Parish Council Information

A summary of Parish Council goings-on at the March and April meetings:

In March Cllr Richard van Dulken reported:

- Hedingham Medical Centre – details on progress of the project have been circulated and publicised by Braintree District Council
- There will be an extraordinary meeting held at Braintree District Council following the consultation to seek views on a proposal to form a Mayoral Combined County Authority for the local government areas of Essex County Council, Thurrock Council and Southend-on-Sea City Council (referred to as Greater Essex in this consultation). Details on this can be found using the following link: <http://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/greater-essex-devolution>
- The Waste consultation has now closed. There were 7500 responses which are now being analysed.

Other business in March included:

- British Coatings Federation have agreed to supply the required paint free of charge to paint the telephone box. Volunteers will be sought to paint it.
- Parish Council Strategy document is making progress.
- Annual litter pick has been organised for 5th April 2025.
- Update on VE Day event given - full details of this can be found in the minutes on the parish website.
- Discussions were held about Church Lane and installing signs to say it is unsuitable for heavy vehicles.

In April Cllr Richard van Dulken reported:

- He will be liaising with Cllr Schwier regarding the 5 worst potholes in the parish – these will include ones on Great Yeldham Road and Cllr van Dulken will look at the ones along Stambourne Road to possibly include this as well.
- Braintree District Council is trying to stop homelessness by helping people prevent this from happening by looking at various options that could be open to residents.
- An Essex County Council household waste survey which was carried out across the county showed that 30% by weight of waste in the black bin is food waste and 10% is glass. Recyclable items need to be disposed of correctly to reduce this, a behavioural change is required to change this.

Other business in the April meeting included:

- Neighbourhood Plan will be progressed to the consultation stage as soon as practicably possible.
- Strategy document agreed for publication.

- Further issues of heavy goods vehicle attempting to go down church lane were discussed and have been reported to Cllr Schwier to reinforce the need for signage to stop large lorries travelling along this road.

Toppesfield Playgroup History

Just a note to clarify the earliest beginnings of the Little Chestnuts Nursery.

In 1973 a group of young mums found themselves taking their children out of the village to attend a Playgroup in Finchingfield and so got together to form a committee to start a group here in Toppesfield. Catering for 3 to rising 5 year olds in association with the Preschool Playgroups Association with their guidelines and training courses, which we attended.

Several of us ran and staffed this enterprise for many years, at first led by Margaret Bohling from Little Yeldham, who had previous experience. So this was Toppesfield Playgroup.

The Toddler Group was formed a little later to cater for younger children, separate from the Playgroup. The Playgroup was keen to offer the opportunity for older siblings to play and learn at their own level whilst not hindered by their younger siblings. It also allowed the younger ones to have separate time with their Mums or carers at their level of need.

Now the Little Chestnuts Nursery has changed in many ways while providing the opportunities for learning through play and social interaction with other children and adults outside the family as always—we hope they go from strength to strength.

Toppesfield Footpaths Walking Group

As some of you may know, whilst checking out the route of the footpath number 23 last month I had an unfortunate experience with my young Jack Russell who slipped the lead close to the Sewage Works. He managed to get under the fence, probably after a rabbit and managed to jump straight into the raw sewage first holding tank, which you can imagine was very thick like quick sand. By the time I managed to climb the 7ft gate topped with barbed wire, and get to him he was close to drowning in the effluent. I managed to get him out just before he sunk without trace, he stunk for 2 weeks after.

I have been in touch with the Operations Director of Anglian Water and after a site visit they closed the gap under the gate and sorted out the perimeter fence holes as I pointed out to the engineer it was a safety issue. Just a warning to keep your dogs under close control when walking down here as it is a very dangerous site.

I have conducted a walk every Thursday this last year with many enjoyable sunny days with upwards of a dozen walkers and their dogs.

There are no issues on any of the footpaths.

I have purchased a Mini chainsaw to enable branches to be kept in trim on the walks.

Toppesfield Allotment news

We have an allotment that has become available, please let me know if you are interested in this space. Locals first choice but will take others if we cannot fill.

Good to see that Amanda's allotment is in the process of being tidied alongside the chairman's patch, which has been neglected due to lack of time last year. I am on track for a good asparagus harvest.

Good to see that the forest school is going well at the bottom right corner.

If you walk your dog through the green space around the allotments, you are welcome but please pick up your dogs mess !

The May blossom is in full flower at the moment and the birdlife is busy.



Seeing plenty of bolting Rhubarb around at the moment with this dry spell we have had, here's how you can combat it!



Rhubarb tends to bolt, or send up flower stalks, when it's stressed—especially by heat, drought, or age. Bolting diverts the plant's energy away from producing those thick, juicy stalks and into reproduction. The best way to avoid bolting is to keep the plant cool and consistently moist. Rhubarb is a cool-season perennial that doesn't do well in hot, dry conditions, so if you live in a warmer climate, consider planting it where it gets some afternoon shade. Applying mulch around the base can also help regulate soil temperature and retain moisture.

