Back in February frontline air ambulance staff treated students from The Highcrest Academy to a special tour showing them around their helicopter and answering questions. The school send 11 pupils to RAF Benson on a fact finding mission as part of the academy's year long commitment to support Thames Valley Air ambulance as its chosen charity.



The students who visited the base were winners of a special Highcrest competition which asked students to submit questions to be put forward to crew members. Questions included How Stressful is it working long hours? What do you do in a life or death situation? How long does it take to train as a paramedic or pilot? What equipment do you use when there is a patient on board?

The group were first given a tour of the helicopter and then afterwards talked with paramedic Neil Plant and pilot Alf Gasparro for a Q & A session. The air ambulance is called out on average three times a day.

# Buckinghamshire Healthcare WHS

A new service recently launched by Buckinghamshire Healthcare NHS Trust aims to help people get more of the care they need closer to home.

From April 2017 the trust started to introduce new developments to the way care is delivered in the community and is investing over £1m to expand community services. This will double the number of outpatient appointments offered at some community hospitals, provide short term support packages to bridge the gap between home and hospital to over 3000 people and reduce hospital admissions. It will also be seeing 350 people through a new frailty assessment service.

The developments will include:

- The launch of community hubs at Marlow and Thame Hospitals
- Frailty Assessment Clinics
- Locality integrated teams to provide joined up care
- Rapid response intermediate care
- Community care coordinator

The trust will monitor how well things work over the next six months and use what is learnt for any final plans, with a view to a further expansion of the scheme to other parts of the county.

Very sadly, Jason and his wife Clara's two-and-a half-year-old daughter Maude died of sepsis in 2011. He dedicated his 2015 BAFTA award to her and has actively campaigned to raise awareness of sepsis and its symptoms. Jason is also an Ambassador of UK Sepsis Trust.

He said: "The physical and emotional trauma of losing your child is overwhelming, but Child Bereavement UK provide a touchstone that you can access, giving you practical tools to help you carry your loss with you as you move forward. # **Totteridge Recreation Ground**

A consultation summary report has been issued into possible developments at Totteridge Recreation ground. This follows on from a questionnaire that was distributed in 2013 to residents living nearby and followed up by a workshop to capture local residents views on community and open space facilities. The results from the workshop were used to inform Wycombe District Council so decisions could be made about future community and sports facilities.

The aim of the consultation was to find out:

- Did people use Totteridge recreation Ground?
- Within the Recreation Ground which location was preferred for a community hall?
- Which of the open space developments they thought would be most used by people.
- Would they support improvement to cricket facilities so a local team can play there?
- From a free text area to find any other comments not covered by the prescribed questions.

The consultation period ran from 21st November 2016 to 12th January 2017. The council received 56 completed questionnaires plus one letter by post and four e-mails.

Responses gave a majority support to:

- Using the recreation ground (Almost all)
- New Community Hall at the car park end
- Support for improvement to cricket provision
- New circular path with lots saying they would use the facility

Other areas such as new seating, gym equipment, outdoor tennis tables, ground trampolines, a ball wall, crickets nets, improved cricket pitch and table, new tennis and multi game courts all received support where some people would use the facilities.



# Highcrest enterprise team lights up Lithuanian trade fair

Enterprising Highcrest Academy students saw their name in lights after inventing a new gadget to give people a cheap way to hook up neon lighting. The invention was so successful that five Year 10 students and two teachers from the school were flown to Lithuania in March to showcase it at an international trade fair. The students were part of a Young Enterprise company called Mörk Valo formed at the academy. The company has already sold dozens of the kit. which retails at £4.99 and costs £2.89 to produce.



Christopher Humphries, Business teacher and Young Enterprise Co-ordinator at the academy, says Highcrest was the only Bucks school represented at the international fair. In all, it was one of just three UK schools among the 50-strong group of companies at the event. Pupils had to give presentations and present a video about their product. Mr Humphries said: "It was an incredible experience. I was very proud of our students who were brilliant. They were at a disadvantage because most of the other schools represented had students who were four to five years older than ours. but our team performed so well." The inspiration for the kit came after a visit to the God's Own Junkyard in London, which exhibits neon artwork.

Ruby Mitchell. 14, who was one of the five-strong team that flew to Lithuania. explained: "I visited the junkyard in London and wanted to buy a light but then I saw it had a £200 price tag and thought we could come up with a simpler alternative for people to use. "The trip to Lithuania was a really good experience and helped us open up a bit and become more confident." Fellow student Robert Wallace said: "I really enjoyed the trip. It was interesting to see the other enterprise groups and products. I learnt how to present my product and gained quite a lot of confidence from doing so."

The kits, which are packaged in a box, are made of electroluminescent wire connected to a battery pack. They allow, for example, people to put up neon displays of their artwork or make colourful lighting displays on their walls. Humza Akhtar, 15, who is Managing Director of Mörk Valo, added: "We sold 25 kits at the Eden centre when we had a stall there earlier this year. We believe that the reason why we had a successful outcome was because our product was new and unique."

The success of the project comes after Highcrest was named last year as the UK winner of a major European schools award project. Assistant Headteacher Gaynor Weldon was flown out by competition organisers to Riga in Latvia on September 22 to collect Highcrest's prize in the Entrepreneurial School Awards.

# **Annual Crime Figures Published**

The annual crime figures across the Thames Valley policing area were published on 3rd May.

