#### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

In our preview edition Jim Tanner's article on Neighbourhood Watch looked at if it was needed. I think the resounding sound from those who are involved in such schemes is yes.

As the darker nights are now with us and will be even more so when the clocks go back at the end of October Neighbourhood Watch is even more likely to become a vital 'tool' in reducing crime. Across the Wycombe District there are several schemes operating with new ones opening all the time.

Neighbourhood Watch schemes are all run by volunteers who live in the area in which the scheme operates. Generally each group of houses, flats or other dwellings has a co-ordinator whose job it is to act as a contact point and distribute out information that may be of assistance in reducing crime. The schemes are supported by a district wide association and by Thames Valley police who operate a Ringmaster system. Ringmaster is a system of message distribution most of which is now done by e-mail although this can be picked up by telephone for those without on-line access.

Starting a scheme is easy and does not require a large amount of time to start making an impact on local problems. Signs advising a Neighbourhood Watch area are a deterrent in themselves are with the eyes and ears of scheme members can help make it a 'no go area' for thieves. As well as burglary there are of course other types of anti-social behaviour to be tackled but again the trouble makers can be identified, reported to the Police and action taken as necessary.

The meeting will be a chance for members and co-ordinators to hear about progress during the year and about new schemes that have started. There will also be a financial report and the election of the committee.



# OBSTACLES IN THE WOOD ... A WALK THROUGH KINGS WOOD

With a warm summers day in the offering and a bit of spare time at the weekend your editor and trusty assistant decided it was time to enjoy a walk in the local wood. Living in a somewhat urban environment as we do on the edge of High Wycombe it is good to know a little bit of the country-side is so close at hand.

On entering Kings Wood we could not help noticing a few tree branches that appeared to have fallen across the pathways. Nothing unusual it that perhaps as a few broken branches are common in woods where trees are often close together are of course at the mercy of all the weather can throw at them.

However as we continued through the wood one could not help but suspect there was a pattern to these fallen branches that perhaps had not been as a result of nature. Indeed it soon became apparent that the branches appear to have been laid as a obstacle course perhaps by local residents. There was of course no one who could give an answer but our suspicions were that these were laid for a reason.

Perhaps they have been laid to stops cyclists or motorcyclists riding through the wood. A very sensible idea perhaps but likely to cause terrible injury to anyone trying to do so. Beyond this of course they have made it difficult for anyone to walk through and enjoy the woods especially if you are not particularly mobile. For anyone using a wheelchair this is one wood that now has to be avaioded as it would almost be impossible to get through. At one point the branches were little more than about 10 metres apart with some fairly large and heavy making moving them very difficult.

Through the power of this magazine it will be interesting if someone knows the answer to why all the branches are across paths in the wood. Who put them there? Did they think of accessibility for all when doing this or just themselves? Maybe we shall never know.
