Freemantle Road - The Big Lunch

Fremantle Road in Terriers took part in The Big Lunch on Sunday 18th July this year and what a success it was!

For anyone who hasn't heard of The Big Lunch, it was started in 2009 by The Eden Project in Cornwall as a way of encouraging neighbours and communities all across the country to get to know each other better, or even to meet for the first time! It all happens on the same day every year, up and down the country and everyone is welcome to start one in their road or neighbourhood. Big Lunches can be held in gardens, public spaces or community centres, subject to permissions needed. You can even apply to the council for a road closure in advance if you would like to hold it in your street.

The Big Lunch website has a wealth of information on how it started, who gets involved and pictures from all over the UK of people partying in the streets and having a ball – all while building stronger communities and friendships, across all ages, races and social standing.

Fremantle Road's Big Lunch 2010 had an attendance of about 40 people, lots of whom had lived in the road for many years and quite a few who hadn't met or were new to the area. Everyone agreed it was a fantastic day, the bunting was up, music filled the air, the weather got warmer as the day went on, everyone brought food to share, from BBQ food and salads to delicious Asian/Indian cuisine, and what was meant to be 12pm – 2pm ended up going on until 8.30pm!

This year's Fremantle Road Lunch was set up by a resident of the road, Emily, who has lived there for 3 years, after she heard about it in May of this year. "It wasn't hard to set up, all I did was pop some flyers through everyone's doors a few weeks ahead of the date, and a reminder the week before with details about the Lunch and contact details for people to RSVP or get more information. Some people were already busy or weren't sure what it was about but the feedback after the event has been brilliant!" she says. "I now have a list of people really keen to get together next year to start planning The Big Lunch 2011 to make it even bigger and better next time and share the planning and set up. What was lovely is that everyone chipped in, brought food and drink to share, helped set up the gazebo, brought their garden furniture into the cul de sac and the atmosphere was really lovely! We all really got to know our immediate neighbours even better and met lots that we didn't know – I recommend anyone to give it a go in their street next year, it was really relaxed and a fantastic day – and all the children played together while the adults chatted, ate and drank into the evening!"

Introducing Steve Baker MP.....

I should like to take this opportunity to say how privileged I feel to be the MP for Wycombe. I recognise the trust you have placed in me and I promise to honour this by representing you faithfully in parliament and in the constituency. There are many challenges facing the country at the moment, and the new coalition government is taking many hard decisions. The most significant challenge ahead is the need to tackle the budget deficit. This needs to be done in a way which is both responsible and fair. But it would be a mistake to believe that this Government is just about sorting out the deficit. I want to work with others to change our country for the better.

Plans have already been announced for the long-overdue reform of schools, hospitals, prisons, the police and the welfare system. We want to replace the old top -down system so that public services are accountable to the people and not central government bureaucracy. We want to put power in the hands of individuals, families and communities so they can build the good society in which they want to live.

Locally, my top priority remains health services. I have had numerous meetings to discuss how to maximise services in Wycombe. One of the first people I met was Anne Eden, the Bucks Hospital NHS Trust Chief Executive, to put my concerns directly. I have also met Simon Burns MP, a Minister in the Department of Health, and have told him plainly and openly that I, and the people of Wycombe, want good healthcare to be provided locally, and this means keeping services in Wycombe hospital.

I have also taken action on other local issues. These include, amongst others, opposing the proposed high-speed rail link, talks with the local police superintendent to discuss crime and police priorities, and discussions with County Council officers on education and proposed changes to adult social care.

I have met many people at my constituency advice bureaux, and have dealt with problems ranging from hospital treatment, and wind turbines to tax and benefits. I would be pleased to help you with any problem you might have – please ring the constituency office on 01494 448408 if you would like an appointment to meet me. Anti - Social behaviour

The following areas have been highlighted by members of the public, who have raised concern of Anti social behaviour.

Linchfield –We are continually having reports of ASB in and around Linchfield mainly by the garages at the bottom. We would like residents from Lichfield to contact the police with any information that can assist us in identifying / dealing with offenders who seem to be congregating from around 9pm till 4am in the morning.

