Parish Council Information

A summary of Parish Council goings-on at the November and December meetings:

In November County Councillor Peter Schwier reported that:

- The latest edition of Essex Highways has been circulated.
- Essex County Council are encouraging people to enjoy the county parks around the county.
- The street light replacement scheme is nearing completion, there will be a 75% cost saving due to the new LED lights which have a 20-year life span. The saving will be £39 million over 25 years.
- Essex County Council are prepared for winter and have checked salt stocks and vehicles.
- Cllr Schwier has funds available from his Locality Grant fund initial enquires are to be emailed to him and he will see if the project fits the criteria.
- The property flood resilience grant for up to £8000 is still open. More details can be found on the Essex County Council website.

District Councillor Richard van Dulken sent in a report as follows:

- Thanks to the Chairman for the two applications for Councillors' Community Grants, for trees, and towards the Christmas event, which I am considering as I write this. You may be interested to know that small occasional grants for community activities can be applied for by organisations within 20 miles from Stansted Airport at the Stansted Airport website, search for "Community Funds". The one I refer to is called the Stansted Airport Passenger Community Fund and is funded from unwanted foreign currency collected from passengers and staff.
- With reference to waste collections, the new collection calendars are available on the BDC website. Of greater note are forthcoming changes to the whole system, in accordance with new government guidelines, designed to increase the % of waste which can be recycled. Over coming months details will emerge, and there will be a public consultation.
- You may have read that work on the Braintree Community Diagnostic Centre at the Braintree Hospital - has begun, to provide X-rays, CT and MRI scans, blood tests and more. This when up and running will mean fewer trips to Broomfield or Colchester General.
- And I am equally pleased to advise that there has been movement on the Hedingham Medical Centre....construction work could begin this winter, with planned completion as I understand it to be in Spring 2026.
- You will have received details of the latest POSI (Potential Open Space Improvements)
 Plan, for which amendments need to be sent by 31st January.

• An expression of interest has been sent by Essex Districts, Cities and Boroughs (plus Southend, Thurrock and Essex County Council) to the government for a devolution deal for Greater Essex, which would allow local councils to make important decisions closer to where residents live and work, on transport, investments, skills training and houses & infrastructure. The government is keen on the model of Mayors, and for instance 3 or 4 larger District Councils making up Greater Essex.

Other business included: Cllr Graves was appointed as representative on the Toppesfield Charities committee. The parish council adopted an updated code of conduct which is available on the parish council website. The parish council agreed to sign up to the National Association of Local Councils Civility & Respect Pledge.

Business in the December meeting included: final preparations for the Christmas event, a coffee morning has been planned for the 8th February 2025. A draft budget was presented for consideration and will be finalised at the January meeting and quotes for an internal auditor will be sought.

Free Printable Companion Planting Guide

ZONE 3 VEGETABLE GARDENING

What is companion planting?

Companion planting is an organic method of maintaining a natural balance in your garden by growing plants together that are mutually beneficial. Planted together, certain plant combinations can aid pollination, prevent disease and keep pest numbers down. Most companion plants are strongly scented and can confuse

pests looking for their host plant, some have antibacterial or anti-fungal properties, while others attract beneficial insects, such as ladybirds and lacewings, which prey on aphids. Most companion planting occurs in the vegetable patch, but some ornamental plants, such as roses, can also benefit from particular plants growing nearby.

Common plant combinations include growing Nasturtiums to deter aphids from beans, and planting Allium (onions) around carrots to ward off carrot root fly.

Here are some obvious plant combinations to avoid, for example you should avoid planting tall plants next to shorter plants, as they will block light and prevent them from growing well. Growing thirsty plants next to drought-tolerant plants is also not advised, as one plant will either be getting too much water, or too little.

The strongly scented leaves of mint confuse flea beetles and can deter them from laying eggs on the leaves of brassicas such as cabbage, broccoli, radish and cauliflower. However, it's best to grow mint in a pot, or it could smother your crop.

There are some dates to add to your dairy:



Annual Review 2024

for Chapel Community Care

As 2024 draws to a close we look back at what has happened over the year and what we have achieved. Some of us also make resolutions.

So, I look back at the work of Chapel Care.

We are coming to the end of our 4th Year and have seen a few changes this year. One major change is a change of name. We were known as Stambourne Chapel Care and have now changed that to Chapel Community Care and come under the work of Ridgewell Community Chapel.

We continue to support around 60 people throughout the North Braintree Rural Community, between the towns of Haverhill, Braintree, Halstead and Sudbury

Referrals

During 2024 we received 16 referrals. One did not want a service, 6 for befriending, 2 for emotional support and 3 for transport.

Volunteers

We now have 12 volunteers with 4 joining us this year.

Just a few statistics for you...

In total for 2024 we completed:

- 82 befriending visits
- 132 transport journeys
- 18 shopping trips
- 12 hospital visits
- 34 telephone befriending support
- 59 support visits.
- 45 dog walks

We need donations and fundraising to fund what we do and if you would like to support us please get in touch to make a one off or regular donation.


