On sitting down to read through the draft of the newsletter, I was tentatively pleased to see the first signs of spring peeping through – the daffodils are beginning to bloom and we have had at least a few days of blue skies!

There is lots of great information in this edition, some of which you may not be aware of. Did you know we do operate a Doctor's car service for those who need help attending appointments? How about the DART transport you can book through Essex County Council to visit the shops, friends family etc? As a village, we have a lot of resources, often supported by volunteers, but also often not used. So please do use these services.

There are also events coming up and calls to arms. Wonderful to see the 50th anniversary of Little Chestnuts preschool – what a fabulous achievement to be serving our Village for so long. You will also see a call to arms for volunteers to plant more trees in the Autumn – just another way we are trying to think of the future of our Parish.

Talking of Parish, we hope that the next Parish event will be successful as we are combining the annual Litter Pick, a coffee morning AND an Easter Egg Hunt all into one. Quite the day! We hope to see as many of you this time as we did for the Historical coffee morning in January.

Finally, there are some good reminders in this edition, around recycling and how to report road issues.

We hope you enjoy reading, and if you would like to place an article, or indeed have a request for information to be circulated, please let our Parish Clerk know.

Parish Council Information

A summary of Parish Council goings-on at the January and February Meetings:

In January District councillor van Dulken reported that:

- The fishing lakes on the Toppesfield Road have been vacated by the owner and are up for sale.
- The main road through Sible Hedingham from Alderford Street to the turn off to Halstead will be shut week commencing 22 January for repairs.
- Hedingham Medical Centre the final business case will be submitted by February 2024 and if this is approved work can then commence.
- The owner of Wash Farm, Poole Street in Great Yeldham is hoping to create a bus museum there.
- Wethersfield Asylum Centre now has 530 residents. Braintree District Council (BDC)
 has received the first tranche of grants and the possibility of building a prison on the
 site has been raised again.
- Nothing further has been received regarding the potential solar farm on Great Yeldham Road.
- Cllr van Dulken has been appointed as the BDC representative on the Essex Flood Partnership group.
- New rules for residual waste will come into effect in April 2024. Operatives will no longer pick up waste by the side of the bins and the bins will not be collected if the lids are not closed.
- BDC planning have met their target for the 5-year housing land supply for this year.
 For BDC this is 700 800 homes per year.

County councillor Peter Schwier reported that:

- Essex County Council (ECC) have 50 gritters and last year went out on 70 occasions and each time cover approximately 40% of the county's roads.
- Strom Henk saw an increase of 800 calls and 12 extra tree surgeon crews were on standby.
- 450 planning applications were commented on with regard to flooding on highways.
- ECC budget the final settlement from central government is expected to be less than what was hoped for. The maximum their proportion of the council tax can increase is 5%. 2% of the increase will be ringfenced for increased Social Care costs. A further 2.9% increase will be applied so this is nearly reaches the 5% maximum increase.

Highlights from the January meeting were:

- Clerks contract and job description to be updated.
- The budget and precept for 2024 / 2025 was agreed. The precept was set at £17750 an increase of 1.7% over the precept for 2023 / 2024 and an increase of £0.05 per annum for a Band D property.
- Anyone interested in setting up a historical society or has ideas on where to store historical documents please contact the parish council.
- It was agreed to purchase a salt bin for Camoise. Close.

Parish Council Information continued.