Underwood Road/ Lower Furney Close/Acorn Close and Bowerdean Road - Groups of youths being rowdy and causing a nuisance, additional Police patrols will be carried out in these areas. We urge members of the public to report any Anti-social Behaviour so that local officers can deal with this robustly. If you are experience any problems of anti-social behavior please contact your Neigbourhood Policeing Team on 0845 8 505 505 or the Anti Social Beahaviour Officer, Adam Rigg at Wycombe District Council on telephone number 01494 421835. Parking

This month we will continue to target our parking patrols around the Bowerdean area where there seems to be an increase of complaints from the residents, main areas for concern are: Bowerdean Road, Arnison Avenue and Mayhew crescent

The main cause for concern around theses location is that cars are parking on the corners of junction making it very difficult and dangerous for other road users. We Urge members of public to ring us if you do come across any vehicles causing an obstruction or a danger to other road users and pedestrians. Police Community Support Officer's (PCSO) will continue to patrol areas highlighted as a concern and deal with offences robustly. During this month 5 fixed penalty notices (£30 pound fines) have been issued for obstruction.

Crime information

We have started to see a steady increase in Burglaries around the Bowerdean and Totteridge area. At present the main areas of concern are

- South Drive / New Drive / North Drive and East Drive
- The Crescent
- Healey Avenue

We are urging all members of the public and local residents to remain vigilant at all times and if you see anyone acting suspiciously then to call the police on the non emergency number 08458 505 505 and report it.

Basham and Cheese—Totteridge Hill's Double Act

Basham and Cheese were not comedians. These two men in their Totteridge Hill shops helped keep us fed in World War II. Bill Basham was a frightening figure, wielding his long knife or chopper, his 'white' apron covered with blood, as he dispensed the shilling per head's (5p) worth of meat and the occasional sausage to his grateful ladies and barked the amount to his cashier to ring up. But like Jones the Butcher in TV's "Dads Army" he always came across as a very fair man. And I loved his sawdust floor.

The other side of Healey Avenue the aptly-named Alf Cheese ran his dairy business. Milk was one of the few unrationed food items. Also in those days milk was not sold in other shops. Nor were there any other dairies in the area. So Alf delivered milk to most houses in Bowerdean. He must surely have had helpers—apart from his wife Emmy who ran the shop—and a vehicle but I never saw that either, as he strode along Rowan Avenue, always in his gum boots (straight from the farm?), pulling a trolley loaded with crates and bottles. He was a fresh-faced, civilised man, who could always spare a moment to chat. But when we saw his approaching figure "out of hours" we were filled with dread. His shop phone was probably the only one in the area and messages of death and disaster often came via Alf who would turn out at any hour of day or night to deliver the bad news.

The next shop down the hill is the only one which has kept its identity to the present day. The news agents in those days were the Brodericks. He was a glum businessman who always looked as if he would rather have been out on the golf course. He was a man of few words. His wife had plenty. But as she was very deaf, he didn't bother to reply. Having to get up early to mark the papers was visibly a daily annoyance to her. Sweets were not rationed but were very scarce, so you had to be particularly nice, to get any. One morning, as I went to collect the newspapers for my round, for some reason she offered a whipped-cream walnut (a rare chocolate treat) to a girl—who said she didn't like them! She was lucky to get out of the shop unscathed. Mrs B. ranted at the ungrateful girl, while the sycophantic customers voiced their own love of the delicacy and their high regards for the proprietor's generosity. She didn't hear and her husband was playing a crucial shot at the time. I escaped to do my round—with the usual little bag of sweets in my pocket......

Leonard Hortin who kept a grocer's shop up the hill could have been a kindred spirit to troubled newsagent, Mr Broderick. He had come down from running an antiques shop in Beaconsfield to serving us council house tenants. But he was genial to all and brought real competition to the co-op next door. His prim sister was a contrast to her glamorous, outgoing sister-in-law. The shop made an interesting visit for an impressionable chapel lad! Add this to a twopenny (1p) bag of chips from the Wakefield twins next door (the highest shop in the parade) and I was in heaven until my 'caring'
