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News from your 13 local churches

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Terriers and Amersham Hill NAG

Terriers and Amersham Hill's Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) has now been running for over a year and a half. It aims to identify, address and tackle local issues and concerns and is a working party between residents, police, and the local council. The NAG meets every 6 weeks on a Monday at the Royal Grammar School, Amersham Road at 7pm. The 3 main issues highlighted were **Speeding and Anti Social use of Vehicles**, **Burglary**, and **Parking**.

With speeding being the first priority, the NAG initially identified 8 roads within Terriers and Amersham Hill which appeared to have a speeding issue and assessed these with the use of a Speed Indication Device (SID) to narrow them down further. The top 3 in the area were Totteridge Lane, Lucas Road and Green Road. Many of you may have noticed the regular attendance of a mobile speed van at the Terriers car park in recent months – there is a definite problem with this part of the road, with continuing speeding – and with a primary school nearby, this is quite a concern. Speeding drivers have also been stopped and warned in an effort to encourage people to consider their speed when sometimes they may not realise how fast they are going. We have also stopped drivers and asked them what would help to stop them speeding, the results were: signs, speed cameras and education.

We have also run a competition at Highworth Combined School to design a poster about speeding – the winning design is now being featured on the school fence at the point where people start to speed down the hill towards Terriers crossroads. We are also hoping to obtain funding in the near future to secure hi visibility jackets for every child at both Highworth and Hamilton primary schools. With winter unfortunately not so far away anymore, these should ensure that children walking to and from school will be seen by all drivers even in fading light. If you know of a local or other business that would be willing to donate towards the cost of these which is in the region of £2400, we would be extremely grateful as the NAG is a voluntary group and has no funding of its own.

Burglary in the area has fallen dramatically which is great news. All houses in the area should have received information through their doors regarding burglary and reducing the risk of it happening to you, especially during the summer months. This is also as a result of the NAG discussing issues and deciding how people need to be informed and which information is important to get across.

Parking continues to be a problem, with many houses having more cars than they have parking spaces for. Consideration should be given to wheelchair and pushchair access on paths, plus obstructions on the road. Letters have been sent to roads where the problem is worst just reminding people to consider these issues. The NAG is working on solving some of these.

The group has a website to give anyone with internet access the opportunity to keep abreast of local issues, concerns and the activities of the NAG. This can be found at http://www.amershamhillandterriersnag.blogspot.com. It so far has limited comments on it, but everyone is encouraged to use it to build up an online community and awareness of any prospective problems in an anonymous manner. It also explains the NAG in more details. In particular, views on parking problem areas are being sought.

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COMMUNITY NEWS ROUND—UP

Buckinghamshire Businesses Receive a helping Hand

Fourteen local businesses in Buckinghamshire have received funding to help them beat the recession, as the first round of the Business Challenge Funds are allocated.

In June, the County Council and Buckinghamshire Economic and Learning Partnership (BELP) set up the £100,000 Business Challenge Fund to support local enterprises get through the tough economic period. Businesses were able to bid for grants up to £5,000. There were 90 applications received.

Amongst the successful applicants was Adcal Labels a specialist sticker and label firm based in High Wycombe. Also winning an award were Hedgerail Pharmacy in Stoke Poges, 50 Plus - an online shop based in Chesham supporting the mature workforce and Hi Tide, a fish and Chip shop in Aylesbury.

The second wave of bidders has been reviewed by Business Link advisors and further awards are due to be made.

Funding available to strengthen community relations

Projects that will help strengthen community relations in the Wycombe district over the next two years through events, sport and intergenerational work have until Monday 9th November to apply for a share of over £140,000 from Wycombe District Council.

Awards will be assessed on the quality of the applications, against the eligibility criteria and must contribute to at least one of the project themes. Green Light for more taxis in Wycombe

At the quarterly forum held on 8th July for the Taxi trade in the Wycombe district, Councillor John Savage, Chairman of the regulatory and Appeals Committee, announced that Wycombe District Council will be lifting restrictions on the number of hackney carriage vehicles that can operate within the district. This change will take effect from 7th September 2009.

Delicious local food at the new Farmers Market

High Wycombe Town Partnership is joining forces with the Thames Valley Farmers Market Co-operative to create a new local produce market in Frogmoor. The new market will be launched on Saturday 19th September, and will be held every third Saturday of the month from 9am until 1pm.

Stalls will include Flexmore Farm from Chalfont St Giles, Rayners from Wooburn Common and The Complete Pig from Britwell Salome.

Meanwhile a nastier Pig Adolf Hitler, had invaded Poland and we children would be off to Priory Road - with our gas masks.......

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TOTTERIDGE ROAD - ABODE OF GANGS AND PIGS

Were you born "right side of the tracks"? I had the good fortune, so I thought to live as a boy on the right side of Totteridge Hill. Those on the Healey Avenue side went to Gordon Road and Spring Gardens Schools. But we "lucky" kids on the Rowan Avenue side went to Totteridge Road and Priory Road. Actually all four schools gave generations of children a good grounding, moral as well as educational.

Anyway I was proud to be going to Totteridge Road Mixed Infants School. Despite that I didn't arrive until a year after my mate, John, although he was - and still is only a day older than me. He was the eldest child in the family and quite a tough guy. I was an only child, whose mother kept her precious son at home until the last possible moment - when I reached the age of five. Tearfully at last, one wintery January morning in 1936 she handed me into the tender care of the sweet-natured Miss Peters, who had only recently taken over the headship from - so people said - the near-aptly named Miss Hipwell.

Sand-trays and squeaky slates were still order of the day and I quickly settled into writing my name and address several times for identification and next-of-kin purposes. It was all very pleasant - until playtime. The school seemed to be ruled by two gang-leaders who with their followers now surrounded me, demanding to know which gang I was going to join. Looking at "Fatty" Abrahams with his large proportions and threatening face and being a coward myself, I didn't need to think long, although the other leader Jimmy Richardson - well-spoken and polite - certainly appealed to me more. He also had most of the girls.

Then John spoke - the first of many such occasions over the years. "He can do what he likes!" declared my Protector. "And if anybody doesn't like it, I'll bash 'em up!" Actually I went from one gang to the other, changing as and when "persuaded". Anyway it didn't seem to matter much, as activity was limited to rushing around and calling one another names. There were no knives and no violence greater than a mild push or being dragged into the wrong toilets.

The teachers gave Mum good reports of me and she was sure her little lad was going to go far - so long as he didn't accept lifts from roaming villians, looking for easy prey like me. As there were only about ten cars in the whole area at the time - and most of them were driven by the vicar, the doctor and other professionals, risk of kidnap didn't seem very great. Then one afternoon, when Mum was late meeting me from school, John's uncle stopped and offered us a lift in his car. At the gate Mum was told the dreadful news by other Mums: they'd seen her David getting into a strangers car, which set off in the direction of the town. When a little later the "murderer" dropped me off at home, my mum hugged me and used