In February District councillor van Dulken reported that:

- Garden waste collections by subscription commence week of Monday 11th March and those signed up will shortly receive permit stickers to affix to their green bin(s).
- There are new rules on the collection of grey bin residual waste there will be no further collection of excess waste by the side of the bin, and a bin will not be emptied if it is overfilled and the top does not close properly.
- The Hedingham Medical Centre business plan being submitted to the ICG for approval in February, after which building can be commenced later this year.
- Wethersfield there are approx. 530 residents, and internal security has been beefed
 up. The Department of Justice is coming back on the issue of building one or more
 prisons on the site, as apparently the more favourably located sites around the country
 are not coming through. The Home Office is seeking a Special Development Order
 (SDO) for RAF Wethersfield, which would give it 3 years of occupation as a migrant
 centre plus 6 months of decommissioning. Braintree DC has indicated its opposition to
 this.
- There is a scheme which may not be relevant to many residents in this area but there is an opportunity for grants of up to £8,000 per qualifying household towards Property Flood Resilience against flood or other water issues. I can point residents toward where to get further information.
- Over 50% of eligible Braintree District households have signed up for the subscription garden waste service commencing in April. Income of over £800,000 towards the cost of the service has come in.
- There is a national grant system called HUG2 (Home Upgrade Grant) from which Braintree District has had a sizeable allocation towards providing energy efficient measures like insulation, and low carbon heating (heat pumps essentially) to lower income homeowners who are not on the gas grid, and have low EPC ratings. Contact BDC at phandh@braintree.gov.uk or search HUG2 on the Gov.UK website,

Highlights from the February meeting were:

- A coffee morning and community litter pick has been arranged for 23rd March 2024.
- Thanks were expressed to the volunteers who installed and filled the salt bin in Camoise Close.
- Cllr Schwier has been contacted regarding the large pot holes along the Great Yeldham Road to try to expedite their repair.
- Cllr Bourlet to apply for funding for Dog Poo bags in an attempt to tackle to the increasing number of case of fouling in the parish.

The next Parish Council Meetings are scheduled to be held on 7th Mach and 4th April 2024 at 7.30pm at Toppesfield Village Hall. The full minutes can be viewed on the parish website.

Doctor Car Service

Public transport available from Toppesfield and Gainsford End

Introducing DaRT 3 - Servicing North East Braintree

Demand Responsive Transport (Dart) is an alternative way of providing access to key services in rural areas.

Instead of using fixed routes with fixed stops and times, DaRT customers book journeys with the operator in advance and are picked up from an agreed point - often their own home, a bus stop or local place of interest.

You can use it:-

- To go shopping
- Get to/from work, school or college
- Attend health appointment
- Visit friends

There are currently two services from Toppesfield;

Wednesday - leaving at 9am to Braintree and returns at 12pm

Thursday—leaving at 9.15am to Sudbury and returns at 12pm

You need to book your seat in advance—please ring 01621 874411 the day before to book your seat on the bus.



It is sad to loose Rae and Anne Syder as he has been a very active member of the allotment scene for many years.

I would like to thank my wife Clare who does all the admin and accounts for our allotment society, (it is Appreciated).

We are taking steps to reduce the rodent problem that was escalated when the field at the side of the allotments was planted with Maize this year.

Having an allotment is a great pastime and very rewarding when the first crop of fresh Veg and Salad is harvested .

The water chamber housing is now12 years old and needs repair, I am sure that with the help of Ian Pain and a decent supply of wood we can make a new cabinet.

March is a good time to plant Blueberries as most will know are an expensive product to buy.

Shallots and Onions are also good to plant out as Sets and are available from Darkins in Sible Hedingham.



By now you should have your First Early New Potatoes Chitted and in the ground or in pots, but it's not too late to get a main crop in the ground.

Healthy activity

The physical benefits of regular spells of gardening help plot-holders to keep fit even if they have sedentary jobs, the physical exercise also contributes to their mental well-being. Gardening can also help to maintain good gait and balance in older gardeners and help with cognitive decline.

Spending as little as 15 minutes a day out in the summer sunshine can build up your levels of vitamin D, if you are fair skinned. And for those whose skin is naturally darker, anywhere up to 90 minutes of sun exposures will help your vitamin levels. However, gardeners do need to be aware of skin cancer risks, Melanoma is the fourth most common cancer in the UK and on the rise. So make sure that you dress appropriately and wear sunscreen on exposed areas.

