Parish Council Information

A short summary of Parish Council goings-on at the November and December Meetings:

- In November and December, District Councillor Richard van Dulken reported:
 - Braintree District Council website has information and advice on it regarding the cost of living crisis and information regarding warm bank venues.
 - The Sible Hedingham Medical Centre should be open by 2024.
 - BDC have an ambition to reach a target of 75% recycling rate. This was 54.4 in September. Essex County Council have a target of 60%. In order to achieve a higher recycling rate more education is required. Unfortunately, across the county 25% of food waste goes into the grey bins.
 - The Rural Prosperity Fund (for areas of less than 30 thousand people) of approx. £580, 000 is dedicated to two projects. The first is for villages to set up Repair Café's and the second is for small/medium companies for who are using low carbon technology i.e. installing solar panels or electric charging points. Further details of the fund will follow in due course.
 - The BDC budget setting review will affect the parish directly as they are proposing to reduce the Street Cleaning fund by 33%. Also 88% of homes have a green bin collection and it is suggested from 2024 there would be a yearly charge of £45 for this service.
 - No news regarding the Wethersfield Prison project has been received.
- In November Essex County Councillor Schwier reported:
 - Essex County Council has discounted broadband packages available.
 - Free meals scheme was delivered over the October half term.
 - Avian Flu increasing and exclusion zones are now in place.
 - Funds are still available from the discretionary grant fund.
 - Councillor Peter Schwier agreed to contact Highways department to progress the issues with the road defect on Toppesfield Road and the drainage issues on Church Lane near house number 28.
- The Road between Great Yeldham and Toppesfield is planned to be closed January 23rd 26th.
- Goal posts for the playing field at Gainsford End have been purchased and will be installed in the spring.
- Toppesfield PC has joined the Braintree Area of Local Councils.
- There will be a Braintree District Council election in May 2023.
- Plans for Christmas decorations and lighting up the tree were agreed.

Parish Council Information continued

- An update regarding the MoJ proposals for building mega prisons on the former Airfield at Wethersfield was given, WASC, the multi-Parish Council group, has completed its plan of works. No planning application as been received by BDC, and BDC has issued a statement asking the MoJ to clarify its plans.
- A planning application has been made for a 3-story extension to the side of the house at 19 Stambourne Road.
- It is hoped to open the new Petanque court on the Toppesfield recreation field by Easter 2023.
- Flooding on Church Lane from the corner near The Green Man public house to the village hall gates has been reported. Reference number 2806140. Essex County Council have investigated and risk- assessed the issue. Their recent inspection of this issue has prioritised it as not as serious as some of the other defects they are aware of, so have recorded it and will consider it when they are planning future works in the area.

An update from WASC January 2023

It is planned that the four parishes with part of the airbase within their parish will work together on a joint Neighbourhood Plan (NP) which will cover all of Wethersfield and Finchingfield and just the parts of Toppesfield and Sible Hedingham that include part of the airfield. This has been discussed with Braintree District Council (BDC) who are very supportive and wish to progress the joint plan as quickly as possible. BDC has also suggested that a separate joint plan to address just the former airbase might be easier and faster to complete, and this can then sit alongside a joint NP for Finchingfield and Wethersfield.

Braintree District council has issued a statement regarding the Ministry of Justice (MoJ) proposal, issued in September 2021. The full statement can be found on the website, but in essence, it calls on the MoJ to clarify its intentions.

Surveyors have been seen in Wethersfield and Finchingfield, examining the "major junctions". Apparently, they have been acting for the MoJ's agents and are presumably looking at the obvious traffic pinch points in both villages. What a shame they didn't come and look prior to issuing the proposal in September 2021!!

What the parish council does is a mystery to some but in its simplest form the parish council is here to serve its community by providing services and facilities at a local level.

Our Councillors are community spirited and passionate about our parish, wanting to see the precept spent responsibly, care about the future development and facilities and want to try and make a real difference to our community.

In May this year the current Council will step down and a new Parish Council will begin its four-year term.

Toppesfield can have up to seven councillors; currently it has five after some resignations during 2022.

Why not think about putting yourself forward for election this year?

