Forward (representing the Women's Institute); Mrs. John Dothie, Mrs. D. Hallett (Not-So-Young Club); Mrs. Eileen Pearce (Liberal group); Mr. W.D. Begg (Morking Men's Club); Mr and Mrs. Denis Hayes; Mr. Simon Dothie (Conservative Association); Mr. D.E. Strunge (Tatsfield school PTA); Mr and Mrs. M. Wilmot; and the Nev. Michael Umrin (St Mary's shurch).

The Chairman said the meeting which had been called to consider the preparation of a village appraisal, would be informal. He hoped they would be able to decide whether a village appraisal was desirable and, if so, to appoint a small group to prepare such an appraisal.

Such a group would be asked to solls to information about the village covering a wide range of matters, among them to discover the work pattern, residential and transport needs of the community, the shopping pattern and needs of the village and the recreational needs of both young and old.

Such matters as education and the schools children attended after leaving the village school - and the desires of parents and potential parents and problems arising from the possible closure of village shops and the medical services in general and the care of old people would come within the survey which would lead to a considered assessment of the needs and future shape of the village: including the vexed question of how large they wanted Tatafield to be and where, if anywhere, building should be allowed.

He hoped the proposed group, if a stablished, would report to and work in close liaison with the Parish Council and other authorities.

Mr. Strange opened the ensuing debate. Parents, he claimed, wanted freedom of choice and were concerned that the school bus service would stop when othe last Tatsfield child had completed the course at Oxted. Mr. Strange suggested that a survey should be made to ascertain the views of parents. There was concern that children were leaving the village to be educated in a more suburban atmosphere.

Following some further discussion the Chairman remarked that education would clearly form an important part of any questionaire.

Mr. Hayes expressed doubts as to the value of the survey and instanced a number of developments which had been permitted against the wishes of the parish council.

The Chairman pointed out that attitudes had changed in recent years and he hoped Mr. Mayes was not being unduly possimistic.

Mr. Begg spoke of the proposed new working men's club, emphasising that the club had moved away from the former image of a 'gembling, drunken hell'. During discussion the Chairman made it clear that the Parish Council, though opposed to development on the suggested site, were anxious to help the club to solve its problems in a way which would be acceptable to all. Mr. Pearce pointed out the importance of deciding the population and area which was desirable for the village. Did they want a population of 2000 around that at present, or some limited expansion, say to 3000?

Mrs. Crofts pin-pointed the problem as a choice between a small, select village or one which was allowed to grow enough to encourage businesses to remain open, and the Rector also spoke of the choice between a rural community and something approaching a suburban one.

In reply to further debate the Chairman said present policy was basically to leave well alone.

Mr. Hayes asked that the question of the village's unmade roads should be included in any survey and Mr. Begg claimed that there was a good dual of squatting going on.

The principle of preparing a village appraisal having been approved by the meeting without dissent, the election of a committee to deal with the mattee in the way suggested was proceeded with.

Those elected were: Mr. P.N. Owen, Mrs. E. Pearce, Mrs. E.M.G. Player, Mr. S. Dothie, Mr. D. Hayes, Mr. H.W. Hunt and the Rev H. Unwin. The Chairman indicated that Mr. Pigram (District Council planning department) would be willing to co-operate with the Committee.

ETHUTES of a public meeting called by Tatsfield Parish Council to discuss the proposal to establish a motorway service area on the M25 at Clacketts Lane/Pitsey Wood held at Tatsfield Village Hall on Monday, December 5, 1977 at 8.15p.m.

Mr. P.N. Owen, Parish Council Chairman and District Council representative presided over a crowded attendance which residents of a number of neighbouring areas in Kent and Surrey.

Drawings and maps of the locality of the proposed service area and illustrating its likely effect were on display.

The Chairman explaing the proceedure to be adopted said he would be inviting Mr. Richard Carey of Limpsfield (whose family formerly lived at the Old Rectory) to discuss the environmental aspects of the proposal. After a general discussion it was proposed to put the following resolution: "That this mueting rejects all proposals to build a service area in or near the Clacketts Lane/Titsey Wood area".

If that proposed was accepted on separate votes by Tatafield residents and others it was proposed that the meeting should proceed to form an organisation to co-ordinate resistance to the proposals.

Mr. Owen said details were still not available and went on to outline the known histry of the suggestions. It was most unlikely that any decison would be reached before January or Pebruary, but it was impositant that individual views should be made known to Tandridge District Council as soon as possible.

