From the Parish Council



Welcome to the March/April edition of the newsletter!

To kick off this edition, I wanted to highlight the save the date for the VE celebration on 11 May. Planning is in progress but will be set to be a fun family event for all—please do put it in your diaries and come along. Other exciting events coming up are:

- Litter pick on 5 April (same day as the market)
- Comedy night at the pub on the 28 March

I wanted to also remind people about an important message that Is later down in the newsletter about sharing concerns and feedback to the Parish Council. We do try as best we can to support and even solve your concerns. A good example of this is back from January when we were informed about the school bus getting stuck on the Toppesfield road. This left some children stranded—which is absolutely unacceptable. We did have Peter Schwier who is our County councillor in attendance. We were able to raise the issue and the urgency of this issue directly with him—and that particular pot hole was in fact filled within 48 hours and fixed in February. This is an extreme example, but a representation of the importance of coming to talk to the Parish Council!

Parish Council Information

A summary of Parish Council goings-on at the January and February meetings:

In January Cllr Richard van Dulken reported:

- A public consultation on the proposals to improve wate collections is open until the 2nd March 2025. More information can be found on the Braintree Council website or go to www.braintree.gov.uk/wasteconsultation to complete the survey.
- It was also reported that a meeting will be held on 10th January 2025 at Braintree District Council to discuss the devolution /reorganisation of local government and whether they will become part of the Greater Essex Group with Southend and Thurrock.
- Construction on the medical centre in Sible Hedingham was due to commence this winter (2024/2025) and be complete in spring 2026.
- Wethersfield Asylum Centre has approx. 580 residents now, but this will increase when a few issues have been resolved.

Cllr van Dulken asked if there were any questions, and the parish council expressed their concerns about a school bus getting stuck in a large pothole on the Toppesfield Road and the pupils being asked to leave the bus and walk home. It was agreed that the parish council would write to Hedingham Buses and Hedingham School to ask what their emergency procedures are should this happen again. It was also discussed what could be done to safeguard the children in this situation.

Cllr Schwier reported that:

- Essex County Council are looking at setting their budget for 2025/2026. Nearly half
 of their budget is spent on adult and child social care. The budget meeting will take
 place on 20 February 2025 and there is potential that there will be an increase of 4 –
 4.5% increase.
- Primary school places need to be applied for by the 15th January 2025.
- The Royal Countryside Fund is open for applications. More information will be sent out via EALC.

Other business in January included:

The Neighbourhood Plan and parish council strategy documents continue to be progressed. A coffee morning on the 8th February 2025 is planned, the council's budget was approved for 2025-2026. Signing post repairs and ownership of the access road to the playing field was also discussed.

In February Cllr Richard van Dulken reported:

- Toppesfield Road where the bus was stuck last month has been repaired and Highways were proactive in addressing the issue once Cllr Schwier contacted them.
- The garden waste subscriptions are due for renewal at a cost of £55 for the year.

 More information about this can be found of Braintree Districts Councils website.
- The government has put Essex into the Fastlane for devolution. Essex, Thurrock and Southend will become Greater Essex. The area will then possibly be put into 3, 4 or 5 unitary authorities. Braintree District Council will disappear and be merged in with a larger area. More details will be released on this over the coming months.
- Wethersfield Asylum Centre there has not been a change in numbers which remain at 580 residents, but this will increase to 800.
- Braintree District Council budgets are being prepared and an extra £470,000 is required to cover the increase in National Insurance that they will have to pay. A small amount of compensation will be received from the government to help with the costs.
- Essex County Council will increase the verge cutting to 2 cuts per year following a 1 cut trail this year.
- Braintree District Council have undertaken a review of all the litter and dog waste bins in the district which number 2100 and most are emptied once a week.

Other business in the February meeting included:

A talk from members of the Finchingfield and Wethersfield Joint Neighbourhood Plan committee to inform the parish council of their progress, the annual litter pick will be hopefully held on 5th April 2025 and 80th anniversary VE Day event will be held on 11th May 2025. Cllr Graves will take the lead on the VE Day event and will be seeking volunteers to help with the planning or on the day itself.

Hello from Little Chestnuts Pre-school, I thought we would let you know what we provide and our plans, as it has been brought to my attention that some in our village don't know.

Little Chestnuts was established 50 years ago as a parent toddler group, over the years we developed into a playgroup and now we are a Pre-school, with over 30 children registered some from the village but most from the surrounding villages and some as far as Witham!!

Our setting is registered with Ofsted, and we accept government funding for 2-year-olds and 3-4year olds, 15 hours and extended hours. We are a registered CIO charity, and our trustees are a group of parents that have volunteered to help run and support the setting. Planning fundraising events and ensuring we are running correctly and providing the best care for all the children and their families that attend the setting.

