From the Parish Council



In 1845, when he was in northern Italy, Robert Browning wrote his poem, 'Home-thoughts from Abroad'. It began:

Oh, to be in England

Now that April's there

Well, I doubt he would have written such lines in April 2024!

April this year has been cold, wet and windy, a bit like a glass of Fosters.

Writing this article now, at the very end of the month, I am thinking more about the old proverb:

'March winds and April showers bring forth the May flowers'.

Let's hope that turns out to be correct.

So we look ahead to summer and already you will see in this edition of the Newsletter that there are events being planned for the next four or five months and more will no doubt follow.

Regular village walks? Check.

Music events? Check.

Quiz evenings? Check

And so on.

We are fortunate to live in such an active village. As a community we punch well above our weight, benefiting not only from our invaluable community owned amenities such as the shop and pub but also from all the hard working volunteers that keep these assets running but also undertake new events and activities.

At the Annual Parish Meeting last week, it was recognised that one of the areas in which the village falls short is communicating fully to all parishioners.

Efforts will therefore be made to rectify this situation over the coming weeks and months by using all the appropriate communication channels not just within the parish but also in the surrounding area.

Each organisation sent a report on its activities and plans to the Annual Parish Meeting and these will soon be posted to the PC website - Home - Toppesfield Parish Council (e-voice.org.uk)

Staying on the theme of communication, if there is anything you would like especially to see in the Newsletter please let our Clerk, Kaaren, know. Alternatively, you can write an article yourself if you wish or share any photos you have taken of the village.

The next Newsletter will be published in July and will be the 200 th edition, so it would be good to make that a bumper issue!

Parish Council Information

A summary of Parish Council goings-on at the March and April Meetings:

In March District Councillor Richard van Dulken reported that:

- The 2024/25 BDC budget was approved at Full Council on 19th February, with no Councillor voting against, with the BDC portion of the total Council Tax bills increased by 2.96% approx. 11p per week for a Band D dwelling, which is one of the lowest rates in Essex.
- The Councillors' Community Grant will continue during the coming year, with the same rate as this year, of £1,250 per Councillor.
- I can confirm that the Application for £312 from the PC, for dog waste bags and wall holders is allowable and will be paid over in April, the new financial year.
- I am pleased to have learnt that there will be patching of potholes ("patching") on Great Yeldham Road very shortly as the Clerk is aware this will involve a closure or reduced access to the road during 18-20 March.
- The most recent news I have on Wethersfield (following a meeting on the site a few weeks ago) is that there are 550-600 users, and we were informed that no crime had been attributed to the migrant residents. The Home Office has advised that they intend to use Wethersfield for 3 years, with a 6-month decommissioning period at the end of 3 years. On a more positive note, the prisons team at the Department of Justice appears to have no further interest in Wethersfield as a prison site, as better located sites have been approved.
- I have been appointed as the Braintree District representative on the Essex Flood Partnership Board which meets 4 times a year. I appreciate that floods from rivers are not a major issue in Toppesfield but the remit of the Board does extend to surface water and drainage issues, while not being involved in day-to-day maintenance which is generally Essex Highways, or Anglian Water.
- As you may have seen in the news, BDC Operations were able to assist Uttlesford with their bin collections, over 16 days in February, with no adverse effect on our operations.
- BDC has announced a new small grants scheme providing grants of up to £10,000 to start or enhance community projects which support residents with the cost of living. Any non-profit community group can apply as long as they can evidence that the project supports one of the main objectives of the "Cost of Living Fund", has a clear purpose, and benefits District residents.

Other parish council business included: confirmation of a grant award towards the cost of dog poo bag dispensers and bags to help encourage people to pick up after their dogs. Research into the use of Common Land was carried out, and the litter pick arrangements were finalised. Thank you to everyone who turn out to help. As you can see lots of rubbish was collected.