Overall crime in the Wycombe district increased by 6.4% which faired better than the figure across the force of 7.2%. There were some areas where crime had significantly decreased however such as robbery which this year went down by -16.2%. Shoplifting on the other hand saw an increase of 26.9% and making off without payment was up 25%. Homicide saw the biggest rise of 100% but in context there were just 2 incidents over the year up from one in 2015/16 and none in 2014/15.

Crimes against society saw an increase of 11%. This included a 10% increase in drug offences, 13.7% for trafficking and 9.3% for possession.

Hate crime overall was up but religious incidents recorded fell significantly by 67%. Disability recorded crime was up 20% but non crime occurrences were down by 22%. Domestic abuse recorded crime was also up by 9%.

# The Balls Rolling on Wycombe Lotto

Wycombe District Council will be among the first few local authorities in the country to launch its own community lottery to benefit good causes. The tickets go on sale in June priced at £1 each with 60p from each ticket sale going towards local good causes. The first

draw is due to take place in July and then weekly thereafter.

The Lotto was formally launched by the Mayor on 24th May 2017 and will have a jackpot prize of £25,000 for matching six numbers. There will be other cash prizes of £2,000, £250 and £25 plus a chance to win three free tickets.

There will be two parts to the Wycombe lotto scheme. Local good causes will be able to join up and promote their own dedicated webpage to raise funds. When people buy Wycombe Lotto tickets directly through their preferred local good cause 50p in every pound spend by players using this method will go to that cause. A further 10p will go into the general community chest fund and the remaining 40p will be put towards the prizes, operating costs and VAT.

Players who do not wish to support a specific cause will still be able to play with the full 60p in every pound going into the general community chest.

Wycombe joins a handful of councils currently running local lotteries including Aylesbury Vale, Portsmouth and Corby. If you work or volunteer for a good cause and would like to find out more e-mail: wycombe.lotto@wycombe.gov.uk

#### Summer at St Francis' Church

## "The light shines through them"

This is a politics-free column

What is a saint? Who is a saint? When I ask that question I am not thinking about people with haloes who appear in stained-glass windows or in paintings. In the Christian scriptures the word "saint" is applied to every


follower of Jesus Christ in much the same way that Muslims refer to all who follow the way of Islam as "believers". In everyday speech, however, it has a more precise meaning. If we say of someone "He" (or more commonly, perhaps, "she") "is a real saint", we are not talking about their faith but their behaviour. A "saint" may be to all outward appearances a very ordinary person, but their actions go beyond the ordinary in the way they show love and goodness at work in a human life. They are, to quote the motto of our local Churches Together group on the eastern side of the town, "ordinary people called to do extraordinary things for God" – even though they may not have any clear idea of who God might be.

Each major faith tradition has its own way of recognising and honouring those who are especially close to God, and especially those in whom that closeness has been remembered for generations after their death. During the summer, many Christian saints (or should that be "Saints" - with a capital "S" marking them out as Special?) are remembered in the Church's calendar with a holy (=special) day. It is from the keeping of those days that we get the word "holiday", because in times past people did not work on such days. Many of these Saints are people who are linked very closely with the life and death and resurrection of Jesus – and not always in a good way. While the list of summer Saints includes Barnabas, who was described in one of the earliest Christian writings as "a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith", and Mary Magdalene, the first witness of the resurrection of Jesus, it also includes Simon Peter, who denied three times that he knew Jesus, and Thomas, who doubted the reality of the resurrection. That they are recognised as "Saints" is a reminder that nobody gets it right all the time.

The best definition of a saint that I have heard is one given by a young child, who went to church regularly and was fascinated by the pictures of Saints in the stained-glass windows, particularly loving the bright sunny days when the light streamed through the glass and brought out the rich colours. One day at school the teacher asked the question with which I began: "What is a saint?" The child was the first to raise a hand and to answer, "They are special people. The light shines through them". By that answer the child may have meant the light of a sunny day, but there is also a deeper meaning. The light that shines through a Saint is not sunlight, but the light of God's goodness and God's love.

# Your Community.....Getting Involved

In this day and age of the computer, tablet and smartphone finding a world of information is nothing more than a click of the mouse or tap of the touchscreen away. But even with this technology at hand knowing what is around locally is not always easy. Below are just a few organisations, groups and public groups you may wish to get involved with. Even if none of the below are of interest then you are always free to click or tap away for more information.

#### W.I. (Women's institute)

As the name suggest this one is for the Ladies. Locally we have two active groups, Terriers W.I. and Wycombe Wenches. Both are regular contributors to this magazine but more importantly welcome new members.

#### Men in sheds

Men in sheds is a place where men of all ages can come along and take part in activities similar to what they would do either at home or in the garden but with the bonus of like minded men providing good company. A typical "Shed" provides materials, equipment and tools to enable members to develop interests and get involved in productive activities either using existing skills or learning new ones.

## **NAG's (Neighbourhood Action Groups)**

A NAG is an initiative set up to deal with key issues identified by the community. The group is co-ordinated locally by Thames Valley Police. Typically NAG's consist of residents including young people, district and parish Councillors, representatives from the business community, Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators and the local Policing team. Each NAG usually identifies three key priorities for the policing team to address with the assistance of the community.

#### **Scouts, Guides & Sports Clubs**

There are several local groups and clubs you can join locally. All are run by volunteers for the benefit of young people although of course in the case of sports clubs there are those that cater for adults too. Some are local while others may involve travelling a little further across High Wycombe.
