

TOTTERIDGE COMMUNITY CENTRE

Totteridge & District Community Centre is a registered Charity in England & Wales (No. 1123743) and is based on the same site as the former Totteridge Social Club.

The community Centre was created following the closure of the old club which had served local residents in a variety of ways since the 1950's. In 2007 the social club had fallen on hard times with dwindling membership and was finally closed in October of that year. Now the centre is vibrant once again and open daily with a variety of activities, licensed bar and availability for hire for private functions. It is now in its 3rd year having re-opened in December 2009.

As well as regular events at the centre on Totteridge Drive they organise special events and day trips out too. On 21st July there is a planned trip to Southend-on-Sea. For anyone who has not been there this is one of the south-east's best known seaside locations and the closest to London and hence its popularity with a direct rail link to the heart of the city. It has three blue flag beaches, seven miles of seafront and is a popular resort perhaps even more so these days as more people holiday in the U.K. The cost of the trip is £8.00 for members and their children and £10 for non-members. No news on New Footpath

A proposed new footpath between Windsor Drive and Sheraton Drive still remains unresolved. The Modification order to the definite map was issued back on the 25th October 2011 with copies sent to all affected resident for comments and objections. T & T News understands a number of objections were lodged by the deadline of 3rd February 2012 and it is likely therefore that the matter will be passed to the secretary of State and a public enquiry will follow.

The order if finally passed will open up a footpath across the private Windsor Drive estate linking the two roads. The application for the order was made by a resident of Sheraton Drive and supported by a number of residents in the road and also along Arnison Avenue and Amersham Hill Drive. The applicant and supporters will have to prove usage over a period of 20 years or more if the order is to be finally implemented. Many residents and flat owners on Windsor Drive have written in to object to a path across the private grounds of the estate and dispute the claims made by the applicant and supporters.

X Ray Staff Celebrate Scannappeal's 25th anniversary

Staff in the X-Ray department at Wycombe Hospital recently supported a HOST25 event organised by Dr Carolyn Charleworth, Consultant radiologist and trustee of Scannappeal. Food was provided throughout the lunchtime period and the event raised nearly £500. Other events have included several open gardens in Great Missenden, Chalfont St Giles and Haddenham. A talk by showbiz legend Val Doonican at a special ladies lunch also helped raise f1,500.





News from Wycombe and Westminster Steve Baker MP

Since the beginning of this year, my main focus in the constituency has been the *Better Healthcare in Bucks* consultation on proposed changes to local hospital services. I should like to thank all those people who have taken the trouble to write and contact me with their thoughts on this. I have attended two public meetings at which I heard people's views and contributed to the debate with the clinical director of Bucks NHS Trust. I have also spent many hours with hospital administrators and clinicians, including meeting at length with the vascular team to understand their situation, and putting your concerns to them direct.

It is clear that one of the principal concerns is the journey to Stoke Mandeville Hospital, which everyone thinks is too long and inconvenient, whether as a visitor or as an emergency patient in an ambulance. I thought it was important for me to experience the journey for myself, and you can see a video of my visit to Stoke Mandeville by bus on You Tube (link details below).

My local work on the hospital has been complemented by asking questions on health issues in the House of Commons, both at Prime Minister's Question Time and also putting questions to the Health Minister. I recently asked the Secretary of State for Health if he would meet a local delegation from the Save Our Hospital Services campaign, as I feel it is important for Wycombe people to raise with him in person the provision of hospital services in Bucks. This meeting will take place on 13th June, and I will update you in a future newsletter on how it went.

I was honoured to be invited to officially open the new Hannah Ball School. I know the school has worked hard to change its admissions criteria so that it can now teach children throughout their primary education. I hope parents will find it easier to take their children to just one school, which should also have the added benefit of reducing traffic and parking, and therefore be safer for everyone.

Most Fridays, I have a full day of constituency appointments and visits. During the past few weeks these have included a joint meeting of the Skills Centre, Amersham and Wycombe College and the Federation of Small Business to discuss apprenticeships; a meeting of Bucks Vision to learn more about the challenges faced by blind and partially sighted people; a young peoples' UN style debate on nuclear disarmament; and the local branch of the Institute of Engineering and Technology. You may know I am only one of a few MPs currently sitting in the House of Commons who have a background in science and engineering, and the Institute's members were interested to know how someone with my background applied engineering skills to politics.

Readers may like to know I was recently elected to the 1922 Committee. This committee acts as a liaison between the Prime Minister and backbench Conservative MPs. Please feel free to let me know your views on national issues, which will help in the process of policy feedback. Issue 10 was our first edition with a colour cover and a extra four pages. For the first time we included a picture on the front instead of my editorial which perhaps was a refreshing change. We were also from this point able to offer colour adverts to our advertisers and include the occasional colour picture with an article. In this edition we used the back inside cover for picture completion something we are repeating in issue 20 (This edition!).

From Issue 11 we tried to build on the Sports and Social Club News the aim being to encourage more news from these areas. The first such page included news from Totteridge Football Club and a promotional article "Do you run a club in Totteridge and Terriers".

