Soapbox Double -Speeding & Keeping the Streets clean

20's Plenty for us

Local resident Tamoor Zafar has started a petition to reduce the speed limit along Arnison Avenue and Bowerdean Road. Both roads form a secondary main route linking London Road to Terriers carrying local traffic, busses and other vehicles. Speed is an issue for some local residents and the case for reduction from 30mph to 20mph has according to the proposer strong evidence to support it.

Love Where You Live

Keeping Wycombe & Chiltern's streets and roads clean costs the Councils approximately £2.1 million pounds a year. The councils arrange for roads to be swept, litter to be picked and street litter bins to be emptied and after all this the rubbish still needs to be sorted and disposed of.

Recently the Council's contractor Serco cleaned the Marlow Bypass (A404). Serco collected more than 2 tonnes of litter and wish to urge motorists to help tackle the problem by bagging their rubbish and taking it home. Litter thrown onto our roads and streets can cause a safety hazard to pedestrians and other vehicles whilst the task of clearing roadsides puts workers at risk.

The cost to clean Marlow Bypass nearly £8000 and this is done up to three times a year. The rubbish which they collected was either thrown from vehicles or illegally dumped. Approximately 75% of the litter collected was recyclable and can be recycled at home. The most common items were cans, plastic, paper and cardboard. Some of the more unusual items which were collected were bits of metal, tyres and even a pushchair.

The Councils spends millions in street cleaning and car litter is a considerable factor in this. People should take responsibility for their environment, locally and further afield. Just because you are on the move is no excuse for despoiling the area you're driving through and leaving others to deal with your thoughtlessness.

Anyone that drops litter in a public place is committing a criminal offence and they can be fined under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 and the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act. The fine is between £50 - £80, and if not paid a magistrates' court can impose a fine of up to £2,500. If you see anyone dropping litter please report this online at Keep Britain Tidv

Introduction to Pilates

Pilates is a type of exercise which considers your whole body posture during strengthening and stretching. It emphasises strengthening the deep stability or 'core muscles' and also considers breathing techniques and relaxation to try and promote smooth efficient movements. Joseph Pilates opened studios in New York in the 1950s and 1960s and worked closely with the New York Ballet. His exercise regime at the time focussed on correct posture, breathing control and starting all exercises from a strong centre.

Pilates today: Today many of the original Pilates exercises are still used but most have been adapted to try and make the exercises safe and effective for all levels.

People from all fitness levels use Pilates to try and help improve their postures and techniques and to help prevent injuries as well as helping recover from injuries more quickly or improve their sporting performance.

Different types of classes: There are differences in how Pilates is taught as sadly there is no one regulatory body that instructors have to belong to. There are some key differences between drop-in Pilates classes and structured Pilates programmes with accredited instructors which it is useful to be aware of:

1: A good instructor should insist on a 1:1 initial session to allow an assessment of individual posture, flexibility, strengths and areas for improvement before starting the classes.

2: The classes need to have individuals of similar abilities to allow everyone to progress at an appropriate level.

3: Class size should be a maximum of 10-12 people.

Overall Pilates is a great way to improve posture, strength and flexibility. The body awareness that comes with a well structured course and good instruction can carry over into day to day life whether that's helping to sit better at the desk or improve your technique for high level sport. Terriers Evening W.I.

Abandoned babies, cats and dogs was our theme for March and April In the 18th century, Thomas Coram became aware of the plight of babies born out of wedlock. These children were often abandoned on church steps or left to starve to death. Thomas Coram spent twenty years campaigning to provide a safe place for these babies and eventually won the financial support of the aristocracy which enabled him to build the Foundling Hospital in Bloomsbury. On the day it opened more babies arrived than there were places. Each baby was renamed and the only connection with the mother was a scrap of material. Should the mother be able to support her child in the future she would be able to prove her identity by producing her matching piece of material. The Hospital closed in 1954 but the work of the Thomas Coram Charitable Trust continues today supporting vulnerable children.

In April we turned our attention to cats and dogs when we heard about the work of the Battersea Cats and Dogs Home. Both cats and dogs are rescued and rehomed. Many of them are strays and people come from all over the Country to buy a cat or dog knowing that they are in good health. Every effort is made to match owner to animal and there is a careful vetting procedure to ensure that the placement is appropriate A great deal of work is done in schools etc. to promote responsible dog ownership as most of us would agree that the owners need to be trained as much as the dogs.

