

## Pupil Premium Report For 2019/20

Schools receive extra funding from the Government called the Pupil Premium for, amongst other things, children in receipt of free school meals and for children of service families. It is a Government initiative and, like all such funding, is subject to alteration and, possibly, cancellation.

Eligibility is triggered by a child receiving free school meals at any point during a set number of years, currently six, or being the child of a serving member of the armed forces.

In the academic year 2019-20, eight children attracted this funding, covering a range of year groups and socio-economic backgrounds. However, the administration of this funding presents challenges to schools due to the dates for census collection (meaning some children transferring schools may not be on roll when the information determining the school's budget is collected).