In April County Councillor Peter Schwier reported that:

- Essex County Councils LED lighting programme is hoped to be completed by the end of the year. There have been 4000 fewer faults reported with the LED lights than last year.
- The 5-year tree planting initiative has been completed a year early with 375,000 trees planted and another 100,000 are hoping to be planted next year. £380,000 was budgeted but grants received for the project more than covered the costs.
- Essex County Council has launched its first ever water strategy at their Spring Climate Summit – details of which can be found on their website at: <u>New Water Strategy for</u> <u>Essex | Essex County Council</u>

District Councillor Richard van Dulken reported:

- Wethersfield Asylum Centre: the organisers have recognised some of the challenges and are aiming to cap the number of residents to 800.
- Wethersfield Prison: Braintree District Council are still going ahead with their final appeal on the 11th and 12th April 2024, however it would appear the project maybe fading away as other more suitable sites have been identified.
- Councillors Community Grant Last year £300 was given to Little Chestnuts Preschool for their upcoming 50th Anniversary event and £100 to St Margarets for their summer club activities. So far this year £312 will be given to the Parish Council for Dog poop bag dispensers and bags.
- There was over a 50% take up in the green waste subscription service.
- Braintree District Council has adopted its Corporate Strategy for 2024.
- It is the 50th Anniversary of Braintree District Council this month.

Other business included: the Neighbourhood plan is still progressing, defects and highway issues along Church Lane were discussed and reported to Essex Highways .

Hi Everyone

Well it does seem that the rain has eased up for a bit. What a Spring! We have had some lovely days but it always seems to rain in the night. Still wet and warm does mean that the plants are rushing out of the ground providing some much needed early pollen and nectar for the bees and butterflies. I have had lots of bumble bees and several brimstone butterflies visiting my garden already which is a joy to behold. They are the pale yellow butterflies and always seem to be the early ones to visit. Of course the birds are busy courting their partners with their song, building their nests and laying eggs. So the cycle continues. I always think Spring is such a bringer of hope after what seems an endless and dreary Winter.

The blackthorn blossom seems to have been more spectacular than ever this year, coating the hedgerows almost like snow. Soon to be followed by the May or hawthorn and the verges have been carpeted by first snowdrops and primroses and now cowslips. Magic.



The footpaths have continued to be pretty soggy but things do seem to be drying up a bit. Thank you again to our farmers for marking out cross field footpaths as soon as they are able. My first 4 crops of Asparagus have been pan fried in garlic butter and eaten with sirloin steak and black pudding (Yum).

TOMMOS TIPS

We can soon plant out Courgettes and Beets, other Salad Staples and Main Crop Tatties as they say in Scotland and don't forget Onions (why not try Shallots and Garlic in the same plot ?).

NASLAG INFO

The humble cauliflower has bloomed. Once a soggy side at school dinners, this bland brassica is now the highlight of many an Instagram snap or hip restaurant menu. And whilst edible trends tend to come and go, the craze for cauli seems to be here to stay.

In culinary terms, cauliflower is often treated as a blank canvas, partly because it is fairly flavourless on it's own. This cruciferous vegetable has a tightly packed texture, lending itself to being served as vegan steaks, chopped as a rice alternative, deep fried as 'cauliflower wings' and let's not forget the classic comforting cauliflower cheese.

It's a versatile veg; useful raw in salads, puréed, mashed, grated, roasted and it freezes well. Don't throw the stems – they are equally nutritious and can be used as a base for soup and in slaws.

Cauliflowers have a reputation for being tricky to grow, but with the right planning, growing conditions and care, you can cultivate a Cauli to rival any of those in the shops.

There are hundreds of varieties of cauliflower. A reliable variety is 'All The Year Round', one of the easiest to grow and can harvested from spring through to autumn. But to make the extra effort worthwhile, why not have a go at growing a stand-out variety.

Cauliflower companion planting tip:

Try growing cauliflowers with mint to deter flea beetles. Nasturtiums planted nearby will help to draw cabbage white butterflies away from your crop. Runner Beans ,Stick Beans and Carrots can all be planted out in May .