To become a councillor you must:

- be at least 18 years old
- be a British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any other member state of the European Union, and
- meet at least one of the following four qualifications at the date of nomination:
 - Your name must appear on the register of local government electors for the parish;
 - You have occupied any land or other premises as owner or tenant in the parish/community for 12 months;
 - Your main or only place of work during the prior 12 months has been in the parish/community area;
 - You have lived in the parish/community area or within three miles of it for 12 months.

The Chairman, Chris Neale (07540533611) or the Parish Clerk, Kaaren Berry (07341264219) will be pleased to answer any questions you may have about the role.

TOPPESFIELD ALLOTMENTS with NASLAG

Hope everyone had a great Christmas.

I must start off this article with a complaint I am afraid; we are getting more frequent incidents of Dog POO being left over the allotments. It is a

shame that dog walkers that take the route around the green spaces that we try to keep tidy do not have the courtesy of bagging up you pooch faeces.

Tommo's Tips

January is probably the coldest period of the winter and coming on top of the floods and heavy rains of just before Christmas it is well worth taking the time to look over the allotment and prioritise the jobs for the month. Top of the list has to be clean up the plot and dispose of all the damaged and rotten crops. Don't worry too much about soil preparations for now just concentrate on clearing the way for a February blitz; weather permitting of course. Most of the overwintering vegetables will have suffered under the wet conditions make a list , visit the site shed or garden centres and get in what replacement seeds or bulbs you will need for your immediate needs.

Harvesting

Brussels sprouts, cabbages, leeks and parsnips, if they haven't been damaged by flood water. Check on any vegetables in store and discard any that have gone mouldy or rotten.

Sowing and planting

Patience is the watchword. The days are still too short and cold even to think of sowing seeds either outdoors or in the open. A few sowings of onions, lettuce, peas, broad beans, radish and early carrots can be made under protection towards the end of the month. The January sun can push tempertures quite high so give a little air to transplanted lettuce plants on warm days closing down early in the afternoon.

General

Protect overwintering vegetables under cloches or fleece, don't forget to ventilate and allow plenty of fresh air to get in on sunny days. Under protection winter sunshine temperatures can get as high as on a hot summer's day.

Pack some straw or fleece around celery to protect it from any damaging frosts but remove it on sunny days to let the plants breathe.

Draw the soil up around the stalks of cabbages and winter cauliflowers to just under the first set of leaves. Check over Brussels sprouts and sprouting broccoli and support them with a strong stake to prevent them from being blown over in high winds.

Take advantage of days when the soil is frozen hard to barrow and stack manure and compost close to where it will be dug in later on. Don't walk on the soil as it begins to thaw it will be wet and sticky.

If you have any plants or seedlings ticking over in a cold greenhouse cover them with several layers of newspaper on frosty nights but remove it on warm days.

Cloches

Dig up rhubarb roots and divide them leaving the sections on the surface of the soil for a few days to let them be frosted prior to forcing. Cover any crowns in the soil that have been set aside for forcing with an upturned bucket or flowerpot and cover the drainage holes to shut out the light. With luck you will be harvesting pale pink sticks by late February.

Check on any fruit and vegetables in store and remove any that are diseased or soft.

Towards the end of the month when the weather and soil conditions allow plant out soft fruit bushes. Spray all fruit trees and bushes with a garlic winter wash on a fine day; do not spray in frosty conditions. It won't hurt to hold the job over to next month.

Seed potatoes will be available from the end of the month. Order your seed potatoes and collect seed trays or wooden tomato trays ready to chit them in. On days when you can't work on the plot clean the shed, greenhouse, tools and linseed oil any wooden handles. Check that the watering can and buckets don't leak and that the wheelbarrow doesn't have a flat wheel.

We have one allotment available from the end of March so anyone wanting a plot or even half a plot please contact me.

LETTERS FROM UKRAINE



Last year, a number of Ukrainian families were guests in Toppesfield for several months. In the last Newsletter, we explained how 3 of the families were getting on after they decided to return home, when the situation in Ukraine appeared to be improving. The fourth family moved to Scotland where the daughter had obtained a scholarship to Glasgow University; in any event, they would have been unable to return as their home town continues to be occupied by the invading Russians.