Issue 12 had a Local Crime Update from Thames Valley Neighbournood Policing. It revealed that in the last two years they had uncovered more than 300 cannabis factories with an estimated yield of f4.4 million. There was also details of a stabbing in Green Road and an Arson Attack at Worleys Citroen at the bottom of Hamilton Road. We also reported on the Windsor Drive residents battle against a path, an issue that is still unresolved to this day.

Steve Baker MP did his first piece for T & T News in issue 13 and his office has regularly been submitting an article since. This has helped keep us informed of the work of an MP and the priorities he sees for the High Wycombe area. Freemantle Road was the venue for a "Big Lunch" and this was reported in the magazine. The lunch was a great success in bringing people living in the road together.

Our more recent magazines from issue 14 to 19 have continued very much on the same format since we introduced the colour covers. The news contained in each issue has of course changed and there has been a different cover picture reflecting a local image or news item contained in the magazine. The back cover since colour was introduced has been reserved for advertising with the about T & T News information moving inside.



T & T News.....5 Years on.....

It seems incredible as T & T News looks back that we have been bringing community news to Totteridge and Terriers for 5 years. When this publication started there was no newsletter in Terriers and the one in Totteridge was no longer printing so keeping in touch with community events and news was reliant on the local paper, internet and word of mouth.

The idea of a community newsletter goes back some time before that first edition when I as current editor was doing a community column for a local paper. Interestingly at one point that involved covering this very area but of course those columns of news have now long gone. It was early in 2007 that the idea of a newsletter started to become reality and a trial magazine of just 8 pages and 1000 copies was distributed to a limited number of local roads in June of that year.

The trial edition proved a success and hence T & T News was born with the first full edition rolling off the press early in September 2007. The first edition was just 16 pages all in black and white without the cover picture we have now become used to. In that 1st edition we reported on Highworth Combined School's Festival and Fireworks, the South Bucks Hospice Shops, Neighbourhood Watch, and the obstacles in Kings Wood. That story on Kings Wood sparked a few comments and showed even at a local level we could be a campaigning publication and were open to comments from all sides.

In our second edition in December 2007 our main story was on a £1000 grant received from County councillor Val Letheren's Community Leaders Fund. The grant was essential if T & T News was to continue because then as now we cannot fully cover the cost of printing from advertising support alone. Here perhaps is a good time to thank all those advertisers who have supported us over the years. Looking back through those first editions a few advertisers have been with us since the beginning and to them we extend a very special "Thank You".

Issue 3 covered the story of Potholes and Streetlights and shows that issues some five years ago are still the same now. Our local Girlguiding division by now was set to become a regular contributor to the magazine and we featured an article on the Totteridge Social Club which at the time was in a state of poor repair and disuse. Thankfully five years on the club has now become the Community Centre and is enjoying a new lease of life and is well supported. This was the third edition we featured the guide which is perhaps something we will bring back for future editions of T & T News.

Issue 4 saw us obtain another small grant of £50 from the Mid-Counties Co-Op. The store at Park Parade was at the time newly established having taken over the premises of the old Hazlemere Food Hall. The Co-Op had a hard act to follow as the original

Supermarket was much loved and was an important part of local life in Hazlemere and the surrounding area. For a local supermarket it had challenged the domination of the big four and was winning locally with its range of products and small in-store franchises such as the travel shop. The Co-Op today it still serving the community and is part of the vibrant Park parade shopping area which has bucked the trend of elsewhere with closed shops and struggling businesses.

Issue 5 featured two pages of local Police related news concentrating on speeding and anti-social drivers. We also had a bit more news from our local churches and this later developed into two pages of news from St Francis, Totteridge Baptist Church and occasional pieces from the Catholic and other churches. Carbon Cutters also did a feature in this edition challenging emissions and climate change. The new T & T News web site was also launched for this issue on the bucksinfo.net community website.

Issue 6 featured an article on Community Sentencing which includes getting offenders to do unpaid work in the community, obey a curfew, attend rehabilitation, prohibit certain activities and exclusion. We also had some news from Wycombe District Council and as this was the December 2008 edition a Christmas quiz.

Issue 7 we had article by Sheila Mawhood about the May Fayre taking place on Holywell Mead on the Rye. I cannot remember what the weather was like on the day but seem to remember it went well and was well attended. Chameleon Singles Group which had submitted an article since our very first edition reported that the Christmas Dinner held at the Firecrest near Wendover had an attendance of 17 members. They still do have an annual Christmas Dinner and of course many more events throughout the year.

Issue 8 included an article on the Local Community Partnership. The partnership meets every three months and was set up to take up issues that matter to local people. The last meeting was attended by two local residents groups , Bassetsbury Allotment Holders Association and Heart of Ryemead Community Association both with questions and issues of concern. This edition featured the first Community News Round-Up page with snippets on Neighbourhood Watch Week, New Play Time Funds, Police Open Day and Buckinghamshire Link.

Issue 9 marked a new direction in advertising for T&T News with our first advertisement feature sometimes also refered to as an advertorial. This was on Personal Finance: Saving for Retirement something that affects us all during our working lives. We also had our first short story in the magazine from David Church on "Totteridge Road - Abode of Gangs and Pigs". David went on to write several other short stories for the magazine which were well received and certainly got you thinking.
