### **Terriers Evening W.I.**

We learned in March, from Dr Barry Hughes, how dogs are being trained to be used in the detection of certain medical conditions and how effective they are.

### Rabbit Healthcare in the Summer

As the weather begins to warm up, rabbits are at an increased risk of getting flystrike. This condition predominately occurs in warmer weather where fly eggs hatch around the rabbit's rear end and the maggots eat away at tissue which can progress and potentially become fatal if not treated.

In order to prevent this, it is advisable to keep the rabbit's environment clean and dry, making sure to remove any soiled bedding materials at least once a day. Providing your rabbit with a large, secure space allows them to exercise and to stretch their legs, leading to a happier, healthier rabbit. A good diet will also help, this should be made up of 80% good quality hay and/ or grass, 15% vegetables and 5% pellets.

Get in the habit of regularly checking your rabbit for any signs of fly eggs or build up of faeces or urine stains around the rear end. Gently clean these areas and we advise applying veterinary recommended insecticide and insect repellent to protect your rabbit from any infestations.

## From Westminster to Wycombe - Steve Baker MP



From time to time the Government releases data on all constituencies across the country, which gives a snapshot about residents' access to public services, employment and health. This data helps national and local government formulate policies to combat deprivation. Overall, Wycombe District is the 34th least deprived local authority in the country. It will probably be no surprise that the top areas locally are Hazlemere, Hughenden and Downley. Totteridge scored high on the Living Environment index (higher than parts of Marlow), was average for employment and crime, but scored lower for income and education, skills and training.

It is always a pleasure for me to visit Highcrest Academy, and I am very proud of the school and what it has achieved. There is a real sense of purpose in the school, and the pupils are a credit to themselves and the staff. While congratulating Sheena Moynihan on her career and retirement at the end of this academic year, I cannot help wishing she could continue for years yet! I should like to pay tribute to her for all achievements and say how much she will be missed. She leaves the school in a strong position and I am sure the new headteacher will continue her excellent work.

On 23rd June, every voter will have the opportunity to vote in the EU referendum. I believe the safer choice is to vote to leave. The EU is plagued by high unemployment, a dysfunctional currency, ineffective political institutions, a migrant crisis and a democratic crisis. If we remain, we will not be able to control our borders with a fair and humane migration policy which stops discrimination against people outside the EU. Every week, the EU bills us over  $\neq 350$  million; in Buckinghamshire, our NHS Trust has a challenging deficit which is less than half a day's net contribution to the EU. If we remain, our negotiated rebate will be at risk and our contributions will continue to increase. We may change the British government but the European project of ever-closer economic and political union will continue just the same.

If we vote to leave, we can trade freely with countries around the world and cooperate in a friendly, effective way. We can regain legal control of policies affecting trade, tax, economic regulation, energy and food bills, migration, crime, and civil liberties. If we regain the power to choose who makes our laws and trade deals and who controls public services, British voters will take back democratic control over matters which affect our lives every day.

I know many people are taking the responsibilities of the referendum very seriously, and have vet to make-up their mind about which way to vote. I want to reassure anyone who is thinking of voting to leave that the UK has the world's fifth largest economy, with the best armed forces of any nation, more Nobel Prizes than any European country and more world-leading universities than any European country. Our economy is more dynamic than the European, we have the most attractive capital city on the globe, the greatest "soft power" and global influence of any state and a leadership role in NATO and the UN. I am confident our future will be safer and more prosperous outside the institutions of the failing EU.

South Bucks Hospice Palliative Care & Lymphoedema Clinic

There is now just a year to go until the opening of a multi-million pound hospice inTotteridge. Jo Woolf, Chief Executive Officer of South Bucks Hospice, tells why this is so momentous.



Death is a deeply personal journey that each individual approaches in a unique way. Yet far too many people are denied their final wishes of being allowed to die at home.

South Bucks Hospice enables a patient, who might otherwise need a bed in an institution, to spend their last days in their own home with their family and friends, if that is what they want.

Our day hospice in High Wycombe has been enormously successful, but we need to move to a far bigger building to meet the demands of a growing and rapidly-ageing population.

That is why I am thrilled we have raised £3.8million to enable us to move in Spring 2017 to vastly-larger purpose-built premises in Totteridge, at the site of the old Kingswood School – but we now need your help with the £850,000 annual running costs.

Our day hospice, the only one in a catchment area of 320,000 people, allows people to manage their life, and their death, in the way they prefer – and in many cases this is at home with their family. ## Policing Update

### Totteridge & Bowerdean

Residents have raised concerns over parking at the junctions of Kingston Road and Adelaide Road off Walton Drive. Officers have been issuing parking warning letters to those parking inconsiderately at junctions and will follow up with tickets should this be ignored or not taken seriously.

There has been some unacceptable behaviour from some students from Highcrest Academy on Hatters Lane. A resident from a neighbouring road has had a large metal object throw by a student into her garden which could have caused serious injury to anyone stood in its path, or caused significant damage to the house. The neighbourhood team are looking into this incident.