Since then, they have stayed in touch with friends in Toppesfield, largely through WhatsApp messaging.

The following are extracts from messages they have sent. The messages cover topics from the mundane and ordinary to their experiences of missiles, power cuts, destroyed build-ings and forced appropriation of property.

We often read about or see on TV conflicts from around the world but they often seem so distant. In Ukraine it is different, not least because it is nearer to us but also because many of us know people who are suffering.

When reading the following, please bear in mind that, as good as it is, Google Translate provides a less than perfect English version of the original Ukrainian!

'**We are fine**, but every day there are many rockets coming, and not far from us, a power plant was also damaged. We have already been informed that there will be no light all day tomorrow, we don't know what will happen next'

'Good afternoon, our dear friends! Thanks to God, everything is fine, but we are very worried about what will happen next. Yesterday, Russia launched 100 missiles all over Ukraine, they are causing a lot of trouble and they don't stop. The light is turned off almost every day, sometimes for 2-3 hours, sometimes from morning to evening. But these are trifles compared to the fact that they bomb residential buildings and kill peaceful people, children, after the war the lights will be repaired, and no one will return the people I hope the war will end soon and we will see each other.'

'England helps Ukraine a lot, and we are grateful to everyone who supports us!'

'We probably won't have a Christmas tree this year. The lights are turned off every day, it's very difficult because there is no schedule. They turn it off at any time, sometimes there is no light all day, only at night for a few hours, and I'm so excited... they gave the light!!! and I run like a bee to turn on the washing machine, vacuum, wash the dishes, take a bath, so that I can do everything in time. And while I do everything, I will sleep for 2 -3 hours and I have to get up for work. But nothing, I'm not sorry, I'm just telling it like it is, before people lived without electricity at all and we will move. I am really looking forward to the end of this terrible war, and I want you to come to us!!!' '**Russia thinks that by taking** our light and warmth, we will get scared, start to panic and give up. But they are wrong, we only become stronger and not broken!!! There are disconnection schedules, but they do not all match. On Thursday, when there were rocket attacks, there was only 20 minutes of power per day. Today it was in the morning from 9:00 to 12:00 and in the evening from 17:00 to 19:00, they just took it away'

'I'm doing well at work, there's a lot of work, now it's such a time that many patients are sick. However, the polyclinic has been separated from the hospital for almost a year, and they can't sign a contract with us, and that's why they don't pay us much, we already have a lot of debt. But we hope that everything will be fine from the new year. With this blackout, my oven broke, there must have been a lot of voltage when the light was turned on and the electronics went astray. And I can't bake. Now many people have such problems. We will be without a cake for a while, it will do us good, we eat too much sweets!'

'After the shelling, we had electricity for 2 hours a day'

'As a result of the latest shelling (a rocket exploded 2.5 km from our house), we had no electricity, no internet, no mobile communications for 4 days. And even now the electricity is 8 hours a day and the connection works intermittently. But we do not lose optimism and believe in the victory of Ukraine.'


'**Winter has started earlier** this year. From freezing rain, which covered all the trees and roads with a layer of hard ice. Such a snowy winter happens in Kyiv once every 4 years. And as we sit by the fireplace our hearts fill with the warmth of memories from being in

'I am very worried about my parents and home. The situation there is very tense, people live in fear for their safety and life, constant air raids.'

'In Ukraine 40% of the energy infrastructure was destroyed due to the war. In my city of Skadovsk there are now a lot of armed people of the Russian army, they loot, break into houses and apartments of people who have left and take away their property and transport. In my flat, which was converted into a notary's office, 2 weeks ago, armed people from Russia broke down the front door, changed the entrance locks, and access to it is impossible.

My dad saw all this lawlessness, but he could not prevent them, since they were armed. This happens on a massive scale, people are simply illegally deprived of their private property and evicted from their own homes, and the military is settled in the vacant place.

I am very worried about my parents, the Russian military is also inhabited near their apartment, and unfortunately, I had to take antidepressants in connection with these events in order to somehow maintain my psycho-emotional state and health.'