Watering is key. Rhubarb doesn't like to dry out, and drought stress is a big trigger for bolting. Deep, regular watering helps keep the plant stable. Using straw or compost mulch can help maintain consistent moisture levels, especially during hot weather.

If a flower stalk does appear, don't worry—just remove it as soon as you see it. Cut it off as low as possible before it gets too tall. This prevents the plant from wasting energy and encourages it to focus on growing edible stalks instead. Bolting can also cause the regular stalks to taste a bit rubbish, so try and avoid it! The grassland around the allotment and the grass that we planted behind the causeway is now virtually weed free. Keeping it mowed as helped with this.

Get your beans in ASAP if not already done, June may be a bit late.

Everyone knows nettles as a fearsome weed to be avoided and dug up at first sight. But did you know that nettles can be incredibly useful in the garden - here's why...

Nettle Fertiliser

Nettles are a fantastic source of nitrogen, iron, potassium, copper, zinc, magnesium and calcium, making them an excellent fertiliser for most garden plants.

Nettle tea can be used as a general-purpose fertiliser for various garden plans, offering rich nutrient profile due to its natural plant-derived composition. To use the fertiliser, dilute it with water at a ratio of approximately 1:10 (nettle tea to water) and apply it to the soil or as a foliar spray on your plants.

Nettles make a high-nitrogen feed, so they are superb at promoting leafy green growth. In fact there aren't many organic fertilisers that can compete with nettle regarding nitrogen levels.

How to Make Nettle Fertiliser.

Gather the nettles: Select a group of nettles and cut the leaves and stems using gloves and shears to avoid being stung. Collect enough nettles to fill a large container such as a bucket or a barrel.

Prepare the container: Chop the nettle leaves and stems and place them in the container. The container size will depend on the amount of nettle tea you want to create, but ensure there is enough room to pour water over the nettles without overflowing.

Add water: Fill the container with water, covering the nettles completely. Avoid using chlorinated water, as it may inhibit the fermentation process, rainwater is an excellent alternative.

Cover and ferment: Place a breathable cover, such as gauze or cloth, over the container to keep debris and insects out. Set the container in a shaded area and allow the nettles to ferment for at least three weeks, stirring occasionally to encourage decomposition.

Strain and dilute: Once the fermentation is complete, strain the liquid through a sieve or cheesecloth, discarding the solid matter. Dilute the nettle tea with water at a ratio of one part nettle tea to ten parts water. This will create a suitable concentration for the use as a fertiliser.

Application: Apply the diluted nettle fertiliser to the soil around your plants, either by pouring it directly or using a watering can. Nettle fertilisers work best when applied during the growing season, providing an efficient and natural boost to your plants' nutrient intake.

Great for Compost

For the same reasons that nettles make a great fertiliser, they are also excellent for adding to your compost pile.

They are high in nitrogen, so work much the same as grass in getting your compost going and adding heat to your pile. Because they are also packed with other nutrients, they add lots to your compost, meaning you will have well-balance compost.

Fantastic Mulch: Again, for all the same reasons above, nettles make fantastic mulch.

They will improve your soil, and add tonnes of nitrogen and other nutrients while suppressing weeds.

This makes them a really great mulch, with a large asterisk*.

That asterisk is this, ensure you don't pick nettles with seeds on, I'm sure you can see why this would be a huge headache!

Toppesfield Allotment news continued

Work as a great companion plant: Aphids love nettles; they will seek them out over almost all other plants. So, say you have a nettle patch in the corner of your garden, then grow something that struggles with aphids, like lupins next to it.

Adding onto this, because aphids love nettle, so do ladybirds. This is because they know they will find their favourite snack there. So by having nettles, you can keep aphids away from plants you want to grow and attract everyone's favourite aphid hunter.

Lots of butterflies also love nettles, so by having a patch you can help to keep some caterpillars off your crops. You will also support the butterfly population without sacrificing any of your plants, a real win-win for me. What I often do in the garden is to pick caterpillars off any plant I don't want them on, and pop them onto nettles.

I am not against butterflies and love seeing them in the garden, but I don't want caterpillars feasting on my prized cabbages! So I can enjoy butterflies in the garden without worrying about what they are up to!

Nutritious: Many people will also eat nettles due to their high nutrient levels. Apparently they are a bit of a superfood. This isn't something I have tried, but there are tonnes of recipes out there. I will say, only use nettles you grow in your own allotment or garden, don't forage for them unless you know the area. This is simply because people love to spray nettles with weed-killer, and you don't want to be digesting that!

The Easter Draw was a great success.