Drugs warrants were executed in The Roperies during May as there have been numerous reports of drug use and dealing in this area recently.

There is partnership activity currently with the public safety team in regards to anti-social behaviour. Also on-going work with Red Kite Housing, L & Q Housing and Bucks Mediation who are helping to resolve current neighbour and family disputes.

### Terriers & Amersham Hill

There are still growing concerns about vehicles driving at excessive speed along our roads. The Police are doing what they can with the resources available to run speed monitoring, enforcement and community speed watch operations. Most of the vehicles involved are causing some form of anti-social behaviour by way of aggressive, careless and inconsiderate driving. The Police have powers under section 59 of The police Reform Act 2002.

Parking continues to be an issue and the main area of concern is Green Hill. There have been constant complaints about this area and parking warning notices have been issued. Tyzack Road is another area facing similar issues.

Anti-social behaviour has been fairly low around Terriers. There has been growing concern regarding the car parks at Windsor drive which is included in the ASB car patrols. Successful drug warrants have been enforced in Kennett Close and Windsor Drive during May. If you suspect drugs or anything else illegal is going on in your neighbourhood then please contact the Police on the 101 number.

Theft of registration plates is becoming more frequent with this often committed overnight. The plates are then used to commit further crime. Please be weary where your vehicle is parked and possibly consider surveillance to help solve the issue. Page 22

### Summer at St Francis' Church

I mentioned in my last contribution to T&T News that in spring 2017 South Bucks Hospice will be moving into new, purpose-built premises on the Kingswood First School site. Links between the Hospice and St Francis' Church go back a long way. Members of the congregation have been part of the team of volunteers there more or less since the Hospice opened its doors, and clergy from the church have been occa-

sional visitors since the 1990s. We are now moving into a new phase of this partnership. During the six weeks of the Lenten fast members of the congregation raised over £2,500 for the work of the Hospice, occasional training sessions for Hospice volunteers have been held in the church building, and since Easter we have hosted a weekly "Knit, Craft and Natter" session, jointly with the Hospice, in the church building on Wednesdays at 11.00 a.m. The group which meets includes both members of the church congregation and people who have no other connection with St Francis. All are welcome to join them for a couple of hours of activity and conversation in pleasant company.

Meanwhile, people at St Francis continue to be engaged in supporting people in need both locally and in the Middle East. The congregation is a long-standing supporter of the work of One Can Trust, making regular contributions to the Trust's food bank. The church building has for several months been a collection point for donations to refugees in the Middle East and in the camps around Calais and Dunkergue. Bedding, clothing and toys dropped off at the church have formed part of consignments going to France, Greece and Syria. At present the storage at both High Wycombe – Donations for Refugees and Jungle Solidarity are full to bursting with clothes. What is needed by Donations for Refugees is food and medicines, in particular:

- Tinned vegetables, lentils, soup, fish (no meat or gelatine)
- Rice, couscous, pasta
- Lentils, nuts and dried fruit
- Long life milk, Flour, protein bars
- Biscuits, Sweets and chocolate (no gelatine)
- Baby food (no glass jars)
- Toiletries & Medicines (paracetamol, cough syrup, etc.)
- Bandages, plasters, etc.
- Sanitary towels (no tampons), Nappies & wipes
- New Baby bottles
- Formula (powdered or premixed)
- Donations of ambulances

## Highcrest Academy announces new Principal

Glen Burke has been appointed the new Principal of The Highcrest Academy and will succeed Shena Moynihan when she takes early retirement at the end of the academic year.



Mr Burke, 49, a father of two is currently a member of the academy's senior leadership team and joined Highcrest in 2001, the year it replaced the failing Hatters Lane School under the Government's 'Fresh-Start' scheme. He arrived shortly before the current principal and helped transform the school into an over-subscribed academy with massively improved exam results and a strong Ofsted rating.

He will officially take over on September 1 from Miss Moynihan, for whom he has the highest praise saying "It's been fantastic to work under such an inspirational Principal for the best part of 15 years and I have obviously learnt a great deal from her. I am in a privileged position because I have exceptional knowledge and understanding of the organisation and the successful systems and processes that have already been established".

Perhaps his proudest moment came in 2006 when he helped Highcrest to gain Specialist Schools Status as a technology college, which brought in a one-off £100,000 grant from the Government, plus £129 extra per pupil over the next four years. He was pleased with the 'Good' rating awarded this year to Highcrest by Ofsted, and delighted with the praise showered on the school in the inspectors' report.

Chairman of Governors Chris Turner said: "Having to recruit a successor to take the academy forward on our journey led to a number of sleepless nights. We had a number of very experienced and credible candidates for the post, and therefore a hard decision to make. It gave me great pleasure to be able to offer the post to Glen, a worthy successor to take us forward into the future."