For those that are not aware, I have taken over the responsibility of coordinating the Footpaths for the parish council I was press ganged in to it by Ann Read who has done great works for many years, Thank you Ann.

We at the Allotments have always kept the footpaths around the plots open and accessible to Parishioners Rob Stafford Baker and Myself were instrumental in creating the greensward behind the Causeway that is used by the school kids on the way to school.

My focus will be on keeping the footpaths free of Dog Mess and arranging working parties for any maintenance that is required with the BDC representative .

I have also started a weekly walk on Thursdays at 10 AM for approximately 1½ hrs - often finishing with a coffee at the Shop CAFE watch out for info on the Parish Forum FB page (thanks to the admin for this useful tool).

As the famous Victorian poet and aficionado of beer, Alfred Lord Tennyson so aptly put it: 'In the Spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of beer'. Or something like that.

Well, it is Spring (really, it is) and the thoughts of us all at Pumphouse are certainly turning to beer.

After a pretty quiet start to the year, we have noted a marked increase in orders for our ales, which of course we have been delighted to meet.

The range of customers is gradually increasing and we have been supplying across north Essex, which is really satisfying. Mick Simms and Tina Mason, although they stepped down from the committee earlier this year, are continuing to help the brewery by delivering much of the beer. It seems that after a working life delivering beer, Mick just cannot stop. Forget the Duracell Bunny; we have the Duracell Drayman.



Of course, this June sees the 80th anniversary of D-Day, when the largest seaborne invasion in history took place along the beaches of Normandy. There is real interest in our Allied Amber, 9th's Havocs and 19 Elms beers, including from Royal British Legion branches which are holding commemorative events. So, just like our forebears in 1944 you can roll out that barrel with ales from Pumphouse!

The summer season is always busier, of course, and we have had requests from beer festivals (you will find our beers at the Braintree Festival from Thursday 6th to Saturday 8th June, for example) and private parties as well as events like the Shalford Summer Fete on 22nd June.

Toppesfield's own event will take place on Saturday 8th June. Chris Ames and Sam Burnett together with Reptile Dysfunction and a whole load of other bands and musicians will be hosting another Music Extravaganza. The Brewery Pallet Bar will be open, as in the past, to supply a range of Pumphouse beers.

So let's drink to a warm and successful summer – with beers from Pumphouse, of course.

Dear All

Over the past 14 years living in Toppesfield, we have endeavoured to promote and encourage the owl population. This was partly driven by the owls in residence when we first moved in to the village a large old tawny that would sit in the ash tree high up, wisely observing the comings and goings.

Over the years, I have installed a number of owl boxes, four in total with good success, including a pair of kestrels that nest once a year. We have owls in two of the boxes with a number of sightings through the year.

Aviation and flying has been a lifelong interest and vocation but watching and observing owls has demonstrated how far man's attempts at flight and design are behind the wonders of nature. Owls are truly amazing.

Silent flight, hunting along hedgerows and field margins, unfortunately, as their natural habitat of rough pasture has all but disappeared. Owls strictly control their diet and weight to be able to fly and hunt effectively. They unfortunately cannot tolerate extremes of wet weather as their downy feathers, enabling silent flight are prone to getting wet.

They generally hunt at dawn and dusk and early morning if they are feeding young from April to June. Unfortunately their habits come into conflict with our movement: over the years I have discovered five owls in Toppesfield hit by cars. One tawny survived after rehabilitation at Stonham barns owl sanctuary but the others were either dead or died shortly after.

Owls can be difficult to avoid, especially when flying low, hunting along roadways. Dazzled and disorientated by headlights and the noise of vehicles, their ability to see in the dark with hearing that is highly developed and extremely sensitive, they are unable to move out of our way quickly enough.

We all have our lives to live but if we can find time just to slow down at the critical times at dawn and dusk, we may be able to live a more sustainable future for all.

You may not see an owl very often but you will definitely hear them in the evening hooting and screeching.

Long may the wise old owls live 'Tu-whit tu-whoo'

Spring has sprung – what crime does it bring?