It was estimated that if a service area was created it would be used by about 14,000 people every 24 hours - a prospect which, without any doubt, must make a very deep inroad into the rural amenities of the locality.

Mr. Carey expressed his views on environmental matters, pointing out that this area in the Green Belt was also one of outstanding natural beauty and its future was of considerable concern to all. The Mational Trust was among the bodies interested in a project which would be visible as far away at Limpsfield Chart, as well as from the escarpment of the North Bowns.

He was prepared to accept that the Department would make what efforts were possible to screen the site, but it was bound to be visible over a wide area by night as well as by day.

During a discussion lasting about an hour many points were made by local residents against the proposal.

Wr. Carey pointed out that the motorway was bound to be open for four years without a service area at this point - giving ample opportunity to assess the needs in fiew of the facts revealed and Mr. Greening (Oxted & Limpsfield Ameni ies Association) expressed doubts about the estimated traffic on the motorway - officially given as 60,000 vehicles a day in 1979.

At the chose of the discussion the resolution put by the Chairman was passed a majority of both Tatsfield residents and of the meeting as a whole voting in support of it.

Mr. Carey then read to the meeting the draft constituion of the Campaign Against Tatafield Service Area (CATSA).

These were adopted and the following officers and committee were elected: Chairman, Mr. W.R.C. Carey; tressurer, Hr. R.L. Davies; secretary, Mrs. A. Scott; Committee: Ers. A.M. McHugo, Mrs. F. Wrighley, Hr. E. Leslie, Mr. R.W. Pearse, Hr. P. Hartley and Mr. P.N. Owen.

Closing the meeting the Chairman announced that 5000 circulars had already been distributed and the District Council had already received 113 letters opposing the proposal.

At the end of the meeting those present were invited to enroll as members of the new bady.

MINUTES of the ANNUAL PARISH MESTING held at the Village Hall, Tatefield on Wednesday, March 30, 1977 at 8.0p.m.

PRESENT: Mr. P.W. Owen (Parish Council Chairman), presiding. The following members of the Parish Council were also present: Mr. R.W. Pearce, Mrs. M.E. Crofts, Mrs. M.L.G. Hession, Mrs. A.M. McHugo, Mrs. E.M.G. Player, and Mr. H.W. Hunt, with the Clerk (Mr. P.G. Reid).

Also present were Mrs. H. Dunn (Bistrict Council representative), Mr. J. MacFarlane (County Council representative) and 23 parishioners.

MINUTES of the annual parish meeting held on March 31, 1976 and of the special parish meeting held on November 10, 1977 were confirmed and signed.

REPORTS.

a. Chairman.

Reporting on the year'swork, Mr. Owen said an unusual situation arose after the election when there were six new members of the Council. He expressed thanks to Mrs. Crofts (the remaining member), former members and the Clerk for help given to the new members in taking up their task. The introduction of a thrice-weekly bus service to Exted had been welcomed, though there had been some requests for a longer stay in Oxted. Planning matters had occupied a good deal of Council time. All applications had now to be notified to the Farish Council which had made comments as appropriate. Considerable concern had been expressed at the growing urbanisation of Piggin Hill and representations had been made to Sir Geoffrey Howe, as well as County and District Councils. Parish Councils in the Tandridge District had supported the Councin's approach. The District Council had been asked to clarify the area in the village centre in which they were prepared to permit development and a reply was awaited. A footpath had been provided for the use of Crossways Court residents at the Council's request and efforts were being made to improve this acility. An increased rate had been requested from the District Council to enable the Council to meet reasonable demands which made by local organisations and to prevent the Council having to face the alternative of falling into Financial arrears or of making a demand on the District Council hich could only be met from borrowed money. Parking around the island in the village centre had caused much debate and by a majority parking lines had been requested as the only way od dealing with the proble, Following representations by the Council the County library stop near the school was re-instated by reducing the times at other stops.slightly. The twinning with Vern D'Anjou progress satisfactorily and about 60 visitors were expected in Tatsfield the following week-end. The re-decoration of the Village Hall had persuaded the Council to enter the Rest Kept Village Competition (with special reference to the hall) and it was hoped to make a special effort with the village as a whole, with the co-operation of local residents and organisations, in, 1978. Mr. Owen concluded by expressing his thanks to his solleagues on the Council, the village hall management countities and all others who had helped forward communal life during the past year.

b. Village Hall.

His report was adopted by the meeting.

The report of the Village Hall Management Committee, as c'roulated and filed was presented by the Chairman, Mr. M. Wilmot.

