

#### From the Parish Council



#### September already!

Back to school and back to work; this summer seems to have truly raced by and without the warm weather we have been promised for weeks by the forecasters. Let's hope we have an Indian summer to balance things out a little.

Despite the disappointing weather, there has been a fair bit going on in the village over the past couple of months and that looks likely to continue going into autumn.

One of the most important things under way currently is the Neighbourhood Plan which is taking shape and which we are keen to press ahead with as quickly as possible. A drop-in day was organised in July to provide an up date as to what has been done thus far and about 40 people stopped by. David Oxnam, who is now leading the process, has written a brief update which you will see later in this Newsletter. The final plan which comes out of all the work will provide a framework for any future development in Toppesfield and Gainsford End. This will indicate a level of new development that will be acceptable, the type of development, the visual aspects and how it should fit in with our environmental and landscape requirements.

Questionnaires addressing these topics were available at the drop-in event and many have been completed and returned so the data can be collated. We would, however, like to see as many questionnaires returned as possible so that the final Plan reflects as fully as possible the views of the community. The questionnaires are available from the shop.

Please take some time to do this. It is your opportunity to put your views forward: if you don't, then they won't be heard!

It was also good to see over 150 people attend the music evening at the Green Man in early August. Not only was it a great event, open to all, but it highlighted again how valuable a resource the Green Man is to the parish as a focal point for meeting up. We've all realised over the past 18 months how difficult life can be when meeting up is not possible.

In late July, a Welcome Coffee and Cake event for new and old residents was hosted in the Village Hall. This proved very successful, with a large turnout including about 20 people who have moved into the parish over the past 2 years and with copious amounts of delicious cakes supplied by a number of residents. Perhaps this could be a regular event; any thoughts?

We would like to thank those who have responded to the parish council's request for comments about the proposal to purchase the Green Man barn. Several important points arose from these comments and they will all help determine how things proceed; we should have further news over the next month or so.

The parish council is always happy to hear from residents of any thoughts and ideas they may have to improve the village and make it more sustainable. Please let our clerk, Kaaren Berry, know if you have any suggestions. Whether we like it or not, the world is changing and if villages like Toppesfield don't adapt with it we will become unsustainable.

Our next Newsletter will be published and delivered on the first weekend of November so please let us know in good time if there are any events you would like to advertise.

#### **News from the Footpaths**

#### Hi Everyone

I hope you are all well and enjoying the footpaths. What a strange few months it has been weather wise. I think we are all still waiting for Summer to arrive. However as always there are things to delight us when out walking.



I particularly enjoyed the footpath sign covered in lichen. The footpath sign is an old concrete one and you will find lichens growing on tomb stones and trees too. Lichens are an interesting group of plants. They are a mixture of an alga and a fungus living together for mutual benefit (marriage?!!!) Many are a source of natural dyes. You may remember from your school days in the chemistry lab litmus paper turning from pink to blue indicating acid or alkaline conditions. Litmus is extracted from a lichen. Also the dye for Harries Tweed is extracted from a lichen. In addition, as a source of dyes, lichens are also an indicator of pollution. The bushier they grow the less polluted the atmosphere.

The late flowers are still providing a colourful display and also a feed for the bees and butterflies. On the same walk I spotted a lovely patch of poppies and also several painted lady butterflies on the thistle. Thistles, knapweed, bramble and teasels seem to be firm favourites with the bees and butterflies, providing them with a rich feast of pollen and nectar and of course us with the blackberries.





The horse chestnut tree is always the first to come into leaf in the Spring and the first to start to lose its' leaves as Autumn advances. Now we have lovely clusters of conkers and I spotted some field mushrooms as well, a sure sign that Autumn is on its' way. It always fascinates me that you seldom find a

perfect mushroom. There are teeth marks and holes there so something has been having a nibble!

Of course, as I said in the newsletter last September, we would normally be looking forward to The Village show and hoped that this year we would be able to hold it. I did think long and hard about it and felt that at the time I would normally have started to plan the show the covid situation was still so uncertain. Let's hope for next year.