Well spring has sprung and the migration into the garden has commenced with all the extra jobs that it brings. Unfortunately with the spring season also comes seasonal crimes too and we need give it a little consideration to prevent it and help others from becoming victims too.

New tools and lawn mowers: Be mindful of how you dispose of the packaging to your new purchases; don't advertise it to the thieves and burglars with your empty boxes on display outside for roadside collection. Fold boxes inside out or break them up and put them in bag for collection.

Property marking: It's a good deterrent if your property is visibly security marked with your house number and post code or labelled if a forensic property marking system is used such as www.smartwater.com or www.selectadna.co.uk. You can also record the serial numbers of any property free of charge at www.immobilise.com . If your property does get stolen with property marking and/or recording on Immobilise there is a greater chance of you getting it back.

Working in the garden: It is easy to get engrossed in what you are doing when working in the garden, if the house is empty it is wise to close and lock the door (don't forget the key though!). Put tools away after use, "it add insult to injury" if your tools are used to break into your house.

Shed security: With sheds coach-bolt and plate the padlock hasp sections to the frame and door, use a good quality "Close Shackle" padlock or a key operated mortice lock; don't forget the hinges ensure they cannot be unscrewed. Protect windows with a wire mesh and fit a curtain or white wash the windows to prevent prying eyes. Products that are fit for purpose can found by looking for the "Secured by Design" or "Sold Secure" logos, or on their websites www.securedbydesign.com or www.soldsecure.com .

New plants: Larger plants etc can be secured to land or rootball anchors or plant through chicken wire covering the area with soil. Cement or bolt down containers to the ground. Your local garden centre or DIY store should be able to help.


Rogue Traders: The rogue trader also takes advantage of the fine weather to con the

unsuspecting.

Although you may think you would never be taken in by them they can be very convincing especially to the elderly or vulnerable "I am laying some gravel up the road and see you need some....." "I notice your trees or shrubs need a prune..." so many stories. Look after the elderly or vulnerable near you and step in should you need to with a little advice, also another face sometime puts the rogue trader off. Need a trader and have no personal recommendations, look at www.buywithconfidence for traders checked out by Trading Standards.

What is Common land and what are you allowed to do on it?



This question was raised with the Parish Council recently.

The definition of this can be found on the government website, <u>Common land and village</u> <u>greens - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> where it reads:

Common land is owned, for example by a local council, privately or by the National Trust.

You usually have the <u>right to roam</u> on it. This means you can use it for certain activities like walking and climbing.

Some common land has different rights, so you may be able to use it for other activities, for example horse-riding.

You cannot:

- camp on common land without the owner's permission
- light a fire or have a barbecue
- hold a festival or other event without permission
- drive across it without permission unless you have the <u>right to access your property</u>

The reason for the question being raised was due to increased garden waste being left in Church Lane on the historic 'burning heap'. With the increased size of the burning heap (when lit), if left unsupervised this could cause problems for the surrounding vegetation, a nuisance to neighbours and potentially a hazard to nearby buildings.


The Parish Council would like to remind residents that although the area has been used by residents as an area for disposing of small amounts of burnable garden waste the area is not actually intended for this purpose. In fact, the laws on Common Land prohibit bonfires.

Garden waste and rubble can be disposed of via the Braintree District Council green bin subscription scheme or at local recycling centres. Please see www.loveessex.org/find-your -nearest-recycling-centre/braintree-recycling-centre/ to see what the restrictions and quantities are.

Please keep this area for it's intended use and safe.



'How friends said 'Goodbye' in 1794'

Copied from the Gentlemans Magazine for the year 1794. Obituary for that year.

February 1794 at Sible Hedingham, County Essex, Francis Chatter by his own desire he was carried to Toppesfield in a hearse followed in five carts by his relations to the Green Man (a house he formerly frequented) and placed on tressels in the middle of the parlour; the attendants stood round and spent a guinea (the coffin serving as a table) and after several of the relations, in the joy and loyalty of their hearts, had sung God save the King, he was interred in the Church Yard.