The Clerk reported that no nowleations had been received for the management committee, despite an amouncement on village notice boards.

Hr. Wilnot's report was adopted and during discussion it was agreed that in future comies of planning amplication lists should be sumplied to Mr. Hubbard for posting at the hall.

c. Primary School.

The Rev. Michael Unwin (Rector) presented a report on the primary school. a copy of which is filed with these minutes.
His report was adopted.

d. Village Fond Association.

Comprehensive reports on the work of the Fond Association were presented by Mr. A. Clarke and Fre. D. Geery.
Mrs. Geary detailed a number of proposals made to improve and heautify the pond.

It was reported that the Association which had been voted the remaining funds of the former Residents' Association had £240 in hand.
The reports were adopted.

d. District Council.

Mrs. Durn reported on her work on Tandridge District Council. She reiterated the concern expressed by Mr. Oven as to the urban sprawl extending from the direction of Biggin Hill and deal, assum other matters, with problems arising from a judgement of compact charges.

e. County Council.

Mr. J. MacFarlane reported on County Council matters and stressed the problems caused in Surrey by reason of the reduction of the rate support grant.

The county was nevertheless endeavouring to maintain essential services at a time of raging inflation coupled with the decrease in government support.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS.

A ceneral discussion ensued on a number of matters. When Mr. Softley questioned the additional rate provision sought by the Parish Council, the Chairman pointed out that the addition assumted to about 60m or 70m per household. Funds so made available would only be applied to matters calculated to be for the benefit of the tillage as a whole.

Dr Hichael Hession velcomed the policy now adopted.

After some further discussion the meeting ended at 10.0p.m. with refreshments served by Mrs. Crofts. The annual meeting of the Vern D'Anjou Association followed.

RULES AND CONSTITUTION OF "THE TATSFIELD VILLAGE POND ASSOCIATION".

1. TITLE.

"The Tatsfield Village Pond Association".

2. OBJECTS.

. To encourage restoration and maintenance of village pond so that it continues to be a centre of the village for posterity.

3. MEMBERSHIP.

Membership is open to residents of Tatsfield or other interested persons and organisations by payment of an entrance fee.

4. FUNDS.

Funds shall be raised by donations and social events. The financial year of the association shall run from January 1st to December 31st.

5. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The annual general meeting of the Tatsfield village pond association shall take place during March or April each year, at the discretion of the Committee. Twenty one days notice of the A.G.M. shall be given by public notice. The Quorum for an A.G.M. shall be 10.

The annual general meeting shall have the following duties:

- (a) To approve the annual report.
- (b) To approve the properly sudited accounts.
- (c) To elect the Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer and 5 other committee members. Nominations in writing with the nominees consent, shall be notified to the secretary not less than seven days before the A.G.M.
- (d) To approve any amendments to the rules and constitution.
- (e) To appoint an Hon. Auditor.

6. EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETINGS.

Extraordinary General Meetings may be called by not less than 10 members with twenty eight days notice to the secretary and the purpose stated.

7. THE COMMITTEE.

The Committee shall consist of eight members including the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. The committee shall invite the Parish Council to nominate an additional member. In the case of equality of votes the Chairman shall have the casting vote. No member shall have more than one vote.

. The committee retires annually and may seek re-election.

The quorum at a Committee meeting shall be 5.

8. ALTERATION TO RULES AND CONSTITUTION.

No alteration to the rules and constitution shall be made except by a resolution carried by at least two thirds of the members.

. 9. FREQUENCY OF MEETINGS.

There shall be a minimum of two meetings of the committee every year, of which at least one shall be open to the public.

10. SIGNING OF CHEQUES.

The bank mandate shall contain the signatures of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of which any two signatures be required on documents.

TABSFIELD SCHOOL AND THE EDUCATION CUTS. So far as our school is concerned the effects are slight. The school lost the services of two part time teachers who covered work with individuals and small groups of children. Some of their work is being covered by the Headteacher. It should been noted that numbers of children entering the school are falling, so that classes and 2 numbers are down by approx. 5 pupils on last year- and are some 20 and 23 pupils in each. The school's libary service for primary schools has paid its last visit. The school is offsetting the loss of this service by buying in some 100, new books. According to the headteacher the school is well stocked and has good resourc has an adequate number of teachers and a slightly falling rell(10 down of last year) and these factors offsett to a considerable extent the effects of the cuts in the classromm situation.

1976-1977

MEMBERS as at March 1, 1977.