Fresh, local, seasonal produce

If managed properly, an allotment can produce enough food to supplement a family's weekly shop, with fresh fruit and vegetables over the year. Allotment gardeners can choose to garden organically and avoid ingesting chemicals that are likely to be present on shop bought fruit and vegetables.

In a survey of National Allotment Society members nearly every person said their love of allotment gardening comes from the fresh air, home grown produce, healthy lifestyle and like-minded people this activity offers.

Sense of achievement

As many new plot-holders discover, growing vegetables requires acquiring new knowledge and skills and the satisfaction gained from eating their first home grown tomato or new potato makes them taste even more delicious!

Contact with nature

Working a plot year- round means that allotment holders experience the seasons, witness the behaviour of birds, insects and other animals and gain an understanding of the eco-system. This appreciation of the natural world also has the potential to inspire more environmentally aware behaviour by themselves and their children.

In 2018 the UK Government produced a 25 Year Environment Plan, which acknowledges that connecting people to their environment will also improve their health and well-being. A study in the Netherlands showed that every 10 per cent increase in exposure to green space translated into an improvement in health equivalent to being five years younger, with similar benefits found by studies in Canada and Japan. So get out there and Dig.

The Public Footpath from the Causeway to the Allotments was laid with Granite Chippings last year, and it has made a great difference for walking down to the site. It is no longer a muddy path! A great benefit to all that walk the area and to school children that walk to the school.





Update regarding the Green Man

During our recent cold snap, part of the original Green Man suffered a burst pipe. This caused a flood of near biblical proportions in the dining room, the water pouring from the ceiling and walls was alarming!

Having affected a temporary repair we contacted the insurance company and started the process of claiming.

Thankfully the insurance company decided to uphold the claim (after the usual to-ing and fro-ing). They have agreed costs to rebuild in the original damp and cold way. As TCP are always striving to keep the pub functional and comfortable the committee felt that this was a cost effective opportunity to further improve the damp and cold problems in the dining room while everything is apart.

Unfortunately this has lead to additional unexpected spending to keep the dining room in good condition and comfortable. Westross is cracking on with the works and should have the dining room back in action by Easter.

However the Pub remains open and is still providing all its usual offerings.



Have you ever complained about issues on our roads?

Do you know how to report it or how to check if it has been reported?

The easiest way is to visit the Essex County website on <u>Tell us - Essex County</u> <u>Council (essexhighways.org)</u> where can track an existing issue or tell them about an issue.

To track an issue click on the track it button and you can enter the location you are querying and see all reported issues and then clicking on the coloured dots will let you know the status of the reported issue.

To report an issue you will need to click on one of the icons as shown below and follow the instructions on screen.

Alternatively you can call Highways on 0345 603 7631.


















Issues cannot be fixed if they are not known about.

A reminder to recycle and where to get more recycling sacks from.

10 FACTS ABOUT RECYCLING

- 1. Recycling is the process of taking material such as glass, plastic, metal or paper, and processing it so that it can be used all over again!
- 2. Less than half of plastic in the U.K is recycled.
- 3. In the UK we throw away enough cans each year they could reach the moon three times
- 4. The energy saved from recycling 1 glass bottle is enough a power a light bulb for four hours
- 5. 14 million glass bottles and jars are sent to landfill every day.
- 6. Every tonne of paper recycled saves 17 trees.
- 7. We throw more rubbish into landfill than we recycle.
- 8. Making one can from raw (new) materials uses the same amount of energy that it takes to recycle 20 cans.
- 9. In less than 2 hours the UK produces enough waste to fill the Albert Hall in London.
- 10. Up to 60% of the rubbish that ends up in the bin could be recycled.

The more we recycle the better for our planet.

Don't forget there is a bottle recycling point next to the pub and if you run out of recycling sacks you can order them from the District Council or even nearer and more conveniently contact the parish clerk to arrange a collection or delivery of more sacks.


Litter pickers under 16 must be supervised by allocated adult and all equipment is being supplied by Braintree District Council