We are open 8.30am-3pm Monday -Friday term time and we have just extended our service by now providing after school care 3.15pm-5.15pm Monday — Thursday for both the children at Little Chestnuts and St Margarets primary school. For the last few years, we have also opened 2 days for 3 weeks in the summer holidays to provide childcare for those working and also for the children have a routine and consistency. It makes our return in September a little easier for both the children and staff!!

We offer a wide range of activities including weekly dance classes, yoga, cooking and we take regular walks around the village and to our allotment and visits from and to the local primary school to watch plays, listen to the choir and enjoy some cake.

We were extremely grateful to be given an area for our outside learning at the allotment, the children have had great fun exploring and learning new skills.

We are also looking to provide a weekly sports class this term, these activities are a valuable resource that enables the children to try something new, listen to and follow instructions from different adults and learn new skills.

Our newest development is a new building to provide a quiet place for our children with additional needs to complete activities and for our Talk Boost programme, parent meetings, meetings with other professionals such as speech and language, health visitors etc... and of course a place for the 5 staff members to complete training, planning and key working observations and assessments for the children. And we have two apprentices joining us this term, which we are so pleased to support and teach a new generation of practitioners into early years childcare.

Toppesfield Allotment news

In March, as spring approaches, it's an ideal time to prepare your allotment in the village for the growing season ahead. Here's a comprehensive guide to help you get started:

1. Soil Preparation and Maintenance:

Weeding: Remove any weeds that have emerged to prevent them from competing with your crops.

Soil Improvement: Incorporate well-rotted compost or manure to enhance soil fertility and structure.

2. Sowing and Planting:

Vegetables:

Outdoors: Sow seeds of broad beans, carrots, parsnips, beetroot, onions, lettuces, radishes, peas, spinach, summer cabbage, salad leaves, leeks, Swiss chard, kohl rabi, turnip, and summer cauliflower directly into prepared beds.

Indoors: or in a poly tunnel - Start seeds of sweet peppers, tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines, celery, salads, and globe artichokes in a heated propagator or on a sunny windowsill.

Fruit:

Bare-root Trees: Plant bare-root fruit trees before buds burst. **Soft Fruits:** Plant potted soft fruit bushes such as currants, gooseberries, and raspberries.

Strawberries: Plant cold-stored strawberry runners and sow seeds of alpine strawberries.

3. Pruning and Training:

Fruit Trees: Carry out formative pruning of newly planted fruit trees if the weather is dry.

Berries: Untile canes of blackberries and hybrid berries that have been bundled together for the winter, and train them into arches before the buds burst.

4. Protection and Maintenance:

Pest Control: Protect early outdoor seed sowings from slugs with biological controls.

Frost Protection: Cover early sowings with cloches or fleece to shield them from late frosts.

Mulching: Apply a mulch around fruit trees, nuts, and bushes as long as the ground isn't frozen to retain moisture and suppress weeds.

5. Planning Ahead:

Seedbeds: Prepare seedbeds ready for sowing as the soil warms up by ensuring they are weed-free and raked to a fine tilth.

Support Structures: Put supports in place for peas and start preparing runner bean supports and trenches for sowing in May or planting out in June.

6. Harvesting:

Crops: Harvest purple sprouting broccoli, kale, winter cabbage, Jerusalem artichokes, and spring onions.

7. Community Engagement:

Workshops and Events: Consider organizing workshops or events to share knowledge and foster community spirit among allotment members.

We will have a group project Tidy Up day towards the end of March weather permitting, the water cabinet also needs remedial work as it is falling down.

We can have a sausage sizzle on the day and make it fun for the kids!

By following these guidelines, your allotment in Toppesfield will be well-prepared for a productive and enjoyable growing season.

Welcome to Suzy and Wendy who have taken over the allotment that Ian and Anoush had last year, they are looking for a small shed if anyone knows of a surplus one available?

Clare will be issuing the agreements this month (Cash Only) is preferred .

You may like to take a look at the woodland area, that has been made into an outdoor learning area for the preschool. Thanks to Kaaren Berry who is the driving force behind this project.

Braintree District Council Garden Waste Subscription It's Time to Renew

The full year's subscription fee for your first bin will remain at £55 for 2025/26 and for a second or subsequent bin, the subscription fee will be £30.

New or replacement bins cost £35.50 per bin.

Each bin requires a separate subscription.

If you already have a green bin, you can continue to use this when you subscribe.

If you have previously upgraded to a 240L bin, you may continue to use this for the same price until such time as the bin needs to be replaced, at which point a 180L will be offered (there is no longer an option to have a 240L bin).


The choir represented the school magnificently at the Young Voices concert in the O2 on February 4th. They had a fantastic time and were an absolute pleasure to take.


Our beautiful girl Cookie is looking for a loving and patient home to take her on some new adventures... could that be with you?