Mrs. D. Hallett (booking secretary), Mrs. M. Hession, JF (Parish Council representative), Mr. K. Hubbard (hall supervisor), Mr. D. Johnson (hontreasurer), Mrs. A. Jupp, Mrs. E. Maxwell-Jones, Mrs. B. Softley, Mrs. W. Stevenson (hon. secretary), Mr. H. Tapsell and Mr. M. Wilmot (Chairman).

1. MEMBERSHIP.

We suffered a great loss when Mr. and Mrs. Slatter left Tatsfield. They had been the mainstay of the hall for very many years, filling for various periods all the offices of the 'anagement Committee. There is no doubt that their work saved the committee and, therefore, the ratepayers, hundreds of pounds and maintained a hall of which the village should be proud. The Committee wished them happiness in their new home and presented them with a chaque contributed by members of the committee.

We wore very fortunate in adding last September Mrs. D. Hallett and Mr. K. Hubbard to our membership. Mrs. Pallett has proved to be a very efficient booking secretary and Mr. Hubbard's excellent work as hall supervisor must be apparent to all users of the hall.

We were without an honorary secretary until February when Mrs. Stevenson volunteered for the job and is proving to be very competant and helpful.

Our membership at present is up to strength, in fact it is one over the number provided in the draft constitution.

For some years it has been necessary to exert a certain amount of persuation to obtain a counittee at all and volunteers have been co-opted to the management committee instead of following strictly the terms of the draft constitution. The co-opted members are: Mrs. D. Hallett, Mr. K. Hubbard, Mr. D. Johnson, Mrs. J.E. Maxwell-Jones and Mrs. Stevenson. It is now apprepriate to regularise the position.

Two members of the Committee, Messrs Tapsell and Wilmot stand down in accordance with the draft constitution. Mr. Tapsell offers himself for re-election.

We Recommend.

- a. That the total membership of the Tatsfield Village Hall Management Committee be increased from nine to ten members.
- b. That the following co-opted members be re-elected members of the Tatsfield Village Hall Hanagement Committed: Mrs. D. Hallett, Mr. K. Hubbard, Mr. D. Johnson, Mrs. J.E. Maxwell-Jones and Mrs. W. Stevenson.
- c. That Mr. H. Tapsell be re-elected a member of the Tatsfield Village Hall Management Committee.

2. CONSTITUTION.

It appears that the constitution approved by the Parish Council on February 13, 1967 was found to have a number of gaps and a draft of a revised document was forwarded to the Parish Council on April 6, 1968 but no formal approval can be traced by the Management Committee. The Committee has, however, enhancement to follow this draft which, in turn, has proved to have a number of defects.
We are of opinion, therefore, that a fresh attempt should be made to bring this matter up to date.

3. INTERNAL RE-DECORATION.

The work of internal re-decoration of the hall has been completed at a cost of £1990.

4. CHARGES.

We reviewed the charges made for the use of the hall in July last and were able not to seek any increase. We hope to hold charges down for a further period but that will depend upon the matters mentioned in paragraphs 5 and 6 below.

5. OUTSTANDING WORK, ETC.

Following the completion of the internal re-decoration, a detailed inspection of equipment, etc., was carried out with the result that a number of additional jobs need to be done and some equipment repaired or replaced.

Some items will need professional treatment, some will be done by member

Some items will need professional treatment, some will be done by members of the Counittee, but it is felt that the help of users of the hall and other interested persons should be sought to deal with the following:

Constitute room: ease doors to sink cupboard and repaint inside and out.

Kitchen: Paint insides of cupboards and paint edge of threshold to back door. Paint bolts etc.

Hall: Strip and re-varnish window sills.

Stage: Paint edge, stain floor, varnish floor flap and step risers.

Small Committee From: New 'Formica' top to one stacking table.

Resove old paint splashes and re-polish window sill.

Chairs: Noodan: varnish.
Stacking: repair or renew five canvas seats.

Entrance Porch: Ro-doccrate inside.

Offers of help, please to the Hall Superviser (Mr. K. Hebbard of Greensleeves, Massacur Road - telephone: Tatsfield 491).

6. COOKER.

We have been asked to instal cooking facilities in the kitchen for use on a small number of occasions each year. We have considered the various

methods which could be adapted, namely:

1. An electric cooker: the average 4-ring cooker consumes 12kw [all on and used at this rate for only 20 minutes during the winter would involve an extra charge of f134.88 per annum plus a charge forthe electricity consumed by the cooker. To expect only those who use the cooker to meet this extra cost is not feasible and it would follow, therefore, that the charge to all users would have to be raised.