#### INDIA -- NOTES FROM SCAD AFTER COVID

India as a whole has again been in Lockdown for approx. 4 months, and it is just beginning to ease up now although schools and Temples are still closed. Many children have had no schooling for 20 months, although the older children have benefitted from SCAD's TVs installed publicly in 27 villages (accompanied by volunteers) for children to benefit from the national TV educational programmes. The smaller children need supervising and aren't generally using the system. SCAD estimates that the educational sessions were being attended by 30% of the oldest children

Some of the Toppesfield residents have met Charles from SCAD – either when visiting SCAD in India or when he has been staying with me. Sadly, he was very ill with COVID and was in Intensive Care for 5 days. However, I'm glad to report that he is now feeling well again and in good spirits, recuperating at home. He is not allowed contact with villagers for several months yet, but goes into SCAD office.

The 200 vulnerable women SCAD has put on the tree-planting programme have been achieving wonders and now have c 150,000 saplings ready to plant out this September.

The SCAD Medical Centre has been closed to all but Covid cases for months but has just re-opened for other needy patients.

Almost all community projects are back up and running now, since the Government eased some lockdown restrictions on 15 June. The saltpan workers are back for 3 – 4 hrs/day, which is at least providing them with some basic income.

Anbu Illam (the SCAD School for Differently Abled Children) is still closed but their out-reach teams continue to work in the villages to reach as many children as possible with educational games and activities. SCAD's School for the gypsy children had to close under Covid but their teaching/outreach team has been encouraging the children to come at 11am for educational activities; later they are provided with lunch and go home at c 2.30pm every day, so they are also being catered for in so many important ways.

The team on the Cheranmahadevi College Campus who have been making the aids and appliances for the physically challenged children continue to visit the villages. There they assess and measure up the disabled children to work out what's needed in the way of orthopaedic equipment. These are all made from recycled cardboard transformed into strong, robust papier maché (eg special small chairs, arm/back supports, etc). This is such essential work, often making it possible for a child to sit in a chair for the first time, where previously they had simply lain on the floor, unable to support themselves upright. Since the cardboard is a free and readily available source of material, these orthopaedic supports can be easily re-made as the child grows. The team has made 150 aids during lockdown.



One other project has been successfully completed next to the BioDigestion plant. Following the successful completion of the SCAD URBED Ecohouse, which won the Indian Green Building Council's top award, SCAD with the support of Urbed Trust wants to establish and strengthen the centre for sustainable development "Gardens of Delight" within a period of two years and then focus on further development.. On Saturday the 31<sup>st</sup> of July we had our reboot event for the neighbourhood plan in the village hall. 40 people came along to see the exhibition which was to primarily look at the factors that would potentially influence any plans that the community may have for the future of the village.

A number of constructive conversations took place and everyone who visited was encouraged to take away the questionnaire which will assist the planning group with formulating some thoughts and proposals for the future.

Responses to questionnaires are currently being analysed but we would like some more!


#### St. Margaret's C of E Primary School

#### **Green Gardening**

#### Ideas for a low carbon garden

We've all been learning about the urgent need to reduce our carbon footprint. A low-carbon garden buzzes with life, sparkles with water, and is packed with plants. All gardeners have a chance to make a direct, practical difference in combatting climate change. Every time you grow a tree, mulch your soil, or let your grass grow long, you could actively be increasing the carbon your garden absorbs.

A billion tiny actions have brought us to the edge of environmental crisis. And a billion tiny actions can help pull us back from the brink.

Here are a few ideas, suggested by the Royal Horticultural Society:

#### Grow a hedge

Not only do hedges actively sequester and store carbon, they also providing nesting sites, food sources, and shelter for wildlife.

#### **Grow your own plant supports**

Coppices of hazel, birch, willow and dogwood trees provide a renewable, carbon-free source of bean-poles and pea sticks as well as a wildlife habitat. Hazel is best for uprights, and willow for weaving poles. BUT don't stick willow into the ground as it roots very readily!

#### Pick greener ways to grow your own

Home-grown food, when grown sustainably, has a much lower carbon footprint than that produced by conventional agriculture. Vegetable gardens store more carbon when permanently planted with fruit trees, berries, and perennial vegetables, interspersed with annuals to fill gaps. Use mulches such as homemade compost, make paths from woodchip rather than concrete or grass, and grow organically for maximum carbon benefit.

#### Make your own compost

Compost bins make good use of green waste from the kitchen and garden; this avoids waste going into landfill where it releases methane. Soil mulched with compost holds on to nutrients and rainwater better, meaning less need to water and feed your garden. An all-round winner!

#### Plant a tree

Trees suck in carbon. Plant a tree in your garden and you help offset not just your own carbon footprint, but that of your children too. 