'I returned home yesterday and I am very glad about it. There were air raids and 4 explosions in the evening, but we are far away, where we don't know for sure yet. I am very happy to be at home. Now I have a big mess in the house and in the yard, but my eyes are afraid, my hands are doing ... '

'Now I catch myself thinking that I miss England. Probably, there has never been a single day when I did not remember spending time in England. Everything is stable with us - air raid alerts, sometimes 4 times a night, and during the day too, there are fewer explosions now than 4-5 days ago. When I hear explosions, I immediately understand that someone had a great grief.'

'We're all pretty stressed out. All the media write about the possible infliction of a tactical nuclear strike on Ukraine after these untruthful referendums on the accession of the occupied Ukrainian territories to the Russian Federation. Ukraine intends to liberate its territories, and Russia considers some of them to be its own. Another escalation of the conflict. There are bombings every night and day, but I can no longer sleep in the basement. Mentally tired. I sleep in the house, and my husband is in the basement.'

'Words of support are always important and necessary. Of course, we believe in the best, but insanity actions in Russia do not give any result! We thought that this was already the bottom for them, but, it turns out, they guessed it. This is some kind of abnormal and very dangerous country! We didn't even discover it before.'

'We are very tired of all these constant bombings, day and night '

'**This damned war** has changed our life completely and our windy world too. Yesterday was a terrible day in Ukraine. All people cried... and then sang our songs. They won't break us. We love life, our Motherland and treat people with respect. other countries! We love and respect other nations!'

'**Today they blew up the chestnut square** in the city center and the flower market. How I hate them.... It hurts to think about it and see it. I really miss England. It was a happy time for me!

I really want to be together, so that there is peace and live like before, with your normal life... Is it really that much? There is no water, the Nazis are blowing up our power plants .. in our city. Today there was no light for a whole day ... now they have already turned it on. Public transport trolleybuses and trams do not run, you can't turn on the lights in the evening - blackout ... This is very sad and hard ... Sorry, but I can't talk on the phone right now, it's very difficult for me mentally. I want back to Ukraine, but I don't want to go back to the war.'

'**My friend told me that the Russians** appropriated her notarial office with its furniture and appliances, the notarial archive, which is the property of the state, appropriated it. The same thing happened to her car garage... Now she does not have her property - her office' '**This is difficult**, but we hold on and even gather friends to our place on Saturday. We will make Ukrainian bograch and fry kebabs! The main thing is to be calm in the city! We pray about it. I've had a tough week, but I'm not giving up!'

'Thank you for your kind words of support! We are having hard times now, they have been hard since the beginning of the war, but especially now. Everything is fine with us, after a massive attack - yesterday and today it was bad with the Internet, the power is turned off, and we have not had drinking water in our city since April. But our citizens have learned to get around these difficulties - everyone has candles and imported water ... As long as there is heating, everything is fine. This terrible dream should end soon, we all want to wake up... We are so used to it that we do not pay attention to the air raid alert, everyone is minding their own business, working. Yesterday, many saw and heard rockets. Surprisingly, it flies quietly, and after it there is already a very strong sound!'

'I remember England with joy and love! Now it's a little difficult for us - there was no water, now there is electricity! My work is now impossible without the Internet... A lot of people need legal and psychological help! We try, but the soul is also very hard! I love Toppesfield so much!'



'**We had no light, heat and communication for a day**. Now everything is getting better, but my mother still has neither light nor heat. It's impossible to believe, but it's true 21st century We try to hold on. I try not to think deeply about everything, otherwise it be-

comes very bad at heart. We just live day by day.'

'We are very dependent on electricity. This is our pain. If we are without light, then I will not be able to attend. When there is no light, there is nothing, no heat, no water, no connection. I love the Christmas fuss so much, but we don't have it... It's very sad, no one thinks about gifts and holidays... '

'Good evening! Now we have every day by candlelight - there is no light for 12 hours, but we decided to make beauty out of this problem and do not despair!'

'Happy New Year! peace and happiness to all of us in the new year! We drank red wine in memory of those heroes who gave their lives and shed their scarlet blood for our freedom and independence!'

'Give everyone in Toppesfield our most sincere congratulations for a Happy New Year.'