- 2. Butane gas cooker permanently installed. We would not wish to have butane cylinders permanently within the hall and to site them outside the hall would involve too high a security risk.
- 3. Fortable Butane gas cooker. We came to the conclusion that the fairest way of dealing with this matter was for those who wish to undertake cooking to hire a portable butane gas cooker them--selves for use at such events as they may wish.

We would emphasise that no additional electrical apparatus of any kind may be used in the hall without the prior agreement of the hall supervisor who may have to arrange for some of the heaters to be disconnected to compensate for the extra current consumed.

7. GENERALLY.

I would conclude this report by thanking the various members of the Committee for their support and for taking on the many jobs which require to be done. This is a working committee, not a talking one.



MINUTES of annual parish meeting held at the Village Hall on Wednesday, March 31, 1976 at 8.0p.m.

PRESENT: Dr. M. Hessien (Parish Council chairman), presiding, Mrs. M. Crofts, Mr. K. Clarke, Mr. K. Goodchild and the Nev M. Unwin (parish council members), Mrs. H. Dunn (Tandridge District Council) and between 50 and 60 parishioners with Mr. P.G. Reid (Clerk to parish council) and two Press representatives.

APOLOGIES were received from Mr. J. Softley and Mr. D Hayes (parish council members) and from Mr. A Powell and Mr. F. Langford (of Bran Lan Hamsey College, Brasted, who are prearing a study of Tatefield).

CHADMAN'S REPORT.

The Chairman said this would be the last meeting arranged by this Council, which had lasted for five years instead of the normal three, because of

local government re-organisation.

During an interesting and stimulating year ten council meetings had been held. Dr. Hession recalled the 900th anniversary celebrations of the parish church, at the end of which Mr. Leveson Gower had intimated that he wished to present

the greens to the council. During the year the twimning with Vern D'Anjou had been firmyl established and had provided what all had hoped it would provide: a valuable link with a French community which had attracted wider village support than many other local activities.

An increasing number of people had attended parish council meetings and become

more involved in village affairs.

The chairman recalled major repairs carried out to the village hall, plans to erect a village sign at the foot of Ricketts Hill and the agreement to restrict

parking around the 'island' opposite the village hall.

A major failure had been the attempt to innugurate a bis service to Oxted to help shoppers.

The Social Group led by Mrs Bodds had proved successful, the Council meeting the wost of a meeting place.

Various road safety matters had been taken up but no solution had been found in relation to Rag Hill. The large beech tree opposite the Church Read junction with the Croydon Read might shortly be felled to improve visib ility. Mr. Hayes continued to represent the Council on the Surrey Association of Town

and Parish Councils.

VILLAGE HALL.

Mr. M. Wilmot presented the report of the Village Hall Management Committee, a copy of which is filed with these minutes.

TheRevm M. Unwin presented a report on the primary school which was likely next term to have 130 pupils. A great number of activities and visits went on.
As a result of recent cuts announced in a ducation the school would lose a part time. teacher and the hours of the caretaker would be reduced.

The County education authority was now insisting that children went on to schools at Hamsey Green or Chelsham.

The Chairman confessed to a feeling of depression at the cuts and reculled that a meeting in connection with the advancement of State Education (CASE) was to be held in the village. He thanked Mrs othie for her work as chairsan of the managors.

BESTRICT COUNCIL.

Mrs. Dunn reported on her work as District Council member. Dealing with the ending of the concessionary fare system she said she had favoured this and in the course of later discussion made it clearthat she felt this was a matter which abould be dealt with on a national basis.

VILLAGE POND.

Mrs. Geary reported that the Village Fond Preservation Society formed during the year had a membership of 114. In a concise report she said the pend was once twice as big as today and recalled various endeavours to improve it.

GENERAL.

During general discussion a number of matters were faised, the main discussion arising on lack of hus services to Oxted and the hardship entailed for those who have difficulty in getting doctors' prescriptions made up, it emerging that the informal arrangement to assist in getting these dispensed had now come to an end.

Mr. Jupp moved a resolution asking the Farish Council to pursue with the health authorities means of securing the dispencing of prescriptions for old people. This was seconded by Mr. Goodchild and, an amendment to substitute 'anyone' for 'old people' having been carried on a show of hands, the resolution was jassed as amended.

A further discussion took place on the use of the village hall on concessionary terms by certain organisations.

Thanking the members of the Perish Council for their work, Mrs. Dothic said she hoped they would see some of the familiar faces at next year's parish meeting.
