or more. Similarly the residents, Management and Freehold companies who look after the estate will have to provide evidence of what has been done to deter trespassers from the land. Residents and owners of the flats meanwhile have an uncertain time ahead until a decision can be made.

High Wycombe Local Community Partnership

Community Planning for High Wycombe

If you would like to hear about what is happening on your doorstep, and let local councillors, police and health authorities know what you think, visit your Local Community Partnership.

Your local meeting is the High Wycombe Local Community Partnership and the meetings give local residents an opportunity to influence local decision-making and bring together key figures within your area who will listen to what you have to say.

At the moment local councillors and community representatives for High Wycombe are involved working on an area plan for the town. They have reported on what local people think is important for the area and these issues are now being looked at to see how best to tackle them. A workshop is being held in June as the next stage in the plan, and an action plan will be drawn up and projects identified to start work on the ground.

Some examples of the top priorities being worked on are:

Need more activities for young people in the area.

Anti Social behaviour
Cheaper and better publicised public transport
Speeding on local roads
More affordable housing – houses not flats
Support for local businesses in the town
Concerns about moving many hospital services away from High Wycombe
More GP surgeries/pharmacies/NHS dentists

The LCP has a number of budgets to spend on projects and initiatives which link to the identified priorities for the town. Last year a grant was given to Totteridge and Terriers News in recognition of the service it provides to the community in the area.

Neighbourhood Policing Local Crime Update

Cannabis Factories

In the past two years, Thames Valley Police has uncovered more than 300 cannabis factories, with an estimated yield of £4.4 million. Cannabis factories range from small enterprises to barns and industrial premises adapted for large-scale production. Because properties are often sub let from existing tenants, it can be difficult to trace those responsible. On 9 May

at St Hughs Avenue and on 11 May at Amersham Hill Drive, large quantities of Cannabis were discovered. The following can be indications that cannabis is being grown at a property:

windows always closed and blacked out / activity only heard during the night / unusual smells or sounds .fertilizer bags, grow bags or water piping lying around / more bin bags outside the property than usual / new locks or alarms installed / other suspicious or unusual activity

Residents from Amersham Hill Drive reported their suspicions as "I'd get the odd strong whiff of cannabis when I was outside in my garden... during the harsh winter we just had, every house in the road had snow covering the roof except that house" Report suspicious activity to the Police.

Man stabbed- Green Road

An 18 year old male was charged with wounding with intent to endanger life after a man was stabbed in Green Road on 8 May 2010 at around 7.15pm. Anyone with information is asked to contact DC Katie Spour at High Wycombe CID on 08458 505505 and quote URN 1227 of 8 May.

Arson with Intent to endanger life - Worleys Citroen

In the early hours of 31 March, reports were received of a Mercedes van on fire outside Worleys Citroen, Hamilton Road. The van, containing gas cylinders, was extinguished and the Police and Fire services are working together to establish the cause of the fire, although initial enquiries suggest it was a targeted attack aimed at a particular individual.

A Clean Sweep

To boyhood ears the words seemed contradictory—"A <u>Clean Sweep</u>"? Certainly the soot-encrusted (even before he started) figure who came to sweep our Rowan Avenue chimney, wouldn't have fitted that description. Mum dreaded this annual ordeal—covering the furniture with old tablecloths and the (lino) floor with newspapers, taking down the photos and keeping the doors and windows shut. Even so soot seemed to permeate the whole house for weeks afterwards. At least the sweep was always a cheerful character, who removed the cigarette from his mouth, only to rest his blackened hands on the walls (which later had to be scrubbed clean), and gaze proudly at the new speckled ceiling, while drinking his second cuppa. I was glad to be sent outside, to check if the brush was visible above the chimney-pot. Even if it wasn't, I would have said it was, just to get rid of him before my snow-white cat fell into his filthy little truck—although dad always said black cats were lucky!

Now my wife and I live on the hill above the Bowerdean estate. Things have improved and the sweep we had, before we switched to central heating three decades ago, left less mess than his predecessor. Even so we breathed a sigh of relief, as he walked back to his van dragging a sack full of soot over carpeted floors, pausing only to give me a warm handshake. Thank goodness he didn't try to hug my wife!

In last winter's severe weather I began to wonder what we could do for heat, if there were power cuts. A gas fire seemed to be the answer—until the (Gas Safe) engineer said casually "You have to get the chimney swept" Our hearts sank. The nightmare had returned. I thought of our old neighbour, who used to sweep his own chimney. The resultant chimney fire and call to the Fire Brigade became such a regular event, we always had tea and biscuits ready for the firemen, when they came down from checking our loft and have their regular Union meeting in our front room. If I had a go at our chimney would they come to my aid, I wondered. Perhaps not a good idea and anyway I hate getting my hands dirty! I wondered if there were any small boys around, who for a few toffees would crawl up the chimney for me but then though Social Services might object.

So I turned to Yellow PagesTM and was amazed to find how many sweeps there still are. Who should I ring and what would they be like? Perhaps a fellow Totteridge resident was the best idea. He would show me the most consideration. Where better to look than this magazine, which you are reading now? I came across Johnny, who quickly agreed to come and assured me there would be no mess. But what on earth is an "AZTEC" sweep? I pictured a guitar-swinging Mexican in a sombrero, serenading the neighbours before he started. In the event Johnny turned up in neat English attire. He got out of his (clean) white van, came in, smiled at the covers over the TV etc and set to his task with brush and (glorious) vac, pausing only to smile reassuringly. The job was quickly done