The Bucks Federation of W.I.s hold an Annual Council Meeting in Aylesbury which is attended by representatives from W.I.s across the County. Business matters are discussed and well known speakers attend. This year our members were particularly touched on hearing about a charity "Dreamflight" They charter a Boeing 747 and take 192 disabled children on the holiday of a life time to the theme parks of Florida, giving these children, who suffer so much, some fun and joy in their lives. An impromptu collection was taken at the end of the meeting and £882 was raised.

Lungworm watch out!

We are all aware of the need for pet prevention against fleas and worms but another important one to protect against is canine lungworm.

Here at Vets4Pets High Wycombe we recently met Coco, a lovely young Staffie who had symptoms including coughing, going off her food, weight loss and lethargy. She was a very poorly girl; we admitted her for tests which revealed anaemia and irregular lungs on an X ray, so a follow-up instant blood test for lungworm was done proving this was indeed the cause of Coco's problems. Thankfully, after treatment, Coco is making a quick recovery back to her lively, loveable self.

In its lifecycle lungworm commonly passes through slugs/snails as hosts so any dog with access to gardens, parks or woodland is potentially at risk. With cases now being reported in the High Wycombe area we strongly encouraging dog owners to use a simple monthly spot-on treatment to prevent lungworm.

News from Bucks County Council -Val Letheren updates us on her work.....

Roads and pavement update.

Be assured that the remainder of the footway that needs it will be repaired in Geralds Road. Sorry it has taken so long but that is how it and I have also asked for Amersham Hill footway to be repaired where it is bad.

Regarding the roads in our area:

Chippendale Close is now down to be jet patched for the first 50 metres as is Windsor Drive which is also causing complaints and looks bad. These roads are of concrete base and we have many in the town which are certainly beginning to show their age. Kingshill Road is completed but still does not look perfect but is a much smoother ride.

Regarding my continuing work with scrutinising services for young people. Having completed the inquiries into how much is going on to help our young people decide what to do when they leave school, and also how the pupil premium grant can be used more effectively to help young people from hard up back grounds achieve their potential ,our next is to explore is cyber safety. There seems to be a lot of bullying young people experience on the web and there is also concern about the various web pages they can access regarding porn and violence. Parents and schools have a role to play to make the children aware of the dangers of giving personal information on line and we intend to explore how we can help to prevent this. Any experts out there who would like to give advice would be welcome to talk to us, and as with our two other reports we have completed this year it will be available on the County Councils website after we have taken it to the BCC Cabinet.

News from Wycombe and Westminster - Steve Baker MP



T&T News

One of the most interesting things about being the MP for Wycombe is the variety of the constituency and the people I represent. Wycombe has its traditional industries such as furniture making but also new high-tech business, and there is a large rural area which is mostly designated as being of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Some of my constituents are extremely wealthy and some have come to this country as asylum seekers. It is often difficult for people to know how they fare in relation to others, so you might be interested in some facts and figures which were passed to me recently.

Wycombe is considered a prosperous constituency with earnings, educational attainment and employment all above the national average, and offers a high ratio of jobs to working age residents. The numbers claiming unemployment benefits has fallen by 28.3% over the year to December 2013, which is a quicker rate than the country as a whole. Wycombe's economy has strengths in sectors that are expected to show strong employment growth and feature in the Government's Plan for Growth and Industrial strategy. However, it is worth noting that 40% of part-time workers in Wycombe earn less than the living wage; 33 % of women in work are employed part-time and 8% of men.

There are 5,200 businesses in the constituency, employing 51,700 people, but of these only twenty companies employ more than 250 people. At 18% Wycombe has a lower share of employment in the public sector than England as a whole. There are particular strengths in information and communications, wholesale and motor trades, and the retail trade employs the most people (6,600). Wycombe's residents are more likely than the national population to be employed in the most highly-paid and knowledge intensive occupations. Overall, employment in Wycombe District is expected to increase 13.7% to 2021, representing the 21st strongest performance forecast for any local authority in Great Britain and the 8th highest outside London. The median hourly pay in Wycombe is £12.77 which is 10% above the national level.

Deprivation is very low by national standards across Buckinghamshire, and no part of Wycombe ranks among the most deprived areas. However, there are parts of Totteridge which are in the lowest quarter and people here must be given opportunities to gain skills and employment in order that they can better themselves.

Whilst these figures are – I hope you agree – interesting we must never lose sight of individuals. People are not statistics, and we must always see everyone as a person in their own right and respect their own choices and circumstances. However most governments, be they at a local, national or even European level, do not seem to be able to do this. We have targets for many aspects of government which sometime work in favour of the individual but more often than not curtail an individual's freedom and choices.