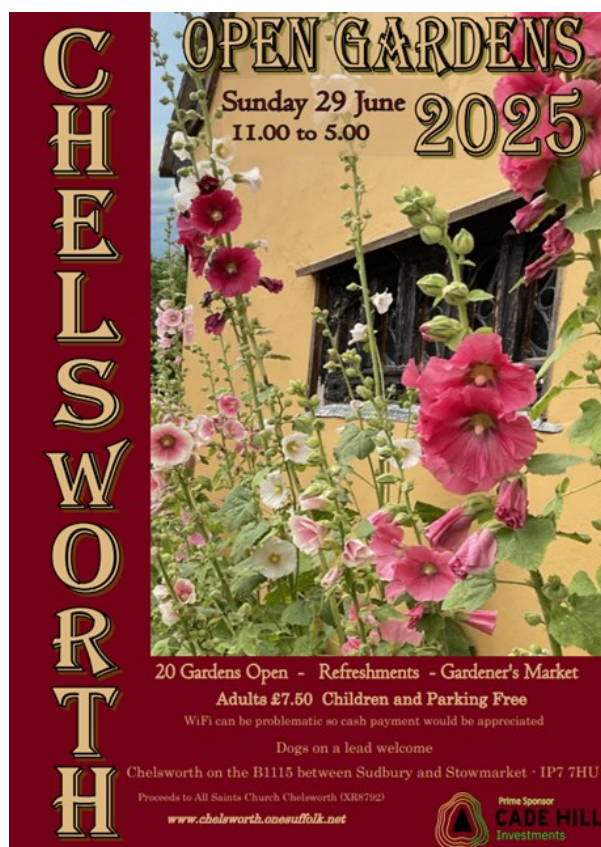
Taste of East Anglia, Kentwell Hall, 14th of June

Suddenly it seems that everyone is wanting beer! The post-Christmas lull is over and we are receiving an increasing request for beers.

Part of this is due to the imminent 80th anniversary of VE Day. The actual day is the 8th May but we are supplying beer for events from the 8th through to the 11th May. On 8th May we will be at Shalford's celebration, on Saturday 10th we are supplying the beer for the Finchingfield British Legion event and on Sunday 11th our Allied Amber – together with its specially designed pump clip - will be on show at Toppesfield's own celebration. Our special thanks to Wendy Ames for designing the eye-catching clip, which is shown here.



Before that, we will be holding a pop-up-pub at Stambourne village hall on Friday 2 May. This is planned to complement the Pizzeria Gusto pizza van that will be providing authentic wood-fired pizzas between 4pm and 8pm. Beer and pizza: sounds good to us! Beer can be consumed in the hall or can be taken away. We have recently changed the way we are operating at the brewery, following Aaron reducing his hours in order to focus more on his studies. He is now brewing one day each week and a small group of volunteers is undertaking the racking weekly.

Chris, one of the volunteers involved, is shown here cleaning barrels in preparation for transferring the fermented ale into barrels. It is a satisfying task to help 'give birth' to the beers and we are fortunate to have volunteers like Chris giving up their time to do unpaid tasks like these.



As many know, Pumphouse is one of only 3 community owned breweries in England (there are 2 in N Ireland) and we are the only one in the east and south of the country. One of the effects of this is that we are sometimes asked by others who are thinking of setting up a community brewery about our experiences. In April we had a visit by a group from St Neots who are considering establishing a brewery in a listed oast house in the town. Aaron was able to explain about the challenges and rewards of brewing and the group subsequently had an enjoyable time including lunch in the Green Man.

Toppesfield Village Hall

Village hall is in regular use daily term time for use by the pre-school. Recently they have expanded their hours to include a after school facility for the primary school pupils until 5.15pm four days a week. In addition they have booked some partial weeks in the in the school summer holidays.

The village market continues to be popular, first Saturday of every month with the added lure of bacon butties.

Hall continues to be used for major village events such as flower show and church supper auction, and the recent influx of young families to the village has increased demand for children's birthday parties, and even have a wedding reception booked for later this year.

Sadly the return of evening clubs has not occurred since the Covid epidemic, apart from the carpet bowls which continues on a Tuesday evening. We do get enquiries from various outside clubs but nothing concrete as yet.

Financially the hall is in a comfortable position and have been able to complete some improvements to the outside areas. The well worn metal gate has been replaced by a wooden one more in keeping with the existing front gate and both fitted with an easier latch.

In conjunction with the pre-school we have finally had a large concrete base laid for easier and safer access to enable new sheds to be put up and even up the ground levels, bonus is will and stop the nettles etc that blocked the rear access. The pre-school have had a bespoke outside office space erected to benefit the staff, a quiet place for children and a private space for meeting parents.

Our AGM has been delayed until May15th due to illness and other commitments. Our committee has shrunk to just 5 members which means more work for less people. As with many village organizations it is increasingly difficult to recruit new blood and we are well aware that we are not as active in providing social activities, we are much more of a managing committee focused on keeping the hall financially viable and dealing with everyday needs of maintenance and keeping to the statutory requirements of a charitable organization. We would be delighted to welcome any-one interested in helping to keep this facility running as we are in danger of not being compliant with charity rules to keep operating. Please do consider joining, is just a few meetings a year, but we do want input from our users if you only choose to attend the AGM and share your preferences.

Future improvements will be replacing our dilapidated shed to provide storage for equipment for outside events ie gazebos and garden games. New steps for accessing the stage are planned. Any further ideas welcomed

Hopefully we can return to the hall and its grounds to being the first choice for fetes and celebrations rather than a forgotten resource.
